Ted LeBleu, Rockport caught one 7-pound trout, and four reds that averaged six pounds each. Tuesday, Dr. R. H. Schultz, Rockport caught 5 trout that weighed 16 pounds.

Rainfall From Ten To Thirteen Inches Less

Rainfall in the Rockport-Aransas Pass area during 1956 varied from ten to thirteen inches less than in normal years, according to reports from various sources.

In Rockport, observers said that it was 12.85 inches below the 12-year average from 1943-1955, as gauges here showed only 18.87 inches against an average of 31.72 inches for the preceding period.

This was a little more than two inches less than fell on Aransas Pass, where 20.25 inches were recorded for last year.

The precipitation there was 10 inches below the annual average for San Patricio County, and approximately 11.5 inches less than the 12-year average for Rockport.

December, with .89 inches, was the seventh month in 1956 when less than an inch of rain fell in Aransas Pass, according to W. C. Hutson, weather observer for that part of San Patricio County. July was lowest, with .11 inches, followed by September, with .18 inches, and February with .37. Highest rainfall was in April, when 7.75 inches or precipitation was recorded, and October, second with 3.30.

Other months were as follows: January, .50 inches; March, .60 inches; May, 1.45 inches; June, 1.83 inches; August 2.63 inches; November, .64 inches.

The High School Pirates remained undefeated in district play as they took the measure over the Woodsboro Eagles last Friday night in Woodsboro by a 62-47 score. Coach Segler used every boy on his squad when in the third quarter his boys pulled way out in front of the Eagles.

The Pirates defense was alert as time after time they stole the ball from the Eagles without giving them a shot. The "B" team won their game by a 26-25 score.

Their next district ball game will be tomorrow night in Ingleside against the dangerous Mustangs. A win tomorrow night will definitely establish the Pirates as one of the favorites to capture the west zone of the district, the winners of which will meet the winners of the east zone for the championship.

Judge Wendell Tries One DWI

Judge John D. Wendell, in county court, sentenced Pedro Herrera of Rockport, to a fine of \$200 and costs of \$21, with ten days in the county jail, and suspension of his driver's license for six months.

Herrera had been charged with driving while intoxicated by Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine on Sunday morning, after he had forced one man off the road between here and Aransas Pass, without a wreck, and sideswiped another, continuing on his way at high speed.

Charles Rickman, the first man, managed to evade Herrera's rush down Highway 35 by taking to the road's shoulder, and continued to Aransas Pass where he called Mundine.

Mundine left, to intercept the car driven by Herrera, who, in the meantime driving on the wrong side of the road, had sideswiped a 1956 Olds sedan, driven by Fred Wakefield, of Corpus Christi, stopping. Wakefield, whose car was still able to run, wheeled around and chased Herrera, finally forcing him off the road, and holding him until Mundine arrived.

Earlier in the weekend, a 1949 Olds sedan, driven by Eugene Townsend and a 1956 Ford, driven by Margaret Barnes Carter, of Houston, were in collision on Highway 35, near the airport, and, although Miss Carter's car was turned over, luckily no one was seriously injured.

Another Highway 35 wreck resulted in damage of approximately \$100 to Jack Sanders '56 Mercury. Sanders was driving north on the highway behind another car, which slowed down. Sanders also slowed, and Andrew Davis, in a 1954 Mercury, ran into him. Deputy Sheriff Mundine, who investigated, gave Davis a ticket for following too closely.

City Council Meets Monday

The City Council at its regular meeting Monday night approved a resolution cooperating with the State Highway Department in construction of curbs and gutters along the business route of Highway 35.

A request from members of the Aransas County Library Board, for help in finding a home for the three-thousand volumes library which ladies of region have assembled was tabled.

Results of the election to close parts of Mimosa, Austin, and Broadway, next to the Bruhl home, were canvassed and certified.

Requests for street lights at Royal and Ruby streets and in front of the Johnson Fish Company were approved.

The council devoted considerable time to discussion of the delinquent tax list, and instructed City Attorney Joe Caldwell to proceed with the suits against property holders as fast as possible. Ten such suits will be started within the next few days.

Councilors then approved current bills.

3 Drown In Boating Accident Last Thursday

Two men and a boy drowned, and a fourth spent the night clinging to a beacon in Aransas Bay as the result of a boating accident last Thursday night.

Dead were H. M. Norris, of Rockport, and his son, Leslie, and Thomas Fanning, of Tulsa, Okla. Surviving was Arthur Miller, also of Rockport.

The four left Rockport on a rabbit hunting expedition on Mud Island, about 7 p. m. Thursday.

Miller told Coast Guardsmen his 14-foot skiff was struck by a huge swell which threw the occupants of the boat to one side, causing it to capsize near Channel Marker 49 about two miles south of Rockport.

The four clung to the side of the overturned boat in the chilly darkness as winds whipped up the waters of the bay.

After about 40 minutes, during which time he held up the Norris boy, Miller said he was becoming exhausted. He told the boy's father the child appeared to be dead and that he was going to have to turn him lose.

He said the father did not answer, and he released the lifeless body. It sank immediately.

A few minutes later, he said the boy's father released his grip on the boat and silently sank into the bay.

Miller said he and Fanning decided to try to swim to Marker (Continued on page 8)

January 31 Last Day For Poll Tax

January 31 is the last day that poll taxes can be paid, according to Mrs. Jordan Weber, of the tax assessor-collector's office, who says that only 223 in Rockport and six in Aransas Pass have been paid so far. Even in an off year, such as this one, there are more than 1000 people who usually pay their poll tax, so a lot of people are going to have to visit the courthouse in the near future. Last year there were 1476 poll taxes paid.

County tax assessor-collector A. C. Shivers called attention to a recent opinion on poll taxes and exemption certificates, rendered by J. C. Davis, assistant attorney general, which points out some things that all of us need to know about poll taxes.

You may pay your poll tax by going to the Assessor-Collector's office or paying the same to one of his regular deputies regardless of where he may be stationed. Also, a husband may pay the poll tax of his wife, or a wife may pay her husband's poll tax.

In addition to this, you may authorize some one to pay your poll tax for you. This authorization does not have to be sworn to, but it must contain all the necessary information to enable the tax assessor-collector to fill out the poll tax and it must be accompanied by the proper amount of money to pay the poll tax.

The third method remains the same, and that is payment by United States mail, and in this instance the application must be sworn to.

Regardless of whether you paid your poll tax in person, by duly authorized agent, or by United States mail, the correct information necessary to fill out the poll tax and the proper amount of money must have been in the hands of the assessor-collector or one of his duly authorized deputies not later than midnight, January 31, 1957.

All tax receipts issued for any year after January 31st, where the application was not made or was not received by the assessor-collector until after January 31st shall be issued, but on the face thereof shall be stamped "Holder not entitled to vote", and what is more, the holder shall not be included in the list of qualified voters prepared for the election judges of the county.

There is also an erroneous idea about the law, Sheriff Shivers pointed out, not only among lawyers and tax collectors, but among the tax payers themselves to the effect that if a poll tax application is placed in the mail by the deadline, that the assessor-collector is authorized to issue the applicant a voting poll tax.

This is not true, Sheriff Shivers said. The application and the money must be in the hands of the assessor-collector or one of his authorized deputies before midnight, January 31.

Post Office Has Forms to Report Aliens' Addresses

According to Postmaster Jimmy Reid Simmons, alien address forms are available at the post office for the convenience of any aliens in the area who are required to report their addresses to the government in compliance with the law.

Simmons pointed out that it is important for each non-citizen to report his address to the Government each January because of penalties for non-compliance.

A willful violation can bring a fine of up to \$200, a jail sentence and deportation. To avoid this, Simmons said, aliens should go to the nearest post office or immigration office during January, obtain an address report form, which should be filled out and returned to the clerk.

Immigration officials stress the fact, he said, that non-citizen should mail his own card.

The statement followed an announcement from Immigration Commission J. M. Swing, in Washington, reminding aliens of the report requirement, which also says that any non-citizen outside the country shall file the report within ten days of his return to the U. S.

Swing, in his announcement, pointed out that the only non-citizens exempt from the address report requirement are diplomats, foreign representatives in the United Nations, and Mexican contract laborers.

Kathryn McLester, Dr. A. C. Lewis, and Mrs. A. W. Ebert met with the court to discuss opening of the street between blocks 69 and 70 in Fulton, in the Quayle Tract. After some exploration of the matter, Commissioner Mills moved that the court make an effort to purchase the necessary property as a county road, and the rest of the commissioners agreed with him.

Judge John D. Wendell was authorized to place a price on old furniture and lumber remaining from the former courthouse, and to sell this material as advantageously as possible. He was also authorized to sign a contract with C. P. & L. for electrical service in courthouse.

County attorney Weldon Cabaniss informed the court that Mrs. W. N. Meigs had agreed to accept a payment of \$500 in settlement of injuries suffered from material thrown by one of the county mowers, and the county clerk and treasurer were instructed to make the payment.

Judge Wendell was instructed by the commissioners to look into the matter of purchasing a mimeograph machine for use by the county's offices, and to prepare and advertise bids for curb and gutter to be placed on the north, east, and south sides of the present courthouse.

The bond of Ross Terry, delinquent tax attorney was approved, and a room designated in the courthouse where the county health office could administer free polio shots to needy children.

The commissioners then moved to participate in the city's move to cooperate with the state highway department to install curbs and gutters on the Highway 35 business route through Rockport. They voted to issue time warrants in the amount of \$26,252.49 to purchase lot 9 to 16, Block 398, in the Manning Addition, for resale of the house and property, with the county retaining the necessary 20 feet for highway purposes.

The contract for gas for the county's vehicles was awarded the Magnolia Petroleum Company, as of February 1, 1957, instead of to Gulf, which previously had it. After setting salaries and fees for the coming year, the court adjourned.

Drunks Tried In Justice Court

Two drunk and one vagrancy cases were tried before Justice of the Peace Jack Smith over the weekend, according to Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine, who made the arrests. Otis Foster, of Phoenix, Arizona, driving a 1955 Buick, got mixed up in his turns and wound up in W. B. Allen's front yard, Saturday night. When he tried to turn his car, he tore the door off W. B.'s garage before Mundine was called and arrested him, charging him with drunkenness.

Foster paid a fine, after he had sobered up, of \$20 and costs of \$17.50. Clyde Hogland, a passenger, charged with drunkenness, paid \$1 and costs of \$19.50. Mrs. Ruby Foster, who was also in the car, was charged with vagrancy, and fined \$1 and costs of \$19.50.

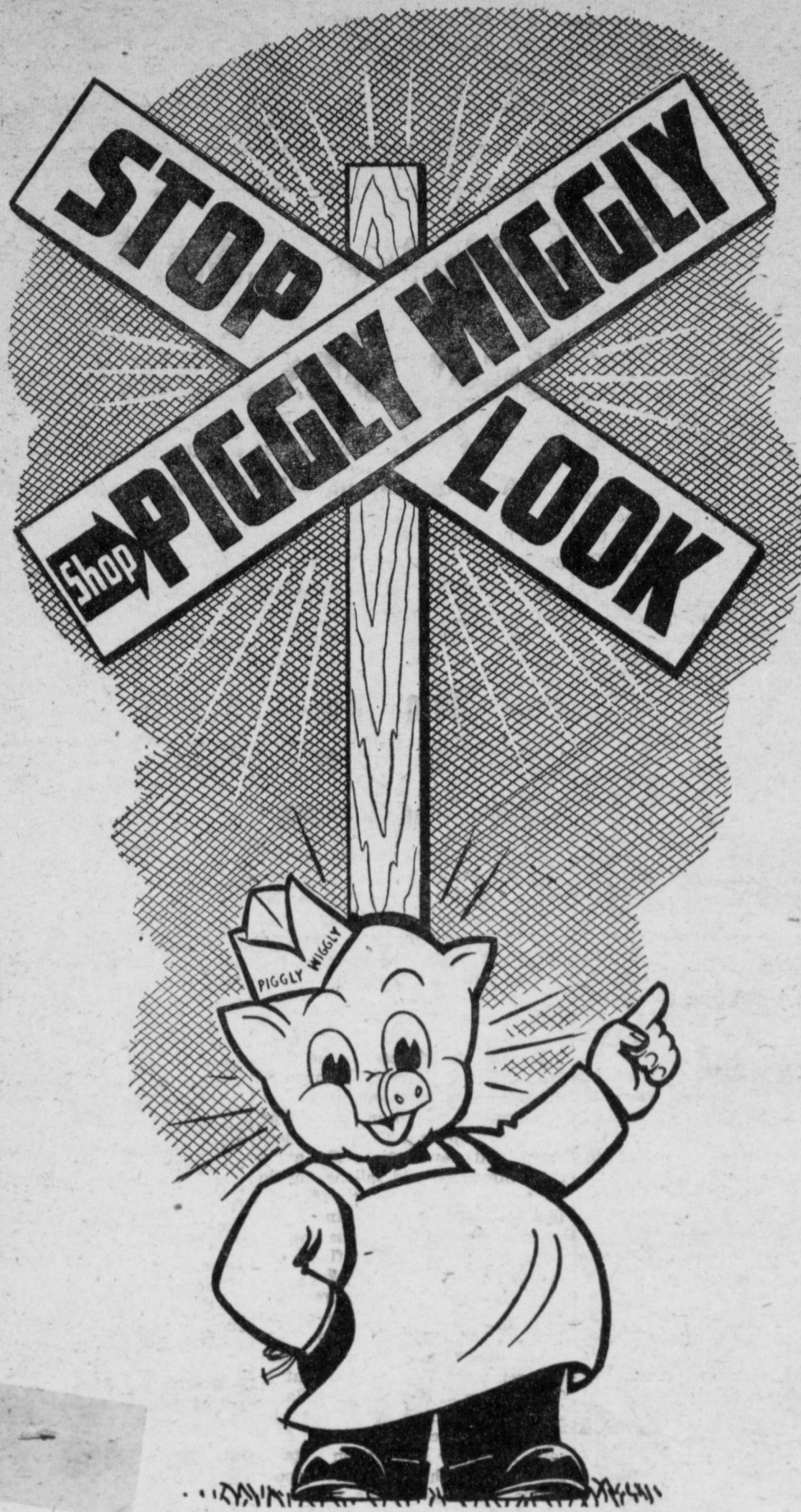

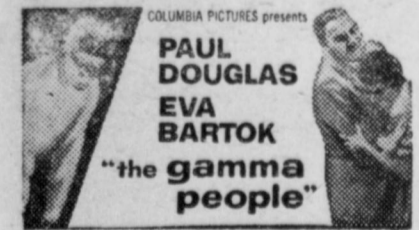

Traffic Arrests Up In Aransas County During Past Year

State highway patrolmen made 254 arrests in Aransas County in 1956, compared to 218 in the previous year, according to Lieutenant Paul Oder, of the Corpus Christi office.

Eleven deaths were caused by these 254 accidents, four more than for 1955, although property damage of \$27,520 was only a little greater and for 1955, when damage amounted to \$27,000.

Injuries in 1956 amounted to 26, against 14 for the preceding year.

In the sixteen-county region under control of the Corpus Christi Highway Patrol District, deaths fell to 14 in December, compared to December, 1955, when an all time high of 31 was recorded.

The city of Victoria went for 365 continuous days without an accident, then, on December 31, an accident caused the year's only fatality.

The 14 deaths, Oder said, occurred in 11 accidents, two of them in cities and the rest in rural areas. In five of the accidents, drinking was involved.

Of 134 accidents of all types

reported in December, the lieutenant said, 39% of drivers and pedestrians involved had been drinking. Property damage amounted to \$94,872.

In all, Oder reported, highway patrolmen in this district arrested or warned 3,220 drivers for driving violations. Of this number, 56% were either driving while under the influence of liquor or speeding.

More Opportunities For Aransas County Youths

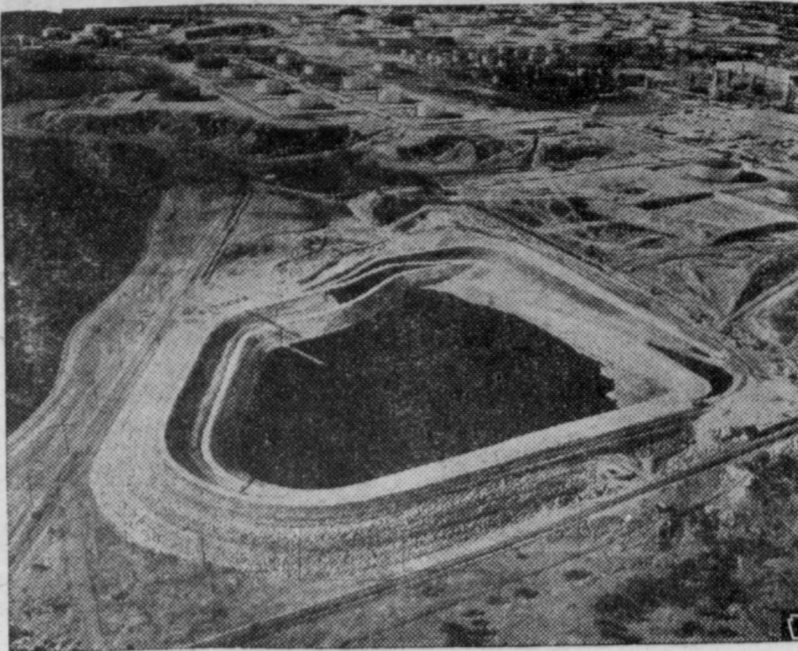

Other benefits include annual leave, sick leave, group insurance, traveling expenses when away from assigned station and benefits of the State Retirement System and Federal Social Security.

In addition, applicants must be citizens of the United States and residents of Texas for at least a year immediately prior to filing of the application. They are also subject to a rigid character investigation.

Anyone interested and who can meet the qualifications are urged to write to any District Office of the Texas Highway Patrol for an application.

World's Largest Oil Storage Reservoir



Creole Petroleum Corporation, Venezuelan affiliate of Standard Oil Company (New Jersey), has drastically cut storage costs by constructing an 8,800,000 barrel earthen storage reservoir.

Creole, with the help of experts from Massachusetts Institute of Technology, discovered that the clay at Amuay, Venezuela, was impermeable enough to hold oil without any appreciable loss from seepage.

Built at a cost of \$2,800,000, this earthen reservoir is more than twice the size of the number one reservoir that Creole completed last fall, as shown above left.

Covering nearly 29 acres, it is 60 feet deep and has an earthen dam 275 feet wide at the base around two sides. According to company spokesmen this type storage can be built at a cost of about 35 cents a barrel compared with \$1.65 to \$2.00 for conventional tank storage.

By permitting sustained, more nearly constant throughputs in the face of variations in product offtake, the outdoor storage affords the added advantage of assisting Creole to maintain uniform refinery operations during the summer periods.

Dr. Sabin Seeks Oral Vaccine Against Polio

A new polio vaccine that might be swallowed as a pill or mixed in a glass of milk is now closer to realization as a result of the work of Dr. Albert B. Sabin of the University of Cincinnati, Ohio.

Emphasizing that his new vaccine is still in the experimental stages of limited testing, Dr. Sabin urged widespread use of the Salk vaccine saying: "the Salk vaccine is the only polio vaccine available for public use at this time and advantage should be taken of its protective effects to the maximum of its availability."

Using a new technique to isolate live virus polio strains, Dr. Sabin reported recently on the development of a vaccine composed of weakened strains of the three types of polio virus. Dr. Sabin's work has been supported by the National Foundation since 1940 at a cost of more than one million dollars.

Last year Dr. Sabin tested three strains of virus which he believed might be used for a live virus vaccine. These viruses were given separately to 133 prisoners. No harm was done to the prisoners and they developed antibodies to the types of polio they had been given. In some cases, however, more virulent virus was recovered from individuals than originally had been given to them. The possibility that these stronger viruses might spread to unvaccinated persons had to be considered. Dr. Sabin has now isolated three strains of live but weakened virus by a technique that he hopes assures their separation from harmful virus strains.

Research toward a live virus vaccine against polio has been in progress for many years in many different laboratories in an effort to find, or breed, weakened strains which will not harm the individuals to whom they are given but will create immunity to the disease.

The chief advantage to the general public of a live virus vaccine is that it could probably be given by mouth, perhaps as a pill or in milk or fruit syrup. It is hoped that the immunity from a single dose would be lifelong.

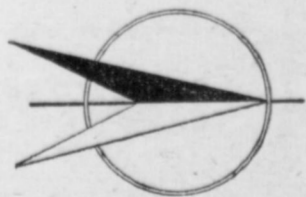

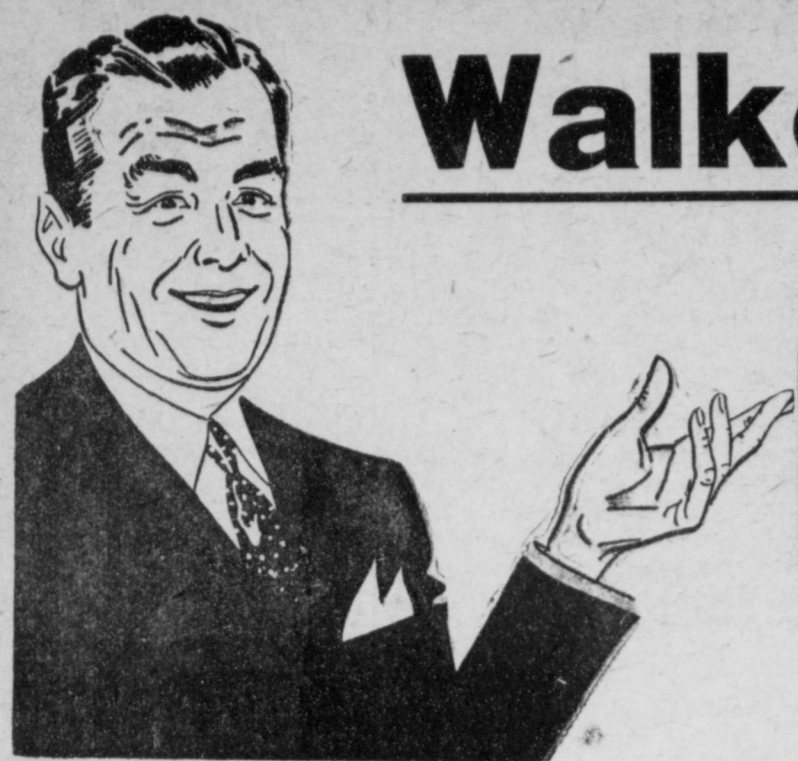

South Texas Representatives Sponsor Veterans Hospital

Washington — United States Representatives Joe M. Kilgore of McAllen and John Young of Corpus Christi introduced companion bills in the House of Representatives in an effort to obtain a Veterans' Hospital for South Texas.

The Congressmen stated that no specific location in South Texas is stipulated. The legislation was introduced simply to get a hospital in the South Texas area, in the 14th or 15th Congressional Districts, they said, and added that the selection of a site undoubtedly would be the result of a close investigation as to needs, population and accessibility as determined by the Veterans' Administration.

Kilgore said that Texas has a total of 10 Veterans' Hospitals and Medical Centers, but they are crowded and their locations are such that South Texas Veterans must travel hundreds of miles for medical attention.

Young pointed out that the facilities at the U. S. Naval Hospital at Corpus Christi are extremely limited and are little more than required by active duty naval personnel in Corpus Christi and the surrounding area.

The 14th and 15th Congressional Districts have a large Veteran population, the Congressmen pointed out and stated that they feel a 300 bed general medical and surgical hospital is necessary.

Ten Local Men Have Chance For Nomination To Air Force Academy

Ten young men, from the 14th Congressional District, of which Aransas County is a part, have a chance for nomination to the Air Force Academy, if they want to go, and are willing to shake a leg.

Congressman John Young, sworn in on January 3, writes: "I have been informed by Air Force authorities that, as a new member of Congress, I have the privilege of nominating ten young men from our district to the Air Force Academy. I have already received several for these nominations, which must be made by January 31."

"The time is very short, and I am taking this means of notifying interested young men that I will be pleased to consider their applications on a first-come-first-served basis. As you probably know, these nominations entitle a boy to take a competitive examination for the Academy."

"From those taking the examination, eleven will be chosen by Air Force authorities for the Academy, in the same manner that appointments are made to West Point and Annapolis."

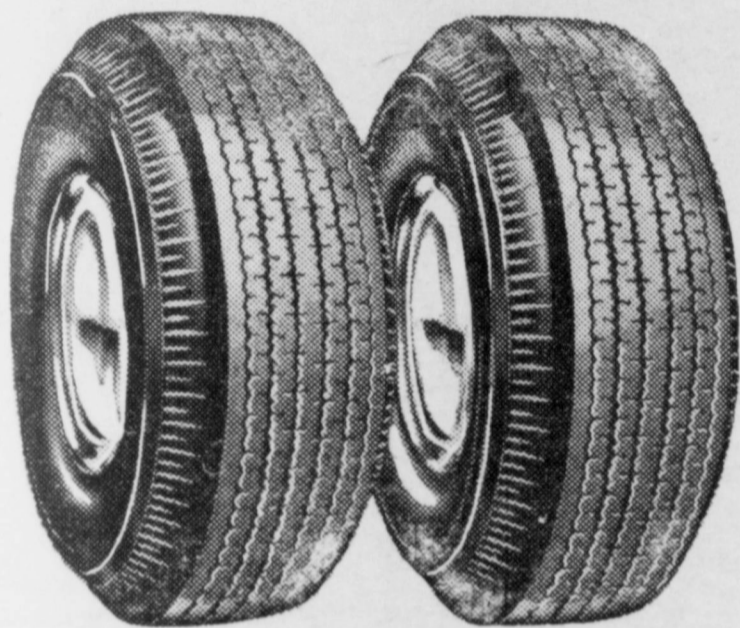

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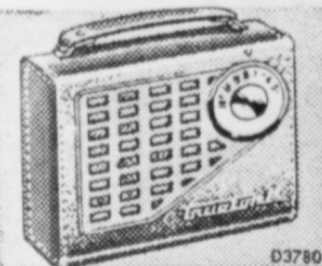

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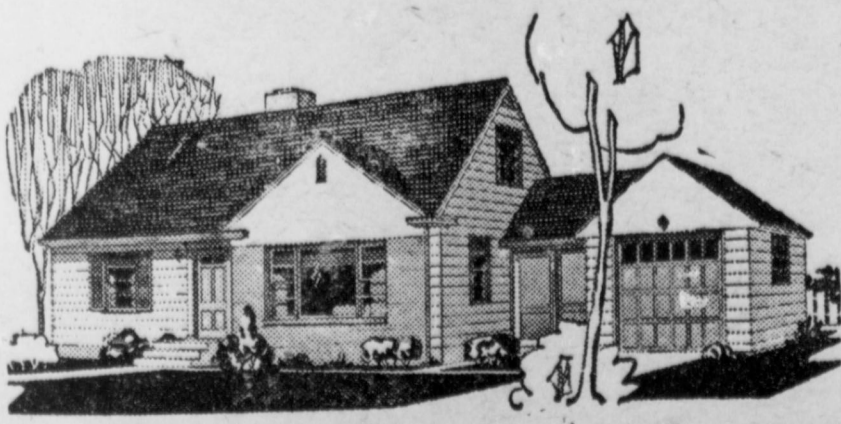

Will Aransas Pass Be Texas' Next Deepwater Port?

Conn Brown, new mayor of Aransas Pass, has plans for making a deepwater port out of the bustling little city, with a channel deep enough to accommodate vessels of 24-foot draft.

To do this, he hopes to have the fill for the new Port-Aransas-Aransas Pass Causeway, already authorized by the State Highway Department, dredged from the tributary waterway connecting Aransas Pass with the Intracoastal Canal at Port Aransas, widening and deepening of which has already been authorized by Congress.

In a letter to Colonel W. F. McCrone, Chief of the Galveston District, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, and to H. H. Thornton, chairman of the State Highway Commission, Brown pointed out the merits of the combined project, and recommended that the two agencies investigate the economic benefits of such an operation.

The state, he said, would be a gainer because spoil dredged from the channel would be more satisfactory than that obtained from shallow harbor pits along the side of the causeway.

The Federal government would benefit since removal of such spoil, enlarging the waterway, would eliminate necessity of maintenance for several years.

The city would profit because the amount of spoil necessary for the causeway was so large that the channel would be enlarged to a bottom width of 200 feet and to a depth sufficient to accommodate vessels drawing 24 feet of water, rather than the twelve feet authorized in the Congressional approval for enlargement of the waterway.

In addition, because of increased room in the channel, a larger dredge could be used to pump the spoil, making its removal more economical and expediting the work on both channel and causeway.

Copies of the recommendation were also sent to T. O. Foster, Jr., District Engineer for the State Highway Department, H. L. Sisson, resident engineer for the Corps at Corpus Christi, and Dale Miller, executive veep of the Intracoastal Canal Association.

Brown has already received a favorable reply from Colonel McCrone, in the form of a copy of a letter McCrone wrote to Randle B. Alexander, of the State Highway Department, in which the Chief of Engineers heartily endorsed the plan put forward by the Aransas Pass mayor.

The plan also has the endorsement of Foster, Sisson, and Mil-

More Traffic Accidents in 1957

Figures released by the Bureau of Public Roads indicate that there are now more than 65 million vehicles registered in this country. This means a net gain, for 1956, of approximately 3-million more vehicles on the roads today than in 1955. And, if the trend continues, we can expect 80-million in 1966 and over a 100-million crowding the roads by 1975.

What do these figures mean to you, as a motorist? Well for one thing - if you think the traffic accident toll is terrible now, just wait 'til the above prediction become realities. Try to visualize 50,000 to 75,000 vehicle deaths each year.

The overall traffic problem must be attacked on all fronts, with stepped-up engineering, education and enforcement. However, for our purposes here, let's look at what just one of the phases offers as a partial solution and how we stand - that of education.

Texas, according to records of the Texas Safety Association, falls far behind many states in young driver education, but some headway is being made. During the 1955-56 school year our secondary schools trained nearly 23,083 youngsters to be better, thus safer drivers in our state. Insurance companies have been quick to see the advantages of such a program and have reduced insurance rates by 10% to those who have completed approved driver training courses.

Where do the educators stand? A survey made this past summer by TSA shows that principals and superintendents are overwhelmingly in favor of an expanded driver education program. Generally, they believed it should begin in the ninth grade.

But, many roadblocks prevent the expansion of high school driver education, the most serious of which are the costs to the school, fitting the course into an already crowded curriculum and a shortage of properly trained teachers. These obstacles are emphasized by the fact that in spite of a growing public understanding, only 11.5 per cent of Texas' eligible students receive a complete course; one including both classroom and practice driving instruction - the need is obvious.

ty under the leadership of its director, Colonel Homer Garrison, Jr. has done everything within its bounds to gain an expanded program for our schools. In one such move, Colonel Garrison had this to say.

"It has become apparent that a trained instructor in a schoolroom could improve bad driving habits, or prevent them from being formed in the first place, since the classroom instructor had access to the students at a considerably more impressionable age." He said he believed the lesson could be taught much faster in the classroom by a qualified teacher, than on the highway by a patrolman . . . and at greatly reduced expense to the state.

The Texas Education Agency, National Safety Council, Parent-Teacher Association, universities and colleges, local safety councils, the press and other media have likewise been encouraging driver education.

But, one thing is sadly lacking, that is the active support of Mr. and Mrs. Texas. Until public apathy is abated, the annual accident lists cannot be noticeably shortened. Until we, as individuals, express our opinions to our elected representatives and our school administrators we cannot expect our highway to be safe.

If that sounds pessimistic then let me put it in another way. Let's suppose that you have two children who are now less than two years old - we can call one John and the other Mary. Now, unless some radical adjustment is made in our present traffic control program, you can expect either John or Mary to be killed or seriously injured in a traffic accident before he or she reaches the age of twenty-one. It's up to you.

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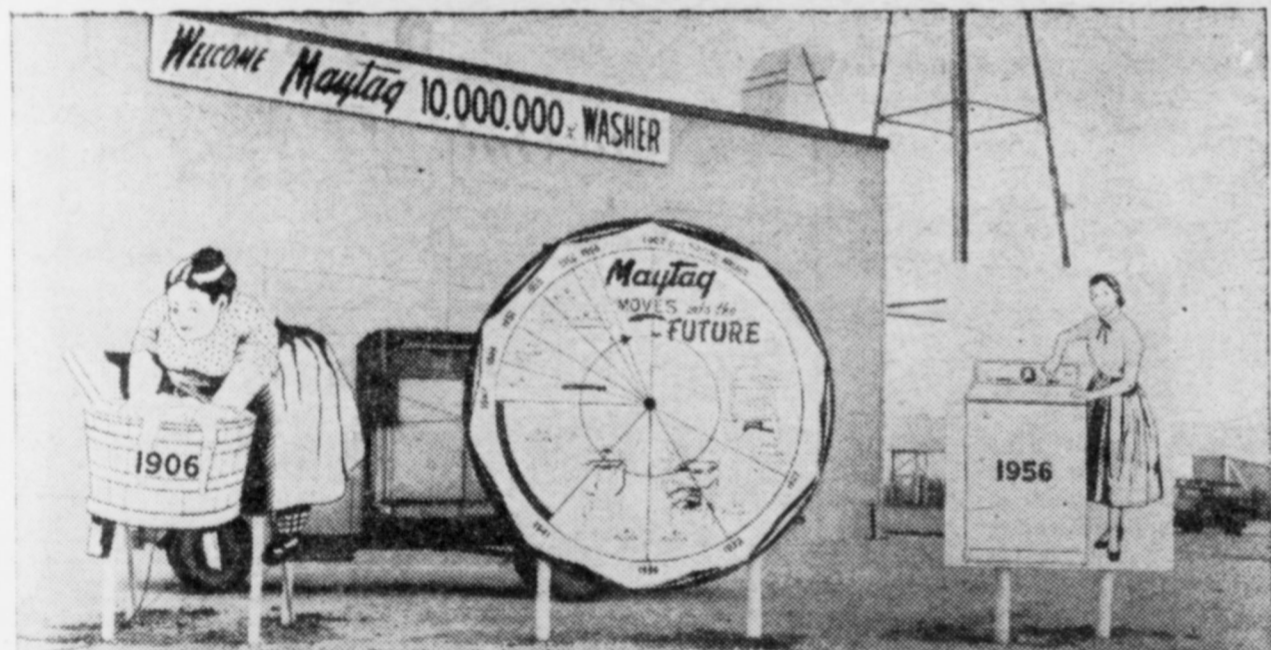
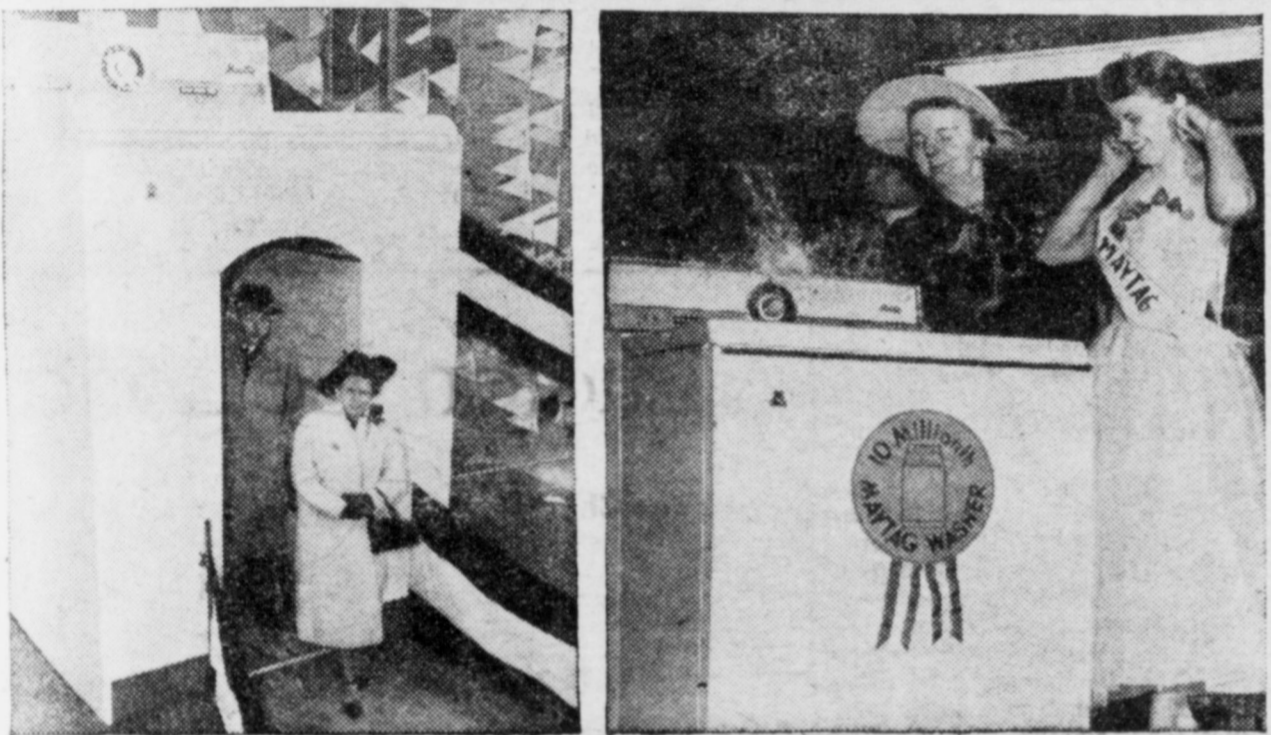
Woman's Club Stages Tourist Party Benefit For March of Dimes
