## New Examination For Postmaster May Be Held Says Simmons

In all probability, according to Acting Postmaster Jimmy Simmons, a new examination for postmaster in Rockport may be held in the near future, stemming from a protest which he registered against results of the last one, which was held in February.

At that time, Simmons said, he was barred from holding a full postmaster's position, because of a clause in the regulations that say a full postmaster shall have had at least two years' experience in business. Jimmy pointed out, however, that this restriction would soon be past for him, as he has been in the postoffice for almost a year; and with the ten month's credit he should receive for his army service, he has only a couple of more to go before being able to qualify, even under this ruling.

Two other men, M. A. Rowan and Douglas Hale, who took the examination at the same time as Simmons, placed ahead of him on this account. Rowan was first, and Hale second, with a score of 84.60.

It's one of the longest outboard hassles in the country, strictly for fishing boats, and tough enough to separate the men from the boys. Anyone owning a fishing boat with a stock motor of ten horse power or over, and who is at least 15 years old can enter.

The entry fee is five bucks and there are four classes. Four handsome trophies will be awarded in each class, along with a great big one to the first boat under the wire that has complied with the rules.

No non-trip chinos nor step bottoms can qualify; no transom jacks will be allowed; there will be no racing lower units, no fins, no brass propellers, and only gasoline and lube oil may be used. Alcohol burners and other speed jobs are out. All motors must be fully assembled as sold, of standard make and model. Only spark plugs are optional. No additives are legal in the gasoline, although they may be used with lube. Each boat must carry a driver and passenger or passengers.

The race starts at Freeport, on the morning of Aug. 11, and finishes 130 miles down the Intra-coastal Canal, at the Rockport yacht basin.

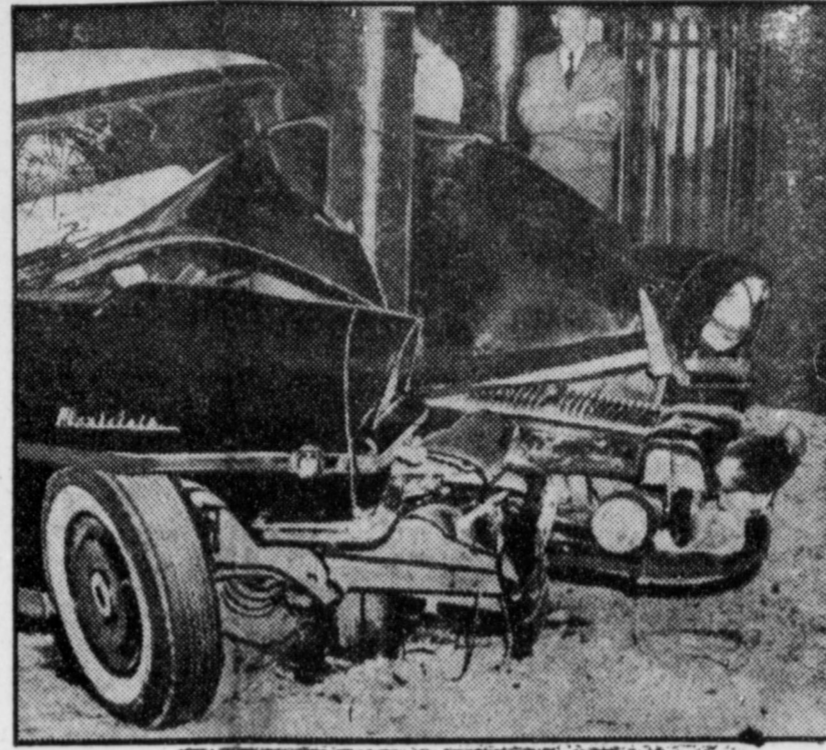
After the race there will be a feed for contestants, a street dance, a beauty contest, the awarding of trophies and assorted other festivities.

## PHILLIPS PETROLEUM SCHEDULES TESTS IN FULTON FIELD

Phillips Petroleum Co. has scheduled three tests in West Fulton Beach Field seven miles north-northwest of Rockport.

The firm's No. 70 Copano, projected to 7,650 feet, is 2,970 feet from the south and 660 feet from the east line of State Tract 46. The No. 71 Copano, slated 7,900-feet, is 1,980 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west line of State Tract 66.

Phillips No. 73 Copano, projected to 7,700 feet, is 2,540 feet from the south and 660 feet from the west line of State Tract 45. The three tests are on a 7,648-acre lease which contains 58 wells.

Western Natural Gas Co. No. 28 St. Charles, Aransas County wildcat eight miles northeast of Lamar, was testing intervals from the bottom up through 7-inch casing which was set on bottom at 8,765 feet.

The Frio project is on a 46,445-acre lease.

## New Presbyterian Church Directory Just Issued

A new directory for the Presbyterian Church has just been issued for 1956, and contains everything from Boy Scouts to Young People, if the index is to be trusted. Besides that, the directory gives the names and phone numbers of all members of the congregation.

Not the least interesting feature is a brief history of the church in Rockport. The First Presbyterian Church of Rockport was organized about 1872. It was recognized on December 13, 1899, by the Rev. A. H. P. McCurdy. However, records between that time and 1908 were lost, but during that period the church had the following pastors: Rev. R. Montgomery, Rev. Joshua Phipps, Rev. W. E. Shive, Rev. R. M. Hall, Rev. H. R. Laird, Rev. Leonard Gill, and Rev. M. W. Doggett.

The first church building was constructed in 1906 and 1907. Previously the services had been held in the Methodist or Baptist churches. The bell, which is still in use, was given to the church in 1920 by Mr. A. A. Rowland, of Hesperia, Mich. The present church building was constructed in 1950.

In the years since 1908, the following pastors have served this church: T. O. Ferrin, J. A. Montgomery, R. E. Hardin, C. S. Long, J. A. Black, W. H. Morrison, Francis M. Davis, Rodney Sunday, T. H. Pollard, and A. Arnett Ward. Others, who served from 1916 to 1918, have been lost track of.

## 1st National Bank Increases Capital

Capitalization of Local Institution Raised to \$150,000 With Surplus of Same Amount; Stockholders Increased from Eleven to Forty

In a far-reaching reorganization of its financial structure, the First National Bank of Rockport has increased its capitalization from \$25,000 to \$150,000, and established a surplus of the same amount, according to an announcement made Wednesday by James H. Sorenson, Jr., executive vice-president and cashier of the institution.

## Roy Hinton Announces for Representative

Sorenson said, "but it has taken some time to work out the details. At a meeting of the stockholders held on June 21 the necessary papers were drawn and forwarded to Washington for approval of the Comptroller of currency. Tuesday we received a telegram from him, approving the increase in capitalization, which went into effect this morning, June 27."

The bank, which was founded in 1890, formerly had only eleven stockholders, but through stock dividends and sale of new stock, approximately twenty-nine more now have an interest in the institution, making the total list around forty, Sorenson said.

The bank has gone forward steadily since its founding, and this newest chapter in its history is another step in its program to keep pace with the progress and growth of the community as a whole. It gives the town an even more sound foundation to build on than it has had in the past, and places the First National in the same class, as far as capital and surplus goes, with other top-ranking banks in surrounding towns.

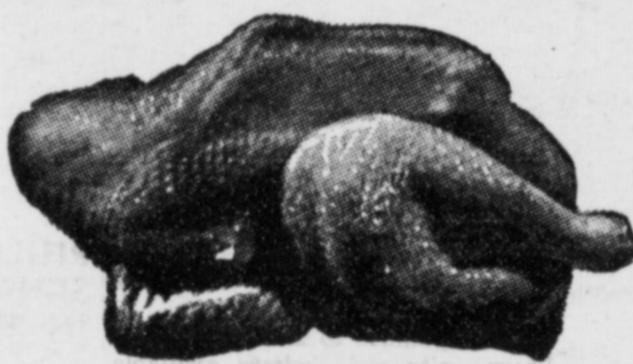

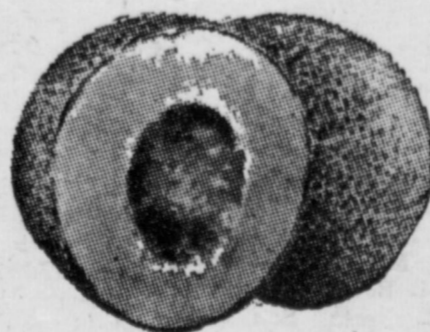

bringing about oil and gas production.

"I would favor creating a special commission to carry out the rehabilitation program," Hinton said. "The money for this work could be obtained from revenues derived by the state from lease and royalty money. The money for this work would not be an additional burden on oil and gas companies, but would come from funds that the state is now getting for leases and royalties from exploration and production. Such funds would be matched by the federal government."

Hinton said he believes that the rehabilitation should include restoration of oyster beds, improving the natural habitats of fish, eliminating pollution, and the building of permanent jetties and passes from the Gulf into inland waters. Hinton points out that the assistance and cooperation of the federal government could be obtained by the rehabilitation commission in carrying out planned long range programs.

Born in Austin in 1907, Roy Hinton has lived most of his life in the South Texas coast country. After his school days he studied law in the offices of well-known attorneys in Beeville, gaining a practical working knowledge of that profession. He held the office of bailiff of the 117th District Court in Corpus Christi from 1938 through 1941, and from 1941 through 1944 he was in charge of electrical maintenance for the main naval base in Corpus Christi and all auxiliary fields while under construction. Since 1945 he has

been in cafe, fishing and tourist business in Rockport. He is married and has one daughter, Mrs. James Herring of Corpus Christi, and two granddaughters, Lydia Ann and Barbara Lynn.

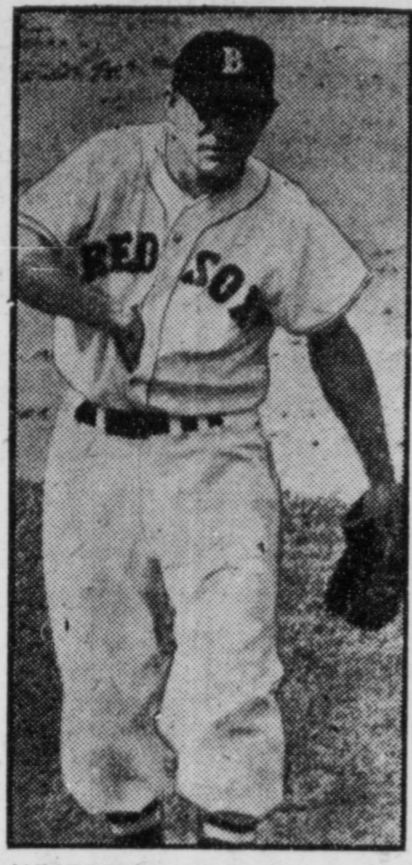
Hinton said that he believes the next legislature will be a crucial one from a taxation standpoint, and said he will oppose any kind of sales tax, state income tax, or any additional taxes on beer, cigarettes and gasoline. He said he believes that industries and businesses that are now escaping taxation should come in for a fair share, rather than piling more taxes on sources that are already tax burdened. He definitely opposes federal government control of our natural gas or any other business that should be controlled by the state.

Other points in Hinton's platform include further steps toward solving the water problem of the area, increase in old age pension benefits, which have not been raised in four years, salary raises for school teachers and better conditions for school children. He said he would support a bill to pay the Texas war veterans a bonus.

"I will go down the line with the Democratic party," Hinton said. "I have always been a Democrat."

### Savings Bonds Safer Than Cash

The slogan "Safer Than Cash" now applied to United States Savings Bonds doesn't begin to tell the full story, according to Fred A. Bracht, chairman of the County Savings Bonds Committee. "Not too many people know about the fine service the Treasury offers to bond holders," Mr. Bracht declared. "This service is one of the outstanding features that make the Savings Bond one of the best investments ever offered."

"A good many of us already know that we can get our lost, destroyed, or stolen bonds replaced without cost. But this is just the beginning. The Bureau of the Public Debt, which is the branch of the Treasury that handles all bond records and redemptions, leaves no stone unturned to see that the original intent of the purchaser is carried out in the disposition of bonds."

Mr. Bracht called special attention to the provision allowing for bonds to be issued to co-owners. He cited the example of the man who died suddenly without an adequate will. He had several thousand dollars in Series E savings bonds, issued in his own name and that of his wife as co-owner. The estate seemed to be in for a long period of litigation. The widow, who needed funds badly, had been told that the savings bonds must become a part of the estate.

Upon advice of a friend, the widow wrote to the Treasury Department. She was quickly informed that the bonds were her property and could be cashed at her discretion. According to regulations, whenever a bond owner dies, the bond instantly becomes the sole property of the surviving co-owner.

"The Treasury has thousands of such cases in its files," Mr. Bracht said, "proving once again that savings bonds not only make a wonderful nest egg for future security, but are an excellent means of providing for loved ones after death."

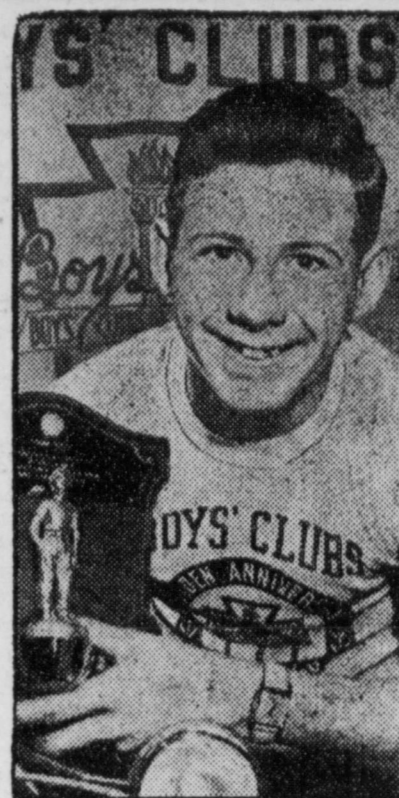
Shrimp landings in the Rockport-Fulton area for the hours ending at 8:00 a.m., June 22, amounted to 6700 pounds of tails.

Robert Hooper, Jr., of Austwell, has applied for a permit to operate in San Antonio Bay, at a location about 4 miles southeast of Austwell where he proposes to extend the jetties on the sides of the harbor entrance and inclose fill areas on both sides of an existing harbor and enlarge the harbor at the above location. The existing sheet pile bulkhead jetties on the sides of the harbor entrance would be extended about 170 feet. A rubble jetty would be constructed between the end of the sheet pile bulkhead extension and the end of an existing rubble jetty on the south side of the harbor. A boulder jetty would extend from the end of the sheet pile extension on the north side of the harbor entrance north approximately 270 feet. A boulder jetty would extend from the jettied entrance northwestward and then west to shore. An existing boulder jetty parallel to this bulkhead would be removed and the harbor shoreward from the bulkhead dredged to 6 feet below mean low water. The dredged material would be placed within the inclosures north and south of the harbor entrance formed by the bulkheads and jetties.

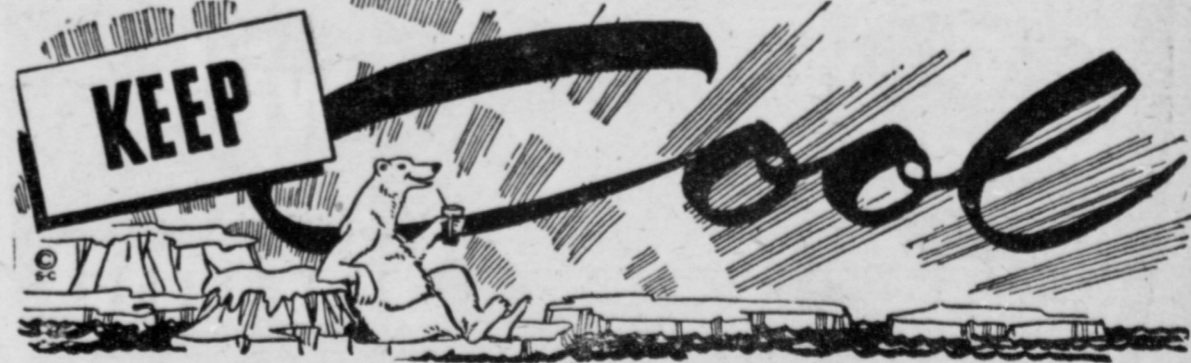

Dr. Lohse used color films illustrating what is taking place along our beaches and also showed the group how wind and tides affect passes between the Gulf and the bays and how, when such passes aren't built so that nature can help keep them open, they fail to work.

The talk was "very well accepted," Dr. Bauer summed it up. The Copano Fish & Game Protective Association of Texas, Inc., will hold its regular meetings the third Tuesday of each month.

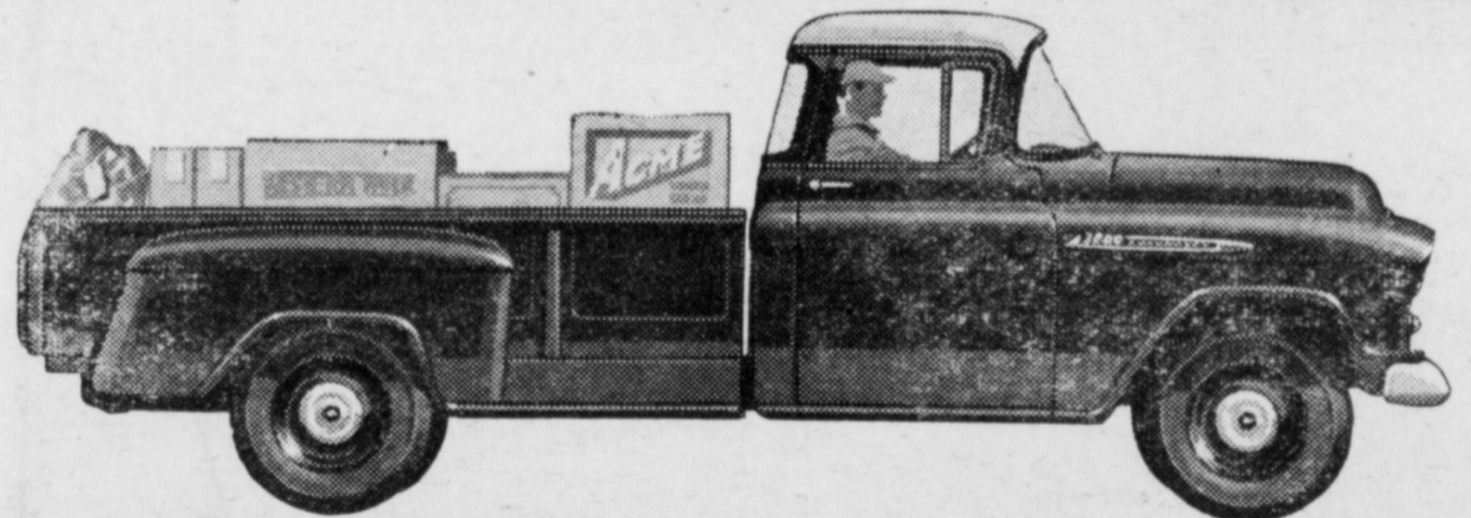

### General Description and Requirements

Four handsome trophies will be awarded in each of the four classes. One large trophy to first boat completing race. Each boat must carry a driver and a passenger or passengers. No minors under 15. Carry an anchor and line, one oar or paddle, an approved life preserver cushion or life jacket for each person aboard.

Race will be run under normal weather conditions from a Poll Boat start. Postponement is subject to small craft warning in this area.

Only gasoline and lubeoil may be used. Any type of fuel system (tanks, etc.) may be used. No fuel additives will be allowed. Oil additives will be permitted.

Stock lower units only. No streamlined, racing lower units will be permitted.

Boats must be numbered according to class for identification purposes. For instance: A boat from Galveston running the B1 class would be numbered thus: B1-G 5, etc.

Motors in all classes, must be

stock service gear shift motors of standard make and model, fully assembled as sold. Only spark plugs are optional. Cows may not be removed, but may be cut or altered for permanently installed remote controls and/or steering bars. All motors must conform to factory specifications and recommendations.

Judges will be on hand at start and finish. Winning motors will be inspected. Owners must agree to reassemble their motors, if necessary to tear down for inspection. Judges decision will be final.

While there are numerous arguments that you can fish from any type boat, it is true that a real fishing boat for these waters has certain recognized qualities that are apparent to anyone familiar with boats. Generally speaking, a fishing boat has ample beam and depth to negotiate rough water and has a more or less straight sheer or rising sheer line, some glare in the forward sections and no interruption of the bottom planing surface. No non-trip chines or step bottom boats will qualify. No transom jacks will be allowed. However, there are always borderline cases in the determination of whether a boat is a "fishing type" or not. Therefore, the following measurement chart covering the various classes is offered as a reference.

Sand bags must be used for ballast, if needed. Amount of ballast must be shown on your entry blank and not exceed 25 pounds.

All measurements are to be made assuming no decking is present. For example: Depth is measured sheerline to inside of bottom blanking. Beam is measured in a straight horizontal line, sheerline to sheerline. Length is the overall straight line from stem to middle of transom. Transom width is the widest point in a straight line. Depth amidship is measured from the inside of bottom planking up to a line drawn between the gunwales. Depth of transom is the deepest point of the transom, sheerline to bottom of planking.

Boats in classes A and B1 must have a proved carrying capacity of at least four adults. Boats in classes C1 and D1 must have a carrying capacity of five adults.

Class "A1" 17 cu. in. motors except that 20 cu. in. Gale Products engines (Sea King, Sea Bee, Saber, etc.) will be allowed to run this class. Entry blanks will be on hand at the starting point. All entrants must sign an entry blank to be eligible for the race. Identifying numbers will be painted on both sides of your boat with cold water paint or tape. Same may be removed after winners have been certified.

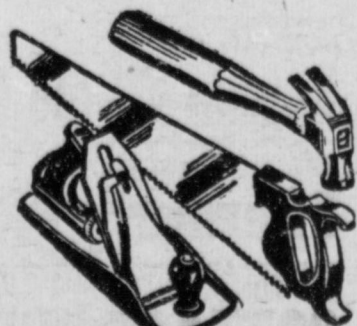

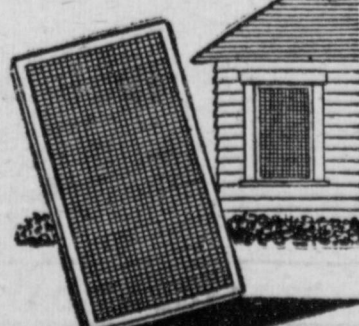
