He moved out to the end of the jettie, and kept catching hardheads until he had tallied 23 fish, for that single piece of squid, and he heaved it back again, hoping that another hardhead would hit.

His friend was kidding him. "You'd feel funny if something really big hit that wouldn't you," he said.

Two hours later, after having looked at the spool of his reel three or four times, and wondering whether he could ever turn that fish, he brought a fifty-pound drum alongside the jettie.

He had no gaff, so he took off his belt and handed it to his friend, Reed, who made a loop out of it, and slipped it around the drum's tail, so they could land the fish.

And, believe it or not, there was enough of the squid left to be used again.

"But I didn't try it," said Bert. "I was too tired, and I never did catch that 24th hardhead."

New Commandant At AC&W Station Electronic Expert

Captain Bert W. Smith, commandant of the 813th AC&W Squadron at Rockport, is a radar expert and a career officer in the Air force, with an All-American family.

Captain Smith entered the service in October, 1940, and was posted at Scott Air Force Base, Illinois, for radio training. In 1942 he took part in the Officers' Squadron communications course, and on graduation received his commission as a second lieutenant.

From Scott he was sent to Harvard University for a 12-weeks' course on electronic and cathode ray equipment, followed by another 12 weeks at Massachusetts Institute of Technology for instruction in ultra-high-frequency technique.

Upon leaving MIT he was ordered to Boca Raton AFB to study the air-borne radar in use at that time.

In 1943 Captain Smith attended the Bell Telephone Laboratory School for War Training, concerned with the use of radar for bombing through high overcast, and at the end of the war he was radar maintenance officer at Victorville AFB, California. This base was engaged in training personnel for use of radar in high altitude bombing.

After that, the captain served in Alaska at Fairbanks, Anchorage, and Adak, utilizing both air-borne and ground radar. It was at Anchorage, as a member of an AC&W unit, that he had his first introduction to ground equipment.

Upon return from Alaska in 1946, he was a member of a tactical AC&W squadron at Turner AFB, Georgia, and then went to Keesler AFB, Biloxi, Miss., for atomic training. Transferred to Sandia AFB, New Mexico, as member of a special weapons group, he went with it to Barksdale Field, La.; then back to Scott for further communications work; then to Polk AFB, North Carolina, and, early in 1954, to Germany. He served three years at Bremerhaven (where he was accompanied by his family) in an Air Force Security Squadron.

Back in the United States, in 1957 he was again at Keesler, to take part in a staff officers' course in communications and electronics. Upon graduation, he was ordered to the 813th AC&W Squadron at Rockport, as commandant, replacing Lieutenant D. R. Burleson, who is now executive officer.

Captain and Mrs. Smith claim they are an All-American family. He was born in Alabama; she is a Georgian. Their first son, Robert, was born in Virginia in 1943; William arrived in 1945, while his parents were in California; and a daughter — Susan — was born at Scott AFB in Illinois.

City Council Has Routine Meeting

The City Council, at its regular meeting last Monday, was faced with routine business. The exchange of rights-of-way between R. R. Rice and the city, for land to open Water Street, was discussed and approved.

A petition to annex the Security Subdivision north of town was read and an ordinance was passed making such annexation.

The question of water and sewer rates outside the city was brought up, and the council decided to charge one and a half times the regular rate for such service.

New Swimming Pool and Grocery Scheduled Here

A new swimming pool and drive-in grocery have been added to Rockport's already booming building program according to J. G. (Jim) Kautz, who has already let the contract on a portion of the construction.

The grocery building, of masonry construction, will be located on Highway 35, on the Jane Ellen Motel property, and will be 40 feet by 22 feet, containing both room for the grocery and the rest rooms and showers for the swimming pool.

The pool is a modified rectangle, 20 feet wide by 40 feet long, and eight feet deep, and will be surrounded by a concrete apron ten feet wide, Kautz said.

Contractor for the building is H. H. Dick, and the swimming pool will probably be built by a Corpus Christi firm, Kautz said.

He hopes to have the entire installation done for the summer tourist season, and expects to operate the pool as a semi-private club, for members among townspeople and tourists.

Other construction now going on, or scheduled in Rockport, includes a 40 feet by 100 foot store building, to be built by Joe Sloum; a 50 foot by 100 foot air conditioned drug store to be built by Arthur Bracht for the Roatan Drug Company, and an extensive remodeling job on Johnson's Drug Store.

Practically all of these are slated for early completion, to accommodate the summer tourist trade.

SAFETY COUNCIL MET ON MONDAY

The Rockport-Fulton Area Safety Council held their regular meeting Monday night, and discussed some of the current problems that need attention.

According to Dudley Bracht, president, highway safety signs are now ready, and will be installed along the highway at the outskirts of the city in the near future. Others, as soon as they are finished, will be set up at the city limits.

J. P. Keith, the council's representative working with the local hot rod club, reported that the membership was very conscious of traffic problems and safe driving, and that internal disciplinary measures has proved efficacious in at least two instances in curbing reckless driving.

A number of the members of the safety council brought up the fact that some of the teenage girls in Rockport were more reckless than male drivers, and the council hopes to be able to convince this segment of our population that safety pays, and that an automobile is a dangerous weapon.

It was brought out during the evening's discussion, that drivers attending the drag races at the Aransas County Airport were very orderly and well-behaved, and that while in the beginning there had been some traffic arrests among the crowds attending these races, that recently there had been none. Rockport, said Bracht, has been getting some very favorable publicity over radio and TV for the way the affairs are handled, and he said, part of the funds that were brought in by these races would be used to sponsor the local hot rod club, which is applying for its charter from the national organization.

A letter from Brad H. Smith, of the Governor's office, asked that the council send information on its method of operation, as it and similar groups around the country have been instrumental in much better traffic conditions where they have been formed.

It's A Small World After All, Airmen Find

A bit of a hometown atmosphere was created at Rockport Air Force Station when Airman First Class Joe D. Gregory recently arrived for assignment here. During a check of his records and assignment to a job at the radar station, it was discovered that he was from the small town of Des Arc, Ark., which, incidentally happens to be the hometown of his first sergeant, Technical Sergeant Walter J. Campbell.

Naturally a conversation ensued about their old home community. This conversation uncovered still other facts familiar to both of the Arkansans. It came to light that Airman Gregory had attended high school with both Sergeant Campbell's sister and a cousin before entering the Air Force. It seems to be a rather small world and, in the Air Force, you are more often than not, apt to see quite a hunk of it. Airman Gregory is a radar specialist at Rockport's radar station. rooms each, Capt. Bert W. Smith, commanding officer of the station, said.

Cost of each unit is expected to run around \$15,000.

Allowing approximately two months from the time bids are requested until the contract is let, these should be ready some time late this year, for Captain Smith said specifications will call for completion within six months after the contract is awarded.

He declined comment on when the other 180 officers and men scheduled for this base could be expected, but pointed out that final work site is now under way. Buildings here are complete, and installation of all equipment here is almost finished, although additional material is still expected.

However, a good deal of work still remains to be done on the unmanned auxiliary stations which will be a part of the set-up here. These are at Riviera and Palacios.

Personnel continues to grow steadily, if slowly, and there are a score of men now station here, with others trickling in. Staff Sergeant Franklin D. Wix, a radar man, and Staff Sergeant Emmett E. McPherson, an expert in automotive maintenance both arrived this week.

Captain William E. Maxon, headquarters 33rd Air Division, Oklahoma City, was here this week, Captain Smith said, making arrangements for installation of dental facilities at the base. These will be contained in an air-conditioned, mobile unit, that will be located close to the headquarters buildings of the 813th at Aransas County Airport.

Oddly enough, Captain Smith said, one of the main problems of the new station at this time is erosion. This has been serious enough in the sandy soil on which the base is situated, that a pair of agronomists were here this week. Tanner Smith, of the U. S. Engineers' office at Galveston, and Gordon Jones, of the Engineers' southwest district office in Dallas, have examined the situation thoroughly and have made recommendations aimed at curbing the nuisance.

Rainfall During Last Seven Years Averages 22.41 Inches

Rainfall in the Rockport area during the period from 1951 thru 1957 has averaged 22.41 inches, but there have been some curious inconsistencies during that time.

In 1951, there was a 30.91 inch precipitation, but in 1952, rain amounted to only 17.48 inches. The following year it jumped to 32.74 inches again; in 1954 it was 26.31 inches; 22.71 inches were registered in 1955. In 1956 it fell to 18.87 inches, the lowest during the period, and then in 1957, when the drought broke, shot up to 37.11 inches.

Temperature in the period fluctuated from a low of 32 degrees to a high of 94 degrees.

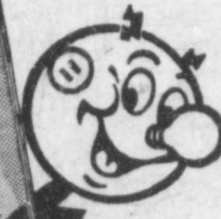

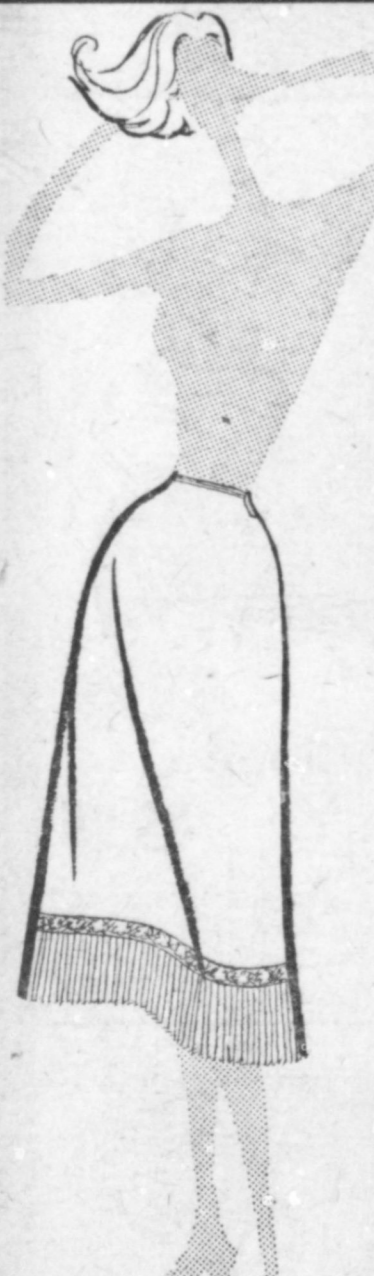
