The meeting was the outcome of an earlier trip in which the local group contacted the Park Board at its last meeting in Austin, making for increased facilities at Goose Island, pointing out that the park's attendance 147,000 in 1956 - was second largest of any state park. If facilities were provided to adequately care for this number of people, Steele asserted, Goose Island should support itself.

Improvements desired by the County Park Association include twelve camp shelters at an estimated cost of \$9000; twenty-five quate brakes, lights, horn and concrete picnic tables and grills, steering. 
