New Publication Deals With Fishing Boats of the World

Design, construction, engines, gear and equipment of scores of fishing boats from dozens of different countries are discussed comprehensively in Fishing Boats of the World, a 650-page book which has just been published by The Fishing News, Arthur J. Heighway Publications Ltd., Ludgate House, 107 Fleet Street, London E. C. 4, in cooperation with the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), Rome, Italy.

The book (\$1.50 a copy) contains some 600 illustrations and is based on 70 papers presented at the FAO International Fishing Boat Congress held in Paris and Miami in 1953. In total some 140 naval architects, boat builders, engineers, gear manufacturers, and other experts have contributed.

Dealing entirely with fishing boats, the book is the most comprehensive volume covering this field. Some idea of its scope can be obtained from the fact that in the opening chapter on boat types, short distance, surface, bottom, and combination fishing are each dealt with extensively, followed by a section on research vessels, and sections dealing with materials, fish-holds, and economics. In the course of this chapter, the hull shapes, characteristics, qualities and defects of boats operating in the United States, India, Pakistan, France, Germany, Iceland, Norway, Sweden, Belgium, Denmark, Italy, Japan, Canada, Britain, Ireland,

Belgian Traffic Keeps To Right, English to Left, Says Harry Carter

Once more Mr. Harry Carter has sent us a Report for the Roys, covering his European trip. He says:

"When traveling in Europe it is extremely advisable to watch one's step. In Belgium traffic keeps to the right. Back here, in England, one must remember that all traffic keeps to the left, as it does, we believe in Sweden. Bicycles creep up on one so silently and their name is legion.

"Riding in a friend's little Ford, through some picturesque counties, including my own Surrey, we have arrived at Salisbury. Not far from here is that baffling relic of the Stone Age called Stonehenge, considered by archeologists to be from 4000 to 6000 years old. Among this concentric ring of stones is one 22 1/2 feet high embedded 6 feet in the ground. All are dressed and cut with sockets and tenon joints.

"Seen from its wide, tree lined lawn, Salisbury Cathedral presents a most satisfying sight. Dedicated in the year 1258, of pure early Gothic construction, it is surmounted by a spire 400 feet in height, the tallest in the country.

"Let's go through Market Square. The stalls are rather close together. The browsing multitude moves slowly, speculating on quality and prices.

"A fishmonger advertises fresh haddock. Oak smoked kippers. Here are fresh eggs at 64 cents a dozen, roasting chickens at 50 cents a pound, broilers at 37 cents. Jersey tomatoes at 25 cents a pound remind one of that mild and sunny little group of islands, the Channel Isles, 120 miles south of Southampton. Cabbages there grow six feet high and walking canes not very strong 'tis true, are made from their stalks. These islands have practically no winter. Years ago we loved to go to Jersey or Guernsey for vacations.

"The writer has now reached Burnham on Sea, on the shores of the Bristol Channel, where grassy, sloping banks drop gently toward the water from the promenade. This is an ideal place for relaxation and a look at the times of the buses to Wells.

"The bus winds its leisurely way through Somerset lanes to the small but historic city of Wells.

"The unfortunate Charles the First may have lost his wallet some time before he lost his head, for in the Town Hall there is an original letter of his, requesting a loan of 500 pounds.

"The guide book says that Wells Cathedral is one of the loveliest churches in the world."

"It further states that 'the great West Front is a colored curtain of carved stone, adorned by more than 300 statues.' Instead of trying to check up on the actual, it was sufficient to stand and gaze and wonder at the marvelous skill in planning and craftsmanship shown by the 13th century men who were responsible for the construction of it all.

"The first thing one notices on entering is the massive 'upside down' arch. This curious piece of architecture was constructed later than the original arch on which it rests, the idea being to support the tremendous weight of the central tower then considered in dangerous condition.

"Joining a large crowd in the North Transept we watched the strange goings on of the Cathedral clock. A seated figure high on the wall kicks two bells to strike the quarter hours. As the hours strike the figures of knights on horse-

back on top of the clock revolve whilst, on the outside wall two warriors in armor strike bells with their halberds.

"As the mellow tones die away a deeper note is struck. The Dean of the Cathedral steps forward, delivers a brief talk and leads the assembled company in prayer.

Accidents Rank Fourth As Cause of Death

Accidents rank fourth as a cause of death in Texas. According to Dr. Henry A. Holle, Commissioner of Health, 5,372 Texans died last year of this one cause, while thousands more were crippled. There are no figures available on the number of days lost because of accidents, there can be no doubt but that it is tremendous.

Automobiles caused 2,519 deaths or 47% of the total. The dangerous curves and intersections on the highways in Texas are well marked and drivers can assist greatly in reducing accidents by carefully observing them.

Many accidents could be avoided if motorists would drive below the legal speed limits when tired, sleepy, in rainy weather and when

other hazards exist. One should adhere closely to the law regarding the dimming of lights for approaching cars. It is an old saying, but true, that those who drink should not drive.

Many deaths are caused by accidents in the home. A total of 650 deaths were caused last year by falls. In homes most of these fatal accidents occur on either outside or inside stairways. Of course, there are many other locations in the home where accidents can and do happen.

Disorderly housekeeping, poor furniture arrangement, slippery waxed floors, worn floor coverings, unanchored rugs, neglected repairs and dark or obstructed passageways are other fall hazards found in many homes. Short cuts and so-called time savers frequently lead to accidents. The time saved is insignificant compared to the

cost and time lost from an accident. When everybody develops safety habits, accidents will not be "fourth" as a cause of death.

FORMER ROCKPORT CITIZEN HONORED

A former Rockport citizen, Ike Barton McFarland, was recently honored in Houston by a testimonial dinner, given because of his work in combating polio. The following write-up brought to our attention by Mrs. D. A. Baldwin, was taken from the Houston Chronicle of June 15, is full, because it may be of interest to friends and acquaintances. It says: Ike Marton McFarland, humanitarian.

The quiet, 71-year-old man sat at the head table Monday night and heard of his determination to continue his work until the word polio would cease to be synonymous with fear and panic.

Those at the testimonial dinner in the Rice Hotel knew Ike McFarland as the man who has always stood in the background, modest to praise others, modest about his own sacrifices.

That's why the leaders of the Harris County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis gathered to praise the chapter chairman.

Carlton Speed, Houston oilman and vice chairman of the chapter, presented McFarland with a collection of letters and a brief history of "Houston Polio Story."

Lloyd Gregory, master of ceremonies, traced the early history of the local chapter.

It was a story of McFarland's vigorous leadership in the days when the local hospitals refused to admit polio patients to their wards.

Perhaps it seems unbelievable now but nurses refused to care for polio patients and mothers became nurses aides to care for their own children.

There were words of praise from Cal Wilson, regional representative for the foundation, from Dick Gottlieb, 1956 chairman of the March of Dimes campaign, from Col. Joseph Evans, Houston cottonman.

In a telegram, Evans wrote what Gregory termed a capsule of what everyone wanted Ike McFarland to know:

"You have managed some way to stay in the background and give credit to others when you were the main spring that provided the inspiration . . ."

To McFarland, perhaps, the expression he appreciated the most is one he has heard many times before. Said his wife:

"I've always said that the thing I'm proudest of is that I'm Ike's wife."

In response, McFarland gave credit to the foundation for its help through the epidemics, and warned that there is still work to

Precaution Saves Boating Tragedies

Precaution saves boating accidents. A little care can save lives, boats and equipment, as well as bring the vacationer home safe. Terrible tragedies like the recent one in Port Bay are needless, yet, with the coming of summer and the influx of vacationists, unless this year differs from preceding ones, there are going to be a number of people drowned.

Life insurance statisticians state that the three summer months account of about a half of the 6,500 annual accidental drownings in the United States.

The daily average rises during June, comes to a peak in July, and tapers off in August.

While many of these result from swimming, a lot more are due to the carelessness and crazy things people do. One greenhorn who won't listen, or a fool, can cause plenty of grief to innocent passengers in a small boat, and carelessness here can kill just as surely as a gun.

To combat this lack of knowledge on the part of some people, and foolishness on the part of others, the Coast Guard has compiled a simple set of rules for boating safety.

Do not overload your boat. Fishing, rowing and small outboards should never carry more than four people at the outside, and for most of them three is plenty. Such a boat is easily swamped by the passing wave of a motor boat or larger craft, by a sudden squall, or by the excitement of one of the passengers who, for no good reason, may attempt to stand up or move around in the craft.

Do not leave shore in a leaky or poorly constructed boat. You're inviting trouble if you do.

Liquor and safe boating do not mix, any more than liquor and automobiles.

Observe the pilot rules, which you may obtain by writing to the commander, Eighth Coast Guard District, New Orleans, La., or from your nearest Coast Guard station. There are rules of the road on the water, just as there are on land.

Instruct at least one of your passengers or crew in the rudiments of handling your boat if you should become disabled, and, without alarming them, see that all hands know what to do in an emergency. Show everyone the location of emergency equipment.

Don't hurry when operating your boat, or when securing equipment and supplies for it—take your time and use caution.

Obtain local information and familiarize yourself with the locality where you intend to operate. Do not venture into dangerous or restricted waters.

Have your life preservers handy, and wear them when conditions warrant it.

Check your weather and tides before going out, and have due regard for them.

On an inboard boat, be sure that your gasoline filler pipes are on the inside of the combing, and that they extend to the bottom of your gas tank.

Be sure your fuel tanks are vented.

Bilges should be kept free of oil, waste and grease at all times.

Be sure your electrical equipment and wiring are in good shape.

Have an adequate fuel filter; check your battery and its ventilation.

Do not operate near swimmers. Do not use gasoline stoves.

Do not use kapok-filled life preservers as seats, as such action compresses the filler, and reduces its efficiency.

Do not fail to provide lifebelts for children.

State Selective Service Holds House Cleaning

State Selective Service headquarters Thursday completed a big house-cleaning chore it has been at since April 21st, destruction of the draft files of approximately 1,750,000 men who registered with draft boards between 1940 and 1947.

It finally turned out to be close to a 200-ton job. The bulky records, stored in Austin since 1947, were sold to a paper company, which in turn is selling them to a Michigan pulp mill.

An official Selective Service representative had to sit by a shredding machine to see that every file was destroyed, since the records are confidential. He has certified that he witnessed destruction of the records.

Registration cards and classification records of everyone who registered during the 1940-47 period are being saved, also approximately 81,000 files, mostly involving men classified as aliens at one time or another.

Selective Service also is keeping records of men registered under the current draft law, which went into effect in 1948. These records are now in 137 draft boards over the state.

"The draft law is still in effect," damage others.

cautions Brigadier General Paul L. Wakefield, state Selective Service director, who was in charge of the destruction program. "Males reaching 18 are still required to register. All males born on or since August 30, 1922, should be registered with local draft boards under the present draft law."

The old draft records left can be housed in one per cent of the space occupied by the destroyed records. Destruction of the records will reduce space needed by state Selective Service headquarters more than half.
