

United Fund Drive Will Be Staged Early In October

The United Fund Drive will be staged early in October, Jack McDavid told members of the board of directors of the Chamber of Commerce last night, and urged that everyone back this worthy project to the limit, as the budget this year will be approximately \$9,000.

One of the troubles encountered in past drives, McDavid said, was the fact that many people had not yet been able to accustom themselves to this kind of giving, and were still thinking in terms of the

old set-up when they gave a little to every drive, rather than lumping the sums together and giving it all to the United Fund.

As has been pointed out in the past, the United Fund covers a multitude of charities, providing for all of them, without the nuisance of one drive after another throughout the year. The total needs of these various charities are considered, the goal set at that need, the drive held in a day, and the moneys apportioned to the various organizations, thus relieving the community of the almost intolerable burden it had been under previously, with one fund's drive treading closely on the heels of another.

The agencies represented at this time, and their necessary budgetary needs are as follows:

The American Red Cross, \$1552; Aransas County Emergency Corps, \$500; Girl Scouts of America, \$1,210; the Aransas County Youth Council, \$350; the Aransas County Youth Council Building Fund, \$600; Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, \$600;

United Services Organization, \$309; the Aransas County Library Board, \$300; the Rockport-Fulton Area Safety Council, \$150; the Boy Scouts of America, \$1300; the Crippled Children's Hospital at Corpus Christi, \$500; the Junior Youth Council of Aransas County, \$150; the Blind Veterans' Organization, \$25; the Foundation for Mental Health, \$31.76; various contingencies, such as flood relief, storm disasters and so on, as they arise, \$422.24; and expenses of the fund, approximately \$1000.

It should be pointed out here that much of this money goes to make this community a better place to live in. In this category comes the money given to the Red Cross, to the Boy and Girl Scouts, to the various Youth Councils, the Safety Council and so on, and hence, when gifts are made to the United Fund, the money is returned to the community in many fold benefits that otherwise could not be attained.

The only outside fund that is not contained in this is the "March of Dimes" and they are omitted because their charter does not allow them to participate in such organizations as the United Fund. But all these other organizations are cared for by the fund, and to the fund's drive should be given the total of all the amounts that you gave to each of these in the past.

Shrimp Theft Charges Filed Against Three

Three men charged with theft of 1500 pounds of shrimp were in the Nueces County jail this week, and Corpus Christi police were questioning two more, thought to be implicated.

Assistant Police Chief V R Patterson, of Aransas Pass, said that one of the men was picked up there, and two others in Corpus Christi.

The three are Howard Bourque, Alton W. Banks, and Daniel Webster Hardee, and bail for each of them was set at \$2500 by Nueces County Justice of the Peace W. A. Gilleland on Friday.

The other pair were apprehended by officers in Freeport Sunday night.

Patterson said that members of the Nueces County sheriff's department transferred these men from Freeport to Aransas Pass for questioning.

Patterson said the five men collaborated in theft of the shrimp from the vessel Premier I on August 23, transferring it to the shrimp pier.

The shrimp were found at a Rockport fish house where they had been sold.

Rockport Schools Now Have 1020 Students

Rockport schools opened on Sept. 3, and, according to Supt. Pat H. Greene, there were 938 scholars registered this morning. This is 49 more than the total enrollment for the month of September last year.

The enrollment is split as follows:

Rockport Elementary 466, Junior High School 161, Senior High School 186, and Fulton Elementary, 125 students.

Superintendent Greene says that he expects approximately 975 students, or perhaps a few more students by Oct. 1.

Lunchroom participation so far this year is about doubled, he said, with around 400 students using the school cafeterias.

There are 82 students enrolled at Sacred Heart Catholic School.

Commissioners Hold Routine Session

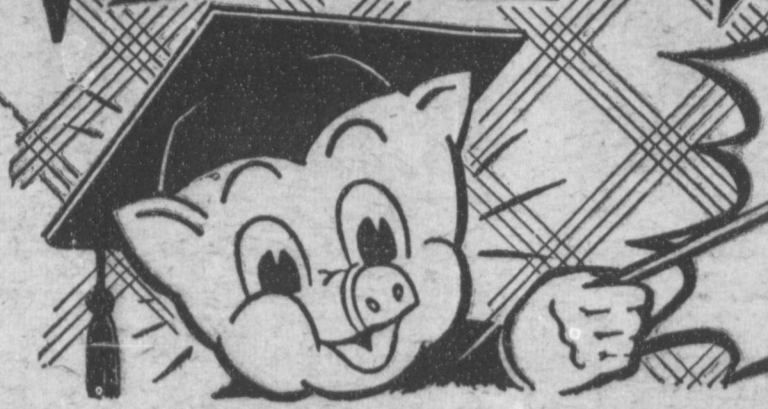
The Commissioners' Court, at its regular meeting, transacted routine business.

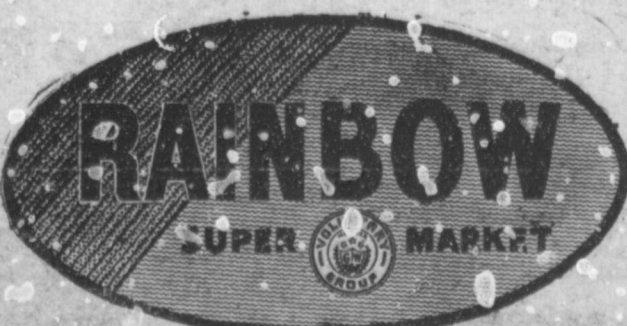

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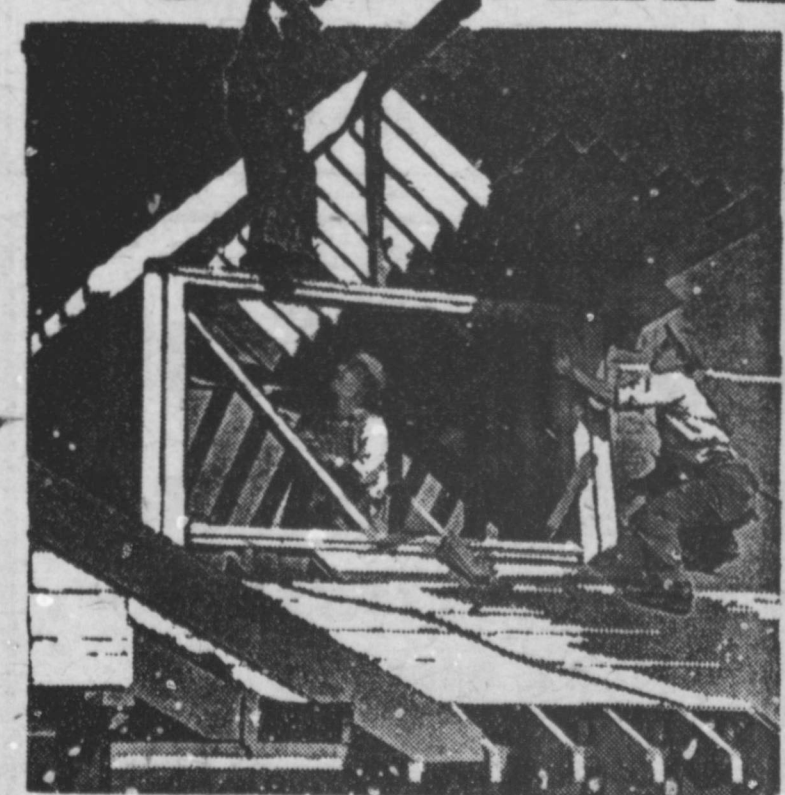
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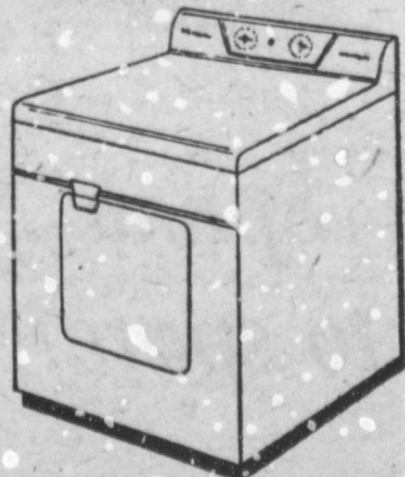


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OCTOBER DRAFT CALLS FOR 338 TEXANS

Austin, Tex.—The state quota for Texas draft boards in October calls for 338 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, Selective Service director said Wednesday. The state's October call of 338 compares with a quota of 387 for September and 547 for August. The October call is the state's share of a national call for 7,000 men. The national call is 8,000 in September.

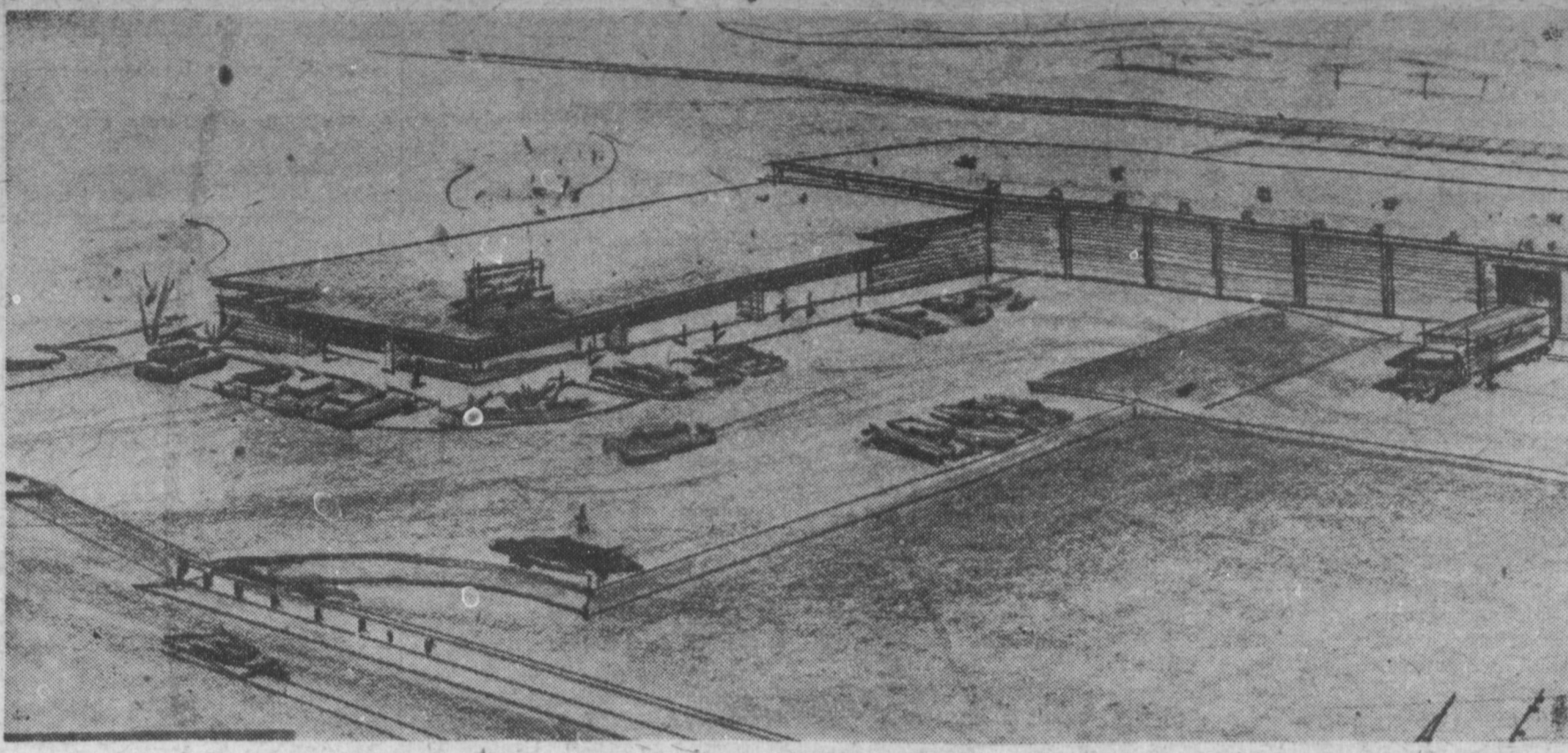
Colonel Schwartz said no men were scheduled to take pre-induction physical and mental examinations in September and October except possibly transfers from other states or "isolated special cases in Texas."

Local board quotas for the October induction and pre-induction examination are scheduled to be mailed by State Selective Service headquarters Thursday. September quotas were issued about a month ago.

The October quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on October 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

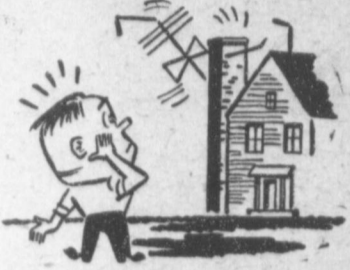

IT'S THE LAW

Contingencies

In this unpredictable life of ours, it is the law's business to take a long look into the future and say what would "happen if."

For in your contracts, leases, wills, insurance policies, escrows, and the like, you had better say what would "happen if" some of your best laid plans go awry. Such events the law calls "contingencies."

Who gets the "earnest money" you put down, if you cannot go through with buying that house? What if you want to pay up that loan and save interest? What happens if a partnership goes sour, or a partner gets sick or dies? What happens if the people you name in your will should die before you do, or, if you all perish in a common catastrophe like a car smashup?

The law is wise but it cannot do your thinking for you. It settles such questions — but not attitudes to your liking. If you don't make a will, the law says who shall get your property. If you leave certain things out of a contract, the law assumes that you meant to put some certain things in. But how much better it would be in the first place to put them in the way you want them, by asking "what if?"

Take your will now: Your first desire, of course, is to take care of your wife and children — those nearest to you. But it won't hurt anything to put "contingent beneficiaries" in your will in case something happens to thwart your first intentions.

Review your will every year or so to see if it meets the new things that have come up, or arrange with your lawyer to write in "contingent beneficiaries" — those who will receive your property if your first beneficiaries should die before you do.

You may long ago have had your son provided for in your will, but what about those lovely grandchildren he and his wife have presented to you since you wrote the will? What would happen to them if things go wrong and your son should die before you?

Or take your widowed sister and her children now. Suppose you and your immediate family should be wiped out: Would you want your property to go equally to her and to your well-heeled bachelor brother? Or would you prefer to leave your brother some token of your affection, and then really take care of your sister?

You may be impatient with the law's long memory. Such things never happen, you think, but the court records are full of plans which failed. And so the law has ways in which you can provide for "what happens — if." One way is the device of contingent beneficiaries in your will and insurance policies.

Shrimp Landing Show Increase

Shrimp landings at Texas ports in July were up all along the line, with a whopping total of 6,807,000 pounds of tails landed by the fleet. Aransas Pass and Corpus Christi led the procession, with 1,836,000 pounds, or almost a million more than was landed in June. When the total for the two cities amounted to 844,000 pounds.

Freeport was next in line, with 1,364,000 pounds, against only 195,000 last June; Brownsville was third, with 1,357,000 pounds compared to 928,000 the month before. Galveston landed 555,000 against 79,000 in June; Rockport reported 435,000 in July compared to 252,000 the month before; Port Lavaca and Palacios caught 156,000 pounds against 58,000 pounds in June; and even the Sabine Pass-Port Arthur area showed an increase of 10,000 pounds, jumping to 32,000 in July, compared to 22,000 in June.

Total catch was 6,807,000 pounds in July, against only 2,992,000 in June. During the period from January to July inclusive, this year there was a marked increase in the overall catch. Last year during that time, only 10,709,000 pounds of tails had been landed, while this year the total is 18,628,000 pounds, or nearly a 200% increase over the season of 1956.

In the salt water fish department, Galveston fishermen reported 108,000 pounds caught during July, against \$1,000 the month before; Port Isabel caught 28,000, which was a 14,000 pound drop; and in Sabine Pass-Port Arthur, fishermen said they caught 22,000 pounds of various species, an increase of six tons over the previous month.

Galveston reported one ton of crabs during July, and the Sabine Pass-Port Arthur region caught 12,000 pounds, which was a five-ton raise.

Orange Grove places its split-T attack in the hands of the Kirchoff twins, Allen and Alton, who Coach James Little terms excellent handlers of the key option play.

Dick Herschap is available at fullback after being dogged by injuries in the past. Tackle Nelson Hackfeld is a strong blocker on offense and the backbone of the defensive alignment along with guard David Myers.

Melvin Borchert must break in a new fullback at Rockport, and the Pirates' belly series off the T revolves around that position. Clyde Townsend, an 180-pound tackle converted to fullback, should fill the bill.

The team assumes a veteran outlook with Mickey Casterline, Bob Close, Victor Torres and Mike Townsend bolstering the line. And hard-running Eugene Satsky, Danny Adams and John Cabaniss in the backfield.

West Oso is minus a quarter-back after the graduation of Gary Kemp and has a shortage at tackle, but the Bears can count on six regulars. Leandrew Kindall and Ruby James carry the backfield load, as do Arnoldo Barrera, Juan Perez, Andrew Johnson and Douglas Mitchell in the line for Coach Ed Back.

Mathis, under new coach Frank Schneider, must practically rebuild from top to bottom. Backs Butch Allen and Carroll Rouse and linemen Elwood Stridde and Robbie Simpson are the returnees.

J. L. Bogue tries to mold a contender out of a small, but speedy outfit at Woodsboro. Darald Hartfield, Jerry Walzel, Arch Koozts, and Milton Gillespie, comprise the backfield.

In the line, Homer Hartfield, John Durst, and James Weeks form the bulk of the know-how.

At Ingleside, Kenneth Wagner battles problems of depth, as well as line woes. Ray Perry, Henry Duelm and Jeffrey Hanson head the backs and Darral Dean, Ashley Turbeville, Aaron Gooch comprise the line experience. Flour Bluff should improve on its winless district showing of '56. But Harvey Howard will have to find help for linemen George Deutsch, Wayman Johnson and James Roper.

Richard Adams, Edward Self, David Cooper and Alvin Beaugard-figure to take charge of ball carry chores.
