## Tourist Business One of U.S. Fastest Growing Industries

Twenty-four Tourists a Year are Comparable to A New Industry With Annual Payroll of \$100,000 From Standpoint of New Money in Community

"One of the fastest developing businesses in the United States is the tourist business," said Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Chamber of Commerce, "and American tourists in this country will spend between fifteen and twenty billion dollars this year. Any community that had a road leading in and out of it can get a slice of this if they go about it in the right way."

To get its share, Rockport does not need luxurious hotels, multi-million dollar airports, sun-drenched beaches, or grand canyons, although they help. And it does not

have to try to become a playground for rich people.

Latest figures on tourist wants, Mrs. Juergens said, show that only one out of four stays at a hotel, and only one out of twelve travels by plane. Four out of five earn less than \$7,000 a year; and six out of seven travel by car.

"Instead of expensive beaches and spectacular attractions," Mrs. Juergens continued, "surveys show that their primary wants are comfort, change, amusement and pleasant surroundings, and if a community can supply these at a reasonable price, it can develop a tourist business."

Such a business can mean a lot to an area, she pointed out. Estimates of average daily expenditures vary widely, but the National Association of Travel Organizations estimates that average expenditures per tourist for lodging, gasoline and other purchases are about \$10.

"On this basis," the Chamber manager said, "if the community can attract a couple of dozen tourists a day throughout the year, it has been proven that their expenditures are comparable to acquiring a new manufacturing industry with an annual payroll of \$100,000."

Mrs. Juergens pointed out that many community leaders throughout the nation pin their hopes for community advancement on industry and agriculture, but that the Chamber of Commerce of the United States has said:

"Tourist promotion is a key operation in any regional, state, or community development program. Basically there are three ways to bring new money and business into an area. These are agricultural, industrial and tourist development and the last of these three is probably the quickest and least difficult."

And, because the tourist business is a composite of many other businesses, what helps one helps the others. "Over in Knoxville, Tenn., they do a \$35 million a year tourist business," Mrs. Juergens said, "and get about 2.5 million visitors a year there to spend the money. A close check revealed that \$10.3 millions went for food; lodgings absorbed \$7,925,000; auto upkeep on tourist cars amounted to \$3,696,000; amusements garnered \$4,762,000 of the tourist dollars; they spent \$5,531,000 for retail purchases; laundry and dry cleaning brought another \$711,000 into the community; barbers, doctors, lawyers and other professional people received \$1,244,000 of this new money from out of town; and taxis, buses, telegraph, telephone, power, water, lights, gas and similar expenses accounted for \$1,563,000."

And the things that make a town good for tourists, she said, are the things that attract industry, for industrialists, in selecting plant locations, are seeking for their employees the same kind of community atmosphere that appeals to tourists. Both industry and tourists are looking for communities with better living conditions, better facilities, better civic organizations and a wider variety of recreational activities.

"The future of the tourist business is wide open," Mrs. Juergens said, "and the trend is definitely towards more and more tourist business. In the next hundred years it is expected to increase about 3,000%. Our share of getting our share will be in direct ratio to our ability to launch a sustained development program. If we can do that, Rockport's tourists will be an industry in themselves."

## Local Residents Take Education Course In A. P.

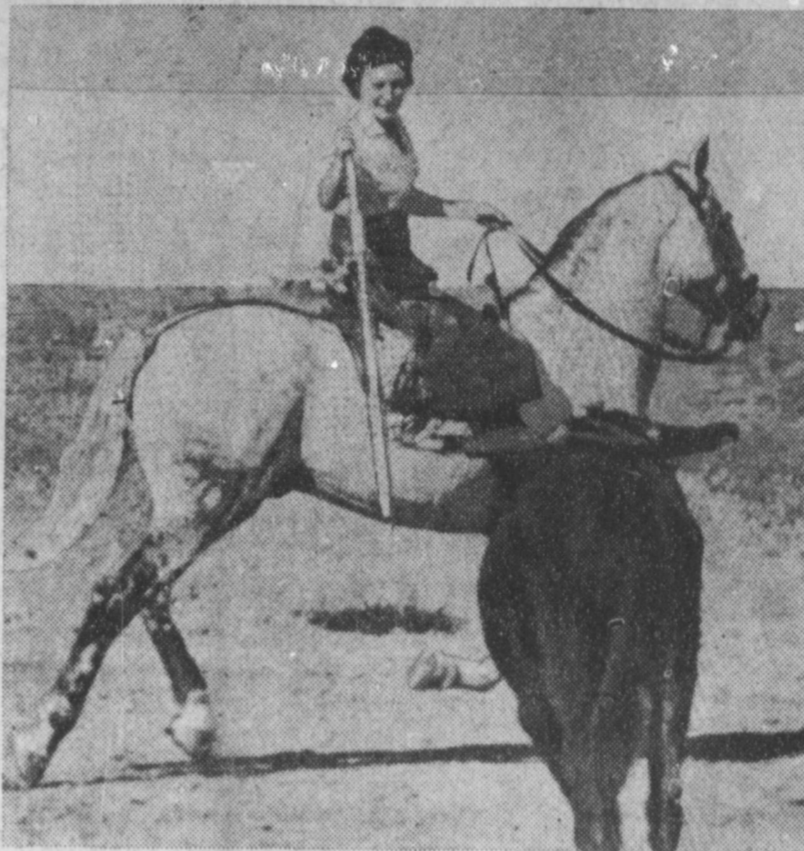

## Atkinson Asks Engineer Permit

He proposes to erect a four by 300-foot wharf, with a 10 by 20-foot T-head, and an elevation of 5 feet above mean low tide.

## COMMUNITY WARNED OF THEFT OF POWDER AND BLASTING CAPS

Theft of nearly 200 pounds of blasting powder and 86 electrical blasting caps from the trailer magazine of the General Geophysical Company was reported to Sheriff A. C. Shivers Saturday by Bill Graves, Rockport party chief.

The explosives, in one pound cans, consisted of 109 pounds of blasting powder, 88 pounds of a more sensitive priming powder, and caps with 60-foot wire leads attached, all made by the Atlas Powder Corporation.

Graves said that the loss could have occurred at any time last week, as normally the trailer magazine, parked near the city dump, was only opened about once a week. The thieves used a hacksaw to cut the two locks from the door, he said, in order to gain access to the explosive.

Sheriff Shivers said no clues to the robbery had been found, but warned everybody to be on the lookout for cans or boxes marked with the Atlas trademark, in case the theft was the result of vandalism, and some of the explosives strewn around by juveniles who had no concept of the power of the explosives.

In case such cans or boxes are sighted, he said, leave them alone and call the sheriff's office.

## Aransas Schools Win Driver Awards

Drivers' License Program of Such Excellence That State-Wide Recognition Is Given Through Presentation of Plaque Scheduled For Feb. 18

The drivers' training offered by the Aransas County school system is of such outstanding excellence that it has won an award from the school from the Southwest Insurance Information Service, according to a letter received this week by Pat H. Greene, school superintendent.

The letter, which is from the Service's executive secretary, F.

Darby Hammond, says, in part: "Southwestern Insurance Information Service. Incorporated has made a statewide survey and is making awards of excellence to 23 winning schools. These schools were divided into nine groups on the basis of the number of pupils enrolled. Your school has won second place and an engraved plaque in Group Six."

"The Texas Safety Association, assisted by the Department of Public Safety, and the Texas Education Agency, selected the winners for us."

According to Greene, driver education is mandatory for all 9th graders, and there are 59 out of 60 in the class that are at present enrolled in the course, the other having a drivers' license already, and a class conflict that makes it impossible for him to attend.

During the first six weeks, he said, students are taught the theory of safe driving from text books and films, and this part of the course is followed by written and visual tests.

Once these have been passed satisfactorily, students are given 30 weeks of behind-the-wheel training, and because the George Clarke Chevrolet furnishes the driver training car used in the classes, the school does not find it necessary to charge for the course.

The plaque will be presented to the school at an assembly program to be held at 10:25 on February 18, Greene said, at which time a representative of the Service will be here for the ceremonies.

Coach Melvin Borchert is the instructor in charge.

## Budget Includes Many Coastal Bend Projects

The president, in his recent budgetary message, included a number of projects which are of extreme importance to South Texas and the Coastal Bend, and allocated considerable sums for work on this program.

New money for public works in the area included \$1.75 million for maintenance on the Gulf Intracoastal Canal in the Galveston district, \$470,000 to be spent extending the Guadalupe Channel to Victoria, and \$450,000 for realignment of that section of the canal lying between Rockport and Old Ingleside.

Brazos Island Harbor, at Port Isabel, is to receive \$1.4 million for new construction during the year, and \$235,000 for maintenance. Corpus Christi Lift Bridge, at the upper end of the present harbor, was allotted \$915,000 and \$800,000 in new funds went to the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi waterway for construction and deepening, along with \$420,000 for maintenance.

Elsewhere in Texas Houston Ship Channel got \$800,000 for construction and \$795,000 for maintenance; Galveston Seawall received \$1 million for construction; Galveston Channel and Harbor was allotted \$310,000 for maintenance;

Galveston-Texas City-Houston channel was down for \$12,000 for investigations; Freeport Harbor, \$150,000 for maintenance; Sabine-Neches Waterway drew \$800,000 in new construction and \$1,095,000 for maintenance; while the channel at Anahuac got \$30,000, that at Cedar Bayou (near Houston) \$70,000, and the Pass Cavallo-Port Lavaca channel \$80,000, all the last three being for maintenance.

The funds that have been requested must receive approval of both houses in Congress before the money is made available, but prospects of the local realignment project say that money for this appears certain.

Last year, \$890,000 in Federal funds was appropriated for the so-called Intracoastal Canal cut-off, which will leave Aransas Bay near Rockport, travel along the shores of the mainland through the Redfish Bay area, then past Aransas Pass harbor, and on out through Corpus Christi Bay to Old Ingleside, where it will rejoin the present course of the canal, cutting off some 17 or 18 miles of the older route, and some very rough water where the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi waterway enters the Gulf of Mexico through Aransas Pass.

Of the appropriation last year, \$760,000 was earmarked for a bridge across the new canal, on the new route of the Port Aransas-Aransas Pass Causeway, which is scheduled to start construction (continued on page 8)

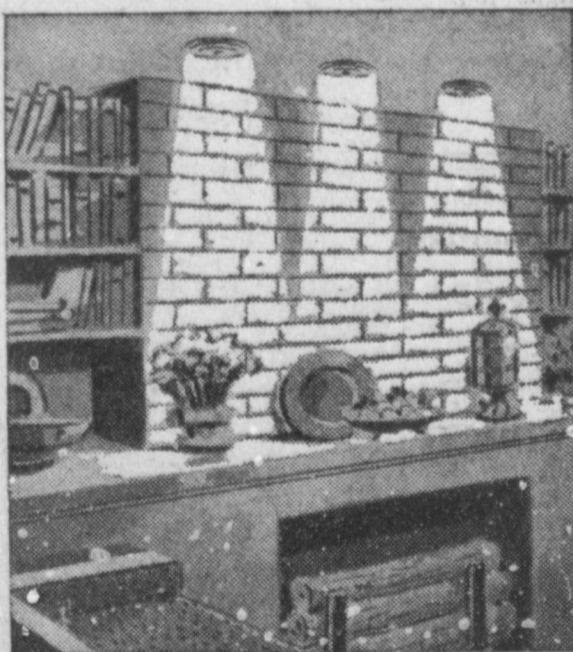

Texas Shrimp Landings Drop Nearly Three Million Pounds In November

Shrimp landings on the Texas coast were off nearly 3,000,000 pounds (tail weight) in November, according to the latest release from the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which gives November's total as 4,225,000, compared to 7,421,000 pounds of tails in October.

The figures, latest available, showed Brownsville leading for the entire coast, with 1,254,000 pounds in November, opposed to 1,594,000 in the preceding month, and the Aransas Pass-Corpus Christi region second, with 1,111,000 pounds, a drop of 600,000 pounds over October, when it held first place.

Greatest decline of the Texas ports was off by the Freeport boats. In November they caught only 560,000 pounds of tails, compared to 1,517,000 in October, and dropped to fourth place from third. Third place in November went to Port Isabel, with 747,000 pounds, a drop of 300,000 pounds over the preceding month.

Galveston produced 166,000 pounds in November, against 661,000 the month before; Rockport brought in 237,000 pounds in November compared to 287,000 in October; Port Lavaca and Palacios reported only 66,000 against a prior 493,000; and the Sabine Pass-Port Arthur region landed 84,000 pounds of tails in November compared to 149,000 the month before.

However, the 1957 landings for November outstripped those for the same month in 1956 by a million pounds, while for January to November inclusive, in 1957, they were about 10 million pounds greater than in 1956. Exact figures for 1957 during this ten months totaled 44,224,000 pounds, compared to only 32,588,000 in the preceding year.

Oyster landings at Galveston totaled 391 barrels during the month, and in the Sabine Pass, Port Arthur area, they were 537 barrels, compared with none at either place in October. This is a decided drop over 1956, when they were 1619 and 3000 barrels respectively, and, since so much fresh water was admitted to the bays this year, it is extremely doubtful if production this year will be anywhere near that of 1956-57.

In the finfish department, Gal-

veston and Freeport combined reported 80,000 pounds, compared to 73,000 in October, and 33,000 for the same month in 1956. Port Lavaca and Palacios combined had 3000 pounds, with none last month, and none caught in November, 1956.

Aransas Pass, Rockport, and Corpus Christi reported no fin fish in November for either year; Port Isabel said that its fishermen caught 10,000 pounds in November, or only half the amount they had brought in October, and very little compared to the 147,000 pounds caught there in November, 1956.

The Sabine Pass-Port Arthur region caught 15,000 pounds of finfish in November, compared to 12,000 pounds the preceding month, and 10,000 pounds in November, 1956.

Blue crab landing at Galveston and Freeport dropped from 3000 pounds in October to only 2000 in November and those in the Sabine Pass-Port Arthur region dropped from 3000 to 1000 pounds.

To fill a long felt need in Aransas County for an efficient and safe savings institution, the Arco Federal Credit Union was organized Monday night by a group of local people and application was made for a charter to the United States Treasurer.

Charter members included W. E. Beasley, J. T. Slocum, Capt. James Palmer, H. E. Cullom, Hugh Trahan, R. Nava, Jeane H. Bailey, Christine McDonald, C. O. Bailey and Jack McCready.

The new Union will be county-wide in its membership and become one of some 18,000 such organizations in the United States, 3,000 of them in Texas. All are highly successful and in addition to loans to members pay about 5% on savings.

The Aransas County Union, as are all others, is designed both as a savings depository and loaning agency. It will adhere to Deaf Smith County's Union at Hereford, one of the State's most successful.

Savings of as little as 25 cents per week are acceptable from children's accounts and all funds may be withdrawn at any time without penalty. One membership fee of 25 cents is the only expense in opening an account. The amount any one person may deposit is fixed each year by the directors, but no officer or director is allowed to borrow beyond the amount of his savings.

All Aransas County citizens are requested to ask for details and applications blanks.

Judge C. O. Bailey was appointed temporary secretary-treasurer without salary, to serve until full organization is completed and will be glad to answer questions.

Mr. H. T. Sanderson, of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Co. Union and also a director of the State and National organizations, spoke to the Aransas County group and helped organize.

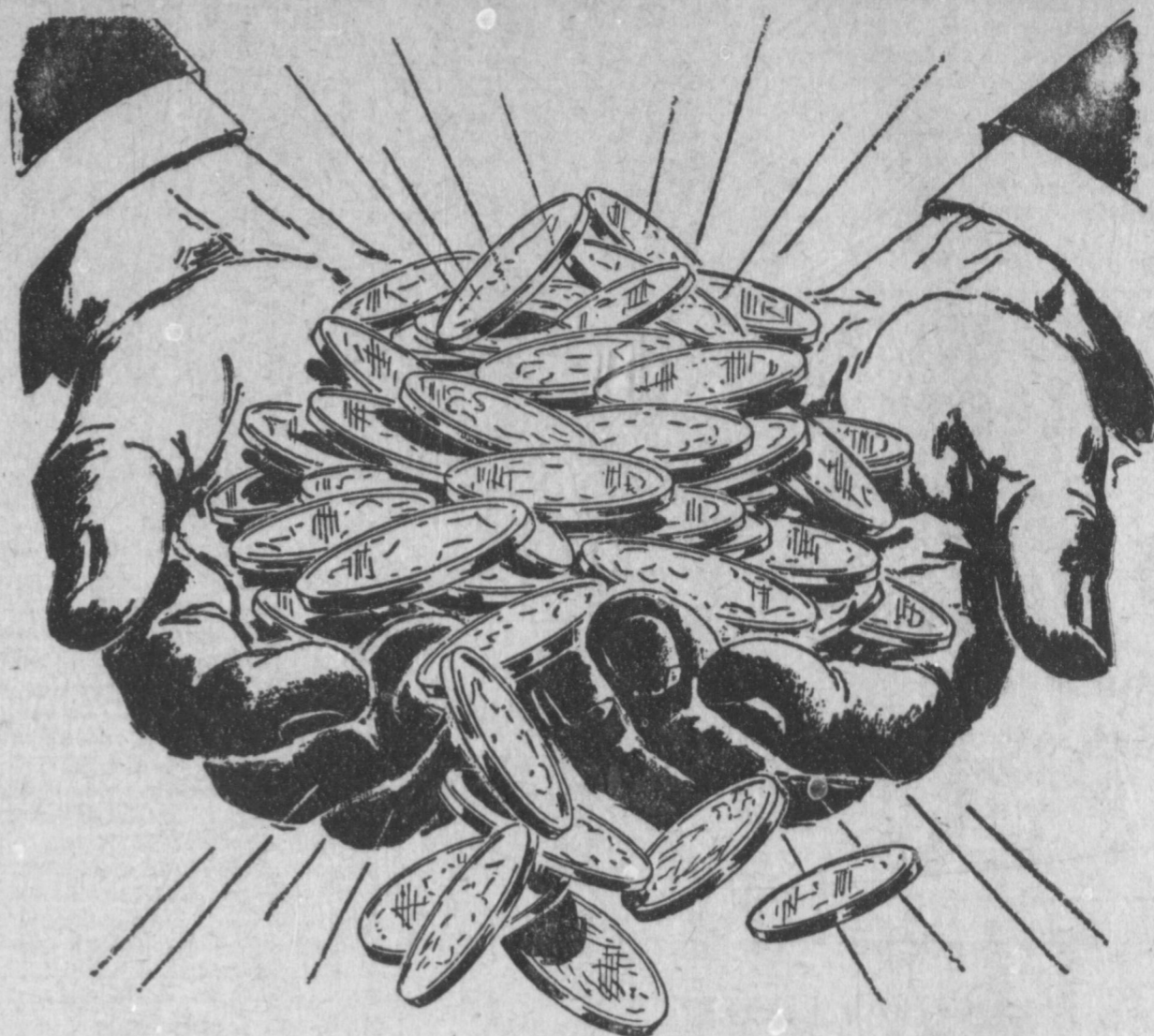

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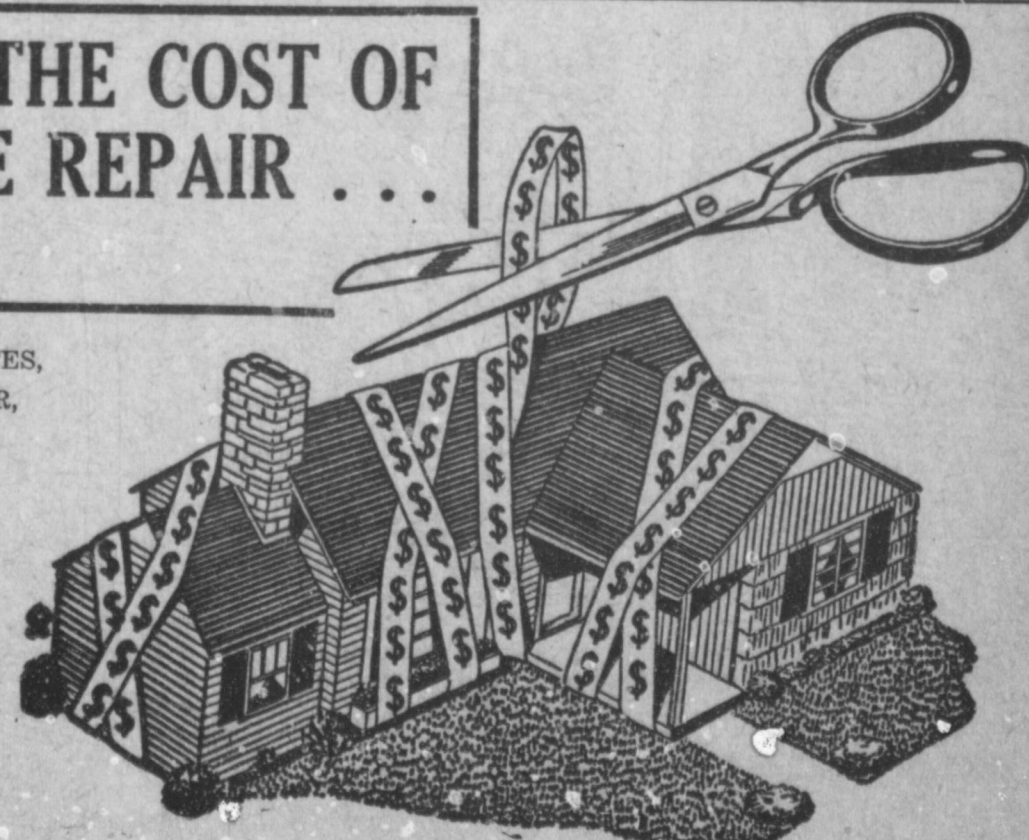

**BIBLES ARE STILL BEST SELLERS**

"Bibles are still best sellers," said Mrs. Harry Traylor, at the Treasure House, "and you'd be surprised at the number of people who come in wanting something a little special for a gift that settle on one of the many fine editions that are available."

Mrs. Traylor doesn't sell books, or at least any that are not antiques, but she does sell Bibles along with all the other gifts, china, antiques, and silverware in her shop, and she has one beautiful illuminated one that many people look at enviously.

Handsome bindings, beautiful pictures in color and explanatory supplements highlight new Bibles, Mrs. Traylor said. A Catholic edition, printed by the Catholic Press of Chicago, is a rich and beautiful one-volume library of the faith.

The illustrations of this magnificent edition are reproductions in full color of more than 100 old masters, tracing the Bible stories with great paintings, from Rembrandt's "Moses" to Fra Angelico's "Crucifixion".

Some of the art transcends denominational lines. Guy Rove, commissioned by the Texas publisher Houston Harte to create new pictures of the prophets for a modern Protestant edition of Old Testament stories, won an award with Harte from the Christoffers, a Catholic laymen's group.

Some of the art was born in persecution. Menorah Press discovered a Jewish refugee who hid from the Nazis for three months in a French garret. His only book was a Bible. He began sketching scenes and characters, and after the war used them to illustrate Menorah's new Jewish Family Bible, making two trips to Israel to complete the project.

Mrs. Traylor points out that the supplementary text is equally appealing to many people of all faiths who want a deeper understanding of the Holy Book.

Many new editions feature, in addition to the basic Bible of the owner's faith, synopses of chapters, maps of the Holy Land, a concordance or dictionary of Biblical terms, and other helps peculiar to each of the great religions.

Jewish Bibles, for instance, explain the Jewish holidays and their rites and meanings; Catholic Bibles describe in words and color the Mass, the sacraments, the rosary and other prayers.

One of the most exhaustively supplemented Protestant editions is the New Analytical Bible, created for the John A. Dickson Publishing Company. It uses no art, but contains both the original King James version and (in brackets) clarification of its archaic words from the American Revised Version, plus 800 pages of explanatory text, including one of the most comprehensive cross-indexing of Biblical names, places, and subjects ever to be published.

According to Mrs. Traylor, everybody's buying one—rich man, poor man, Protestant, Catholic, Jew—and the biggest best seller ever printed is selling better than ever.

"No one," she says, "quite knows why it's happening." Publishers, when contacted, offer different reasons. Some say it's the beauty of the new editions, which has changed the Bible from its black and white past to the colorful and beautiful ones of today. Still others say that there is

**The Church of Christ**

**What It Teaches**

Soon the religious world will begin to have a great deal to say about "Lent", "Ash Wednesday", "Palm Sunday", "Good Friday", and "Easter", and many other related expressions. But, my friends, have you ever stopped to think how little the Bible teaches on the observance of such religious holy days?

In view of all the emphasis that most of the churches of our day lay upon the observance of part, or all of these days, it is well that we stop to do some investigating for ourselves.

Let us now look at a statement made by the apostle Paul in Gal. 4:9-11, "But now, after that ye have known God, or rather are known to God, how turn ye again to the weak and beggarly elements, where unto ye desire again to be in bondage? Ye observe days, and months, and times, and years. I am afraid of you, lest I have bestowed upon you labor in vain."

Christians about observing unauthorized holy days. And said that he was fearful, lest he had bestowed upon them labor in vain. If Paul was fearful of having bestowed upon the early Christians labor in vain, because of their keeping so many days that God had not commanded, what would he say now.

From the days of the Nicene Creed in 325 A.D. until now they have been constantly increased. So that new ones are being set aside every few years. My friends, you may search your New Testament through, and you will not find a command to keep Easter, nor any example of New Testament Christians ever observing it, or the many other days that are connected with it. But you will find that the Christians met on the resurrection day of our Lord to eat the "Lord's supper" in memory of His death.

Let us read Acts 20:7, "And upon the first day of the week, when the disciples came together to break bread, Paul preached unto them, ready to depart on the morrow; and continued his speech until midnight." In the Gospel according to Mark 16:9, we learn that Christ arose on the first day of the week. Thus, the early Christians celebrated the death of Christ on every first day of the week, (52 times a year) and not just once a year. It is a custom with many people to go to church somewhere on "Easter", although that may be the only time that they ever go.

In the Churches of Christ, there are no special programs, no special emphasis on Easter, any more than any other Sunday, or Lord's day. It is not observed with any special emphasis at all. Our reason for that is, that the Holy Scriptures do not authorize it; and because it had its origin in the old "Teutonic mythology". See Encyclopaedia Britannica, volume 7, pages 858 and 859.

You have a cordial invitation to worship with the Church of Christ on every first day of the week, when the Lord's supper is served to all the children of God. —adv.
