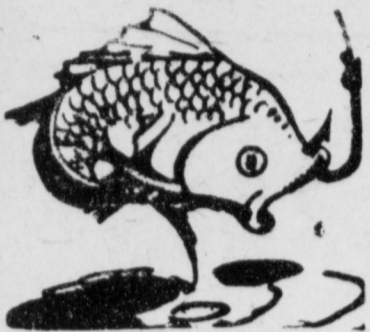


Along The Waterfront

Aerial Maps of Region Now On Display

A series of giant aerial photographs of Rockport, Frandolig Island, and Fulton, made for the Navigation District by the Naval Air Station, are now on display at the harbor-master's office in Rockport.

The photographs, measuring approximately 40 inches by 40 inches, were made as part of the training exercises of one of the flying boat crews, and were presented to the district by the commanding officer at Corpus Christi, for use in planning improvements on navigation district property.

They show three sections of the shoreline, and will be supplemented later by another, of the topography in the Cove area.

As part of the planning for the district, there is an overlay of the Frandolig Island section, which may also be seen. This shows projected improvements on the island and around Little Bay, including a four-lane boulevard, several parks, and a hotel development.

According to the Navigation Commissioners, the public is invited to see these aerials, and the overlay, which have been mounted on the walls of the office.

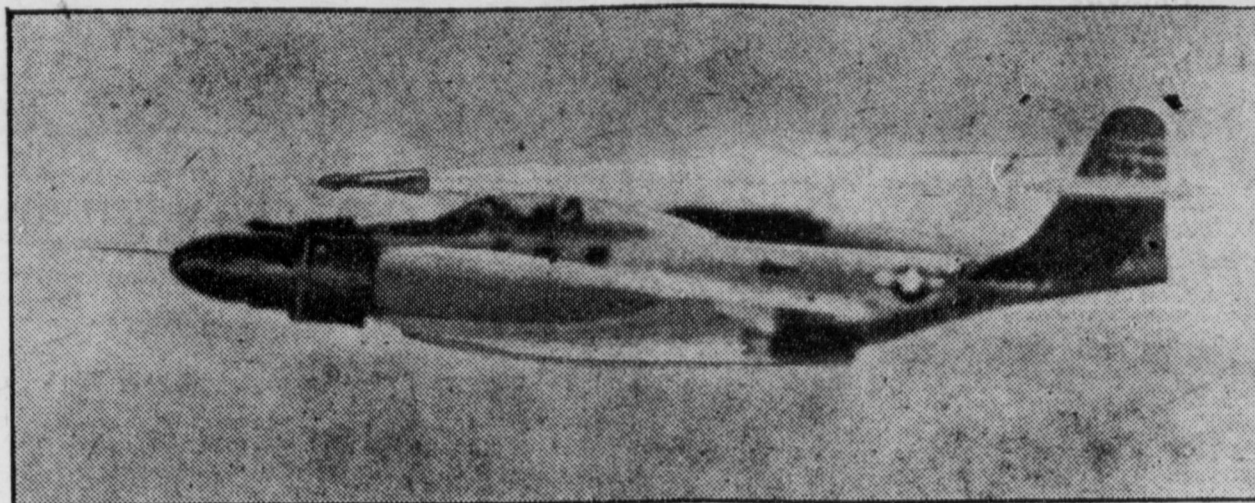

PLANS MADE FOR ANNUAL X-RAY SURVEY HERE

Philip W. Gauss, field representative of the Tuberculosis Division of the Texas State Health Department, met with Dr. H. F. Elliot, county health officer, and other interested citizens, at the Chamber of Commerce building, Tuesday morning. Plans were formulated for the annual mass X-ray survey to be held in Aransas County at the Rockport postoffice, and the dates were set for 12 noon until 6 p.m. May 8 and from 9 a.m. until 6 p.m. May 9.

The general chairman for the event will be announced at a later date.

Statements relative to the setup of the program are as follows:

1. X-rays are provided by the State Health Department, free of charge.
2. The physicians of the county urge 100% participation.
3. Reports are confidential and are sent to the physician you name.
4. It is not necessary to undress.
5. Healthy people should be X-rayed once per year.
6. No one under 15 years of age is eligible (children are infected with tuberculosis from adults).
7. These X-rays show other chest pathology as well as tuberculosis. Lung cancer and heart diseases are often diagnosed in their early stages.
8. There will be cash prizes awarded by various merchants and civic clubs. You become eligible to win by having your X-ray made.

Record Vote Tuesday Elects Johnson, 3 to 1

Harrist Defeats C. L. Thomas, 214 to 50; Jimmy Hunt Re-elected In Ward 1

In a record-breaking vote of 440 ballots, Chester Johnson, local automobile dealer, defeated the incumbent Seth H. Steele, for mayor in Tuesday's city election by a vote of 324 to 112.

Earnest Harrist running for reelection as alderman from Ward 2, defeated C. L. Thomas, 214 to 50.

Jimmy Hunt received 169 votes for alderman in Ward 1. He was unopposed in his try for reelection.

Johnson, 41 years old, was born in Markham, Matagorda County, Texas. He married the former Miss May Mills of Lamar, in 1937 and the couple have three children, Sue Ann, 11, Mary Lou, 9, and Albert Henry, 4. The Johnsons are members of the Methodist Church.

The new mayor is a former Navy man, having spent 4 years in the Pacific Theater of operations during World War II on PT Boats. At present he is Judge Advocate of the local VFW Post in addition to being a member of the Rockport Masonic Lodge and San Antonio Shrine, Alfaraz Temple. He first came to Rockport in 1936 and since 1947 has been in business in the city.

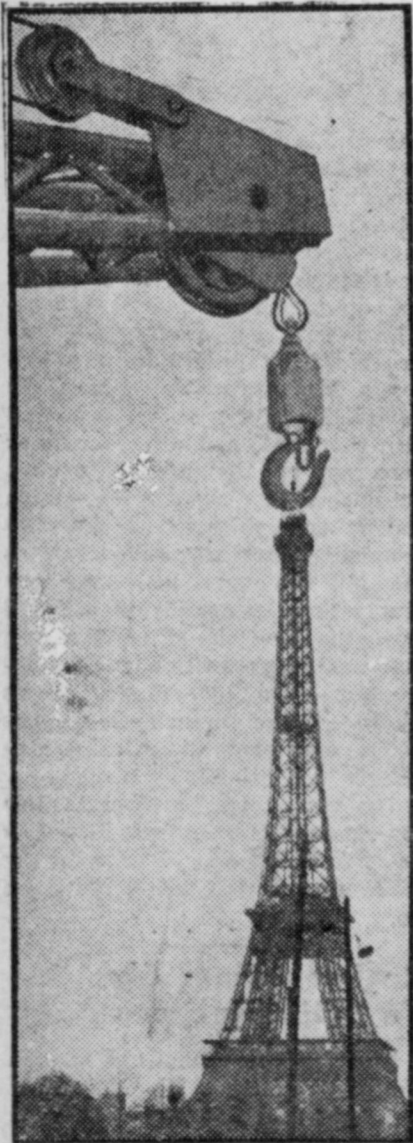
After the egg hunt the girls were seated around a table where they sang a grace and were served refreshments by Troop 36.

MOST AREA CITIES SET RECORD VOTE IN TUESDAY'S ELECTION

High interest in city elections of the upper Coastal Bend area was manifested Tuesday as new voting records were set in city after city. Refugio, where 740 votes were divided between eight candidates seeking three vacancies on the town council, was the exception. The record was set there two years ago when approximately 80 percent of the qualified voters went to the polls to elect a mayor and two councilmen in protest of the "old regime." Five incumbents were unseated by newcomers to politics in the elections where many of the present office holders did not offer for reelection.

Two Councilmen Relected At Robstown

Robstown.—Voters in the city election in Robstown Tuesday turned out in larger than usual numbers to elect a mayor and reelect two councilmen and a city utility system trustee.

Herman G. Balzer, unopposed in his bid for mayor, received 521 votes. The incumbent, S. R. Vickery, did not seek reelection. Councilmen J. E. Evans with 464 votes and Cosme Pena with 448 votes were reelected. Mauricio Canales who also sought a council post polled 139 votes. Trustee H. E. Dare of the city utility board was reelected by a margin of 18 votes over King Copeland and a wider margin over Armando Flores. Dare received 246 votes. The unofficial returns showed Copeland polled 228 votes and Flores 168.

Presiding Judge Dale Troutman said that the 681 voters were of an estimated 1,600 voters eligible to ballot in the city election. Recent city annexations make it difficult from poll lists to determine the exact number of eligible voters. Election machines were used in Robstown for the first time in a city election. Troutman said their use proved successful.

Portland Voters Reelect Wilson

Portland.—Dr. E. Wilson was reelected mayor of Portland Tuesday, defeating Dale Griffith by a count of 269 to 132. The 410 votes cast were said to be a record for the city. Alan Dale received the highest votes among five candidates for the commission posts with 241. J. Clifton McNeill was reelected to the commission with 206 votes. The three remaining candidates and votes polled were: O. M. Shannon, 156; Tom DeMauche, 123, and J. R. Williams, 36.

Two Ingleside Incumbents Win In Tuesday's Election

'ACTION, NOT PROMISES,' IS BELL'S CAMPAIGN THEME

"Action, Not Promises!" was the campaign theme of the man the people of the 14th Congressional

District chose to serve as their Congressman in 1954.

"On the basis of this pledge and

the results obtained during my first term in Congress, I am announcing my candidacy for reelection to a second term subject to the action of the Democratic Primary in July," Congressman John J. Bell of Cuero stated this week.

Bell's program of action in behalf of the 14th Congressional District bore fruit early in his first session in Congress. Projects ranging from small watershed developments, post offices, and radar stations to multi-million dollar dam and bridge construction appropriations have been secured for the 14th District.

The Canyon Dam above New Braunfels is the first in a series of dams to be built along the Guadalupe River and its tributaries. It is hoped that \$2 million will have been appropriated for this dam before this Congress adjourns, and the ultimate figure for this dam will be in excess of \$13,000,000.

Other major projects to which Bell has brought "action" include the replacement of the old bascule bridge at Corpus Christi (\$4,361,000.00); a 34' depth channel extension to Tule Lake (\$919,000.00); Port Aransas-Corpus Christi

Waterway—36' depth beginning at Gulf end (\$330,000.00—completed project \$2,460,000.00); Turtle Cove Harbor (\$47,000.00); widening of the channel to Aransas Pass (\$38,000.00); advance planning and engineering of \$31,000.00 for realignment of intra-coastal canal at Fulton, Rockport, Aransas Pass, Ingleside, etc.

Many other projects are in the mill, such as a 36' x 200' LaQuinta channel, and flood control program for Esccondido Creek at Kenedy in addition to the Small Watershed Project in progress there now.

"It is gratifying to see one's labor bear fruit. There is so much to be done but much beneficial work has been done for the District. This was accomplished with the help of friends at home and in Washington," Bell stated.

Moreover, multi-million dollar appropriations were obtained for maintenance, repair, and improvement of the several Naval installations at Beeville, Kingsville, Alice-Orange Grove, and Corpus Christi.

It is significant to note that of all the public works appropriations recommended for Texas in the President's 1956 budget, more than one-third of the total amount was

earmarked for Bell's District.

"I will work with every person, every organization, and every community to build a better District," Bell said.

"But as we count our blessings," he continued, "we must be ever vigilant against the communist threat which would deprive us of them, and our priceless liberty, freedom and Democracy as well."

"Maintaining an honorable peace is the most difficult problem facing this Nation today. All past wars have been terrible, but in this Atomic and Hydrogen Age, armed conflict is unthinkable."

duction," Bell counseled. "Meanwhile, the farmer and rancher must receive an adequate return for their investment and labor. To this end I shall continue to dedicate myself."

Unlimited progress and prosperity is in store for the 14th Congressional District if it is properly developed, according to the Cuero lawmaker who served almost eighteen (18) years in the Texas Legislature prior to going to Washington.

"We have many natural resources in abundance but only with an adequate supply of water, however, can we assure the industrial future of South Texas as well as the future of our farming areas, our ranching sections and our cities," he pointed out. "Labor, agriculture, industry, and all our citizens should share in the glorious future of this area."

Homestead May Be Sold for Taxes

Many Texans have the mistaken impression that their homestead cannot be seized and sold for delinquent taxes. In many cases, this idea has led to considerable grief and monetary loss which could have been avoided. A homestead should be rendered to tax assessors like any other property, and taxes assessed against it should be paid as faithfully as those on any other taxable property.

In a previous column, it was indicated that the deadline for rendering property for taxation is April 1, so far as most city taxing agencies are concerned. The last date for rendering real and personal property for state and county taxes is April 30. State taxes are collected by the County Tax Collector.

Under the Texas Constitution, each family is entitled to claim one piece of real property as their homestead. This claim must be established by an affidavit filed with the county tax assessor on or before April 30, each and every year. This affidavit must be filed by the owner himself. A lending agency cannot do so, even though it may actually pay the annual taxes thereon from a fund created by the owner's monthly installments.

When the homestead affidavit is properly filed, the owner becomes entitled to an exemption of State taxes up to the value of \$3,000, or 200 acres in the case of farm lands. This is an exemption from rendition and assessment. There is no similar exemption with reference to county or city taxes.

The homestead claimed for tax purposes need not be the property which is actually occupied by the owner as his residence.

When the homestead affidavit is not filed by April 30, the taxpayer loses his right to the \$3,000 or 200-acre exemption, and consequently becomes liable for more taxes than he would otherwise be required to pay.

Property taxes are assessed against the person who is the record owner of each piece of real and personal property on the first day of January of each year. Individuals purchasing property during the year should make sure that the taxes for all previous years have been paid. Otherwise, the purchaser may be forced to pay hundreds of dollars in delinquent taxes to protect his property. Unpaid taxes create a lien against the property which can be enforced regardless of change of ownership.

One should also keep in mind to make some arrangement for the previous owner to pay his pro-rata share of taxes for the current year. Otherwise, the buyer may find it necessary to pay the entire taxes for that year.

When taxes are not paid by the deadline prescribed for the particular taxing unit (city, county, State, or district), monetary penalties and interest are added from month to month. In addition, the property becomes subject to seizure and sale to satisfy the tax lien. This lien applies to all property, whether homestead or not.

New Jury Service Requirements Are Outlined In New Law, School Teachers, Ferryman Have Exemption Cancelled

Several changes in the list of jury service exceptions have been made under an amended law governing the exemption from jury service of those persons otherwise qualified for jury service, with some groups being removed and others added to the list of exceptions.

Among those groups removed from the list are publishers of newspapers, school teachers, ferrymen, and all millers engaged in grist, flouring and saw mills.

Added to the list of those exempt from jury service are all females who have legal custody of a child, or children, under 16 years of age; persons between the ages of 60 and 65 years; all registered, practical and vocational nurses actively engaged in the practice of their profession; any practitioner who treats the sick by prayer or spiritual means in accordance with the tenets, teachings or practice of any well established church or denomination, or a nurse who cares for the sick who are under treatment by such spiritual means, or a reader whose duty is to conduct regular religious services of such church or denomination; agents and patrolmen engaged in forestry protection work employed by the State Department of Forestry when engaged in the actual discharge of their duties; and the wife of any man who is summoned to serve on the same jury panel.

Under the old law there were only eight classes or groups exempt from jury service of those qualified to serve, with the list as follows:

(1) All persons over 60 years of age.

(2) All civil officers of this State or the United States, other than first and second class postmasters.

(3) All ministers of the Gospel engaged in the active discharge of their ministerial duties.

(4) All physicians and attorneys engaged in actual practice.

(5) All publishers of newspapers, school masters, druggists, undertakers, telegraph operators, railroad station agents, ferrymen, and all millers engaged in grist, flouring and saw mills.

(6) All presidents, vice-presidents, conductors, engineers and firemen of railroad companies when engaged in the regular and actual discharge of their respective positions.

(7) Any person who has acted as a jury commissioner within the preceding twelve months.

(8) Members of fire companies both volunteer and organized.

MAY DRAFT CALL ASKS FOR 593 TEXANS

AUSTIN, Texas, March 28—The May draft call for Texas asks for 593 men, compared to 301 for April, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced Wednesday.

This is the state's share of a national call for 12,000 men, all for the Army.

At the same time, the state Selective Service director announced a call on half the state's draft boards for 1,152 men to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations for future calls.

He said that the boards not receiving a quota for these examinations in May would be called upon to furnish men for examination in June.

Both local board calls for May induction and pre-induction examination are scheduled to be mailed from the state Selective Service headquarters Wednesday.

The May quota will be filled with men who are 21 years of age, or older, on May 1st, with the exception of delinquents, or volunteers, who may be older.

Colonel Schwartz said he expected the May call to be filled with volunteers and men without children. He said delinquents were liable first, but the state doesn't have many delinquents.

He warned young fathers that they had better be alert in advising their draft boards about children or an expected child.

"They may get drafted if they don't," he said. "Fathers have to let their draft boards know about these little family events. If they don't, they may get those greetings from their friends and neighbors. Then it's too late."
