Drag Races Are Slated For Mar. 30

Come Sunday, March 30, there'll be a lot of guys and dolls from Corpus Christi at the local airport, seeing how fast their beasts will bug before some 150-mile-an-hour dragster cops the trophy as top eliminator of the day.

There'll be members of the Stahorses, K.A.M.M.'s, Scrapers, Derbies, Top-Rodders, Quartermasters, Side Winders and the Iron Angels clubs, all running under the auspices of the Corpus Christi Timing Association. And, if past experience is any criterion, there'll be cars here from all over the rest of South Texas, anxious to show the Corpus Christi clubs that there are fast cars elsewhere, too.

Because no serious-minded hot rodder can get along without belonging to a club whose name he wears emblazoned on his shirt, overalls, or jackets, they'll have names just as colorful as those from the Coastal Bend metropolis.

From Houston will come the Quarter Kings and the Eliminators who say that the local drag strip is one of the best in Texas. Victoria's Gear Grinders will be out in full force, and the Poor Boys, the big San Antonio club that is the mainstay of the Alamo Timing Association always sends cars. Up from the valley will come (nine chances out of ten) D. C. McNabb's lightning fast dragster, to represent the Rio Grande Valley Timing Association, along with a host of other cars, and the Laredo Timing Association will send anywhere from 10 to 12.

Since the Corpus Christi Timing Association first staged a race last July Fourth, crowds at the strip here have run from 2,000 to 6,000 people, and the strip record is crowding 140 miles an hour.

The primary activity of all these clubs is the repair and improvement of cars. Hot-rodgers, who never consider a car finished, may put up a couple of years' labor and \$8,000 into a prize-winning car.

Second most important activity of all legitimate hot rod clubs is public relations. They have to work on civic projects, aid with community charities, are pledged to stop and help fellow motorists in distress, and have their own disciplinary system that forces mem-

Boat Inspection and New Operators' Licenses Are Due June 1, According to Coast Guard Marine Inspectors

The Marine Inspection Service of the U. S. Coast Guard, with Commander F. Lederle, officer in charge, will have charge of inspecting passenger carrying vessels in the Corpus Christi district, to be sure they are complying with the new Federal law on boating safety, Commander E. J. Worrell, executive officer, announced here Wednesday afternoon.

Known as Public Law 519, and passed by Congress in May, 1956, the law affects any boat of any sort, from an outboard to a liner that carries more than six passengers for domestic purposes. Among these are included crew boats, seismograph boats, charter boats, vessels belonging to groups like the Sea Scouts and: "Any domestic vessel operating on the navigable waters of the United States."

All such domestically-owned vessels, Commander Worrell said, must make application between now and June 1 for inspection by the Marine Inspection Service. One copy of this application will be

returned to the boatman, and will serve as his permission to operate until the actual inspection can be carried out, he said.

This inspection, as set up by the new law, will be a thorough one, and will be made every three years, with two other inspections of lesser severity being made during the period.

At these tri-ennial inspections, as they will be known, boats must be hauled out, for inspection of the hull, propeller, shaft, and underwater fittings.

At the same time, or after the boat has been returned to the water, it will be thoroughly gone over to see that planking, bulkheads, bilge pumps, fire fighting and safety equipment and the radio are all in good shape.

There will also be changes in the licenses required from operator's after June 1, Commander Worrell said. The present motor boat operator's license must be surrendered as soon after June 1 as is possible, and must definitely be turned in and a new one obtained before June 1, 1959.

The new ones will be of several sorts. There will be a bay license, and then there will be a number of different offshore zones and types of service.

Operators with insufficient experience will not be allowed to go offshore, but, if what experience they do have warrants it, will be issued licenses to operate in the bays. To obtain an offshore license, a man must have had at least four years experience offshore in the Gulf of Mexico.

Commander Worrell stated that it is not the intention of the present law or the Coast Guard to work a hardship on any boats now operating, and that considerable leeway has been allowed the inspection service. Nevertheless, new boats must be built to comply with the regulations, and there will be some of those now operating that will undoubtedly have to make extensive changes to comply with the safety rules before they can be allowed to go on.

Locally, copies of the rules and regulations, and some applications are available at the office of the Navigation District on the waterfront.

Car Inspection Deadline Near

With less than a month left in which to have motor vehicles inspected, Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Texas department of public safety, urged motorists to obtain their 1958 inspection stickers immediately. In doing so, he said that 52 per cent of the registered vehicles in Texas have not been inspected for the current year.

"At the present rate of inspection it looks as though the usual ten per cent who wait until the deadline for inspections will be waiting in line on April 15. With crowded inspection stations on this deadline date immediate service cannot be rendered and car owners will suffer an unnecessary loss of time and inconvenience."

Nearly half of the vehicles already inspected have required some adjustments or repairs which require more time for both the owner and can be handled better when not rushed.

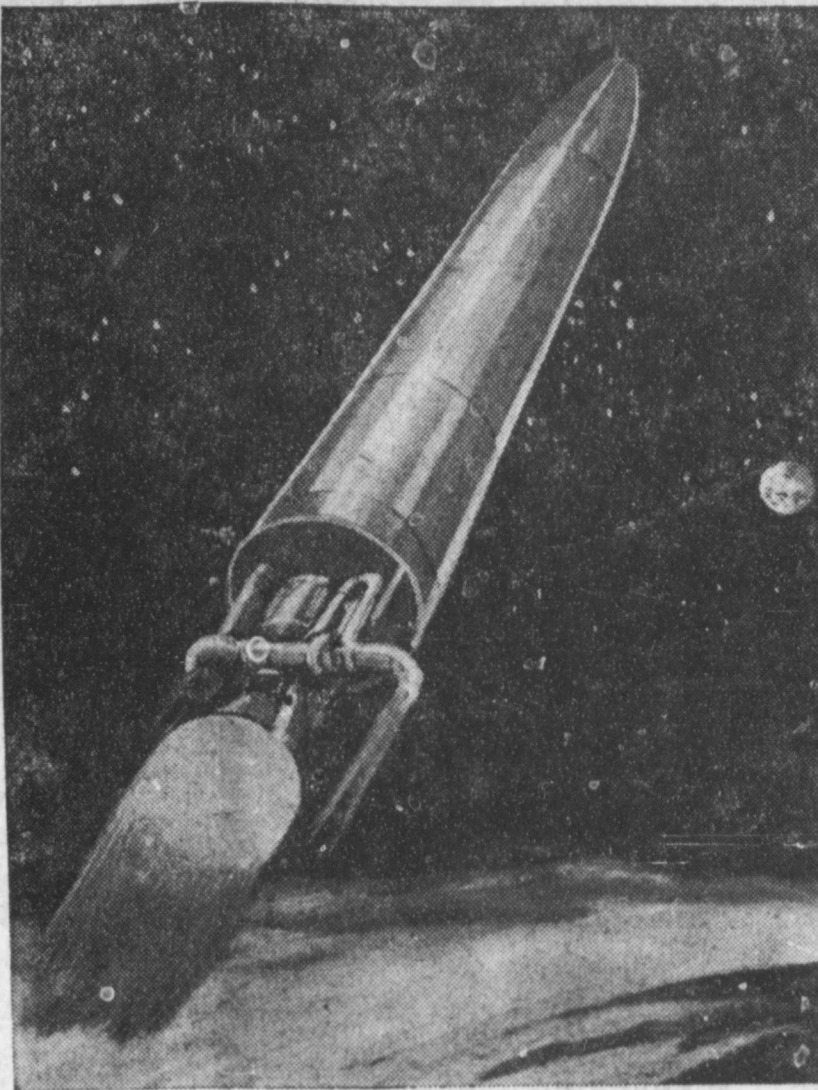
The subject of the essays is "Americanism and Girl Scouting". The deadline is April 1.

City Council Handles Routine Business

The City Council, at their regular meeting, handled largely routine business.

R. R. Rice presented a proposal, accompanied by a plat prepared by County Surveyor James A. Jarboe, in which he asked the Council to accept a portion of his property in Block 1, Doughty and Mathis, as shown on the plat, in exchange for that portion of Water Street which he now has under fence.

This was discussed at length, after which a motion was made by Councilman James W. Porter that the proposal be accepted, with City Attorney Richard Hatch preparing the necessary papers, and that North Street end at the new east boundary of Water Street.

This motion was seconded by Councilman Roy Rogers. Councilman Porter, Rogers and Ernest Harritt voted aye on the proposal. Councilman James Hunt abstained.

Issuance of city dog tags has been suspended at this time, and Dr. Schmidt has been instructed to proceed with his rabies vaccination program.

The Council was then told, by Mayor Chester Johnson, that the Fire Department building needed repairs, and Councilmen concluded that the department should use the funds appropriated to them by the City and County for such repair work, and should it become necessary, more funds could be requested.

A claims and damage ordinance was discussed and passed.

Canal Cut-off Gets All Money Allotted

Lyndon Johnson Says That President Has Asked For \$1.4 Million, Which Will Bring Funds Up to Original Estimate Made When Project Began

A Rockport conference Tuesday brought completion of the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off one step nearer, when Aransas Pass officials, members of the Aransas County Navigation Board, and one of the largest landowners along the route assured W. S. Minor, Assistant Resident Engineer, of the Corpus Christi office, Corps of Engineers, that necessary right-of-way would be obtained within the next 30 to 60 days.

Emory M. Spencer, will donate the necessary 400-foot strip through his properties. Aransas County Navigation District Com-

missioners T. Dick Picton, Raymond Owens and Ted Atwood, voted to furnish the balance of the right-of-way needed in Aransas County. Richard Hatch and Fred Robbins, city attorney and city manager of Aransas Pass, assured Minor that practically all right-of-way in that neighborhood was already available.

Minor, at the meeting, said that the Corps of Engineers' plans for completion of this long-sought waterway could be completed within a week after title to the right-of-way was completed, and that, while they were subject to review, it was unlikely that they would be held up long, due to the urgent need for such projects to get underway.

This sudden outburst of activity was sparked by telegrams to Spencer, to Mayor Conn Brown of Aransas Pass, and to other key figures in the fight for the canal cut-off, apprising them over the weekend that the president's request for funds for this project had been revised upward, and that, dependent upon action by Congress there would be \$1.4 million available for construction in the very near future.

Originally, estimates called for an expenditure of approximately \$2,290,000 for dredging the waterway between a point near Rockport and the Port Aransas-Corpus Christi waterway, near Ingleside, shortening the route of the present Intracoastal Canal between Corpus Christi and Rockport by approximately 17 miles, and passing Aransas Pass just to the east of the present Conn Brown harbor.

A year ago, \$890,000 was contained in the Rivers and Harbors Bill, as a starter on the project. This was to be used for construction of a high-level bridge over the proposed canal route, to accommodate the new Aransas Pass-Port Aransas Causeway, but at that time no funds were made available for actual dredging of the canal.

Earlier this year, President Eisenhower had asked for \$430,000 additional, largely because engineers figured that the bridge costs could not be met by the original appropriation, but, due to the government's desire to start public works to relieve unemployment, the entire remainder of the money for the project was contained in the \$175 million appropriation asked for within the past week.

Tied in with, and to a certain extent hinging upon, construction of the cut-off were a number of other area projects, some of them already underway.

At Aransas Pass, the new causeway to Mustang Island has reached the stage where bids will be sought on construction next month, and this will call for expenditure of approximately \$1 million, replacing the old road. Bids for the bridge are to be let next month also. With 125 feet in horizontal clearance, and 50-foot vertical, it is designed to handle ordinary canal traffic without any trouble, and, although it will be paid for with Federal funds, and will be built to Federal plans and specifications, the State Highway Department will actually be in charge of construction.

At Rockport, the Case Harbor, part of Aransas County's long-range program of betterment, has been waiting on location of the canal cut-off, and dredging of the waterway, which will go just to the east of the new harbor, planned for commercial and industrial uses.

Chairman Dick Picton, of the Navigation District, said that plans have been completed for dredging of the first phase of the new harbor, and that, when and if the government starts dredging, an effort will be made to negotiate a subsidiary contract with the dredging company for this excavation.

C. of C. Receives Another Inquiry

The Chamber of Commerce has received another inquiry from an industrial site, this time from a chemical company, which wishes to locate upon the Gulf coast.

This company, according to the letter, has tentatively selected a site that is not in Texas, but they have not made any final decision.

They need an unlimited supply of salt water, and three million gallons of fresh water daily, with five million cubic feet of dry gas per day, and a long term contract.

They also need approximately 400 tons of oyster shell daily, as part of their manufacturing process.

The site needed is 1000 acres in extent, free from flooding of any kind, either local or from the Gulf, and it should be on or available to the Intracoastal Canal.

Electricity, they say, will probably be generated by the plant itself.

The letter asks that they be advised as to whether these requirements can be met, and says that, in this event, the company would prefer to build on the property of some Navigation District, on a 99-year lease.

Immediately following this, there will be a meeting of the Aransas County High School delegates to the Third Annual conference of the Parent-Teachers' Association to be held in Sinton on April 1.

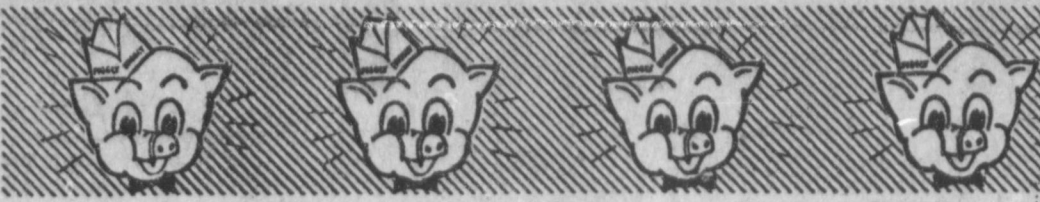

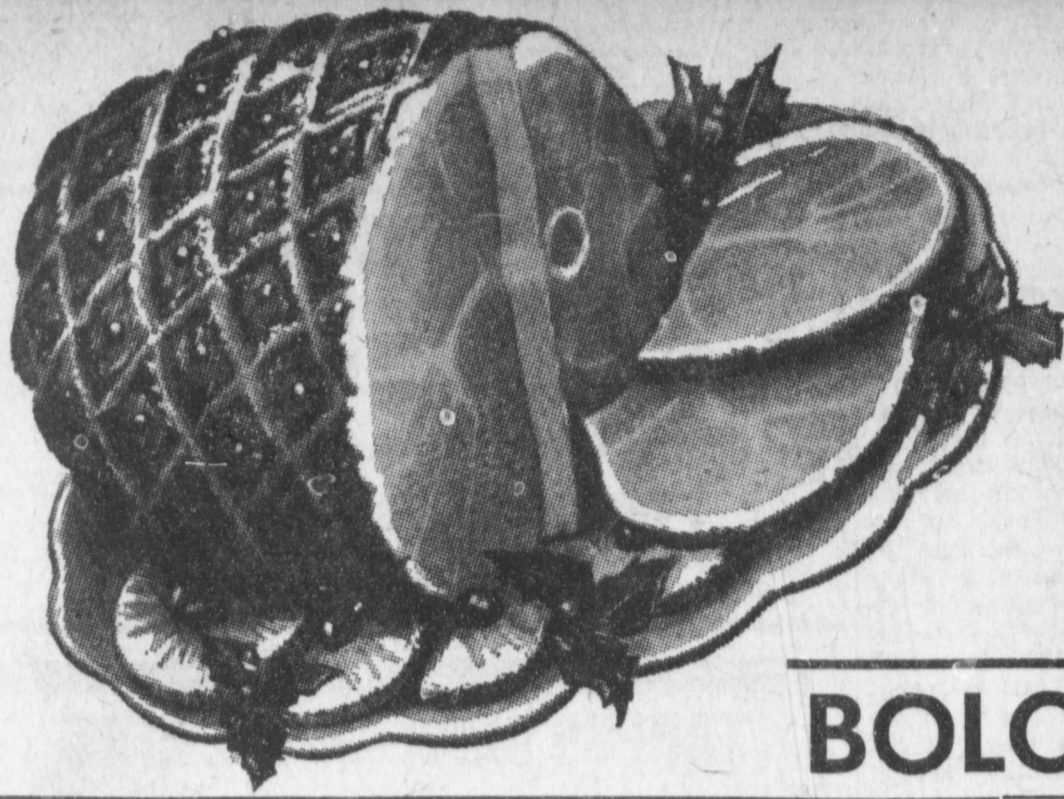

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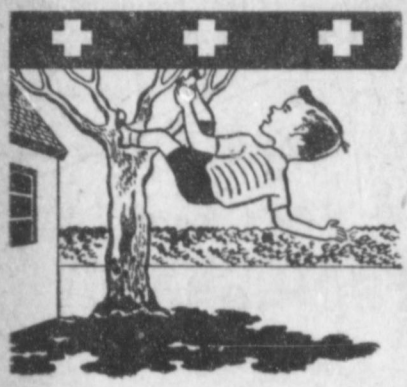

The Church of Christ What It Teaches

WHAT DENOMINATION? Quite often when we make a new acquaintance, and they learn we are a preacher, they will ask, "What denomination do you preach for?" Then just as kindly and patiently as we know how, explain that we do not preach for any denomination: I just preach for the Church of Christ. I have no denomination, and belong to no denomination; for the church that Jesus built is not a denomination.

Christ's church was built, set up in its organized form, or established on the first Pentecost after His resurrection, Sunday morning, about 9:00 o'clock, 33 A.D. On that day there were about 3,000 souls added to the Lord's church, and He has continued to add to His church daily such as should be saved. (Read Acts 2nd chapter). No one ever asked Paul, Peter, or John, "What denomination do you preach for. The reason, my friends, is that none existed in the days of the apostles. They have originated long this side of the days of the apostles.

In fact, the oldest of the denominations, with which we are acquainted, had their origin about 400 years ago. Hence, they could not be the church that Jesus built more than 1900 years ago. The church that Jesus built is undenominational and non-denominational; but never interdenominational.

The Bible teaches that denominationalism is wrong and sinful; for it is a devise to divide the Lord's people. It has been wrong and sinful in every age to divide God's people. Perhaps the worst thing that ever happened to God's people under the old covenant was for them to become divided. Jeroboam led away ten tribes of the children of Israel; while only two tribes stayed with King Rehoboam. They were never united again, and eventually, the Lord suffered both of them to be carried away into captivity, from which most of them never returned.

But, my friends, the Devil knows as well as our military men, that if he can divide, he can win. And moreover, he is the only one that does win in this situation.

As we look upon the divided condition of the religious world with all their conflicting and contradictory doctrines, it is really a pathetic scene to behold. Everyone has his "ISM", and are in competition with everyone else for numbers and popularity.

My friends, there is no justification in the Bible for this divided condition. And if men would follow the Bible only, there would be only Christians; for the Bible makes Christians only. It is when men or women depart from the Bible that denominationalism has its beginning. There is no need for any denomination whatsoever; for the church that Jesus built is big enough to contain and does contain all the saved. Christ is the Saviour of the body (Eph. 5: 23) and the body is the church (Eph. 1:22, 23). And it is not the Lord's will that there should be any "schism in the body" (Cor. 12: 25).

Our Lord prayed for the unity of His people (Jno. 17: 20, 21). Paul and the other apostles plead for it (1 Cor. 1: 10-15), also (Eph. 4: 1-6).

My friends, we do wrong when we foster or encourage denominationalism with our time, money or influence. For denominationalism just means division. It comes from the same word as "denominator"; and that shows into how many parts a thing is divided. Hence, the church of Christ pleads for undenominational Christianity. Attend the church of Christ. There is a difference.

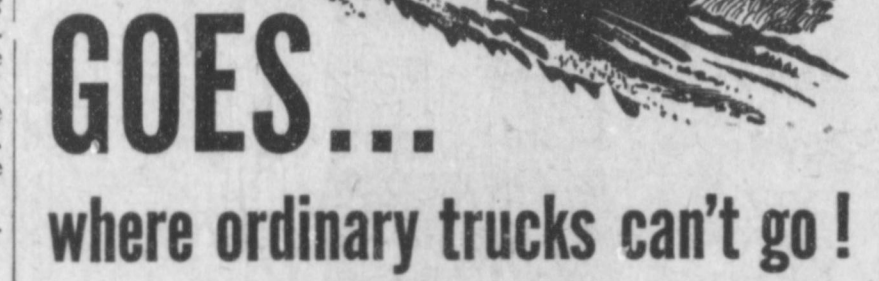

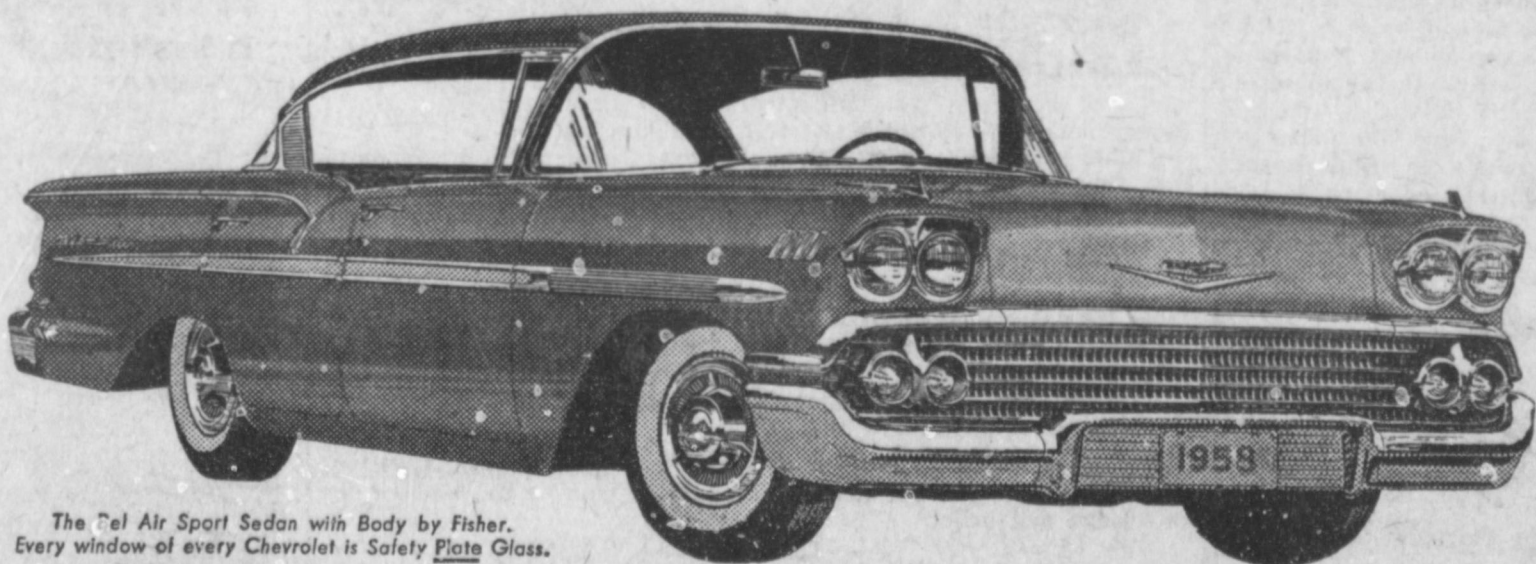

Shrimp Landings Drop In January

According to Fish and Wildlife figures just released, Brownsville was the shrimp port of the Texas coast during January, with landings of 793,000 pounds of tails, a small upswing over December, when only 747,000 pounds were landed.

Port Isabel was second, with 480,000 pounds against 452,000, and the Aransas Pass-Corpus Christi area, which was second in December with 536,000 pounds of tails had dropped to third in January, with only 315,000 landed.

However, production of the Texas coast declined, from 2,168,000 pounds to 1,779,000 in January. Freepart shrimpers brought in only 103,000 pounds in January against 218,000 the month before; Rockport landed 65,000 pounds compared to 135,000 in December; and the other ports reported even less.

There were 15,000 pounds of tails landed in the Port Lavaca-Palacios region; 5,000 at Galveston; and only 3,000 pounds around

Sabine Pass and Port Arthur. Oyster landings were smaller in January than they were the month before.

At Galveston, 1383 barrels were reported against a revised estimate for December of 2215 barrels. At Sabine Pass and Port Arthur, only 152 barrels were landed in January, a marked drop from a year ago, when these two towns reported 6,000 barrels in January, 1957.

Oddy enough, no oysters are reported from Rockport, although from six to 10 or 15 boats were working in this area during most of January.

Finfish landings are up in many Texas ports where they have been reported. It is true that Galveston suffered a drop from 72,000 pounds in December to 59,000 pounds in January, but Port Lavaca and Palacios caught 32,000 pounds of fish in January, against

An estimated 362 million acre feet of water falls on Texas in an average year.

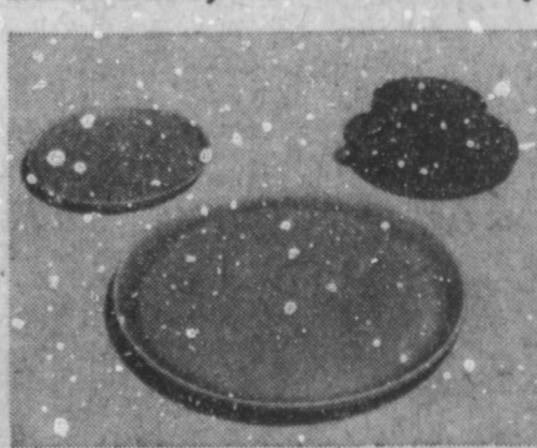
One of Texas' earliest advocates of soil conservation was Howard Duke, who terraced his Newton County farm in 1882.
