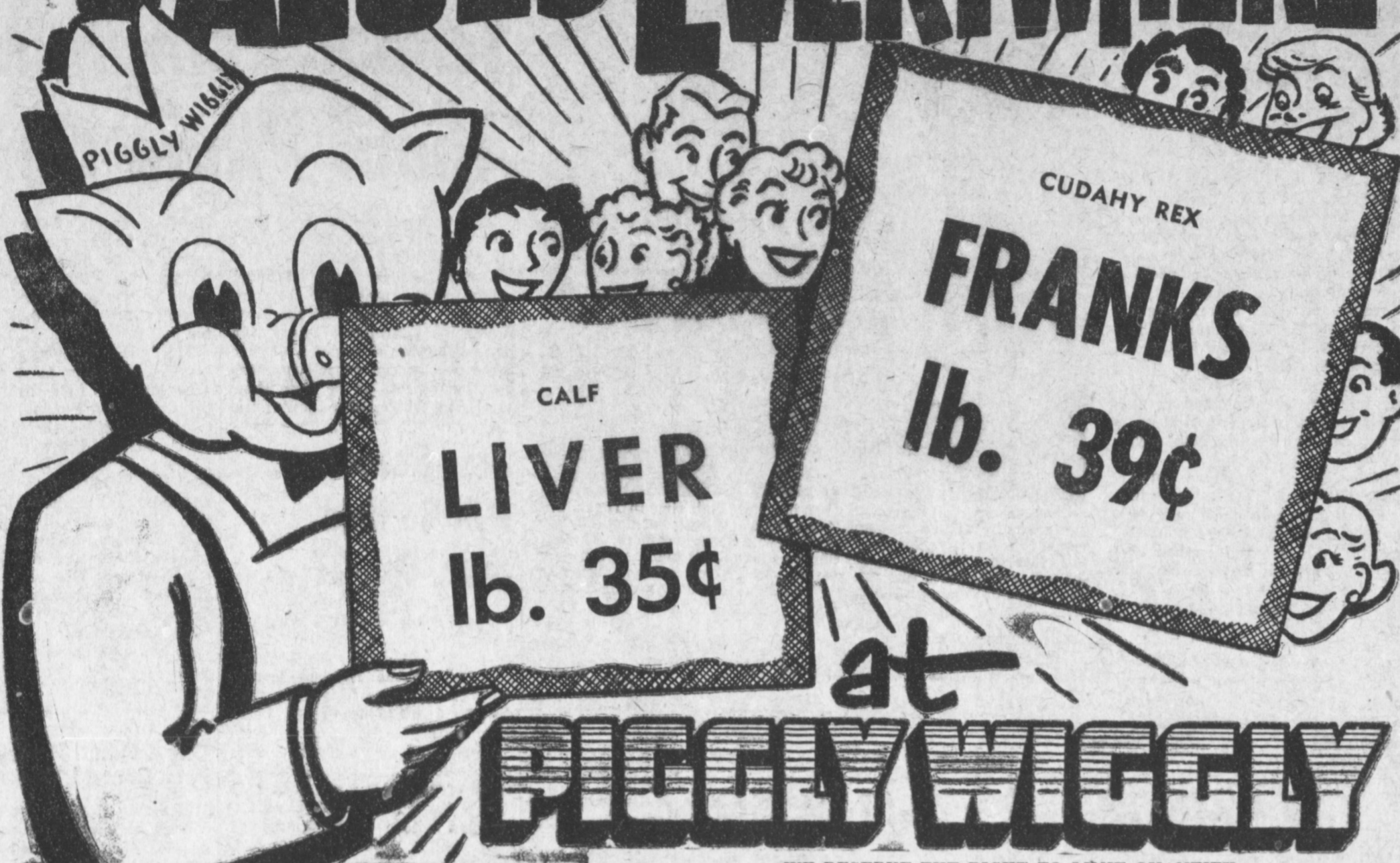

AN ORDINANCE

REGULATING THE SPEED OF TRAFFIC IN, ALONG AND UPON THE STREETS, ALLEYS, AND WAYS OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS: ESTABLISHING THE RATE OF SPEED ON HIGHWAY 35 THROUGH SAID CITY; REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT HERewith, AND PROVIDING PENALTIES FOR THE VIOLATION OF THE PROVISIONS OF THIS ORDINANCE;

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS

I.

On the basis of an engineering and traffic investigation heretofore made by the Texas State Highway Commission, and the speeds prescribed for all motor vehicles operating along and upon Texas State Highway No. 35, within the city limits of Rockport, Texas, shall be as follows:

a. From the North City Limits of the City of Rockport to a point 0.20 mile South of the North City Limits (Cherry Street), the speed limit shall be fifty-five miles per hour — 55 MPH.

b. From a point 0.20 mile South

of the North City Limits of Rockport (Cherry Street) to a point 0.80 mile South of the North City Limits (Laurel Street) the speed limit shall be forty-five miles per hour. — 45 MPH.

c. From a point 0.80 mile South of the North City Limits of Rockport (Laurel Street) to a point midway between Magnolia and Live Oak Streets, the speed limit shall be thirty miles per hour. — 30 MPH.

d. From a point midway between Magnolia and Live Oak Streets to a point midway between Church and Pearl Streets, the speed limit shall be fifteen miles per hour between the hours of 7:00 a.m. and 5:00 p.m. on all days that the Rockport schools are open for the conduction of classes therein. — 15 MPH.

e. From a point midway between Magnolia and Live Oak Streets to a point midway between Church and Pearl Streets, the speed limit shall be thirty miles per hour between the hours of 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 a.m. on all days when the Rockport schools are open for the conduction of classes and on all days when the Rockport schools are not open for

the conduction of classes. — 30 MPH.

f. From a point midway between Church and Pearl Streets to a point 1.40 miles South of the North City Limits (Mimosa Street) the speed limit shall be thirty miles per hour. — 30 MPH.

g. From a point 1.40 miles South of the North City Limits of Rockport (Mimosa Street) to a point 2.00 miles South of the North City Limits (Morgan St.), the speed limit shall be forty-five miles per hour. — 45 MPH.

h. From a point 2.00 miles South of the North City Limits of Rockport (Morgan Street) to the South City Limits, the speed limit shall be fifty-five miles per hour. — 55 MPH.

II.

It shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle upon the streets, alleys and ways within the City Limits of Rockport, Texas, in excess of the following speeds:

a. Upon all alleys or public ways the speed limit shall be 15 miles per hour.

b. On and upon all streets within the City Limits, except where a different rate of speed is provided by this Ordinance, the

speed limit shall be 30 miles per hour except at such times and under such conditions as a person of ordinary prudence driving a motor vehicle under like circumstances, would drive at a lower rate of speed.

III.

All Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby specifically repealed.

IV.

Any person violating any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and, upon conviction, be fined not more than \$200.00.

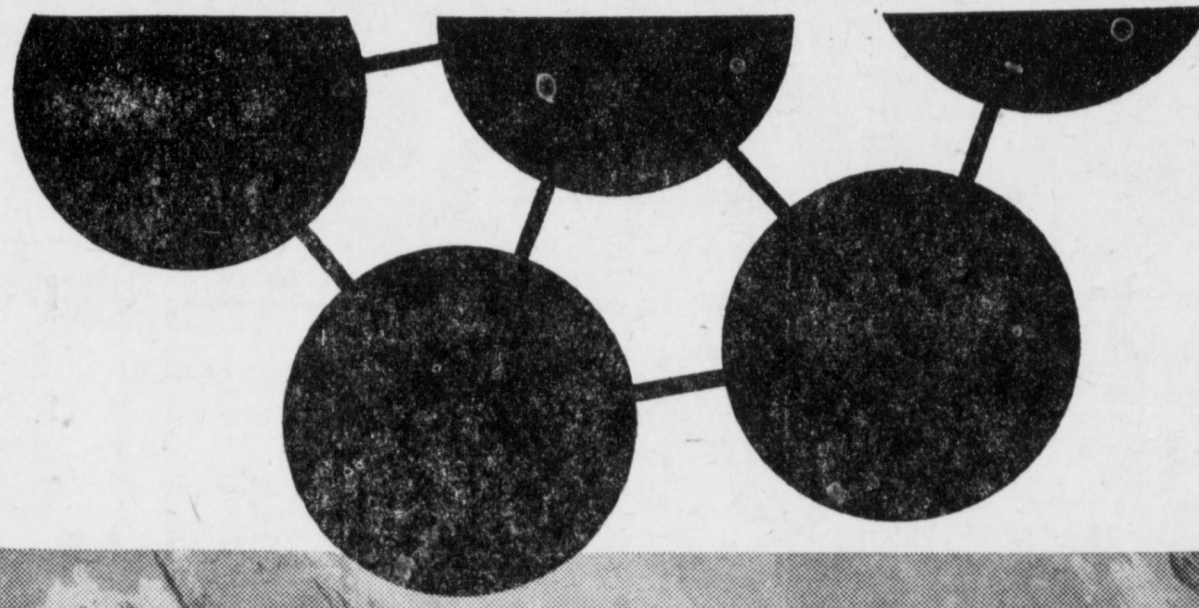

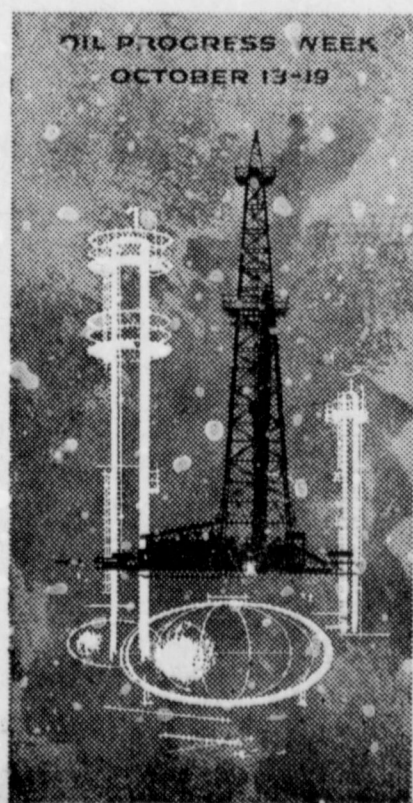

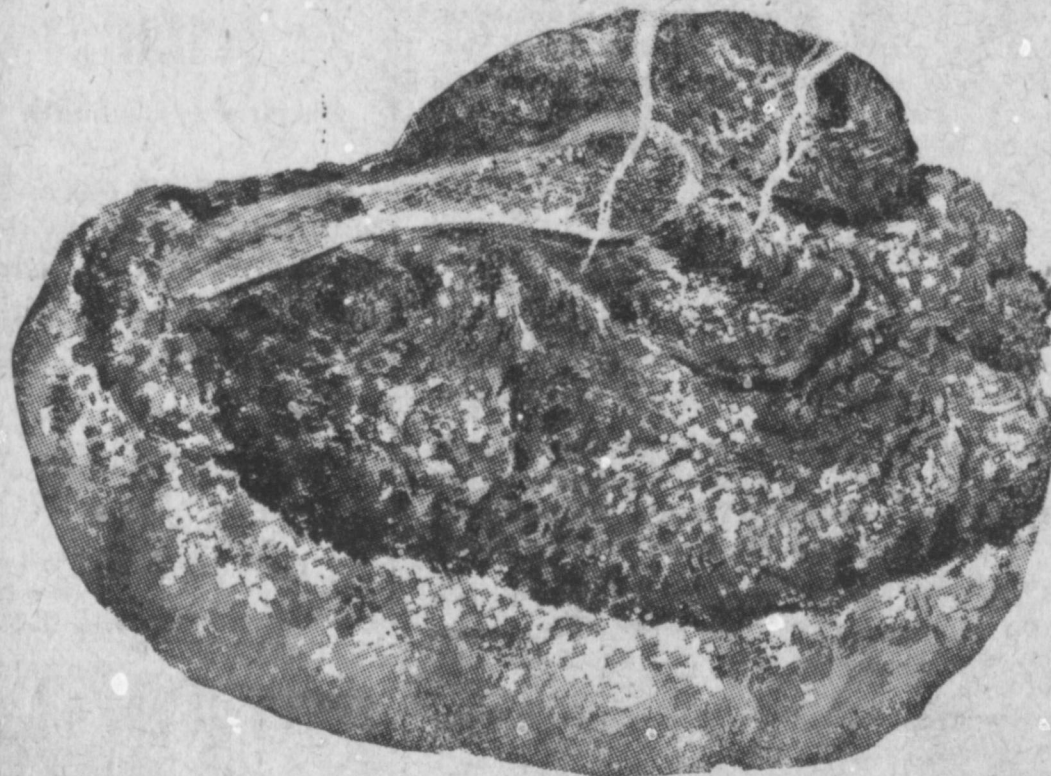

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS, REGULATING PEST CONTROL OPERATIONS, PROVIDING FOR THE REGULATION AND THE ISSUANCE OF PERMITS TO PERSONS, FIRMS OR CORPORATIONS ENGAGED IN THE BUSINESS OF PEST CONTROL, DEFINING TERMS, PROVIDING A SAVINGS CLAUSE, AND PROVIDING A PENALTY TO BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. DEFINITIONS. As used in this Ordinance, the following words shall have the following meanings:

(a) "Pest Control Operator" is any person who engages in the business of using or employing insecticides, rodenticides, fumigants or other substances for the control or destruction of insects, rodents, termites, or other simi-

lar pests.

(b) "Insecticide" is any substance, not a fumigant, used for the destruction or control of insects or other similar pests.

(c) "Rodenticide" is any substance, not a fumigant, used for the destruction or control of rodents.

(d) "Fumigant" is any substance which by itself or in combination with any other substance emits or may be made to emit gases, fumes or vapors dangerous or injurious to human beings which is used for the purpose of controlling the increase of or destroying insects, rodents, vermin, or any other similar pests.

SECTION 2. SCOPE OF ORDINANCE. The terms of this Ordinance shall not apply to any persons constituting an agency of the federal government, state of Texas or City of Rockport engaged in any work of rodent or insect control or extermination, or any persons employed by any such agency or by any such govern-

ments engaged in any such work.

SECTION 3. CREATION AND COMPOSITION OF ROCKPORT PEST CONTROL BOARD. There is hereby created a body to be designated City of Rockport pest control board, which shall consist of three members, the Mayor of the City of Rockport, who shall be chairman of the board, the City Water Superintendent, and the Chief of the Aransas County Emergency Corps.

SECTION 4. ELIGIBILITY OF MEMBER OF BOARD FOR LICENSE. Nothing herein contained shall prohibit the issuance of a license to a member of the City of Rockport pest control board upon his complying with all of the requirements hereof relating to the issuance of such licenses.

SECTION 5. DUTIES OF BOARD. It shall be the duty of the Rockport pest control board to examine the qualifications of all applicants for licenses under this article, and when any applicant is found to be qualified and fit, to recommend the issuance of a license to him upon his complying with all of the requirements herein prescribed.

SECTION 6. OPERATOR'S LICENSE REQUIRED. It shall be unlawful for any person to engage within the city in a business falling within the term "pest control operator," as herein defined, without having a valid unexpired and unsuspended license therefor issued under the terms of this Ordinance.

SECTION 7. APPLICATION FOR LICENSE. Any person desiring to engage in the business of pest control operator within the City shall file with the City Secretary of Rockport a written application for a license. Such application shall state the name, age and address of the applicant, previous employment in the pest control business, references, and the statements made by the applicant in the application shall be made under oath.

SECTION 8. QUALIFICATIONS OF APPLICANT.

(a) Applicant shall have a degree in Entomology from an accredited school, or

(b) Applicant shall have two years experience as owner-operator of a reliable pest control company, or

(c) Applicant shall have three years experience as a serviceman for a reliable pest control company, or

(d) Applicant shall have three years as an employee of a State, Federal or Private Agency in which specialized training is obtained in general structural pest control, or some specialized branch thereof;

(e) Applicant shall have a good business standing and record in this field in the area of last op-

eration;

(f) Applicant shall have and maintain a minimum public liability and property damage insurance coverage of \$25,000.00/\$50,000.00.

(g) Applicant will establish a permanent business address and telephone number before license will be issued.

SECTION 9. EXAMINATION OF APPLICANT. The City of Rockport Pest Control Board shall proceed to examine each applicant with reasonable promptness after his application is filed, and if the applicant is found to be qualified, shall recommend that a license be granted him. If the applicant is not found to be qualified, his application shall be denied and returned to the City Secretary, who shall at once notify applicant in writing of its denial.

SECTION 10. APPEAL FROM DENIAL OF APPLICATION. Upon the denial of his application, an applicant may, within twenty days after the denial of his application, appeal to the City Council. The Council may, after a hearing of which the applicant and the chairman of the City of Rockport Pest Control Board have been given due notice, either sustain the denial of the application, or order a license issued to the applicant upon the payment of the fee herein prescribed.

SECTION 11. ISSUANCE OF LICENSE: EXPIRATION AND RENEWAL: FEES. When applicant has met all requirements of this Ordinance, and he has been approved by the Pest Control Board, or upon appeal by the City Council, license shall be issued to him by the City Secretary upon payment of a license fee of \$50.00. Each license shall be effective for the calendar year in which it is issued and the fee paid for its issuance shall likewise cover such calendar year. All licenses shall expire on the first day of January next after the date of their issuance. Any licensee holding a license which has not been revoked, or is not under a suspension, may obtain a renewal license each year from the City Secretary on or before the thirty-first day of December of the year in which the existing license expires, upon payment of a license fee of fifty dollars (\$50.00), and such license shall be valid for the ensuing calendar year.

SECTION 12. WHO MAY OPERATE UNDER LICENSE. Such license shall not be transferable and shall not authorize any person or firm other than the person or firm to whom it is issued to engage in business thereunder; provided, however, that a firm may engage in business under a license held by one of its members, and a corporation may do likewise under a license held by its president or vice-president. Upon application by a person, firm or corporation holding a pest control license, as hereinabove provided, together with the payment by such person, firm or corporation of the sum of Five Dollars (\$5.00) for each employee or individual operator, the City shall issue to such individual, employee or operator a non-transferable license, showing on the face thereof the holder of the primary license; which said employee's or operator's licenses shall be renewable, revokable and subject to all of the terms and conditions as herein provided for a primary pest control license.

SECTION 13. REVOCATION OF LICENSE. After a hearing, of which the licensee has been given at least five days written notice, containing the grounds alleged for the revocation of his license, any license may be revoked or suspended by the City of Rockport Pest Control Board for the violation of any law, ordinance, rule or regulation governing the use of insecticides, rodenticides, fumigants or similar substances or for any negligence or departure from accepted safe practices in the use thereof, or for any fraudulent conduct in connection with his business as a pest control operator.

SECTION 14. APPEAL FROM REVOCATION OR SUSPENSION OF LICENSE. Any holder of a license which has been revoked or suspended may appeal to the City Council from the order of revocation or suspension by filing with the City Secretary, within ten days of the date of such order, his written notice of appeal. The City Council shall hear all such appeals, after written notice of the hearing to the person appealing and the chairman of the City of Rockport Pest Control Board, and shall take such action as it may deem fit. Pending the action of the Council on any such appeal the order of the City of Rockport Pest Control Board appealed from shall remain in full force and effect.

SECTION 15. THE CITY SECRETARY AND CITY COUNCIL TO BE NOTIFIED OF SUSPENSIONS OR REVOCATIONS. The City of Rockport Pest Control Board shall give promptly to the holder of a license written notice of any suspension or revocation of his license and shall file promptly with the City of Rockport and the City Council notices of all such suspensions and revocations.

SECTION 16. PENALTY. Any person, firm, corporation, association, partnership or society violating any provision of this Ordinance shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof, shall be punished by a fine of not less than Ten DOLLARS (\$10.00) nor more than Two Hundred Dollars (\$200.00) and each day any such violation continues shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 17. SAVING CLAUSE. If any article, paragraph, subdivision, clause, phrase or provision of this Ordinance shall be adjudged invalid, or to be held unconstitutional, the same shall

not affect the validity of the Ordinance as a whole, or any part or provision thereof other than the part so decided to be invalid or held unconstitutional.

Passed and approved this the 14th day of October, 1957.
