

Rockport Parent-Teacher Association Has Busy Year

Group Is Able to Carry Out Many Needed Projects For Benefit of the Elementary School During 1955

The Rockport Parent-Teacher Association has had a busy and interesting year, according to the annual report prepared by Mrs. Earle Thomas, president of the organization.

The program committee produced a varied and interesting series using the state theme, programs by students, a film, local and student talent, and a joint program with the Fulton and High School P-TAs, which included a band concert and the Founder's Day program.

In addition, the three organizations gave a reception at the Woman's Club building in September for teachers of the various schools. The health chairman of the Rockport group, and her committee, conducted a program whereby the children were given smallpox vaccinations, typhoid shots, and typhoid booster shots.

A number of P-TA members furnished clothing to needy children through the welfare chairman.

Under direction of the finance chairman, the association's only money-making project of the year was staged — the annual Halloween carnival in October — and the amount needed was \$695.79.

Projects for the year were as follows:

1. A telebinocular, for testing students' eyes, was purchased at a cost of \$254.14.
2. Eight three-speed record players, amounting to \$274.26, were purchased for use in the school.
3. Two record libraries were purchased, at a cost of \$191.01.
4. Twenty-one film strips were purchased for the library, at a cost of \$107.50.
5. A new binder was purchased for keeping records of publicity.

The total amount expended on all projects amounted to \$834.06. Subscriptions to the Texas Parent-Teacher Magazine were sent to local doctor's offices, beauty shops, and to the Elementary and Junior High School principals' offices. Subscriptions to the National Parent-Teachers' Magazine were also sent to the principals.

The Rockport P-TA was also active in the Aransas County during the year, several of its members holding office in the county group. Eight of its members attended the School of Instruction sponsored by the council. Eight delegates were sent to the 21st District Conference in Corpus Christi where both the yearbook and publicity book of the local group were on display.

The organization also encouraged visitation of the schools during Public School Week, with the result that approximately 350 persons attended classes during the period.

City Council Holds Regular Meeting; Grants Permission for Cables to Be Installed Underground to Phone Co.

The city council, at its regular meeting Monday night, granted the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company permission to install some of its cables underground, in response to a request from the company, which wishes to install some additional equipment.

Other routine business was handled at the same meeting. Mayor Johnson informed the Council that Surveyor James A. Jarboe had been unable to secure necessary sewer elevation information concerning possibility of establishing a new sewer lift station in the south end of town.

Rockport-Fulton Region Ready For Vacationists

With the closing of school less than a month away, Rockport and Fulton are busily readying themselves for the summer tourist season.

Tourist court operators are adding the final touches before summer visitors arrive who will keep them too busy caring for guests to allow anything else until after labor day. One court, anxious to please, has added a swimming pool for the summer, while others are expanding their air-conditioning and recreational facilities.

Grocery stores are stocking up to accommodate tourists; fishing tackle emporiums have laid in new stocks of fishing material and plugs guaranteed to catch fishermen as well as fish. Skiffs at boat rental places have been refurbished, and, to take care of the younger generation, there's a new malt shop going in, just around the corner from Rockport's beach.

The Chamber of Commerce is putting on a clean-up campaign for the end of this month, and various ladies' committees both in Rockport and Fulton have been actively engaged in beautifying the waterfronts, in cooperation with the Navigation District.

For that matter, the Navigation District itself has wrought the most far reaching changes. There are brand new bathing beaches at Rockport and Fulton, and a new harbor at Fulton, capable of holding 130 boats.

Even the fish are cooperating. Add to all this, the Chamber of Commerce, with the cooperation of the Brazosport Boat Club and the Brazosport Chamber of Commerce (both of Freeport), is planning one of the longest outboard fishing boat marathons west of the Mississippi for August 11, and you have a varied bill of fare for even the most exacting vacationist.

Harbor Beautified By C. of C. and Navigation Board

Rockport's harbor has been subjected to a face-lifting this week, and the formerly bare and dusty resort of local hot-rodders has begun to show an entirely new aspect to the public, as the result of cooperation between Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 and the Chamber of Commerce.

The district furnished the money and the chamber the planning and work, taking the first steps to convert a sunbaked area of glistening shell into what eventually may become a very attractive city park.

Most of the credit for the work goes to Mrs. Charles A. Roe, Sr., assisted by Mrs. J. D. Griggs and Seth H. Steele, as well as others of the community, including Mrs. John M. Cox.

Nearly two hundred palms and oleanders have been planted since Monday morning, and there are still a number of date palms to be set out before the work is completed.

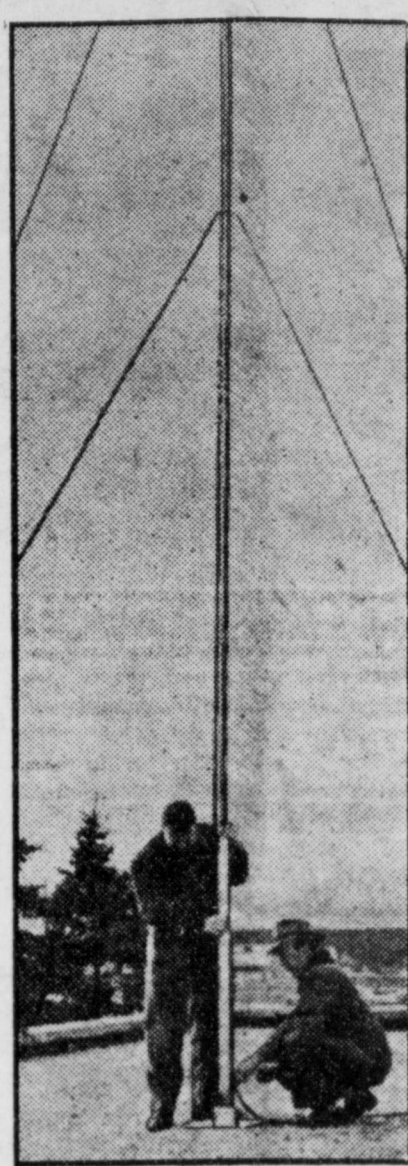

Old Hynes-Picton Store Victim of Clean-up Week

The old store building originally built by William Hynes, and D. M. Picton will fall a victim to clean-up week, May 27 to June 2, according to Arthur Bracht, owner of the building.

Picton and Hynes operated a grocery store in the building, now occupied by Scotty's Barbecue Stand, for a number of years after the store was built, about 1890, when trains were hauling excursionists to Rockport for \$1.50 round trip from San Antonio. From Dallas, which was a little farther, the railroad was charging two bucks and a half!

The old Hynes home stood on the land where the Texaco filling station now stands. (This is the house occupied by the Wren family in recent years, which stands on Highway 35 business route in the

Career Day Conference Held at School

In response to a student questionnaire, and under leadership of Mrs. Electa Taylor, guidance director, a forward step was taken in the Aransas County High School last Friday, when the first career day conference was held, to help students in choosing what path they will follow on graduation.

All students and teachers took part in the day's activities. The purposes of such a conference are:

1. Help each student determine the vocation in which he is most interested.
2. Give information on specific vocations, including job descriptions, requirements, rewards of a particular career, and how to get started in a chosen field.
3. Give young people the practical business viewpoint on employment conditions and job opportunities in local business and industry.
4. Help students prepare for college training or jobs after graduation.
5. Give businessmen a chance to offer a service to educators and to meet and talk with boys and girls who will be their future employees.

The program consisted of a general assembly in the school auditorium, where Mrs. Electa Taylor, Guidance Director, presided. The invocation was given by Miss Martha Ballou. Rockport School of Fine Arts to Open For Summer

The Rockport School of Fine Arts will open its Sixth Annual Summer Session at Rockport on Jun 11, with a session on landscape and marine painting. This class will extend until June 22, according to Simon Michael, director of the school.

From July 9 to 20, a second session will be devoted to portrait and figure painting, and a third will be held at Fredricksburg, from July 30 to August 10. This last will be an architecture and landscape work.

Simon Michael, the school's director, has studied and exhibited both in this country and Europe, and today conducts the Rockport school. He is especially interested in developing students who realize that only through hard work may they experience the deep satisfaction and joy to be derived from all creative activities.

Lincoln Borglum, of Beeville, who is associated with Mr. Michael, completed the great Mount Rushmore Memorial in South Dakota after the death of his father, Gutzon Borglum, who originally designed it. He has executed important works throughout the nation. His home and studio are in Beeville, Texas, where, in his spare time, he raises Herefords.

C. of C. Civic Affairs Committee Meets Tuesday

The Chamber of Commerce Civic Affairs committee met Tuesday night for a discussion of the various projects being fostered by the group.

Seth Steele, chairman, reported that the curb-and-gutter project on the Highway 35 Business Route was making excellent progress under the direction of Mayor Chester Johnson and the City Council, and informed the group that a canvass of property owners along the route had shown that they were almost 100% in favor of the work, even though most of the cost would have to be borne by them.

He also reported that the brick barbecue pit in front of the Woman's Club, a project of the Rockport Lions Club, will probably be finished before the end of May.

The matter of a bridge from the mainland to Frandolig Island was again discussed, and a committee of L. O. Hill, Dr. "Blue" Schmidt, Jack McCready, and Dudley Bracht was appointed to look into the matter and see if some action could be taken.

L. O. Hill was asked to make a house-to-house canvass to determine that state of public feeling on a water and sewer system for Fulton.

Cleanup Week Set For May 27-June 2

Civic Affairs Committee of Chamber of Commerce Plans County-wide Drive for Last Week In May To Refurbish Community for Tourist Season

At a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Civic Affairs Committee the dates for the annual county-wide clean-up drive were set for May 27 - June 2, and plans were laid to refurbish the community before the coming tourist season.

Committee heads appointed by Chairman Seth Steele were as follows:

Five Rockport Men Arrested, Fined, One Jailed

Five local men were arrested over the weekend for drunkenness, and three of them were also charged with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Fined a total of \$23 dollars each in Justice of the Peace F. Iansens court, were Gene Eaton, Kelly Wright, LeRoy Henney, Vernon T. Collins, and David Evans, on charges of intoxication, filed by Deputy Sheriff Slim Haynes.

Wright, Collins, and Evans (who were accompanied by two teenage Rockport girls) were also charged in county court with contributing to the delinquency of a minor.

Tried before Judge John D. Wendell, Evans was fined \$150 and costs, making a total of \$173; Kelly's fine was \$100 and costs, while Collins was sentenced to 90 days in the County Jail.

The girls were turned over to their parents.

Commissioners Meet Transact Routine Business Monday

The Commissioners Court, at its regular meeting on Monday, transacted considerable routine business. Current bills were examined and approved, along with the reports of the County Clerk and County treasurer. A board of equalization was also organized.

The court requested that the County Clerk and County Treasurer issue a warrant for \$5,337.50 to take care of county and district road indebtedness.

The matter of purchasing insurance on the new courthouse was then discussed, and the court decided to obtain this from Doil Turner in Aransas Pass and Ed Beasley, of Rockport.

After voting \$50 towards the hospital expense of an indigent person, the commissioners then decided to observe the following holidays: Memorial Day, July 4th, Labor Day, Thanksgiving, Christmas, and New Year's. There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.

The campaign is aimed at gathering and disposing of unnecessary junk, bottles, tin cans, boards, trash, etcetera, and the city has been contacted to see whether or not rules can be relaxed during the week named, and all trash carried off that is gathered and piled for the garbage trucks. In addition, the county will also be contacted for the same purpose.

In this connection, Chamber President Arthur Bracht pointed out that this is an excellent opportunity to get rid of materials under which snakes hide, such as old boards and other trash, cans, bottles, and old tires that hold water and breed mosquitoes, and trash that attracts flies and rats. He pointed out that rats, mosquitoes, and flies are health hazards, carrying typhus, bubonic plague, malaria, and polio.

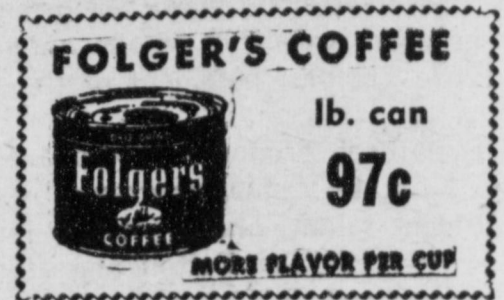

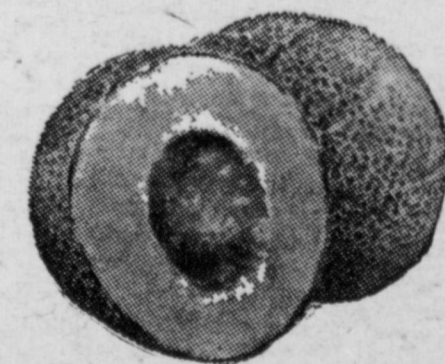

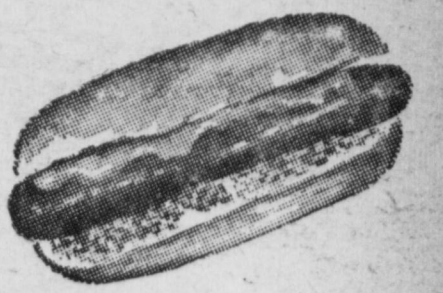

sultant to the school is James Buchanan Wynn, Jr., nationally famous muralist and architectural sculptor, who lives at Winn Ranch, Wimberly, Texas, where he has his home and studio. Mr. Winn has completed outstanding assignments in Africa, Europe and America.

The Rockport School of Fine Arts had its inception in 1948, when Simon Michael, on a visit was impressed with the wonderfully varied opportunities for portrait, landscape, marine, and still life painting in the area.

The first year classes were held, sixty students attended sessions in June, July and August, and the number has increased steadily until in 1955 over one hundred and fifty attended, from as far apart as West Virginia, Michigan and El Paso.

In 1952, with the aid and encouragement of Mr. Emory M. Spencer, Rockport attorney, Mr. Michael acquired the present beautiful grounds and erected his home and studio, which was designed by Mr. Spencer, under the great live oak trees which, through the seasons, are filled with all the birds that inhabit the locality.

Each year an exhibition has been held at Rockport by students of the Rockport School of Fine Arts. The first year, approximately one hundred canvasses were displayed. Shows in recent years have more than doubled that number.

As the school has grown, the value of the prizes has increased. This year (1956) first prize will be one hundred dollars, and the total of all awards will amount to more than five hundred dollars.

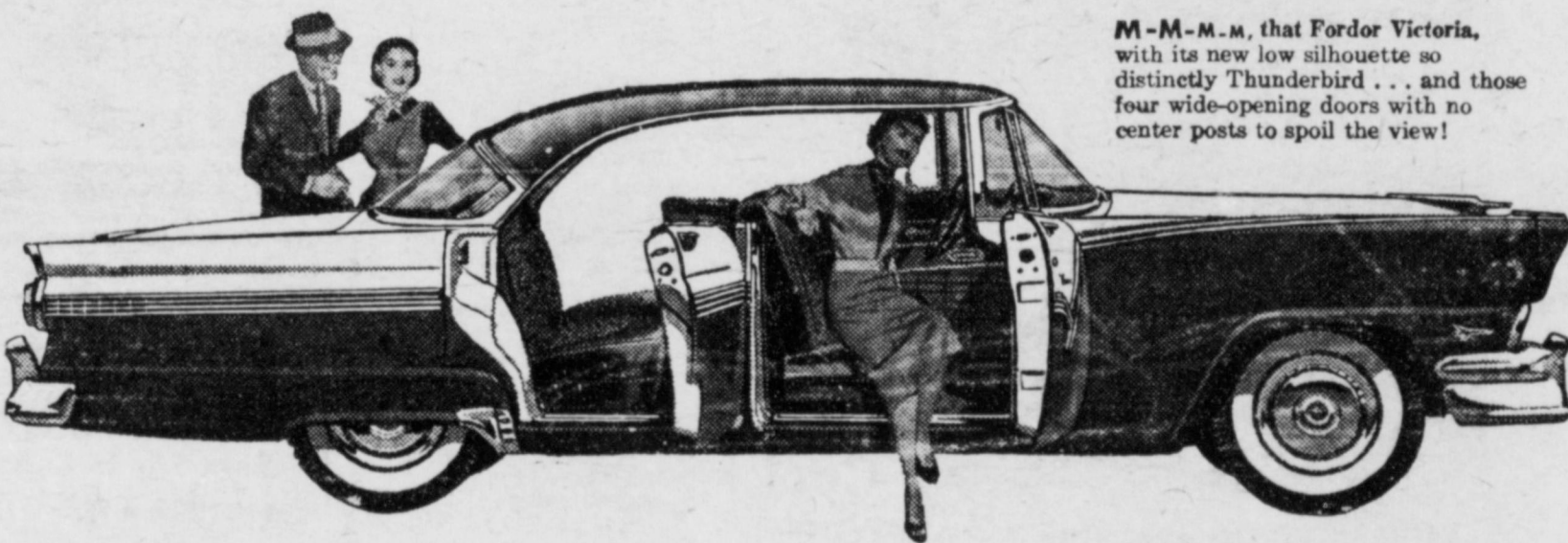

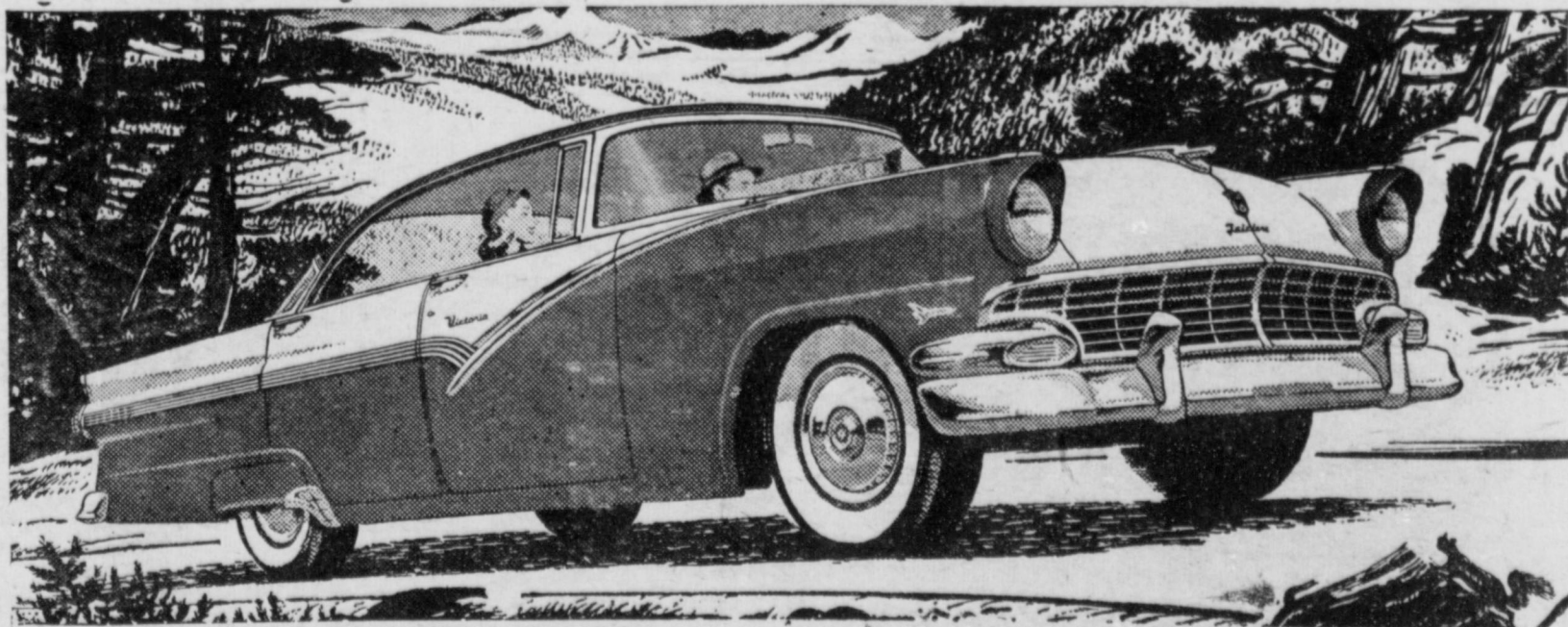

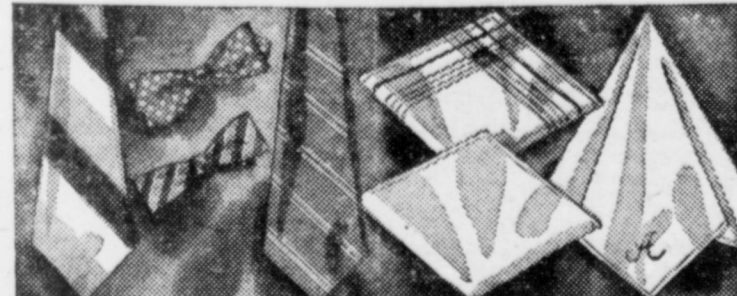

Local Methodists Plan Trip to San Antonio
