This will be an extremely dignified and reverent program, stressing the part of God in all phases of scouting, and, mainly, will be carried out by the girls themselves. This will be the day and program in which the serious value of Girl Scout work will be presented.

Local Firms To Establish Unemployment Records

Twenty-five employers in Aransas County became liable under the amended Texas Unemployment Compensation Act January 1.

J. W. Eder, District Auditor, advises these employers that establishing payroll reporting accounts with the state office of the Texas Employment Commission, Brown Building, Austin, will help avoid penalties and assessments of back taxes.

An amendment to the state's unemployment compensation laws extended coverage to all employers with as many as FOUR employees on 20 days in 20 different weeks, Eder said. Prior to January 1, 1956 only firms who hired eight or more were affected.

The expanded program also covers a small business which has four people only working Saturdays, or one which regularly has two employees during the day and two others at night.

The state program was extended by the 1955 legislature to conform with Federal statutes already enacted. "Otherwise," stated Eder, "25 County employers of four to eight people would not have the advantage of the Texas system of possibly reduced taxes because of employer experience ratings.

And early action will mean earlier eligibility for reduced tax rates." Combined Federal and state taxes begin at 3 per cent of each annual wage up to \$3000. However, the state's program provides for a possible minimum rate of 1/10 of one per cent, and the 1955 average rate for rated employers was .222 per cent. The net Federal tax is 3/10ths of 1% in addition to the state tax.

Any Aransas County employer of four, five, six or seven persons for 20 weeks during 1955 should request explanations of the state TEUC office about complying with the program, Eder added.

City Council Conducts Routine Business

Fred Bracht Jr. appeared before the City Council Tuesday night, with tentative plans for the new building he expects to erect in place of the old concrete block one now occupied by Aransas Natural Gas and others.

The Council voted \$1000 towards street maintenance in Precinct 2, and approved an ordinance closing portions of various streets, long unused, that pass through school grounds.

Routine bills were approved for payment.

8,000-FOOT WELL SCHEDULED NORTH OF ROCKPORT

Conroe Drilling Co. and Stanolind Oil & Gas Co. have scheduled an 8000-foot Aransas County wildcat seven miles north of Rockport.

The group's No. 1 Fred A. Bracht and others is 405 feet from the north and 1500 feet from the east line of the 814-acre lease which falls in William Lewis Survey, A-96 and the M. Hunt Survey, A-80.

Gaona had just left his car and was talking to foreman Fred Medina when, before his wife could drive away, he collapsed. Taken home immediately, Dr. H. F. Elliott pronounced him dead of a heart attack.

He is survived by his wife, Josephine Morales Gaona; one daughter, Mrs. Bertha G. Garcia, San Benito; a sister, Miss Eloiza Gaona, Harlingen; and three brothers, Manuel, Jose, and Eliazar Gaona, of Mexico City, and three grandchildren.

Commissioners Discuss Beach Road Along Bay

In addition to routine business, the Commissioner's Court, at its regular meeting, discussed construction of a four-lane boulevard along Little Bay, between Rockport and Fulton. After thorough examination of the project, the various commissioners' expressed their willingness to cooperate in such a project, and decided to contact people in the various precincts to obtain right of way needed.

Opening a roadway along Copano Bay, through the Heep property was also considered, and Commissioner Davis was asked to contact Mr. Heep to see if right-of-way could be secured.

Representatives from the Western Natural Gas Company met with the Commissioners and requested aid in rebuilding a portion of the county road entering the Aransas Wildlife Refuge. The court voted to devote \$750 to this project.

James A. Jarboe was awarded the contract on the engineering work at the airport; funds were transferred from one Navigation District fund to another, and current bills were approved and paid.

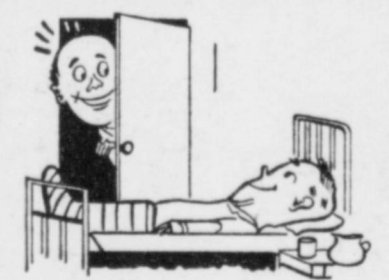

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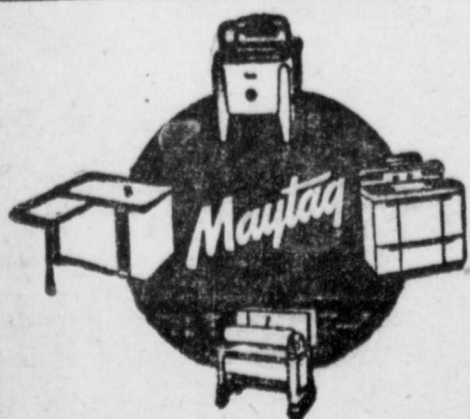

Your Student Council

Have you ever wondered about the Student Council—what the purpose of it is and what system it works upon? Maybe this article can give you this information and clear up some other things about your Student Council.

The Student Council is set up much like the national government. Each homeroom elects its representatives to the Council, just as each state elects its representatives to Congress. The Student body, as a whole elects the president and vice-president, just as the people elect our national president and vice-president. Your representatives on the Student Council represent you, not themselves, just as the representatives in Congress represent the people of their state.

The purpose of the Student Council is to help the students and to try to get something done about their reasonable requests. This year our Student Council is responsible for the flag raising and invocation each morning and it sponsors the paid assemblies. It made a request to the school board for a Coke machine, but it was denied.

A good Student Council should be the most active organization in school and should be close to both the faculty and the students. However, a council cannot be active if the students will not give it their suggestions and their support.

This year our Student Council is carrying out a program to try to get closer to the students. This cannot be done unless the students are informed about what the purpose of it is, and what it can do. The new program includes the reading of the minutes of the council meetings in homeroom meetings. Also, a suggestion box is to be placed in the hall in which the students may drop any suggestions or complaints. The box will be opened before each meeting, and all reasonable ideas will be discussed.

Your Student Council sincerely hopes you will co-operate with its efforts to become closer to the student body—not only for the sake of the council serving at the present, but so that every Student Council in our school in the future will have a more solid foundation.

Woman's Club Building Serves Many Community Needs

The Woman's Club building is steadily increasing in popularity and becoming more necessary to fill the community needs of Aransas County.

That fact was more forcibly brought to mind than ever before when three separate agencies utilized its purpose Tuesday afternoon and still another group benefited by its existence, Tuesday night. Tuesday night, a game party for the pleasure of the tourists was held, one of several held at night, in addition to the weekly parties for the same purpose over a three month period. For several years the Blue and Gold banquet of the Cub Scouts has been staged, rent free, at the Woman's Club building. Also the banquets of the Chamber of Commerce which attract large crowds and such a commodious building is necessary.

Just last week a coffee hour provided a gesture of good will to a group of winter visitors on a conducted tour out of Corpus Christi and a letter from the sponsor of the tour expressed appreciation for the courtesy. So also did a letter from a local church group which recently held a large area meeting there. The building for this purpose was rented for the occasion but the writer expressed gratitude that the community had such a suitable place that was available to the public. For some time the building has been made accessible for the teenagers at a nominal sum and under supervised effort.

Many other community needs are being met by the possession of such a building, some of them, by nature of their use, being on a business basis of rental, such as church meetings, service clubs, banquets and private parties and safety programs held monthly by the oil companies of the area. Each fall the schools of the county are privileged to hold their faculty reception with compliments of the Woman's Club and benefits like programs for the March of Dimes and other similar benefactions are welcomed, rent free.

If we have failed to mention other uses of the club building which has become such a vital part of the community activities, it is because those uses are legion and the citizenry as a whole looks upon the policies with favor.

Marine News

The Mexican Coast Guard, according to the newspaper EXCELSIOR, is intensifying its campaign against foreign fishing fleets in Mexican coastal waters. According to reports, the Coast Guard intends to acquire seaplanes for patrolling the Mexican coasts, a February 28 United States Embassy dispatch from Mexico points out.

Shrimp landings in Texas for January amounted to 1,439,000 pounds, with the following totals for individuals areas: Galveston, 80,000; Freeport, 33,000; Port Lavaca and Palacios, 19,000; Rockport, 60,000; Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi, 308,000; Port Isabel, 461,000; and Brownsville, 528,000 pounds.

This is somewhat less than December landing, which were: Galveston, 31,000; Freeport, 85,000; Port Lavaca and Palacios, 20,000; Rockport, 112,000; Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi, 564,000; Port Isabel, 459,000; and Brownsville, 657,000.

Production for the Texas coast during the whole of 1955 was as follows: Galveston, 2,254,000; Freeport, 5,865,000; Port Lavaca and Palacios, 1,135,000; Rockport, 1,879,000; Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi, 9,289,000; Port Isabel, 5,883,000; Brownsville, 10,716,000 pounds.

These are all heads-off weights. Heads on, landings totaled close to 60,000,000 pounds.

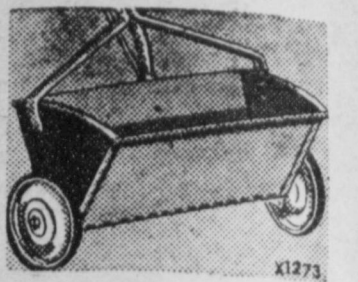
Too bad, too, for the cookies were good. This reporter ate four of them.

Top Command In Radar Strengthened

Oklahoma City, Okla. — To strengthen the aerial defense capabilities in the Southwest, the 33rd Air Defense Division, commanded by Brig. General Wm. P. Nuckols, will operate within new boundaries beginning March 1st. At that time the newly organized 20th Air Defense Division will assume aerial defense responsibilities for Kansas, Missouri, half of Arkansas and the northeast tip of Oklahoma.

Within its adjusted boundaries of Texas, Oklahoma, Arkansas and Louisiana, the 33rd will add eight new aircraft control and warning squadrons and ten automatic auxiliary radar sites. The new units, scheduled for operation this year, will extend radar detection coverage south over Mexico and the Gulf.

Adding new squadrons and radar sites to those now in operation, will give the 33rd area 100 percent coverage over its southern approaches, enabling it to pinpoint interception of any hostile planes at much greater distances from population centers and industrial military targets.

Since its activation in 1951, the 33rd Air Division has been charged with the aerial protection of a six-state area covering over 600,000 square miles. Over this vast area a 24-hour-a-day vigil is maintained by Air Force personnel of the Aircraft Control and Warning Squadrons and members of the Ground Observer Corps. Two Fighter-Interceptor Squadrons maintain around-the-clock readiness and are able to be in the air within minutes to intercept, identify and if necessary, destroy any hostile aircraft in this area. These units are augmented by the jet fighters of the Air National Guard.

The new radar squadrons scheduled for operation this year within the 33rd area will be located at Ozona, Eagle Pass, Zapata, Rockport, Port Isabel, Killeen and Lufkin in Texas and at Lake Charles, La. The ten automatic radar sites will be located near Fannett, Van Vleet, McCamey, Carrizo Springs, Comstock, Delmita, Laredo, Riviera and Palacios in Texas and at Weeks Island, La.

SAFETY INSPECTION DEADLINE ONLY SIX WEEKS AWAY

Safety inspections of the nearly 4,000,000 motor vehicles registered in Texas is "falling seriously behind schedule" with the official deadline only six weeks away.

This was reported today by the Highway Safety Council of Texas after a spot check of authorized inspection stations for the week ending March 3.

Executive Director G. C. Morris of the Council said that inspections had "held to satisfactory pace until January, but inspection stations—particularly in metropolitan areas—report that the required safety checks have been falling seriously behind schedule during the past six weeks."

"In some areas," Morris reported, "motorists seem to have forgotten about inspections altogether and activity has come to a standstill."

Deadline for the inspection of vehicles registered in Texas is April 15.

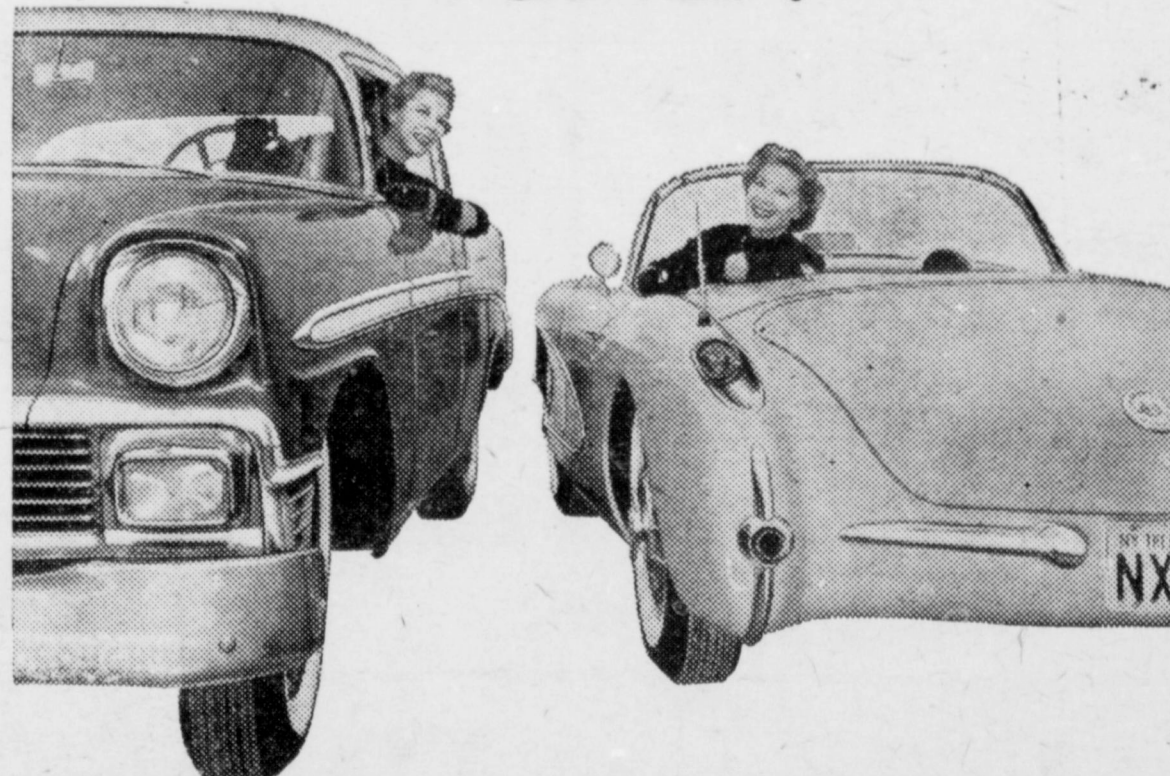

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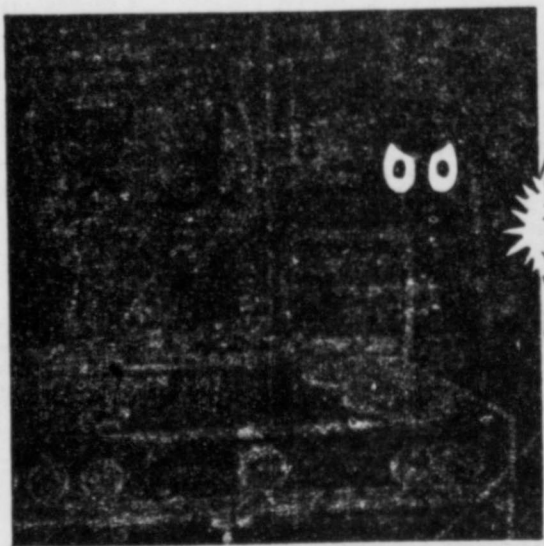

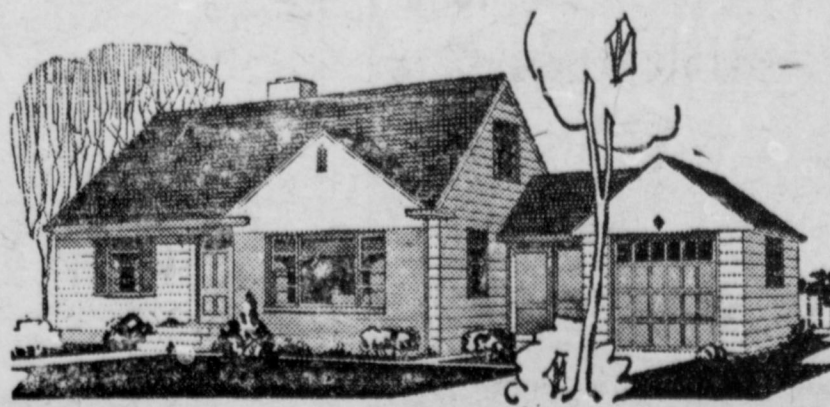

Nearly One and a Half Million Californians Come to Texas As Tourists During Past Year

In a survey of tourist travel in Texas, the Highway Department has come up with some most interesting figures. California was represented here by 1,452,000 native sons. Delaware, next to the

smallest state in the union, sent 8000 visitors to Texas.

According to Highway Department figures, almost 10 million out-of-state tourists spent \$412,000,000 in the Lone Star state last year, a total that places the tourist industry next in line to the state's \$700,000,000 a year cotton crop. One million, two hundred thousand more people investigated the charms of Texas than came here in 1954.

"Texas has been slow to realize the potential value of their tourist industry as a source of cash income," said State Highway Engineer D. C. Greer, "but the steady rise of out-of-state visitors since the end of the war indicates that people in other states are becoming increasingly aware of the state's many attractions as a vacation spot."

The Highway Department maintains bureaus at the state line, where a check is kept on tourist travel.

species as the whooping crane, the grizzly bear, the prairie chicken and the desert bighorn sheep.

Sportsmen's clubs, garden clubs, youth groups and others will schedule special activities in observance of National Wildlife Week. The conservation theme will receive attention in newspapers and on the radio and television programs.

"Conservation," Mr. Steele's announcement concluded, "isn't a one-week task. Fortunately, many organizations and individuals think and talk about it and work at it all the time—but not enough of them do. During the concentrated publicity campaign of National Wildlife Week, we hope to win new recruits for the year-round effort."
