Red Cross Here U. F. Agency

The Red Cross is a United Fund budget for this year has been Agency in Aransas County, and in allotted \$1552. This organization began operation in the United States in the 1880s, and represents one of the oldest and strongest charitable institutions in America today. Emergency assistance and counseling and youth program are two of the important functions which the Red Cross provides. Emergency assistance and counseling will use 76% of the organizations share of the United Fund contributions from Aransas County; sixteen and a half per cent will go towards health services, and youth services will make up another seven and a half per cent. This year the contributions are badly needed as the organization's national treasury has been badly depleted by expenditures of \$58 million as the result of numerous tornadoes, floods and hurricanes throughout the county in the past two years. The budget for this year in this county has been set at \$9000. Beside the money for the Red Cross, other agencies participating are the Aransas County Emergency Corps, \$500; Girl Scouts of America, \$1210; the Aransas County Youth Council, \$350; The Aransas County Youth Council Building Fund, \$600; Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, \$600; United Services Organization, \$369; the Aransas County Library Board, \$300; the Rockport-Fulton Area Safety Council, \$150; the Boy Scout of America, \$1300; the Crappled Children's Hospital at Corpus Christi, \$500; the Junior Youth Council of Aransas County, \$150; the Blind Veterans' Organization, \$25; the Foundation for Mental Health, \$31.76; various contingencies such as flood relief, storm disasters and so on, as they arise, \$422.24, and expenses of the fund, \$1000.

Directors State United Fund Drive Slated for Oct. 2

At a meeting of the United Fund directors, held Wednesday night, it was decided to set the date of the kickoff breakfast and drive for Oct. 2, and to appoint a local special gifts committee, according to drive chairman, Jack McDavid.

A co-chairman of the drive, Byron Hardeman, was also appointed, and a date for a meeting of the directors and special gifts committee, which will be held on Sept. 18. Emory M. Spencer was appointed chairman of the out-of-town special gifts committee.

"We hope to do as we have in the past," McDavid said, "and to complete the solicitation in one day, Oct. 2. The kickoff breakfast which, incidentally, workers pay for themselves, will be at 9 a. m. at the Woman's Club building.

"The community will be divided into segments, as has been done in other years, and each one of these segments will have a captain and crew to call upon the people whose homes are in that segment."

McDavid pointed out that the United Fund replaces all other drives that used to be made, giving everyone a chance to do their giving in one lump, with a minimum of time and trouble.

Separate money-raising efforts used to be held by all the organizations now included in the United Fund, and sometimes two or three drives followed closely on the heels of one another, with the same civic-minded people asked to work on all the drives.

At least ten drives were eliminated by formation of the United Fund, he said, and pointed out that it was possible to budget giving, so that gifts could be made all through the year, if the donor did not feel able to give everything at once.

"A lot of people have asked me what sort of a yardstick to use for giving," McDavid said.

"No one can tell a donor to the United Fund how much to contribute, but the following two fair share scales are used in fund campaigns throughout the county.

"For hourly rated employees, the fair share is considered to be one hour's pay every month, or around 25 cents a week. A worker making a dollar an hour should make a total annual gift of \$12. Using the fund's yardstick of 14 agencies participating, the average amount of each appeal is only a little over 80 cents for each year—less than a dollar for each organization.

"A \$2.50 an hour employee's share is figured at \$30 annually, or about \$1.70 for each appeal.

"For salaried employees the following scale is considered a fair standard.

"Persons making \$5,000 annually can consider their fair share one per cent, or \$50 annually. A man making \$12,500 a year should give about 1½ per cent, for an annual gift of \$187.

"This same yardstick can be applied to businesses as well as salaried people. For instance, an annual net figure of \$10,000, approximately 1½ per cent, or about \$140 should be donated.

"It should be understood, however, that these are merely approximate figures, arrived at in experience elsewhere, and circumstances always can alter cases."


City Council Closes Street

Crewboat Order Includes Two Like Whirlaway



Two of the boats bought by Caspary and Wendell in a deal involving more than a million and a quarter dollars will be like their crew boat, the Whirlaway, which was launched approximately a year ago and which has been in use for offshore rig servicing ever since. This is a new type boat for the Gulf Coast, involving a number of departures from the shrimp boat type hull which is used in Louisiana and elsewhere along the Gulf of Mexico. Delivering a speed of approximately 20 miles an hour, with only 1200 horsepower, the Whirlaway was the prototype of the Standard Oil Company's boat the Chevron, which Caspary and Wendell also operate and of two new hulls now being built for the Rockport firm.

Saturday Evening Post Has Bird Picture Taken at Carroll Isle By Top Bird Photographer Don Bleitz

The Saturday Evening Post, on page 34 of this week's issue, has a bird picture in color taken at Carroll Island in the Second Chain, by top bird photographer Don Bleitz, of Los Angeles, who spent two seasons at Rockport photographing water birds, and who has been all over America assembling the most magnificent collection of bird plates for a forthcoming book that it has been this reporter's good luck to see.

The picture in the Saturday Evening Post was mislabeled by someone not familiar with Texas geography, and reads: "Reddish egrets. These were photographed on a nesting island near Corpus Christi, Texas.

However, all Bleitz's photographs were taken around Rockport, either on Lydia Ann island and the smaller islands of Aransas and Mesquite Bays, or at the Second Chain, offshore from Aransas Wildlife Refuge, where America's last whooping cranes spent their winters.

Don Bleitz's studies of birds are notable, for both the pictures themselves and the techniques and processes by which they are produced represent a completely new approach to bird photography.

"Bird lovers and trained ornithologists usually view the Bleitz pictures with wonder and amazement. Non bird lovers either look at the plates respectfully or think the birds are pretty cute," the article says.

"Photographers, both amateurs and professionals, often inspect the Bleitz pictures with a touch of skepticism, they find it hard to believe that what they see is photographically possible.

The Post then goes on to say that, as the Bleitz bird plates will undoubtedly be regarded as modern successors to the great Audubon prints of the last century, it is presenting briefly, and in non-technical language the manner in which the plates are made.

For the photographer there is much of interest; for the bird lover, the eight pages of color photographs are a delight; and to those of us who know Don Bleitz and his dedication to the work, pleasure in seeing the work of this artist, recognized for what it is, some of the finest bird portraiture in existence, as well as a great natural history of American birds.

Father O'Doherty To Leave for Rome

Father G. J. O'Doherty, pastor of Sacred Heart Church in Rockport, will leave here on Monday, September 16, to spend several days in spiritual retreat at the Passionists retreat house in Houston with other priests of the Diocese of Corpus Christi before he joins the Marian Pilgrimage in New York on September 22, on his way to Rome to attend the World Congress of the Lay Apostolate.

At the Congress, Father O'Doherty will represent the Most Reverend M. S. Garriga, Bishop of Corpus Christi, and the Sodality of the Diocese of Corpus Christi, of which he is Diocesan Director. He will also be one of the clerical representatives of the National Sodality Directors' Conference of the United States. In his group will be members of the National Federation of Sodalities, consisting of adult Sodalists from different parts of the United States.

This is the second time that Pope Pius XII has issued a call to Catholic laymen to meet in the Papal City for a World Congress of the Apostolate of the Laity.

The theme of the Lay Apostolate Congress is "The Laity in the Crisis of the Modern World."

It is one which challenges all laymen dedicated to the work of extending the Kingdom of God.

Before arriving in Rome, the Marian Pilgrimage will take Father O'Doherty to several of the great Catholic shrines in the Old World, such as the shrine and basilica of Our Lady of Fatima in Portugal, and the Shrine at Lourdes, France.

This commemorates a vision of the Virgin Mary which appeared to a peasant girl, Bernadette Soubirous, at that place. A beautiful church, the Rosary, was built, and a statue of the Virgin erected in the Grotto where the Virgin is said to have made her appearance.

Every year, hundreds of thousands of Catholics visit these shrines, leaving precious gifts. Some, healed by their faith, leave their crutches as evidence of their cure, while others bathe in the waters of the Grotto spring, in hope of a miraculous restoration of health.

All through the year the faithful come, but it is on August 20 that the national ceremonies and pilgrimage takes place.

After the Congress in Rome, Father O'Doherty will pay a visit to his mother in Ireland.

Caspary & Wendell Buy 6 Boats for \$1.2 Million

Burton Construction and Shipbuilding Co. Awarded Contract; First Boat Scheduled For Delivery to Local Firm by October 1

An order for \$1,250,000 of workboats for offshore drilling—one of the largest of its kind ever signed by a Texas firm has been placed with a Port Arthur shipyard by Caspary and Wendell, of Rockport. It calls for delivery of six all-steel vessels by Dec. 1.

In announcing award of the contract to Burton Construction and Shipbuilding Co., Inc., Delo H. Caspary of the firm said that two of the vessels would be 136-foot supply boats; two would be high-

speed crew boats, 95 feet long; and the other would be 85-footers, combination crew and cargo boats used to supplement the other four.

"We are instituting what we call a package deal," Caspary said.

"In the past, it has been the custom for drilling companies to charter boats from separate parties to perform needed work in handling crews and supplies for offshore rigs. With delivery of these vessels, we will be able to offer a complete service for a rig, with a team of three boats and their crews.

"As soon as the boats are delivered, they will enter the service of a major offshore drilling company, to service two of its rigs, operating off Louisiana and Texas."

The first 136-footer will be delivered Oct. 1, Caspary said, with the second shortly thereafter, and these will be followed by alternate 95- and 85-footers until the order is complete.

The tenders, he said, will be of the type now used by a number of offshore drilling contractors, but the 95-footers will present some departure from the commonly used shrimp-boat type.

They will follow the design of another boat in the Caspary and Wendell fleet, the Whirlaway, which, since its launching a year ago, has proven exceptionally fast and able, carrying drilling crews to their rigs in air-conditioned comfort, at 20 miles an hour.

"This boat and the Chevron, another 95-footer that we operate for Standard Oil, are just alike," Caspary said, "and we have found that the extra speed has been of great help to us, especially as we have been able to attain it with a minimum of power. In the future, all of our crew boats will follow this pattern for offshore use, as, besides crews, they can also carry a very useful load of cargo."

The 85-footers are somewhat slower, as they will have only a single pair of engines each, instead of the tandem GM diesels that power the other hulls.

"Our engine order for the six hulls amounted to approximately \$280,000," Caspary said, "and we purchased the 32 engines through George Engine Service, Harvey, La."

"All of the vessels are twin-screw and diesel-powered. On the big boats, four tandems, developing 1,200 horse power, will give them a speed of about 14 miles an hour. On the 95-footers there will also be four tandems, but here the power is translated into speed for crew comfort. The western Gulf of Mexico is one of the roughest seas in the world, and in designing these vessels we have done everything possible to produce craft that can stay at sea and do their work with a minimum of trouble."

Besides the Whirlaway and the six new boats, Caspary and Wendell own and operate a number of others on the Texas and Louisiana coasts, and operate a Standard Oil 95-footer for that company.

All types of instruments will be on display and an opportunity will be given parents to confer with the director on the type of instrument best suited to their child.

Coach Borchert says that as of now, none of the rest of the squad appear to be coming down with anything, but that he is afraid that he's going to be unable to field an experienced team when kickoff time comes Friday night, and the Pirates tangle with the Aransas Pass Panthers, which many sports writers hold to be the top contenders in 29AA.

CLENDING'S Aransas Pass

White Wing Dove Season Opens Fri.

For the first time in four years, hunters in Texas will have a chance to blast away at some white wings when the season opens Friday, September 13 at noon. Hunting on that day must cease at sunset.

Plenty of legal birds are promised, although observers say that the white wing crop will be much less than was anticipated two months ago, when biologists estimated at least six hundred thousand of these birds in the Valley.

Actually, the south zone season doesn't open on morning doves in counties not having white wing shooting until October 1, and then it runs only 14 days, from October 1-14, inclusive, the extra three being lopped off, apparently, because of the day and a half's shooting allotted to white wings and mixed bags in those county where this sort of shooting is permitted.

To add to the confusion, no white wings or chalcas make be shot south of U. S. Highway 83 (formerly State Highway 4), in the southern tip of Texas, which, on the map issued by the Game and Fish Commission is marked as a game sanctuary.

Gunners are reminded that a state hunting license, costing \$3.15, is necessary, and that shotguns must be permanently plugged to a three-shell capacity. Shooting from public roads and highway is prohibited, as is shooting from a vehicle, or use of a rifle.

Hunters of white-winged doves going into Mexico for their gun fun are advised to comply with state regulations when importing birds, Ed Elmore said.

While federal regulations allow 25 birds to be brought back, Elmore said state law supersedes that regulation and only 10 birds may be brought into Texas.

Rep. John Young's Fish Study Can Be Valuable

Much of value can be gained by a federal-state study of Texas fisheries as proposed by U. S. Rep. John Young in House bill 9353 which has been referred to the House Committee on Merchant Marine and Fisheries, of which Young is a member.

Hearings on the proposal will be held in Texas by Young, beginning in November. A coordinated study by the Department of the Interior, the Texas Game and Fish Commission, the Corps of Army Engineers and other federal, state and local agencies is contemplated.

Also included is an \$850,000 sum to add approximately 50,000 acres to the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, more than doubling its size. The feasibility of fish passes will be determined, more light will be sought on the mysterious habits of shrimp and means of conserving and increasing fisheries resources will be studied.

HUMMING BIRDS ON SOUTHWARD MIGRATION

According to Mrs. Jack Hagar, the hummingbird migration has begun, with three or four species in the area or just passing through. Tuesday morning, she and bird watchers with her saw 18 in fifteen minutes, most of them black-tailed and ruby-throated, but broadtails have been here as well.

Mrs. Hagar says that the big migration of these jewel-like birds really will not begin until the 1st week in this month or the first part of October.

Eastern and western kingbirds are passing through; there have been Baltimore orioles within recent weeks, and sparrow hawks are also on their way south.

Pirates Drop One to Sinton

Outplayed but never out-fought, the Rockport Pirates dropped the opening game of the season Friday night to the Sinton Pirates, by a 41-7 score. Sinton scored in every quarter; Rockport made its single tally in the final period.

In the first period, Rockport received, and Satsky made a nice runback before he was dumped. Cabaniss cracked the line for a yard and a half; Clyde Townsend lost a half; a pass from Adams to Townsend failed to click, and then Satsky kicked.

The Sinton team took over on their own 46 after the runback. Graham made a yard, and on the second down Rockport was penalized five yards. Joe Schasfer passed and was incomplete, then tried the line for no gain. Elbert Davis kicked.

It was Rockport's ball on their own 20. Satsky tried it for a couple; a Sinton penalty added five yards on the next down, and then it was Cabaniss for another four, giving the local boys first down on their 31.

A pass from Adams to Cabaniss netted 3 yards. Satsky reeled off six more, and Cabaniss went through for five and another first down. Adams shot a pass to Satsky for a yard, then kept the ball and made 13 himself, winding up on the Sinton 44.

Adams to Satsky was good for four; Cabaniss made 3; Satsky picked up a couple of more, and Adams passed for the fourth down, incomplete.

Joe Schaefer carried for the Sinton 35 for three; Elbert Davis got another trio, and then Schaefer connected with Mvrick for eleven yards on a pass, moving the Sinton team up to Rockport's 44.

Henry tried the line for two; a Sinton penalty set them five yards, and made it second down with 13 to go, so Schaefer drifted back,

handed off to Davis, who galloped 19 yards, to Rockport's twenty. Henry reeled off five yards, then Elbert Davis took the ball and on a seventeen-yard gallop around end hit paydirt, and Schaefer kicked the point.

On Sinton's kickoff, someone on the Rockport line missed, and Sinton recovered its own kickoff on the Rockport 32. Graham made two; then Davis went on a 17-yard ramble only to have it nullified by a fifteen yard penalty against the Sinton team. The Sinton quarter then tried an incomplete pass, before handing it off to Elbert Davis on the third down for a gain of eight. Schaefer kept for 11 and a first down, but Sinton lost the ball on downs to Rockport at the end of the first quarter, and the local boys took over on their own 13-yard stripe.

Satsky cracked the line for three; Cabaniss snagged four by the hardest kind of work, and then another, before Satsky kicked.

It was Sinton's ball on their own 45, and in two carries Elbert Davis made seven yards, before Mike Graham carried the mail for another thirteen. Graham made it twelve more in two tries, and another first down. Then he made three; Schaefer clicked off four; Henry made 7, to reach Rockport's 9.

On the first down Sinton fumbled for two yards, then Charles Henry carried it over and Schaefer kicked his second point after touchdown.

Sinton kicked off, and for the second time recovered their own kick this time on Rockport's 29-yard line, but lost the ball on downs. Rockport then tried again, but lost the ball to Sinton on Rockport's 40-yard line, and Elbert Davis carried twice for eleven yards, and a first down on Rockport's 29. Schaefer tried a pass to Henry that didn't work; then he repeated it, and Henry made 14 yards on the pass and a beautiful, twisting run.

This left eight yards to paydirt.

Elbert Davis made seven and a half, then Graham bulled his way through the center for eighteen inches and a touchdown. Schaefer kicked the point after and then Rockport, receiving the kickoff, had time for two plays before the whistle blew ending the first half.

At half time, both the Sinton and Rockport bands put on a colorful show, and Carla Eller, as solo twirler brought down the house. Robbie Bocquet appeared for the first time as drum major at this game, having been picked for that place last week. Georgia Kresta gave an accordion solo.

At the beginning of the second half, Sinton kicked off, and Rockport started from its own 18 yard line. Cabaniss made three; then he made six more, before Clyde Townsend plunged for three and enough yardage to make a first down.

Satsky made a half; Adams was snowed under and swallowed the ball, coming up for the third down with a toss to Payne that didn't work, before Satsky kicked.

Sinton took over on Rockport's 36 yard line and Henry made 2, followed by ten more from Elbert Davis for a first down. Graham made four; then Henry tallied for nine and a first down, when he carried it to Rockport's 13.

Sinton struck a snag along about here, however. Graham carried for two; Henry carried for a couple of more; Davis failed to mark, and then, when a penalty was called against the Sinton team, Rockport declined and took possession on its own three-yard line, but kicked on the fourth down, giving Sinton possession again on Rockport's 35-yard line.

Henry reeled off a couple, and then another one. Schaefer tried Henry with an incomplete pass, and then, on fourth down shot it to Henry again for 25 yards and a touchdown. Schaefer, as usual, kicked the extra point.

On the kickoff, Rockport received and carried the ball back to its own 30, where Cabaniss made six. Townsend one, and Adams tried

an incomplete pass before Satsky kicked and Sinton took over on its own 41, at the end of the third quarter.

On the first play, Mike Graham rambled for 7, and then Davis took off in a big way, crossed the mid-stripe, and was downed on the 19-yard line after having made 35 yards.

This paved the way for another trip to pay dirt for the Sinton pirates, for Charles Henry plunged for three, and then Benny Childress made 16 yards and the tally. Schaefer, for the only time in the game, missed the extra point.

Rockport received and ran the ball back to its own 35-yard stripe. Satsky carried for three; Shivers, who was quarterbacking, tried Rouquette with a pass. Both teams were offside on the next down; Adams tried Shivers with a pass and they lost three yards; then Satsky dropped back and handed the ball to Cabaniss on the old Statute of Liberty play; which was good this time for a 29-yard ramble, to Sinton's 32.

Cabaniss let off from the 32 with 3 yards; Townsend made four; then Satsky garnered in seven and a first down. Cabaniss went through center for the needed eighteen yards and a touchdown, while Satsky added the extra point with a nice boot.

Sinton received and ran the ball back to their own 48, where they tried a couple of plays with no gain before Schaefer connected with Henry with a 17-yard toss, repeating almost immediately with another for twenty yards to Benny Childress. On the next play Schaefer kept and skirted right end for 17 yards and the final tally of the game, making both the touchdown and the point afterwards for five out of six.

Rockport received and ran it back 10 yards to its own 36. Cabaniss made 5; Adams tossed on that was incomplete; Shivers was smothered and Rockport had a five-yard penalty before Satsky kept, faked, and made 22 yards for a first down.

Adams lost sixteen yards when he was swarmed under; Townsend cracked center for ten; then, after a couple of more plays it was Sinton's ball again for one play, a pass, which Satsky intercepted. Satsky made one; Satsky to Adams made eight and a half; Satsky to Cabaniss on a lateral lost a yard, and Satsky kicked.





U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service Exploratory Vessel Reports Gulf Clams

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, in its latest report, says that commercial clams, similar those so popular along the eastern coast of America have been found in the Gulf of Mexico.

The MV Silver Bay, after a sixteen-day cruise in the northern Gulf, has returned to Pascagoula, Mississippi, and reports that 38 drags with a clam dredge were made in the three to five fathom depth range between Cape St. George and Gasparilla Island.

Francis J. Captiva, party chief, said that 70% of the catch was made up of littlenecks, with the remaining 30% comprised of cherrystones and sharps.

Yield, when tested, amounted to about a gallon of meat per bushel, and a preliminary examination indicates that the clams are comparable in taste and quality to the quahogs of the north Atlantic coast.

During the latter part of the cruise, Captiva said, attempts were made to sample numerous surface and sub-surface schools of sardine-like fish seen between Horn Island and Tampa Bay.

Twenty-four tows with a trawl yielded anchovies, chub mackerel, thread herring, bluefish, and round herring. Four tows made in 18-20 fathoms, south of Pet's Bois Island, produced large croakers, spot, butterfish and nerpes at a rate of approximately a ten an hour.
