Taxpayers who worked for more than one employer during 1957 must be sure to attach to their federal income tax returns for the year all their W-2 withhold- Rev. Many people work for several business firms during a year. Generally, such firms will give employees who have left their employ proper certificates soon after they leave the company. These certificates must be used on computing tax status at the end of

the year. Frequently we receive returns lacking two or three such withholding forms. Checking against our own copies of the W-2's furnished us by employers, reveals tax discrepancies. Short - term workers who have never received W-2s from firms by which they were employed should request them at once; those who have lost them should ask for duplicates.



> Although he may pay federal gift taxes totaling several thoudecides to sell the farm for its \$50,000 value, she still has to pay income tax on \$40,000 profit (difference between the sales price and her father's cost of \$10,000).

> On the other hand, if the farmer daughter, but had left it to her under his will, he would have saved the gift tax. The daughter would have taken the property at a cost basis of \$50,000, so upon the sale she would not have had to pay any income tax.

Of course, there would have been some estate taxes and administration expenses in the father's estate, but that would have been much less than the taxes which resulted from the gift. However, depending upon individual and particular circumstances, there may be occasions when a gift is advisable. Your lawyer can advise you on this matter.

Sidewalks presented a problem in those days for frequently they were used as hitching racks, to their detriment. Hence, an ordinance prohibited this, as well as riding or driving down these pedestrian conveniences.

The mayor's court, disclaimed jurisdiction over concealed weapons or improper behavior in church, but the councilmen came out strongly on disorderly houses, fireworks and the hauling of trash through the streets.

One of Rockport's businesses, the Euper Packery, was declared a nuisance during the term of W. P. McGrew, who followed Mathis as Mayor, and it was ordered to cease and desist on penalty of \$25 for every animal killed after passage of the ordinance.

And there were evidently juvenile delinquents in those days, for ordinance No. 23, passed while P. H. Terry was mayor, says:

"The implement known as nigger shooter is hereby declared a nuisance, and anyone found using the same shall be fined not less than \$2.50, or confined in jail for not more than 24 hours."

And this ordinance is still in effect as is another which prohibits playing marbles or any other game on the streets, with the fine assessed at not less than a dollar nor more than five.
