The Aransas County Emergency Corps has scheduled its Christmas tree and children's party for Thursday, December 19, according to Fire Chief Dick Fox.


Rotary Club Changes Meeting Time

On December 21, Rockport citizens will be asked to vote their approval of an \$80,000 bond issue, to defray the city's part of the expense attendant upon curbing, guttering and draining the Highway 35 Business Route, from just below Rockport Cottages to the small park opposite the Charles T. Picton residence, north of the main part of the city.

An important weather announcement has recently been made by the Weather Bureau, according to Paul Clark Sorenson, local observer, who stated that a change in storm signals will be made, effective January 1, 1958.

into the harbor. The \$35,323 alloted to curb and gutter is based on a present estimate of \$1.75 per running foot of curb and gutter.

The majority of property owners along the route have signified their willingness to pay for the installation in front of their property. Hence this money will eventually be returned to the city to be used elsewhere, making total cost of curb, gutter and drainage to the city, approximately \$27,500.

For this expenditure, over a period of time, the city will receive work worth \$189,500, paid for by state funds.

That is the reason that councilmen say that the project is a bar-

Moreover, they point out, the whole project can be paid for without raising taxes or valuations, The city already has a sarplus of approximately \$10,000, and, if the bond issue is approved, along with the desired permission to reallocate the city tax rate of \$1.50 per hundred, it is the council's opinion that this will be sufficient to retire the bonds, without the raises, or without curtailment of present services.

Rockport's Request **Draws Fire From Another Critic**

Despite the fact that the Wildlife Refuge on Blackjack Peninsula is just across St. Charles Bay from Lamar, a distance of only a little more than ten miles from the heart of Rockport, another critic sounded off this morning in the Corpus Christi Caller, objecting to this city's request that the place be named after this city. The letter says:

Editor, the Caller:

There is little merit to the proposal of the Rockport Chamber of Commerce to change the name of Aransas National Wildlife Refuge, the winter home of the famous whooping crane, to Rockport National Wildlife Refuge.

About the only things the refuge and Rockport have in common is that both touch on Aransas Bay and most of the refuge is in Aransas County. But the refuge is also partly in Refugio County, whose county seat is actually three miles closer to the refuge than Rockport and Victoria is only eight miles farther than Rockport.

Perhaps the best case could be made for renaming it the Austwell National Wildlife Refuge, because Austwell is only eight miles from the refuge gate. 
