Over 100 People Have Asked For Marathon Blanks

Over one hundred people have asked for entry blanks for the 130-mile Freeport-Rockport outboard marathon to be held on August 11, according to race officials, and, as there are nearly two weeks yet to go before the start of the race, they expect others.

These figures were disclosed by Fred Palmer and Willie Adkins, of the Brazosport Boat Club, as they visited with Rockport Chamber of Commerce backers of the joint event, wrapping up the last details of what promises to be the longest fishing boat race in Texas, if not in the nation.

The day's program of events begins at 8:00 a. m., when the 17-cubic-inch class of outboards roars over the starting line at Freeport, headed for Rockport, 131 miles down the Intracoastal Canal. At 9:15, the 27-cubic-inch class faces the starter's flag; the C1 class, of 35.7 cubic inches, will be next, at 9:45; and last come the big boys, the 43-inch motors which get away at 10:15 a. m.

There are seventeen trophies to be awarded in the race: four for each class, and a trophy for the first boat across the finish line that has complied with the rules, regardless of class, and there will be a number of merchandise prizes. In addition, the five dollar entry (Continued on page 4)

Home Fire and Explosion Show Not A Motion Picture

There seems to be some misunderstanding about the show that will be given at the High School Auditorium Friday, August 10th. This will be a real live show and not a motion picture, actual fires and explosions such as cause many deaths and much property damage all over the country.

The apparatus for conducting these demonstrations is furnished by the Texas Engineering Extension Service and is in charge of Mr. Joe Fogley, head of the Fire Marshals School at A&M College. The importance of this school is shown by an attendance of over 1300 firemen, firemarshals and safety men from nearly every state in the union, as well as representatives from Canada and Mexico City.

The longest distance traveled in the USA was from Maine and others came from the west coast, Florida, and New York. Fire Chief Richard Fox and Fire Marshal Carl M. Osborn wish to assure everyone that they will be in no danger.

The Rockport and Fulton Fire departments will be in attendance and the same safety precautions will be observed as when this show was presented at A&M College. Representatives from the Air Force will be present to furnish additional information concerning the reporting of weather conditions by the Ground Observing Corps.

Braselton Construction Company Now Has Contracts for Almost A Million and a Quarter in Area

The Braselton Construction Company of Corpus Christi now has contracts for almost a million and a quarter dollars in Rockport, since the signing of its last contract with the Aransas County Independent School Board for \$714,714, covering construction of school buildings here and in Fulton. These, combined with a \$392,393 bid on Aransas County's new courthouse and \$37,000 on jail equipment, bring the total to \$1,145,107.

The courthouse, which is slated to be ready for occupancy around the first of the year, is now making rapid strides towards completion. According to County Judge John D. Wendell, practically all of the brick in the walls will be laid this week; flashing on the roof is being installed, and he expects them to begin pouring finished floors in the inside of the building within the near future.

AWS Construction Ahead of Schedule

Contractors on Base Are Approximately Twelve Percent Ahead of Planned Building, With Three Structures Rapidly Approaching Completion

Construction at the 813th Aircraft Warning Squadron base is well ahead of schedule, according to Lieutenant W. R. Schwartz, project officer from Ellington Field, who has been working with the job ever since its inception.

"Building is approximately twelve percent ahead of original estimates," he said. "One of the airmen's barracks is almost completely enclosed, and work can commence on the interior of the building. 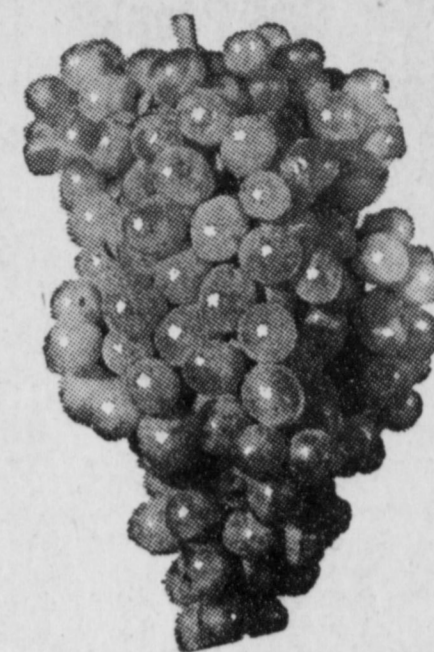

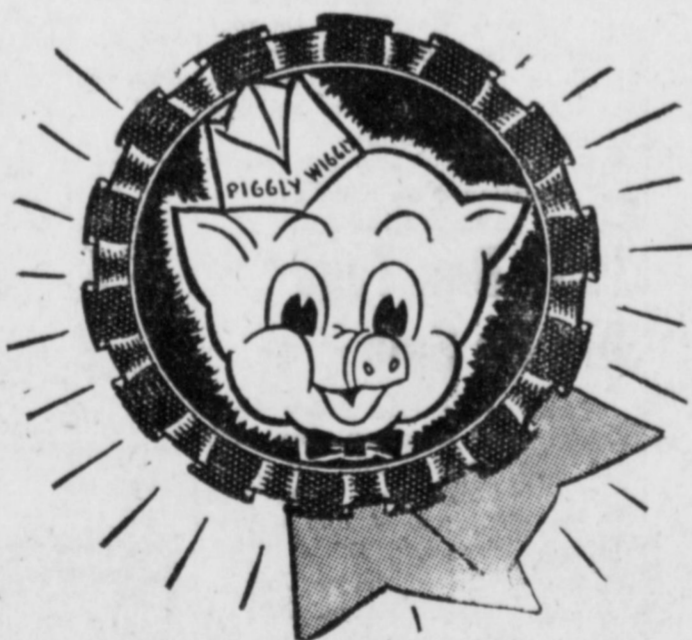

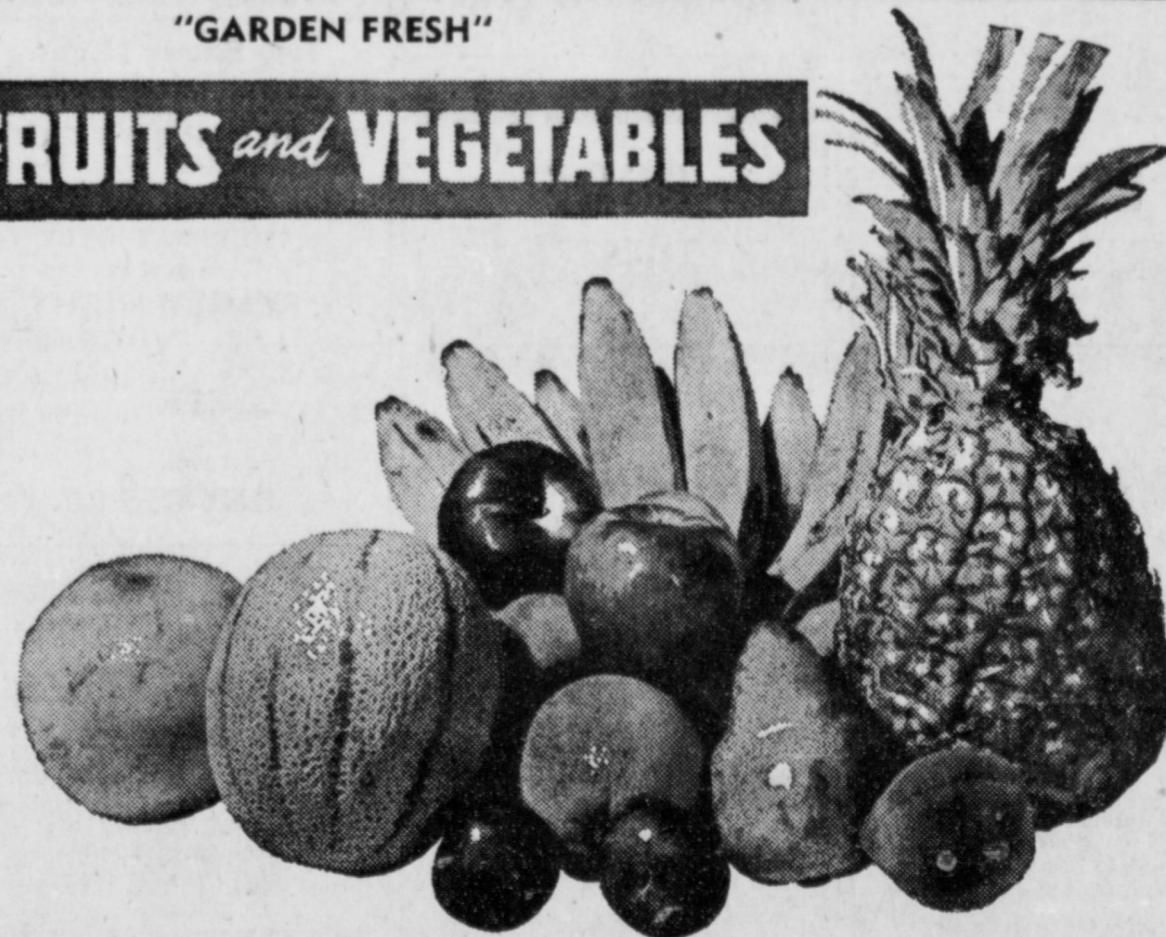

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, amending Section 48a, Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, so as to authorize needed changes in and revision of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas; providing that this section shall not amend, alter, or repeal Section 63 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas as adopted November 1954, or any enabling legislation passed pursuant thereto; providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation and publication.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 9 proposing an amendment to Section 11 of Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding a new subsection to be designated as Section 11a, relating to denial of bail to a person charged with a felony less than capital who has been heretofore twice convicted of a felony providing for the submission of the proposed Amendment to a vote of the people and for proclamation and publication thereof.

Section 11a. Any person accused of a felony less than capital in this State, who has been heretofore twice convicted of a felony, the second conviction being subsequent to the first, both in point of time and commission of the offense, and conviction therefor may, after a hearing, and upon evidence substantially showing the commission of the offense, be denied bail by any judge of a court of record or magistrate in this State; provided, however, that if the accused is not accorded a trial upon the accusation within sixty (60) days from the time of his incarceration upon such charge, the court or magistrate shall be automatically set aside, unless a continuance is obtained upon the motion or request of the accused for a review of any judgment or order made hereunder.

Section 12. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

FOR the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies.

AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas providing that a court judge or magistrate may deny bail to a person who has been convicted of two (2) previous felonies.

Section 2. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 proposing an amendment to Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas by adding thereto another section, to be designated as Section 15a, requiring medical or psychiatric testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of trial by jury where the person under inquiry has not been charged with commission of a criminal offense.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article I of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding another section thereto following Section 15, to be designated Section 15a, to read as follows:

Section 15a. No person shall be committed as a person of unsound mind except on competent medical or psychiatric testimony. The Legislature may enact all laws necessary to provide for the trial, adjudication of insanity and commitment of persons of unsound mind and to provide for a method of appeal from judgments rendered in such cases. Such laws may provide for a waiver of trial by jury, in cases where the person under inquiry has not been charged with the commission of a criminal offense, by the concurrence of the person under inquiry, or his next of kin, and an attorney ad litem appointed by a judge of either the County or Probate Court of the county where the trial is being held, and shall provide for a method of service of notice of such trial upon the person under inquiry and of his right to demand a trial by jury.

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon:

FOR the Constitutional Amendment requiring medical testimony for commitment of persons of unsound mind, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for trial and commitment of such persons and for waiver of the right of trial by jury by a person alleged to be of unsound mind or his next of kin, and his attorney ad litem.

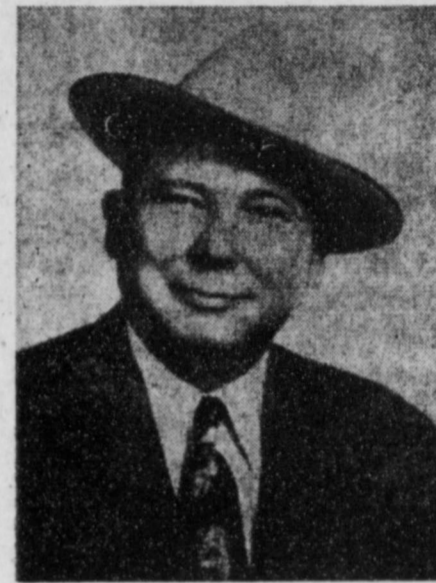
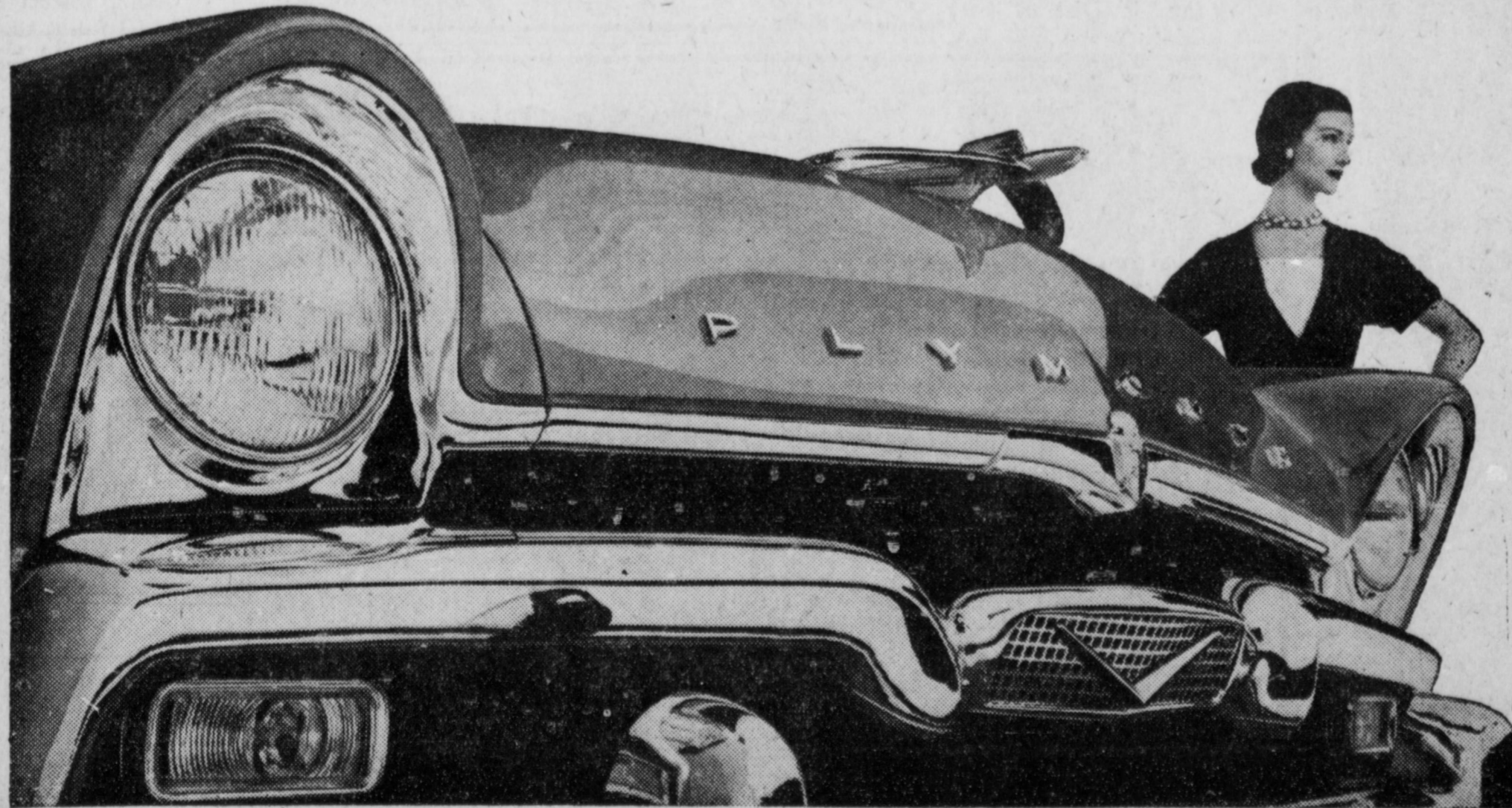

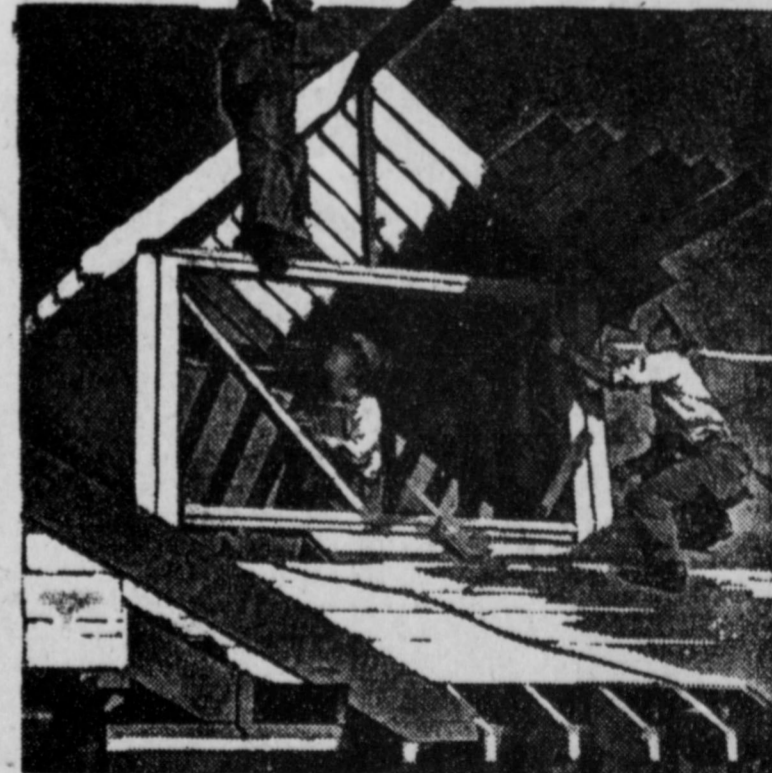

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 23 proposing an amendment to Section 9 of Article VIII of the Constitution of Texas so as to provide that the Commissioners Court in each county may levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund purposes, permanent improvement fund purposes, road and bridge purposes and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these tax rates does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year, and providing further that the Commissioners Court shall not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations...

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Section 9, Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 9. The State tax on property, exclusive of the tax necessary to pay the public debt, and of the taxes provided for the benefit of the public free schools, shall never exceed Thirty-five Cents (35c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation, and no county, city or town shall levy a tax in excess of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year for general fund, permanent improvement fund and jury fund purposes; provided further that at the time the Commissioners Court meets to levy the annual tax rate for each county it shall levy whatever tax rate may be needed for the four (4) constitutional purposes; namely, general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of the foregoing tax levies does not exceed Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year. Once the Court has levied the annual tax rate, the same shall remain in force and effect during that taxable year; and the Legislature may also authorize an additional annual ad valorem tax to be levied and collected

for the further maintenance of the public roads; provided, that a majority of the qualified property tax paying voters of the county voting at an election to be held for that purpose shall vote such tax, not to exceed Fifteen Cents (15c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation of the property subject to taxation in such local laws for the maintenance of the public roads and highways, without the local notice required for special or local laws. This Section shall not be construed as a limitation of powers delegated to counties, cities or towns by any other Section or Sections of this Constitution."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Commissioners Court in each county to levy whatever sums may be necessary for general fund, permanent improvement fund, road and bridge fund and jury fund purposes so long as the total of these funds does not exceed a maximum tax rate of Eighty Cents (80c) on the One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation in any one (1) year and so long as the Amendment does not impair any outstanding bonds or other obligations."

Sec. 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

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PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 46
proposing an amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the Oath of Office to include appointive officers of the State.

Section 1. That Section 1 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:
"Section 1. Members of the Legislature, and all other elected officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation:
'I, _____, do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute the duties of the office of _____ of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable thing, or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God.'"

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1956, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:
"FOR the Constitutional Amendment providing the form of the Oaths of Office for elective and appointive officers of the State."

Section 3. The Governor of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 31 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 51-c, providing that the Legislature may grant aid and compensation to persons who have been fined or imprisoned under the laws of this State for offenses which they are permanently disabled by the laws of this State...

Section 51-c. The Legislature may grant aid and compensation to any person who has heretofore paid a fine or served a sentence in prison, or who may hereafter pay a fine or serve a sentence in prison, under the laws of this State for an offense for which he or she is not guilty, under such regulations as may be prescribed by the Legislature...

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 13, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 32 proposing an amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas, by adopting a new Section to be known as Section 51-b, giving the Legislature the power to provide, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature expedient, for assistance to needy individuals who are permanently and totally disabled during any period when they are receiving aid or assistance, aid to the needy blind, or aid to dependent children, nor while he is receiving permanently any completely State supported institution; and provided further that not more than Twenty Dollars (\$20) a month out of State funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year.

Section 51-b. The Legislature shall have the power to provide by general law, under such limitations and restrictions as may be deemed by the Legislature, for assistance to needy individuals, who are citizens of the United States, who shall have passed their sixtieth (60th) birthday, who are totally and permanently disabled by reason of his mental or physical handicap, or a combination of physical and mental handicaps and not eligible for vocational rehabilitation, and who are residents of the State of Texas, who have resided in this State for a period of not less than (1) year continuously immediately preceding the application and who have resided in the State for at least an additional five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the application for assistance; and providing that the amount paid out of State funds may be paid to any individual recipient; and provided further that the amount paid out of State funds for assistance payments shall not exceed One Million, Five Hundred Thousand Dollars (\$1,500,000) per year.

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PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 6, 1956

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 15 which said Five Cent (5c) ad valorem tax is herein provided, except in case of fire, flood, storm, or earthquake occurring at any such institution, in which case an appropriation in an amount sufficient to replace the uninsured loss so incurred may be made by the Legislature out of General Revenue Funds. The State Comptroller of Public Accounts shall draw all necessary and proper warrants upon the State Treasury in order to carry out the provisions of this section...

Section 17. Item of the State ad valorem tax on property of Seven Cent (7c) on the One Hundred Dollar (\$100) valuation heretofore permitted to be levied by Section 51 of Article 3, as amended, there is hereby levied, in addition to all other taxes permitted by the Constitution of Texas, a State ad valorem tax on property of Two Cent (2c) on One Hundred Dollars (\$100) valuation for the purpose of creating a special fund for the continuing payment of Confederate pensions as provided in Section 51, Article 3, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the Building Fund as provided in Section 51b, Article 3, of the Constitution.

just beginning to move. A 25'x84' quonset-type, field house is now under way at one end of the football field. This will contain two dressing rooms with showers, a storage room for field and track equipment, offices for the athletic director and coaches, and public rest rooms.

The Fulton school, consisting of eight class rooms and necessary offices, to be constructed on an entirely new site, will furnish necessary housing for the elementary grades in that area.

At the high school campus, to supplement the plant already there, additional classrooms will be built for the junior high, connected to the present senior high school buildings, and a new gymnasium will be erected.

At Rockport, where some of the facilities at the elementary school no longer are up to standard, eight more classrooms will be built, to be connected with the old buildings by a covered walk for use in bad weather.

below ground. Sanitary facilities have also been modified, and, pending changes from the engineers' office, are still to be installed, although the necessary materials on hand to complete this portion of the job once the necessary plans are in the hands of the contractor.

All roads, both access and interstate, have been graded, and are ready for paving.

The station, which will also control an unmanned radar at Riviera, will eventually occupy 200 officers and men in its operation, according to informed estimates, and, while quarters are planned for unmarried personnel on the base itself, other arrangements have had to be made for men who will have their families with them.

Lieutenant James H. Hill accompanied Schwartz, who is being transferred from Hinton Field to Harlingen for advanced training. Lt. Hill will be the new project officer.
