Drop for drop, the venom of some species of rattlesnakes is 60 times more powerful than the venom of others. Rattlesnake venom can be drunk without ill effect. It has a slight taste, astringent at first and then turning sweetish when held on the tongue. It produces a slight tingling effect on the lips. Thus a person is in no danger when he sucks the blood from a lanced rattlesnake wound, unless he is suffering from tooth cavities or month sores where the poison would have access to the blood stream.

A rattlesnake's first line of defense is concealment. If this fails, it will assume its coiled position and threaten with rattle, hissing and darting tongue. Even then it will attempt to escape. Its last resort will be to strike out with its fangs, and in some instances will not eject venom which it tends to conserve for securing prey.

With prompt first-aid measures and doctor's care, a rattlesnake bite is very rarely fatal. Klauber recommends that children who have no instinctive fear of snakes be taught a moderate fear of them, but not the hysterical reaction that many adults show.

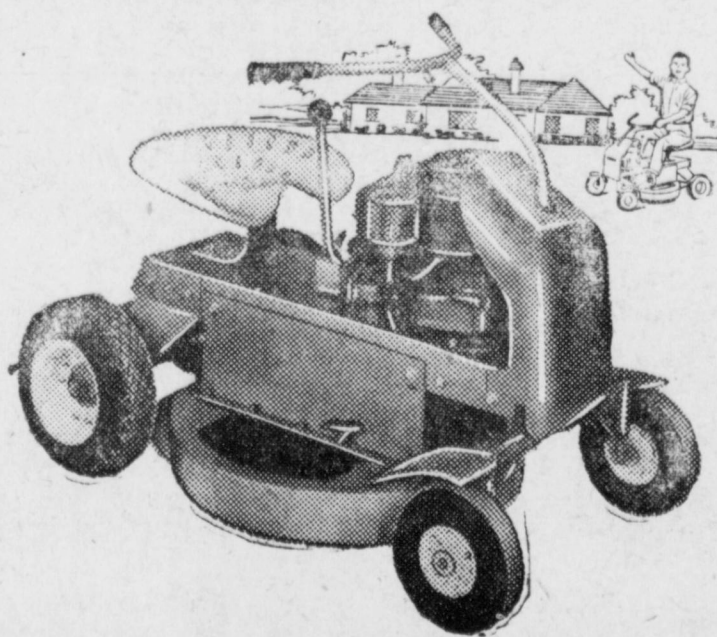

ARANSAS COUNTY COACHES ATTEND COACHING SCHOOL

Four Aransas County coaches, Melvin Borchert, Dave Segler, Pat Smith, and Billy Bates, returned this week from Dallas, where they have been attending the world's largest coaching school — a typically Texas institution.

Starting Monday the high school coaches went through a week of listening to lectures on the latest tactics in football and basketball from such notables as Bud Wilkinson of Oklahoma, Bowden Wyatt of Tennessee, Hank Iba of Okla. A & M and Milton Jowers of Southwest Texas State.

The big clinic, which attracted an estimated 2,150, reached its climax with all-star basketball and football games in which the best of the schoolboy graduating athletic crop were seen in action.

Registration for the coaches were Sunday but there already were more than 900 on the line Saturday — and that's better than 540 above any advance registration in the past 24 coaching schools.

Enrollment reached 2000 for the first time at Lubbock last year exceeding that figure by one but it had been hovering on the magic mark for several years.

Sunday the instructors — Wilkinson coach of the nation's No. 1 football team; Wyatt who had the No. 2 outfit; Iba, producer of fabulous basketball teams at Okla. A & M and Jowers who has been a consistent developer of colorful and high scoring teams at Southwest Texas State, arrived.

Wilkinson lectured on the split T formation. Wyatt teaches the single wing.

Track also came in for its share of attention with Oliver Jackson, coach of Abilene Christian College and developer of the great spring

ter Bobby Morrow doing the lecturing.

So big is the school that three hotel were used for the lectures and meeting places while the athletic facilities of Southern Methodist University were turned over to the football and basketball squad.

The athletes — 56 football players and 24 basketball players — arrived Sunday afternoon but two of the coaches arrived Saturday. Chuck Moser of Abilene who has a 37-game winning streak going and who has produced the last three Class AAAA state champions will handle the North All-Stars. Bill Stages of Corpus Christi Ray who has built a great record and put his team in the finals last fall against Abilene will coach the South. Moser will use the split T formation. Stages will use the multiple T offense.

The all-star football game was at the Cotton Bowl Friday night with a crowd of 20,000 or more expected.

The basketball teams have as coaches Clifton McNeale of Pampa for the North and M. H. (Cotton) Robinson of Buna for the South. This game is scheduled tonight (Thursday) in the big new air-conditioned coliseum at Southern Methodist where 7,600 can be seated. A sell-out is forecast.

Mrs. Steele's Sister Teaches Home Economics In East Pakistan

Basic courses in home economics in East Pakistan have been taught for the past two years by Miss Aline McKenzie, Mrs. Seth Steele's sister for whom an open house was held at the Steele home last Sunday morning.

The work is sponsored by the International Cooperation Administration, an American federal agency, in which Texas A & M College is participating. Miss McKenzie represents A & M College in the project.

The natives of Pakistan teach cooking without stoves, using vessels on the ground or in holes in the ground for the most part. School teachers there have been teaching home economics "from a book — mostly talking about it, with little real demonstration," according to Miss McKenzie who told of teachers from over the East Pakistan area who have come to the classes held in Eden College, a branch of old Dacca University at Dacca.

Miss McKenzie's instructions go far beyond cooking and sewing, and include child welfare, health and home management in all its phases.

H. P. Smith is chief of the Texas A & M College party of 12 working at Dacca. There are instructors from the Texas college giving courses in agriculture, engineering, and business administration, in addition to the home economics instruction.

Two of the girls in the far-away classes will enroll at Texas Women's University (formerly Texas State College for Women) at Denton in September.

Miss McKenzie and other members of the teaching group from A & M have worked with the East Pakistan secondary education board. She has held successful classes in foods in yards on ground chulas, or holes dug in the ground. It was necessary for her to teach the natives how to prepare the food sent in CARE packages.

Miss McKenzie, whose work is 12,000 miles away from the "states," returned by air. She made stop-overs in Rangoon, Burma, Bangkok, Thailand (ancient Siam), Hong Kong, British Colony, Manila, P. I., Tokyo, Japan, and Honolulu, P. I.

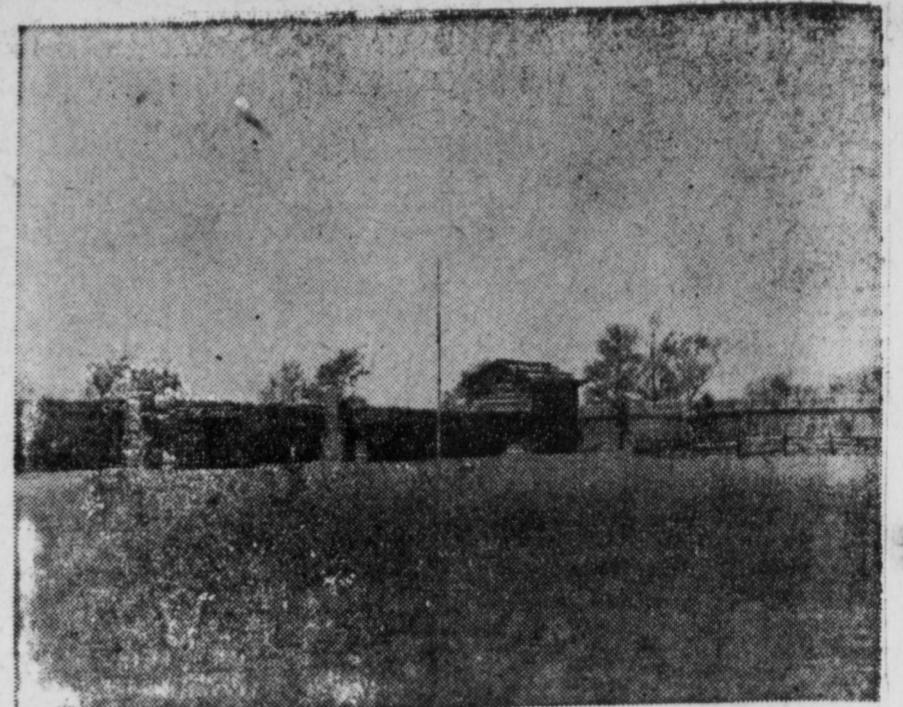

Miss McKenzie, who was head of the home economics department of Texas A & I College at Kingsville 19 years, will return early in August to East Pakistan for another year of work there. She will instruct classes at Mymensingh, 78 miles from Dacca, in addition to her assignment at Dacca, where she will live. She will commute two days of the week for her classes at Mymensingh.

Instruction is in English for the most part. Pakistan is a republic, but was formerly a part of the British Commonwealth of Nations. "I talk English most of the time, but also use the Bengali language," Miss McKenzie explained. "English is understood and spoken by the people there."

Miss McKenzie is a former national president of the Business and Professional Women's Clubs of America.

Park of the Week Old Fort Parker State Park

Old Fort Parker State Park occupies the site of the palisaded fort built by Elder John Parker's colonists who settled along the Navasota River. A replica of the fort is the main feature of the park.

It was from this fort that Cynthia Ann Parker was kidnapped by Comanches in a raid made May 19, 1836.

The fort was a rectangular enclosure made of posts planted in the ground and held together by connecting beams. Cabins were built backing against the palisade and facing a central compound. The fort was designed as a place where the colonists could leave their families while working the fields of their farms outside.

Most of the men were working in the fields when this attack took place. A few of the occupants of the fort escaped. Others were slain or carried off as prisoners. Cynthia Ann Parker, then nine years old, was among those taken. It was not until 1860 that she was recaptured and brought back to her kinsmen. In the meantime she had been reared as an Indian child, married Indian Chief Peta Nocona and became the mother of Quanah Parker, last of

the great Comanche chiefs. Ten years after her return to life among the white people, she died. She is buried beside her famous son in Oklahoma. With past hundreds now buried, both white and Indian descendants gather alternately for reunions at Fort Parker and in Oklahoma.

The replica of the fort is on a spur road leading off State Highway 14 about midway between Groesbeck and Mexia.

Souvenirs and booklets based on the story of the Indian raid, the life of Cynthia Ann Parker and the account of her recapture are available at a booth outside the enclosed fort. Soft drinks are also obtainable there. Recreational features are supplied at nearby Fort Parker State Park.

Newly Discovered Cat And Dog Parasite Can Cause Fatal Illness in Children

Dr. Margaret H. D. Smith, associate professor of pediatrics at New York University, today warned of a newly identified parasite, carried by dogs and cats, which can cause possible fatal illness in children.

Dr. Smith told the closing session of the Massachusetts Medical Society's annual meeting the parasite — a type of worm — is present in 90 per cent of cats and dogs. She said it exists mostly in puppies and kittens and is countrywide.

Young children, particularly "creepers" can pick up the parasite by handling dirt impregnated by those household pets and then putting their hands in their mouths, it was explained.

Dr. Smith said the parasite goes through the bloodstream into the liver and lungs. Symptoms are enlarged liver, lack of appetite

and little weight gains. "It can be, and has been, fatal," said Dr. Smith, "but it is mostly a nuisance."

"As yet there is no specific cure," she said.

Research on the parasite is being done by the communicable disease division of the U. S. Public Health Service and a skin test to determine its presence is expected to be developed within a year, Dr. Smith said.

Dr. Smith said she was not against families keeping dogs and cats "but I would certainly favor older dogs and cats as better household pets."

Sand On Beaches Of World May Be Rainbow-Hued

The sands of beaches in various parts of the world often are of a distinctive color, due to the dominance of some colored mineral. We have many examples of this interesting feature in various parts of the world.

For example, Makapuu beach on the Hawaiian Islands is composed of a large percentage of divine sand, hence presents a distinct green color. The noted beaches at Nome, Alaska, carry large quantities of garnet, hence the sand is quite reddish in color. The ocean beaches along the northern Washington coast also carry large amounts of garnet, and often are referred to as "ruby" beaches, or sands.

Along the coast of North Carolina may be noted typical green sand beaches. At many places

along the southern Oregon coast, magnetic sand has been concentrated, to comprise the black sand beaches. At other points quartz sand is the dominant constituent, giving the beaches a dazzling white color. In some parts of the world, mica is dominant in the beach sands, giving a still more dazzling effect in bright sunlight. In India we find various typical colored beach sands, including green and reds.

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 5, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 37 proposing an amendment to Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State. BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

Section 62. (a) The Legislature shall have the authority to levy taxes to provide a State Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the officers and employees of the State, and may make such reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of the State as it deems advisable. The Legislature may also include officers and employees of judicial districts of the State who are or have been compensated in whole or in part directly or indirectly by the State and may make such other reasonable inclusions, exclusions, or classifications of officers and employees of judicial districts of this State as it deems advisable. Persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 1-a of Article V of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Sub-section; and persons participating in a retirement system created pursuant to Section 48a of Article III of this Constitution shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Sub-section except as permitted by Section 63 of Article XVI of this Constitution. Provided, however, any officer or employee of a county as provided for in Article XVI, Section 62, Sub-section (b) of this Constitution, shall not be eligible to participate in the Fund authorized in this Sub-section, except as otherwise provided herein. The amount contributed by the State to such Fund shall equal the amount contributed by each such person, and shall not exceed at any time five per centum (5%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the State.

Section 2. That Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows: "Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character." Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at a special election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1957, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR THE Constitutional Amendment amending Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

"All funds provided from the compensation of such person or by the State of Texas for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the Treasury of the State of Texas, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States Government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is guaranteed by the United States; or in such other securities as may be permitted by law as investments for the Permanent University Fund or for the Permanent School Fund of this State, under the same limitations and restrictions imposed by the Constitution for investment of those funds and subject to such regulations as the Legislature may provide. However, a sufficient amount of said Fund shall be kept on hand to meet the immediate payment of the amount likely to become due each year out of said Fund, such amount of funds to be kept on hand to be determined by the agency which may be provided by law to administer said Fund.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such legislation shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

"FOR THE Constitutional Amendment amending Sub-section (a) of Section 62, Article XVI of the State Constitution, relating to establishment of a retirement, disability and death compensation fund for officers and employees of the State."

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 1, 1957.

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, providing for the issuance and sale of bonds of the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State; providing for the payment of such bonds; creating an agency to administer said fund and to perform other duties prescribed by law; limiting the period during which financial assistance may be granted; and providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proposition therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding a new section thereto to be known as Section 49-c, as follows: "Section 49-c. There is hereby created as an agency of the State of Texas the Texas Water Development Board to exercise such powers as necessary under this provision together with such other duties and restrictions as may be prescribed by law. The qualifications, compensation, and number of members of said Board shall be determined by law. They shall be appointed by the Governor with the advice and consent of the Senate in the manner and for such terms as may be prescribed by law.

available upon such terms and conditions as the Legislature may prescribe, to the various political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas including river authorities, conservation and reclamation districts and districts created or organized or authorized to be created or organized under Article XVI, Section 59 or Article III, Section 52, of this Constitution, interstate compact commissions to which the State of Texas is a party and municipal corporations, in the conservation and development of the water resources of this State, including the control, storing and preservation of its storm and flood waters and the waters of its rivers and streams, for all useful and lawful purposes by the acquisition, improvement, extension, or construction of dams, reservoirs and other water storage projects, including any system necessary for the transportation of water from storage to points of treatment and/or distribution, including facilities for transporting water therefrom to wholesale purchasers, or for any one or more of such purposes or methods.

"Any or all financial assistance as provided herein shall be repaid with interest upon such terms, conditions and manner of repayment as may be provided by law.

"From the moneys received by the Texas Water Development Board as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon, there shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the bonds authorized by this Section sufficient moneys to pay the interest and principal to become due during the ensuing year and sufficient to establish and maintain a reserve in said fund equal to the average annual principal and interest requirements on all outstanding bonds issued under this Section. If any year prior to December 31, 1982 moneys are received in excess of the foregoing requirements then such excess shall be deposited to the Texas Water De-

velopment Fund, and may be used for administrative expenses of the Board, and for the same purposes and upon the same terms and conditions prescribed for the proceeds derived from the sale of such State bonds. No grant of financial assistance shall be made under the provisions of this Section after December 31, 1982, and all moneys thereafter received as repayment of principal for financial assistance or as interest thereon shall be deposited in the interest and sinking fund for the State bonds; except that such amount may be required to meet the administrative expenses of the Board may be annually set aside; and provided, that after all State bonds have been fully paid with interest, and after there are on deposit in the interest and sinking fund sufficient moneys to pay all future maturities of principal and interest, additional moneys so received shall be deposited to the General Revenue Fund.

"The Legislature may provide for the investment of moneys available in the Texas Water Development Fund, and the interest and sinking funds established for the payment of bonds issued by the Texas Water Development Board. Income from such investment shall be used for the purposes prescribed by the Legislature. The Legislature may also make appropriations from the General Revenue Fund for paying administrative expenses of the Board.

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution of Texas adding a new section to be known as Section 49-c of Article III, authorizing the issuance and sale of Two Hundred Million Dollars (\$200,000,000) in bonds by the State of Texas to create the Texas Water Development Fund to provide financial assistance to certain political subdivisions or bodies politic and corporate of the State of Texas in the conservation and development of the water resources of the State."
