Bearing this out are reports from Willie Close, Hayes Atwood, and Hugh Morrison, all of whom say that there are plenty of big trout available, if you know where to look and what to do after you're there.

This of course, is the history of the coast for year after year. After every freeze fishing drops off to almost nothing, then starts to get better and better until another freeze hits and so on. The odd thing about it is that few fishermen seem to remember this.

Earl Thomas reported that Bill Shepherd, Houston, who fished with him Wednesday caught 27 trout. Walton Court guests Mr. and Mrs. Joe Vanham and Mr. and Mrs. Frank Petras, of Moulton, fishing in Copano Bay from their own outboards caught 19 trout and gafftops, Mrs. Thomas said. Some of the trout ran between 1 and 2 pounds, while the gafftops went from 2 to 3 pounds.

Other guests of the court fishing from their own boats were Mr. and Mrs. Nations and Mr. and Mrs. Honeycutt, of San Antonio, who fished around Rattlesnake Point over the weekend. Mrs. Thomas didn't have any count on their catch, but she said it was a nice one, and that it included some big drum, sheepshead, gafftops and trout.

Career Conference To Be Held At High School Friday

Friday, May 11, from 1:00 to 3:45 p.m. there will be a Career Conference at the Aransas County High School for all students, which everyone is cordially invited to attend.

It is believed that it is necessary for students to have some practical information and instruction in vocational guidance, and, therefore, a program has been arranged to suit their career interests. It is felt that attendance at the Career Conference will bring about greater home-school co-operation in vocational training. Each student has been given the opportunity to indicate his choice of vocations which will be discussed.

The program will include a General Assembly at 1:00 p.m. in the ACHS auditorium, where Mr. Grady St. Clair, Dean of Delaware College, will be the guest speaker. This will be followed by two vocational sessions, during which representatives of business and professions will discuss preparation, qualifications and opportunities in their specific fields.

Methodist Church Makes Great Strides

The Methodist Church has made great strides within the past year, increasing its budget from \$11,380 a year ago to \$12,774 for 1956-57.

About \$3500 worth of work has gone into Fellowship Hall and the Children's building. Chairs, tables, cabinet, and floor repairs have all been made, and a full supply of literature is furnished to a rapidly growing church school.

Over \$3000 will be paid this year, towards retirement of the debt on the new sanctuary. In addition, chimes have been installed and a motion picture projector procured.

The church school has made a steady and continuous growth. From January 1 to May 1, 1955, average Sunday attendance amounted to 75; for the same quarter this year, the attendance was 114.

Since June 1, 1955, 42 new members have been received into the church.

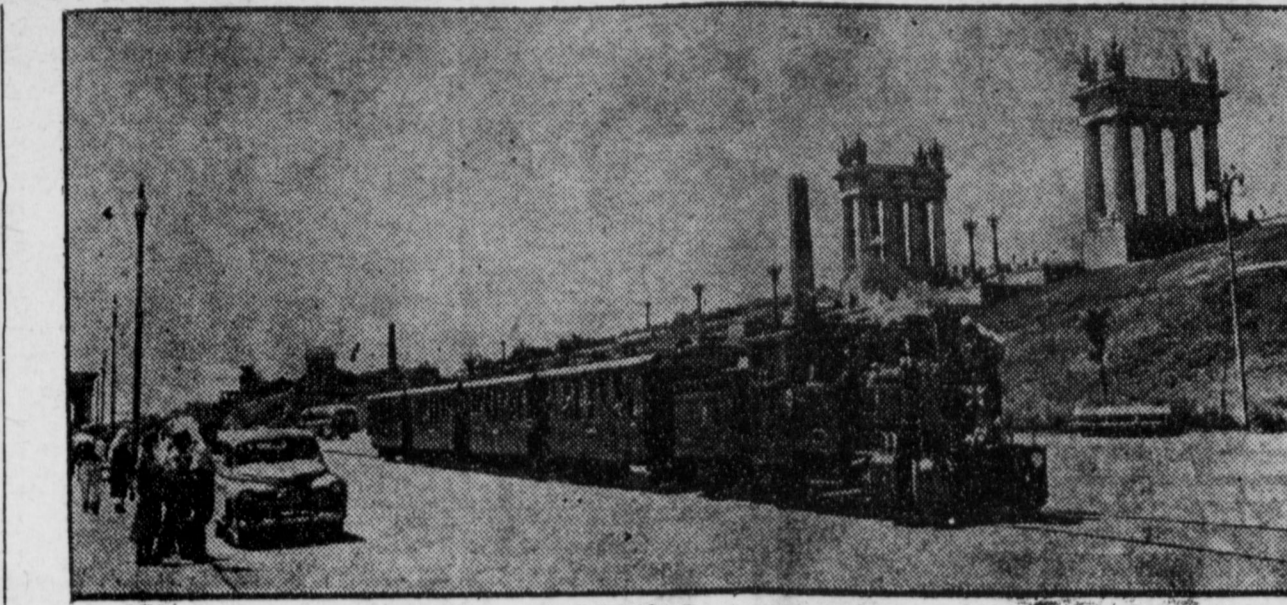

Chest X-Ray Totals New Dodge Continue to Drop

The total number of people taking advantage of free chest X-rays in Aransas County continues to drop. In 1954, the last year when a great majority of the residents were reached, 1795 were X-rayed. The following year only 1333 were examined; this year 1045 went through the routine in the one day that the machine was operating. Originally scheduled for a half day Tuesday and all day Wednesday, no X-rays were given the first half day because of trouble with the machine.

King Cobra Demands Texas Coachwhips

Lear Grimmer, Assistant director of the Lincoln Park Zoo in Chicago, has one of the most finicky king cobras in America. It demands Texas coachwhips for breakfast, dinner, and supper, refusing similar snakes from anywhere else.

"You see," said Grimmer, "these king cobras, when at home, feed entirely on snakes, and when captured and brought to the United States, have to be fed on the same diet. Most of them are not as particular as the one we have, which refuses to eat any dark-colored snake. The Texas coachwhips are a light brown, and just suited to his majesty's taste, so our traditional first stop every year is at Rockport, where, by going to the offshore islands we can generally get plenty of them."

"However," he continued, "unless we do better than we have so far, I'm afraid that the coachwhips he does get are going to be full of mice."

Grimmer then went on to explain that, in order to make the coachwhips last longer, they filled them with mice before they were fed to the cobra, thus giving the king a bigger meal in the right-colored covering.

Grimmer, his wife, Dich Reichert, and Art Goetz, all of Lincoln Park Zoo, were making their third annual collecting trip to Texas, accompanied by John Werler, former curator of reptiles at the Breckenridge Zoo in San Antonio.

OREGON TO DO MUCH EXPLORATION OFF THE TEXAS COAST

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service's Exploratory Vessel Oregon is scheduled to leave Pascagoula on May 1 to carry out three weeks of deep-water shrimp exploration in the north-central and northwestern Gulf of Mexico. The primary objective of this trip will be to conduct extensive coverage of the 200 to 300 fathom area off the Texas coast using 40-foot flat trawls. If significant quantities of shrimp are located, production-type dragging will be carried out using 80-foot balloon and 100-foot flat trawls.

At the request of several members of the Gulf shrimp industry, a series of exploratory drags will

Marine News

For the 72 hours ending at 8 a. m. April 30, Rockport and Fulton produced 23,600 pounds of shrimp tails. For the week ending the same date, total Texas production was 239,000 pounds. Of these, approximately 24,000 pounds were whites, the rest brownies. Rockport production was running about 72% in the 41-50 range, 21% 51-65, 6% in the 21-25 count, 1% in 36-42, as far as the whites were concerned. Brown shrimp (which amounted to two-thirds of the entire catch) were running larger. 8% of the brown catch was in the 15-20 count range; 32% were 21-25 count.

Directors of the S.A.O.T.A., as well as the Association members present at the National Fisheries Convention, held a meeting at Miami Beach on April 16th. Manny Sanchez, President of the Association, announced at that time that "Americans are now consuming shrimp at the rate of two pounds per capita." This statement was based on the fact that the nation is now consuming 350,000,000 pounds (heads on) of shrimp a year valued at \$225,000,000. Mr. Sanchez further revealed that frozen shrimp now accounts for 54% of the total volume. Virgil Versaggi, Chairman of the Ad-

vertising and Publicity Committee, stated that he felt that one of the most important reasons for the growth of the shrimp industry has been its continuing promotion program. He further announced that S.A.O.T.A., which is a participant in the 1956 "Fish Parade," would feature another Shrimp Fiesta this fall to tie in with the "Fish Parade."

Landings of commercially-caught fish and shellfish at Texas ports during January 1956 totaled 3.5 million pounds compared with 5.7 million pounds reported for the corresponding month of last year. A 2.1 million-pound drop in shrimp receipts accounted for most of this 38 percent decrease. Adverse weather conditions during the latter half of the month helped cause the decline in shrimp production.

During the five-month period ending with January 1956, total landings of all fish and shellfish at Texas ports amounted to 39.3 million pounds—a decline of 27 percent compared with the corresponding period of the previous fiscal year. Lowered shrimp production was mainly responsible for the decrease.

Shrimp landings in Rockport, for the 24 hours ending at 8:00 a.m., April 2, amounted to 2700 pounds of tails.

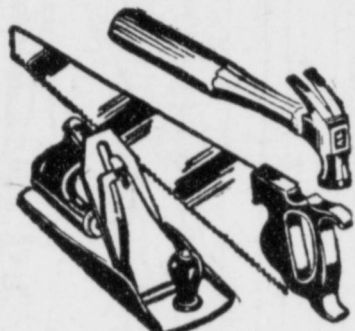

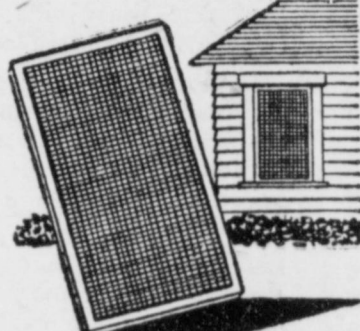

AUSTIN—State draft boards are receiving many telephone calls these days from men who want to know what "IV-A" means.

Because of a recent amendment in Selective Service regulations, more than 100,000 Texans are eligible for a change in classification. Nearly all of them are exempt from further military service unless Congress and the President change the law in the future.

"That is what the classification IV - A means," Colonel Morris Schwartz, state draft director, says. "It means that, under present law, individuals receiving it have completed service and are exempt from further service."

The individuals receiving the IV-A classification were formerly classified in Class I-C (Discharge) and Class I-C (Reserve). These two draft classifications are now abolished.

18,000 TEXANS REGISTER FOR DRAFT

Austin.—More than 18,000 Texans registered for the draft at the state's 137 local boards during the first quarter of 1956, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state selective service director, said recently.

This brings the total number of men on draft board lists to more than 940,000. This is the number of men registering under the federal draft law since August, 1948. The current law went into effect that year.

Nearly all Texans signing up in January, February, and March were registered on their 18th birthdays. The law requires that all males register on their 18th birthday, or within five days there-

after.

All males born since August 30, 1922, have had a legal obligation to register since August, 1943, except those not yet 18. Failure to be registered as required by law can mean a fine of \$10,000, five years in prison, or both.

Currently, no one is drafted in Texas under the age of 21, except volunteers or draft delinquents. The law, however, makes registration compulsory at 18.

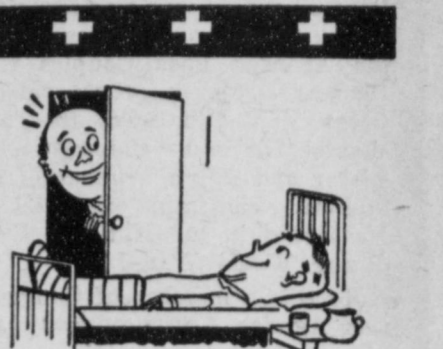
A youth, on his 18th birthday, or within the five-day legal limit following his birthday, must go to the nearest board and register, no matter where he may be.

By giving his home address, a young man can have his registration card sent to his home board when he registers away from home if that is his desire.

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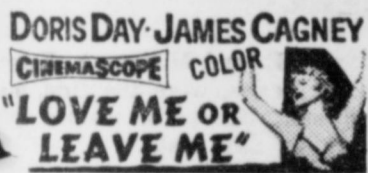
