

Local Construction Totaling \$1.5 Million Making Progress

Two local construction projects, totaling more than \$1.5 million dollars, are making rapid progress. The new courthouse foundations are almost ready for pouring, and a number of buildings for the ACW station being built at the airport are making

rapid progress. In addition, construction of homes is keeping up a hot pace.

The courthouse, which, with the new county jail that was part of the plan, is costing over \$400,000, and should be completed before the first of January.

The ACW Station, which comprises 13 buildings, will be finished only a month or so later. At present, foundations are in for both Airmen's barracks and the bachelor officers quarters, while materials and labor are on the ground to start up with the buildings, where forms for the walls are being set.

Footings have been poured on the community building, steel is being placed for the dining hall; the administration supply and operations buildings are being excavated, and the water reservoir foundations have been poured.

A new access road, leading from Highway 35 to the site, has been cleared and is being compacted, drainage ditches and water well No. 3 are complete, as are culverts on several of the roads inside the reservation.

The field lines for the sanitary facilities are in, and Ricks Construction Company spokesmen said that progress was up to expectations.

The Aransas County Junior Chamber of Commerce meets twice a week and any young man interested in Jaycee work is invited to attend these meetings and join the club. Every second Monday night the club meets at 7:30 in connection with a luncheon at Nelda's Cafe and every fourth Monday night the club has a business meeting at the Chamber of Commerce building. The next Jaycee meeting will be on June 1 at Nelda's Cafe.

Appropriations Bill Passed by Congress Contains Cut-Off Funds

The 1957 Appropriations Bill for Civil Functions was passed last week by Congress, according to John Bell, in his report from the nation's capital. The bill contained \$31,000 in advanced planning funds for re-alignment of the Intracoastal Canal between here and Aransas Pass.

Don't Stop Now, Says Chamber of Commerce President, For Cities, Like Homes, Have to Keep Clean

"The thing we need to do," said Arthur Bracht at a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce Civic Affairs Committee, "is to keep right on going, and make clean-up week an every day affair, carried on throughout the year. Clean-up week is fine, but clean-up, year after year, would be better."

At the meeting, over which Seth

Steele, chairman of the committee, presided, various aspects of community cleanliness and clean-up week were discussed.

Steele reported that city, county, and Highway department officials had all been most cooperative in their efforts, and praised the work of the Fulton Lions, who hauled away more than seventeen truckloads of trash from the waterfront between Rockport and Fulton and in front of Fulton itself.

The problem of newspapers blowing from open delivery trucks, and from trash cans that were improperly covered, was discussed, and the committee urges everyone to do what they can to prevent such trash spreading in the future. Everyone is urged to obtain a properly covered garbage can in which to place their trash and prevent blowing paper.

The committee was also informed that the Jaycees were in charge of beach clean-up in the Rockport area, and that they would make their drive Wednesday afternoon.

City Council Holds Special Session To Discuss Sewer Lift

The City Council met in special session on Wednesday afternoon, at 4:30 p.m., with Mayor Johnson and all councilmen present, to discuss the problems attendant on installation of a sewer lift in the south end of town, to furnish facilities needed in that area.

Also present were W. W. McLendon, R. G. Stivers, Jr., and Joe Stivers, representing various land owners and engineering firms.

Water superintendent Tom Shults told the council that materials for the installation could be obtained promptly.

The Stivers brothers, who are putting in a subdivision on outlet 12, agreed to contribute \$1500 to the cost of the project, so that they can have sanitary facilities for the houses which they will build. This \$1500 is to be paid to the city upon presentation of a commitment to complete the job within sixty days.

Councilman Porter, after hearing the Stivers' presentation, moved that the mayor enter into such a commitment for the city, and that the mayor, city attorney, and water superintendent be empowered to obtain a suitable location for the sewer lift station. The motion was approved unanimously.

Roy Hinton Reports On State Democratic Convention In Dallas

Roy Hinton and R. D. Torres, Aransas County delegates to the state Democratic Convention on May 22, were in Dallas for pre-convention conferences, attending various meetings of delegates from the Congressional District, laying plans for selection of delegates for the National Convention.

Hinton said that he and Torres, met with delegations from San Antonio, Fort Worth, and Houston, renewing many friendships with staunch Democrats.

The convention proved to be the most harmonious since that of 1940, when John Nance Garner was nominated, and later became vice-president of the United States.

Lyndon Johnson was nominated to lead the national delegation.

There were no rump meetings, although fireworks flew when the Houston delegation moved to oust the present Democratic Executive Committee, which did not support the national nominee in 1952, and refused to take the loyalty oath this time. Senator Johnson, however, counseled moderation and, on a motion by John Connally, of Fort Worth, the motion was tabled.

Keynote speaker at the convention was Gerald Mann, former Attorney General, who spoke on Party Loyalty. Ralph Yarborough, perennial candidate for governor, also spoke.

Man Prominent During Boom Days of Rockport Dies in Tucson

George Benjamin Heney, prominent here during Rockport's boom days, and associated with Colonel George Fulton at one time in the past century, died recently in a hospital at Tucson, Arizona.

Well-known in Rockport, to which he returned for many years for visits, he was 94 years old when he died. Born in Lima, N. Y., he arrived in Tucson from San Francisco, where he had grown up and attended school, at the age of 20.

Mr. Heney is survived by his widow, a daughter, Ruth; a son, Carlisle F., Washington, D. C.; and two stepdaughters, Mrs. W. O. Smith and Mrs. Aubrey Lippincott, both of Tucson.

Some Big City Newspapers Among Worst Litterbugs Says President of Lions

Some big city newspapers are among the worst litterbugs we have, according to president of the Fulton Lions' Club, Maurice W. Cochran.

Aiding in the Aransas County Clean Up Week, sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, Cochran says that the Lions turned out to clean up the waterfront from Rockport to Fulton, and hauled off 17 truck loads of trash, of which nearly seven truckloads were newspapers that had apparently blown out of open trucks used for delivery. Those papers delivered in closed trucks were conspicuous by their absence.

Worst offenders were four large city dailies, copies of which were strewn all along the waterfront, and when Cochran asked one delivery driver why this had happened, he said that high wind in the area ripped his papers loose and spread them. The obvious remedy, that of a cover of some kind, to keep the restless news in the truck, he had apparently never considered. Three newspapers sold in the area (including The Pilot) were blameless, yet a quick check of newstands in Rockport and Fulton showed that there were approximately as many of these sold as there were of the others that had been found so widely distributed.

Cochran wrote the offending newspapers as follows:

"The Lions Club of Fulton worked all day Monday to clean up the waterfront from Rockport north through Fulton, a distance of about three miles.

"Seventeen truckloads of debris were sacked and hauled by Boy Scouts and others. Newspapers accounted for about a third and your newspaper was among the debris thus carted off.

"Our Lions Club is aware of your desire to cooperate in keeping our highways and roadways free from trash.

"We hope you will check into the matter of your open delivery trucks scattering loose newspapers along the streets and roads in this and other communities.

"Your cooperation in this matter will be greatly appreciated. Sincerely yours, M. W. Cochran, President, Fulton Lions Club."

Churches Form Jr. Baseball Leagues

Meeting Tuesday Night Sees Inception of Young People's Baseball Teams Representing Various Congregations in Area; Will Play Twice a Week

A group of local churches are forming a new baseball league for their young people, and at a meeting this week at least five—First Presbyterian, First Methodist, First Baptist, Sacred Heart Catholic, and Fulton Baptist—signified their intention to field teams. Others, unable to attend this first meeting, have assured the committee that they are definitely interested, and will meet with them later.

Rockport Fathers Discuss Routing of New Street

City fathers of Rockport, at their regular meeting, discussed re-routing of the old Highway 35 Business Route with County Judge John D. Wendell and County Commissioner W. B. Allen.

As the matter rests at present, the city has agreed to concur with the county in whatever route commissioners deemed most economical and was satisfactory to the Highway Department.

Tentatively, an agreement was reached to abandon a portion of the old road now being used, between Heldenfels Shipyard and the present junction of the business route with Highway 35 at the southern end of town.

Finished plats on the Stivers and Market Street Homes subdivision were approved by the Council, which also discussed extensively the installation of a proposed sewer lift station in the south end of town.

Heldenfels Awarded Aransas County Road Contract

A contract for furnishing shell on Highway 35 in Aransas County has been awarded to Heldenfels Brothers who submitted the low bid of \$201,920 on the project.

Furnishing and stockpiling washed shell between the south end of Copano Bay Causeway and the Refugio County line is expected to take 125 working days, according to T. O. Foster, District Highway Engineer at Corpus Christi.

M. G. Yoes, Resident Engineer at Corpus Christi will be in active charge of the project while under construction.

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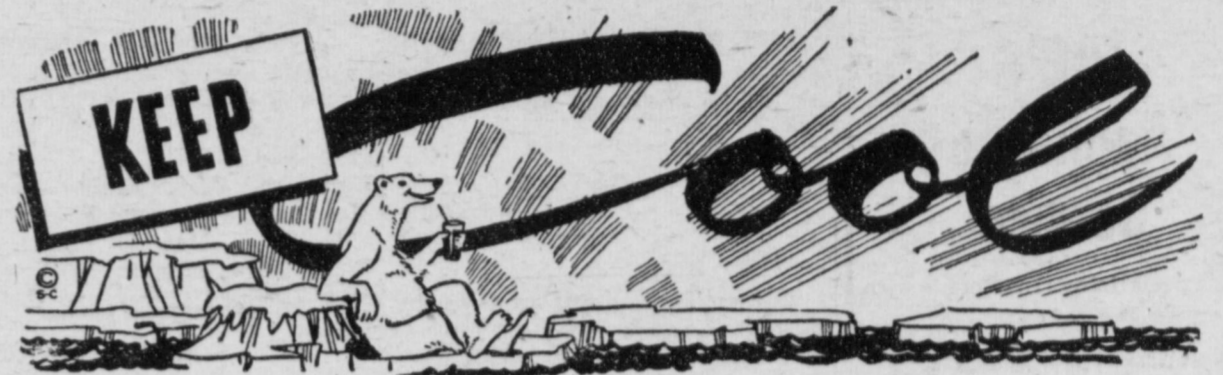

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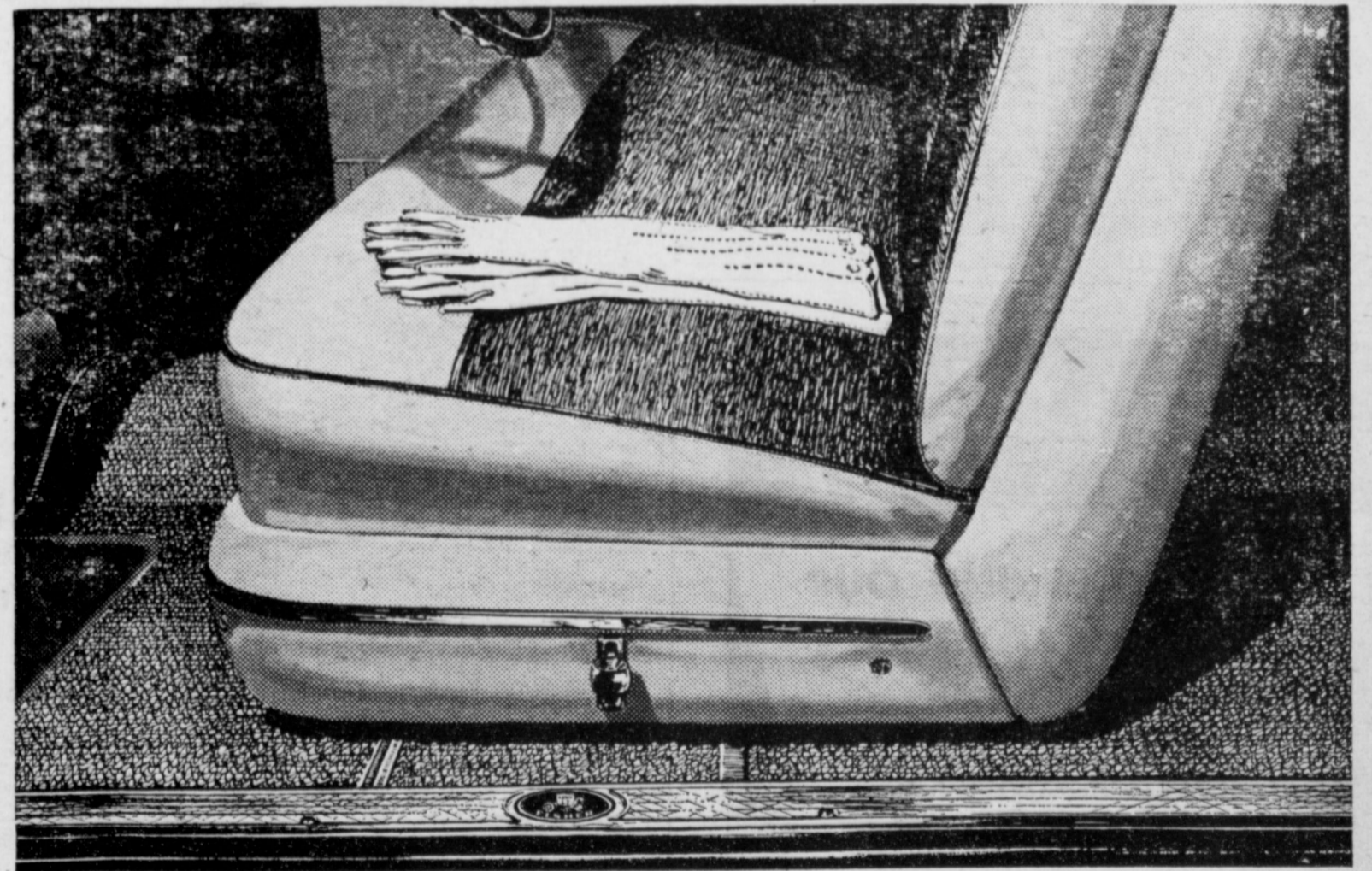
