

School Board Eyes, Approves Budget

The School Board, at their regular meeting Tuesday night, spent most of their time discussing the tentative budget for the forthcoming year, and voted to have this published as soon as Supt. Pat H. Greene could prepare it.

They also called a public hearing on this for Friday night, Aug. 19,

in the Commercial Room of the High School at 8 p. m.

The proposed school calendar was approved by the board.

The board has received a signed contract on construction of new bleachers for the football field, and the contractor has promised completion of these by Sept. 15.

Supt. Pat H. Greene reported that all samples of water used in the school had been reported o. k. by the State Board of Health.

An extremely interesting and somewhat startling report was made by Greene, who said that only \$35,593.51 remained to be paid on outstanding bonds, including those issued in 1951. With the payment of this sum, the school district will be in no indebtedness whatever.

Sufficient money will be available in October, from 1955 taxes to pay this amount in full. However, the bond issue for the high school is not callable until 1956, so this will be set aside as a surplus to meet these bonds when due.

Superintendent Greene also reported that the state had okayed teachers for special education of handicapped children. However, due to inadequate classroom space, this allotment had to be refused, and cannot be taken advantage of until sufficient room is found in which to conduct such classes.

Heldenfels Widening Highway in Refugio Co.

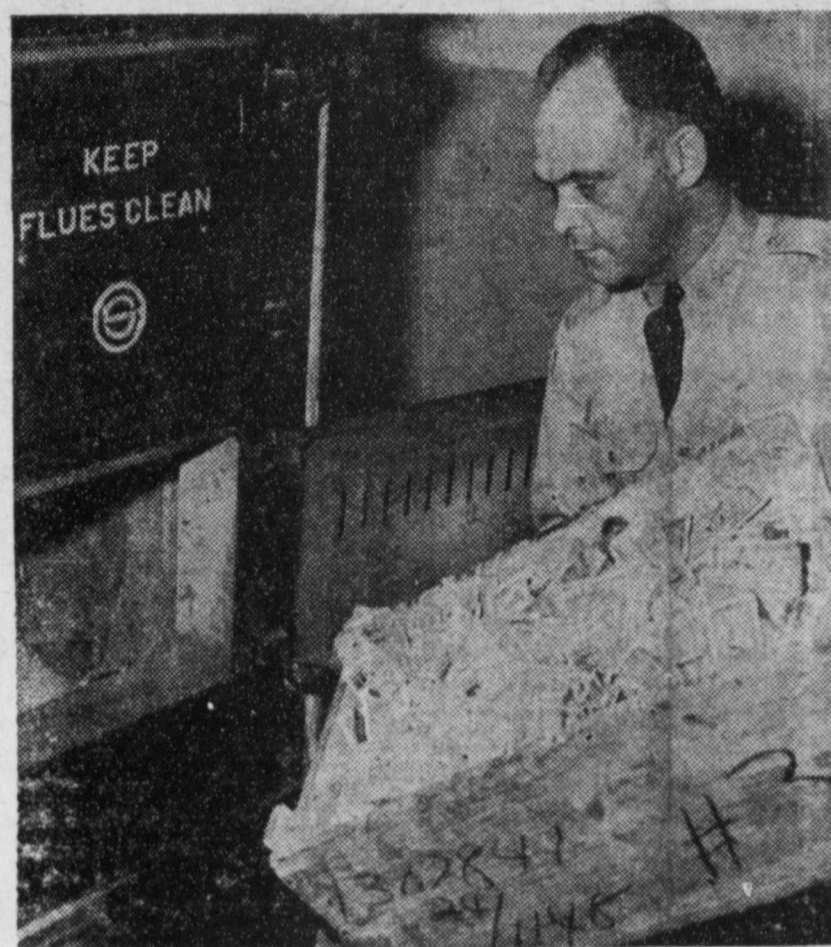
Work is in progress on the widening of culverts and other improvements on the section of U. S. Highway 77 in Refugio County from Greta to the county line at the San Antonio River.

F. W. Heldenfels Jr. of the construction firm of Heldenfels Brothers made the announcement today. His organization holds the \$69,872 contract.

The Heldenfels firm recently rebuilt 17.5 miles of Highway 77 from Victoria to the San Antonio River in Victoria County.

Rolling Greenhouse, Only One of Kind In World, Visits Rockport This Week

Something new rolled through Rockport this week, driven by J. E. Shows of Corpus Christi—a flower garden on wheels, contained in a giant trailer truck with walls of glass, its weather regulated by air conditioning—the only one of its kind in the world!

Shows, who operates a landscaping company, specializes in floral decorations for weddings and displays, and the replanning of gardens. One of his headaches has always been the problem of deliver-

ing his delicate merchandise in perfect condition, with blooms at their showiest.

"You can control things like that in a greenhouse," he said, "but the minute you take the plants out of there, particularly in summer, you run into trouble. If you had your greenhouse right next door every time, that would be fine, but you can't carry one around in your hip pocket, or back it up to the door of a house where you need plants."

To solve this dilemma, Shows dreamed up his mobile flower garden, and then set out to get the \$18,000 glass and aluminum trailer built.

"Practically every trailer manufacturer in the country told me it couldn't be done," he said, "but finally the Fruehauf people over in San Antonio said they would try it."

The thirty-foot van presented many problems. It had to be rigid enough to carry a heavy load without too much flexing, for its sides were to be of glass; which could easily break if there was too much movement. The glass—necessary to give the plants light—could not be in large sheets—that would increase the danger of breakage. Furthermore, the sides of the truck needed to open, like windows, to allow air circulation, yet had to be tight enough when closed so that an oversized air conditioning unit could keep weather inside the truck at the exact temperature and humidity demanded by the plants, if they were to stay in top condition.

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Fire Departments Inaugurate New Training Schedule

U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service Opens Aransas Pass Office, Shrimp Survey to Start Soon

As the first move in a badly needed survey of the shrimping industry, the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service is opening an office in Aransas Pass this week, according to an announcement made Wednesday by George W. Snow, of the service's New Orleans office. Gordon R. Luce will be in charge.

Two additional offices will be opened in Texas — one at Galveston and the other at Brownsville — Snow said, as soon as it is possible to secure adequate personnel.

These offices will assemble statistical and biological data on the Texas shrimping industry, and on this information it is hoped to establish a basis for intelligent management of the fishery and conservation of the resource.

Interviews with crew members, boat captains, fish house owners, and others interested in the industry will be used to determine the actual status of the fishery and abundance of the various species of shrimp.

Individual records thus gained, Snow emphasized, will be strictly confidential, and will only be used along with statistical data to develop the over all, factual picture of the fishery. Knowledge of this sort has never been available previously, but without it no sensible regulation of the fishery can be attempted.

Funds for the survey are available under the Saltonstall-Kenedy Act, which allocates a considerable amount of money for research on commercial fisheries.

Clark Wren Resigns From Democratic Executive Group

Clark Wren, Democratic chairman, Precinct 1, has resigned from the Democratic Executive Committee of Aransas County, effective Aug. 1. So far, no new chairman for the precinct has been elected.

In his letter of resignation, addressed to Emory M. Spencer, chairman of the executive committee, Wren stated that he had hoped that conservative elements of the party would once more lead it into a course of action more in line with his political beliefs.

The action of Governor Shivers in regard to Wright Morrow, of Houston, was criticized by Wren, who said that the fight for a conservative Democratic party having been lost, he no longer felt that he could serve on the committee.

LOCAL ROTARIANS ATTEND KINGSVILLE MEETING TUESDAY

Pat Greene, president, Byron T. Hardeman, secretary, and Fred Bracht, information chairman, of the local Rotary Club attended a one-day meeting of the Rotary Information and Extension Institute for District 185 in Kingsville, Tuesday.

The meeting, held on the campus at A&I, was presided over by Thomas B. Sammons, Jr., governor of the 185th Rotary District, and out of 93 people eligible to attend from the various clubs in the district, 81 were there. Thirty-one of the 36 clubs in the district were represented.

The group met with the Kingsville Rotary Club for its weekly luncheon.

Three Injured in Rockport Area Crashes

Three persons were injured in automobile accidents in Rockport and surrounding area last Thursday afternoon.

Admitted to Rockport Hospital were Mrs. Hilda Epp, who was treated for hip and chest injuries, and Mary Helen Freeman, about 13, who was treated for a deep cut on the forehead. Also injured was Mrs. Opal Mowles who suffered cuts and bruises.

Mrs. Epp was a passenger in a car driven east on Market Street by her brother-in-law, Herman P. Epp, which was in collision with a car driven north on Water Street by Lemuel Byron Allan, 14. The accident occurred about 5:30 p. m. Thursday.

Sheriff A. C. Shivers said Epp's car was knocked 36 feet down Water from the intersection by Allan's car. Neither driver was hurt, but Shivers said Epp's car appeared to be a total loss.

Miss Freeman and Mrs. Mowles were passengers in two cars involved in a head-on collision about 1 p. m. Thursday one mile north of the carbon black plant on Highway 35 near Aransas Pass.

Shivers said a car driven north on Highway 35 by Mrs. Ruby Pollard of Aransas Pass was in collision with a car driven south by Catherine Freeman of Rockport. Mrs. Mowles was in the Pollard car.

Both vehicles were heavily damaged.

Chiefs Fox and Cocke, of the Rockport and Fulton Fire Departments, have outlined a six months advanced training schedule for the combined departments. It is based on recommendations made by the State Firemen's and Fire Marshals' Extension Department at Texas A&M.

Departments have been training new members in pumper operation and hose handling, but the new schedule will cover the actual work of extinguishing different types of fires, such as gasoline, butane, rubber and electrical.

The use of different types of hose nozzles and fire extinguishers will also be taught, as well as first aid and rescue work practices outlined by the Department of Civilian Defense. Training will be given in use of the department's inhalator, salvage and protection of store merchandise and warehouse stock, methods of locating and removing victims under disaster conditions, and treatment of victims who have succumbed to gas or smoke.

This training will be under the direct supervision of the different assistant chiefs who have had school training in these things, using this year's training methods, brought back from A&M by Chief Cocke and Fire Marshal Carl Osborn.

The schedule was outlined to the departments at a joint meeting and was received with unanimous approval by the members.

Osborn reports that the response was much more enthusiastic than that at a meeting of another volunteer fire department, where the members are paid for each drill, and every time they answer a fire alarm.

He pointed out that the Aransas County Emergency Corps, which embraces both the Rockport and Fulton Fire Departments was strictly a volunteer organization, whose members pay 50c a month as membership dues. Osborn reports that other fire marshals who attended the A&M session at the same time as he and Cocke would hardly believe that such a department could be maintained in strength.

City Council Meets Monday Approves Lights

The City Council at its regular meeting Monday night conferred with CP&L officials on the location of new street lights, and approved the company's plans for their installation.

W. W. McClendon, of McLendon and Associates, Corpus Christi, discussed the city's drainage needs, and was authorized to proceed with preliminary mapping on this problem.

The council also decided that the City Hall and Fire Station should be insured, and authorized the necessary expenditure.

Current bills were examined and approved, and there being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

Refraction Survey Set At Wildcat Off Mustang

Two objectives are being sought in a Mustang Island area offshore wildcat being drilled by Atlantic Refining Company and Tide Water Associated Oil Company. In addition to hopes for an oil discovery, the firms plan to use the hole for a refraction survey of much of their offshore tract. Offshore seismography is customarily the reflection method.

Lying off Aransas County, the prospect is located in Block 726, OCS-0501, 18 miles east of Port Aransas. This makes it the first test in federal waters off South Texas. It is the deepest-water mobile platform operation drilled to date, standing in 87 feet of water. Now drilling below 4,909 feet, the operator anticipates hitting salt between 5,000 and 9,000 feet. When this happens, the salt will be drilled to give the hole a total depth of perhaps as much as 12,000 feet.

Instruments will be run to the bottom of the hole to record sonic impulses directly from explosive charges set off on the Gulf floor at the ground surface. This will be Atlantic's first offshore use of the refraction system.

Atlantic and Tide Water have under lease Blocks 716, 725, 726, 727, and the east half of 718, in the Mustang Island area. The wildcat is located 7,000 feet south and 4,300 feet east of the northwest corner of Block 726. The four and one-half 5,670-acre blocks make a total of approximately 26,000 acres in the tract.

The drilling contractor is Glasscock Drilling Company, of Corpus Christi, which is using its "Mr. Gus" mobile drilling platform. The test was spudded on July 24.

A deep Aransas County wildcat, Caroline Hunt Trust Estate No. 4 V. H. Tatton, was drilling below 7,178 feet. Permitted to 10,000 feet, this test is in Section 87, Hanna Kington Survey, A189, 10 miles north-northeast of Lamar. It is about two miles west of Sam E. Wilson, Jr., No. 1 Ocker Brothers, gas discovery.

Caroline Hunt Trust Estate No. 3 V. H. Tatton, wildcat 13 miles northwest of Lamar, has been plugged and abandoned at a total depth of 8,887 feet. The duster is in Section 21, A. M. Berry Survey. Atlantic Refining Co. No. 1 Gilbert Oil Unit, East Aransas Pass Field test six miles north of Aransas Pass, has been plugged and abandoned at a total depth of 7,900 feet. The duster is in John H. Phillips Survey, A-175.

Game and Food Fish of the Texas Coast

In last week's article, we stated that these notes had been made in 1952, which was incorrect. They were actually written in 1951, and at that time were intended for a popular booklet on the game and food fishes of the Texas coast. They do not cover all the fish we have in salt water, because of the minor interest of some species.

We have already dealt with the tarpon, bonefish, and skipjack, so this week will go on to some of the other salt water families, starting with the catfish.

Texas has two species of salt water catfish, the hard head and the gaff top.

The Gafftopsail Catfish, Bagre Marina, ranges from Cape Hatteras south along the Atlantic and Gulf Coasts. It averages from one to two pounds in weight.

Habits and food: Common along beaches and in passes and bays, gafftops swim actively in the channel currents, feeding upon shrimp, small crustaceans, and fish at any level, although primarily bottom feeders. They hit hard, and put up a good fight, especially when large.

Color: Light sea green on the back, sides paling to nearly white on the belly.

The Sea Cat, Galeichthys felis, has other names, including hard-head and a variety not fit to be printed.

Range: Carolinas to the Gulf of Mexico.

Two species of mullet occur in Texas. Only one, the common, or striped mullet, deserves mention here.

The Striped Mullet, Mugil cephalus, is also called mullet, machuto, and lisa, depending on locality.

Size: Averages half a pound. However, in the Laguna Madre they sometimes attain a weight of 5 or 6 pounds. Several years ago, one of the Houston fish markets received one that measured 31 inches and weighed 13 pounds. It came from the Eighth Pass, in Old Mexico.

Color: Usually with a great deal of silver, the scales being arranged in such a manner as to give darker longitudinal stripes along the sides.

There are two species of barracuda. A small form, only about 15 or 16 inches long, is occasionally caught around the passes. This is the guachancho or gauganche, and is rare. However, on some of the reefs along the coast there are large numbers of another species.

This is the Great Barracuda, whose other names include picuda, becuna, sea tiger, tiger of the sea, and "cuda.

Size: Average 5 to 25 pounds. A fifty pounder is large. Record (Bahamas) 103 3/4 pounds.

Habits and food: Usually solitary, swimming near the surface over outside reefs, barracudas occasionally occur in heavy concentrations at the Claypile and Flower Garden Reefs, south of Galveston. In Florida, smaller ones frequent shallow reefs and cuts, and inland bays along the channels. A vicious, savage fish, with a frightening array of teeth, the barracuda makes a hard, slashing fight. It feeds almost entirely on small fish. However, it will attack larger game, including man.

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A. L. Bracht Attends Intracoastal Canal Meeting in Victoria

A. L. Bracht, one of the three remaining charter members, attended the 50th Anniversary Session of the Texas and Louisiana Intracoastal Canal Association at Victoria Monday.

Delegates threw their support behind further expansion of the waterway.

Resolutions passed by the group urged completion of a barge canal linking Victoria to the present canal system along the Gulf of Mexico.

The association also resolved to cooperate with Mexico in extending the canal south from its present terminus at the Rio Grande to Vera Cruz and Tampico, Mexico.

Principal speakers at the session were officers of the Army Corps of Engineers, headed by Maj. Gen. Charles G. Holle of Washington.

General Holle told the 400 delegates the industrially thriving Ohio Valley "uses its connection with the Gulf of Mexico as one of its principal assets." He said the cities along the Great Lakes "are eager for similar connections and have proved it by supporting the Calumetsag Channel which will link the lakes with the Mississippi River system."

The Corps now has a backlog of 8.5 billion worth of water projects, he said, compared with \$6.5 billion spent by the government for all civil works since 1821.

Col. W. P. McCrone of Galveston said the Corps now is studying proposals to expand the present waterway from 125 feet to 300 feet in width all the way from Brownsville to New Orleans.

In an earlier session, the association was addressed by Howard Pyle, deputy administrative assistant to President Eisenhower, who said he felt the federal budget would be balanced this year.

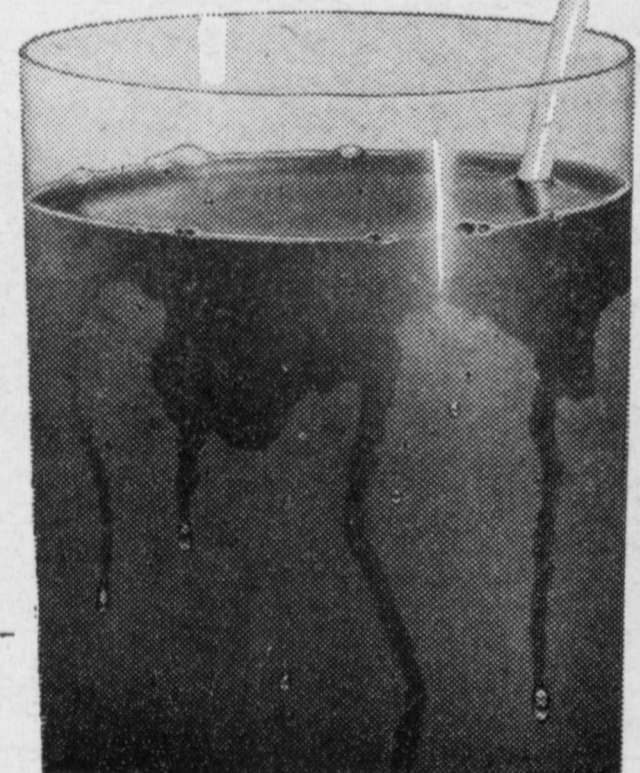

R. A. (Lonnie) Drake Dies In Edna

R. A. (Lonnie) Drake, 59, well known to many Rockport people, and brother of Mrs. G. L. and Mrs. J. F. Brundrett, of this city, died recently at his home in Edna of a heart attack.

He was a native of Edna, having been born June 25, 1896, a son of the late Robert Alonzo Drake and Clara Bronough Drake. He attended grade school there, and completed high school in Rockport in 1914. He later went to Southwest State Teachers College at San Marcos, after which he taught school in the Arenosa community in Jackson County.

Dr. Drake joined the army soon after our entry into World War I and spent most of his service in Europe.

Shortly after returning home, he was married to Miss Bessie Moore of Temple, on June 6, 1920.

In 1920, he opened a men's clothing store in Edna, and was active in the business until his death. A cleaning plant that he opened at the same time was sold in 1945.

Dr. Drake was a tireless church, civic, and community worker, and was active in several of these endeavors at the time of his death.

He was past commander of the American Legion Post at Edna, and wore a 35-year pin; he was a member of the Masonic Lodge for most of his life, serving as Worshipful Master in 1928-29. He served on the Edna School Board for over 20 years; was a long time member of the chamber of commerce of that city, and served as its president in 1931, and later was affiliated with the new Jackson County Chamber of Commerce, successor to the Edna chamber.

Mr. Drake was a charter member of the Rotary Club, serving one year as its president; head of the Salvation Army in the area for 20 years; mayor of Edna from 1939 to 1945; secretary of the County Board of Development; and member of the Edna Coffee Club.

He was a life-long member of the Methodist Church and had served for years as teacher of the men's Bible class, and superintendent of the Sunday School. He was also chairman of the board of stewards for a number of years.

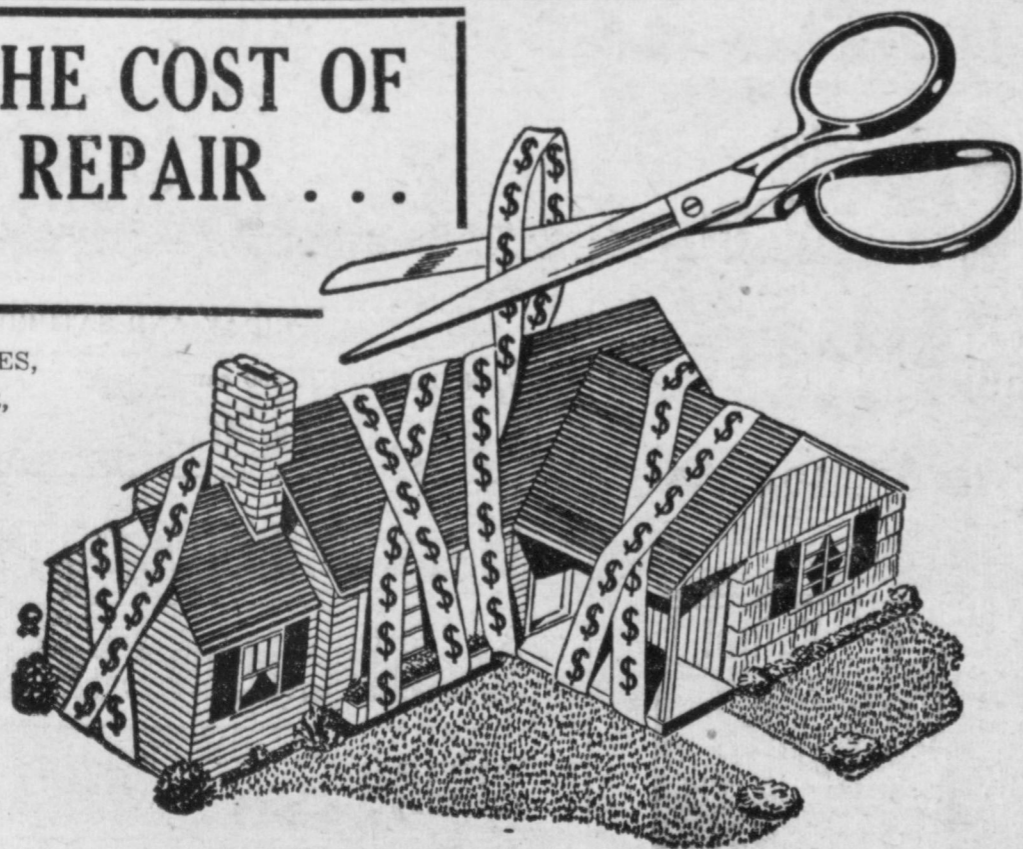

rolled out of the Fruehauf plant looks much like any other trailer until you draw alongside and see its walls of glass jalousies, through which rainbow-hued roses are nodding at the world.

"The van has a temperature range from 30 to 110 degrees," Shows said. "I brought this load from Los Angeles, and though it was 120 degrees when we came across the Yuma Desert, they all came through in fine shape. I can keep flowers and plants in here at the same stage for a year if I want to, by watching the temperature."

Roses of all sorts—Nocturne, New Yorker, Will Rogers, Pride of Los Angeles, and a dozen other varieties—nodded and swayed in the big trailer, whose cool interior smelled exactly like the greenhouse it was.

Some of them had buds, others were in full bloom, and a few, near the door, showed some new growth.

"That's because it's a little warmer there," the landscape planner said. "I've opened the door too much. However, the air conditioner gives me a new tool to work with, and I can keep plants in bud as long as I want. If the flowers ought to be open when I deliver them, all I have to do is turn it up for as long as it takes to get the plant exactly where it should be, and then turn it down again, stopping the growth at that point. It will stay like that until I either change it or take it out of the truck."

Shows has lived in Corpus Christi for 21 years, and during that time has planted gardens for many prominent South Texas families. Sam E. Wilson, A. D. Corgey and Hugh Sullivan, at Corpus Christi; the Waelders of Refugio; the O'Connors of Victoria; and Miss Ima Hogg at Houston all have gardens planted by Shows, either whole or in part.

The most expensive Corpus Christi garden cost \$45,000, he says, but at Refugio he planted one that cost its owners \$185,000!

Shows travels across the nation, from Miami to Los Angeles, and has a second headquarters in Victoria. As he travels, he takes orders, then gets the flowers and other plants wherever they are grown, and delivers them.

He plans to build several more of the big vans as time goes on, and to put them in cross country service.

"It's certainly better than flying flowers in," he insisted. "It only takes two days from California to Texas and they get here in the exact stage the buyer wants." Besides bringing in ordinary plants, the floriculturist expects to bring some rare ones that people in Texas seldom if ever see, because of the difficulty of transplanting them.
