Army Engineers Publish Book On Transportation Lines

Transportation lines, their vessels operating or available for operation under the American flag on December 31, 1955 on the Atlantic, Gulf, and Pacific Coasts, are described in a 452-page booklet published by the Board of Engineers for Rivers and Harbors, Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army.

Three comprehensive tables are provided in this annual publication entitled "Transportation Lines on the Atlantic, Gulf, and Pacific Coasts 1956" now available at \$2.50 each from the Superintendent of Documents, Government

Printing Office, Washington, D. C. Table 1 lists 1,591 transportation lines (companies or individuals) with their addresses.

Table 2 lists each vessel, its type and construction, its type of operation, its net register tonnage, length and breadth, draft, horsepower, carrying capacity, highest fixed superstructures, cargo handling equipment, local operating base, and date when built or rebuilt.

Table 3 shows service, the localities served by the vessels, the schedules of operations, principal commodities carried, and the usual navigation season. In addition, the railroads having joint rates with water carriers at ports are named where the information was available.
