#### Bishop Uses Depth To Beat Longhorns In Local Track Meet

Bishop found saftey in numbers here Friday night to turn back the threat of George West's one-man gang and capture the 2nd annual Toast of the Coast the bays. To obtain an offshore

Bishop, placing in ten of the 15 events, compiled a total of 50 points to barely outdistance George West, which amassed 47. Woodsboro was third with 291/2 points.

David Bennett of George West was the sensation of the meet, which saw 11 new records written

Bennett clipped his own standthe Corpus Christi clubs broad jumping 20 feet, one inch. leap of 5' 91/2".

In the standout event of the meet, Bennett outlegged Bishop's Ronnie Bull by a scant stride to take the low hurdles.

George West had a chance of victory until the third-to-last event of the evening when Bishop grabbed the 880-yard relay in the record-breaking time of 1:37.8. A fine third leg by Lynn Remmert and an anchor lap by Jack Justice barely managed to overhaul Woodsboro.



This sudden outburst of activity was sparked by telegrams to Spencer, to Mayor Conn Brown of Aransas Pass, and to other key figures in the fight for the canal cut-off, apprising them over the weekend that the president's request for funds for this project had been revised upward, and that, dependent upon action by Congress there would be \$1.4 million available for construction in the very near future.

Originally, estimates called for an expenditure of approximately \$2,290,000 for dredging the waterway between a point near Rockport and the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi waterway, near Ingleside, shortening the route of the present Intracoastal Canal between Corpus Christi and Rockport by approximately 17 miles, and passing Aransas Pass just to the east

of the present Conn Brown harbor. A year ago, \$890,000 was contained in the Rivers and Harbors Bill, as a starter on the project. This was to be used for construction of a high-level bridge over the proposed canal route, to accommodate the new Aransas Pass-Port Aransas Causeway, but at that time no funds were made available for actual dredging of

the canal. Earlier this year, President Eisenhower had asked for \$430,000 additional, largely because engineers figured that the bridge costs could not be met by the original appropriation, but, due to of St. Peter's Episcopal Church, the government's desire to start public works to relieve unemployment, the entire remainder of the money for the project was contained in the \$175 million appropriation asked for within the

At Aransas Pass, the new causeway to Mustang Island has reached the stage where bids will be sought on construction next month, and this will call for expenditure of approximately \$1 million, replacing the old road. Bids for the bridge are to be let next month also. With 125 feet in horizontal clearance, and 50-foot vertical, it is designed to handle ordinary canal traffic without any trouble, and, although it will be paid for with Federal funds, and will be built to Federal plans and specifications, the State Highway Department will actually be in





#### **Gonzales Warm Springs** United Fund Agency

A clarification of the relationship between the March of Dimes (National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis) and the Gonzales Warm Springs Rehabilitation Foundation was made by Ralph Murray, Warm Springs field representative, who visited in Rockport Monday.

"A lot of Texans mistakenly believe that Warm Springs is operated by the March of Dimes, and they also are unaware that many patients other than polio victims are treated at Gonzales," Murray

The National Foundation picks up the tab for most of the polio cases treated at Warm Springs and other treatment facilities, he stated. Warm Springs, on the other hand, has its own fund-raising efforts to assure victims of strokes and accidents of all kinds as well as such diseases as cerebral palsy, muscular dystrophy, multiple sclerosis, etc., that they will not be denied treatment for lack of

Murray said that while the number of polio patients has naturally been reduced as the result of the Salk vaccine, he could verify the March of Dimes' assertaion that rehabilitation on many "old" polio victims is a long way from complete. "We urge everyone to support the March of Dimes to the limit," he said.

Gonzales Warm Springs Rehabilitation Foundation is a non-profit rehabilitation center chartered under Texas laws. It is fully accredited and recognized as one of the outstanding comprehensive rehabilitation centers in the nation, Murray said.






