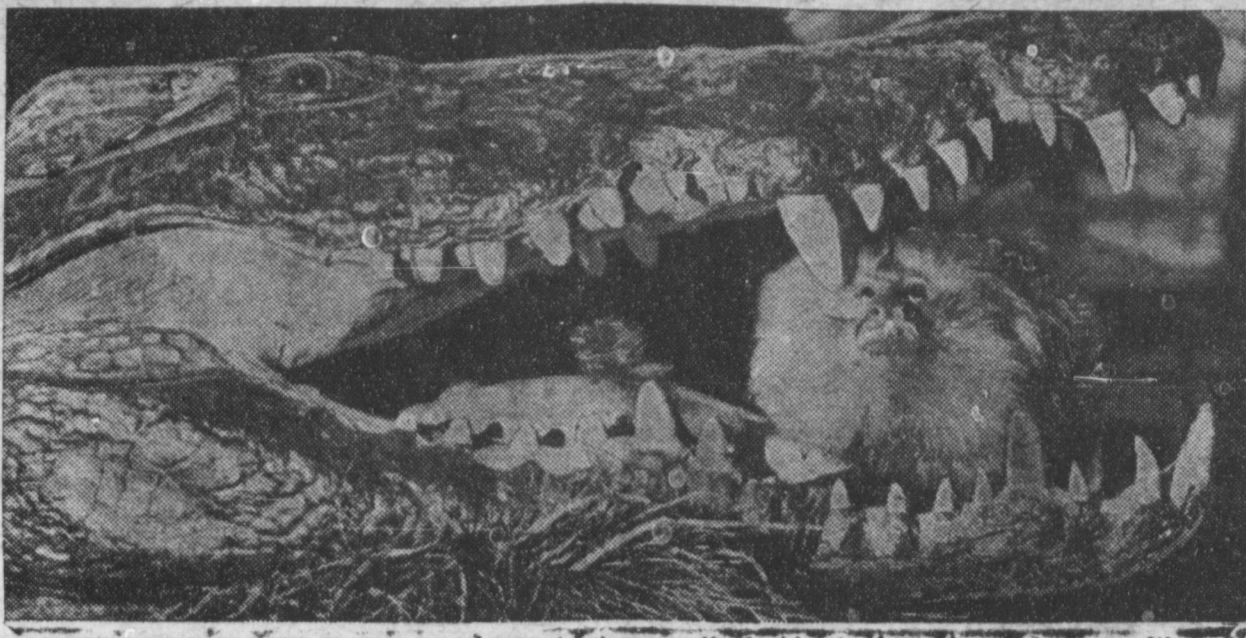
DEEP PROJECT DUE IN ARANSAS

DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE PERSONNEL CHECKING ROCKPORT AND ENVIRONS FOR IMPORTED FIRE ANTS AS MENACE GROWS

Imported fire ants have become an urgent problem in South Texas, with discovery of a heavy infestation in San Antonio and a very strong probability that they occur in Victoria, L. F. Greer said today.

Greer, district agriculturist from Taft, was in Rockport as part of an intensive survey being carried on by the Department of Agriculture, in an attempt to keep the fire ants from spreading.

The San Antonio infestation, which may cover a square mile or more, was discovered in that city late last month by members of the department. It is being used as a sort of training ground for agriculturists from other districts who are unfamiliar with these pests...

"It has been a pleasure to serve, and while I am proud of the job that has been done, there are many others as well qualified as I am to carry on."

County Judge, Hot Rod Association Help Teenagers

How a county judge and a hot rod association teamed together to help teenagers build their own recreation center; teach traffic safety to youthful drivers; and aid the Aransas County library and volunteer fire department was told today by County Judge John D. Wendell.

"Like a lot of other things," said Judge Wendell, "the whole thing just sort of grew. I know I didn't have any idea of just where we were headed when the Corpus Christi Timing Association wanted to stage a drag race at our county airport, and I don't believe the commissioners did either."

"But most of them went along in a sort of 'We'll try it once and see' attitude. Since then we've been able to do considerable good, besides putting quite a little money in the airport fund."

C. of C. President Urges Cooperation With Railroad

President James A. Jarboe, at the regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Chamber of Commerce, urged cooperation with the railroad here as one means of helping Rockport to grow.

He pointed out that there are many advantages to having a station here that we would lose if at any time they should reconsider their recent decision to allow it to remain.

There is a warehouse for undelivered freight. If this was not here, he pointed out, when the truck arrived found no one at home, freight would be carried back to Corpus Christi, frequently causing long delays.

Removal of the station would also rob the town of its Western Union and Railway Express service, including facilities for out-bound shipment of perishables by our commercial fish houses, hunters, fishermen and tourists.

Moreover, he said, possession of a station makes available much general railroad, express, and Western Union information not otherwise available for both tourists and residents of the city.

The railroad, said Jarboe, is the only transportation company with employees stationed here and the only and definitely the only one paying city, county and school taxes here.

For these reasons, the president said that he felt strongly that everyone in town be urged, where possible, to route incoming or out-bound shipments over the Southern Pacific.

The other directors concurred in his suggestions, and the Chamber of Commerce, as represented by the board, is solidly behind this.

Starting With Palm Sunday Special Services Celebrated All of Holy Week Climaxing With Sunrise Service at Waterfront On Easter Day

Starting with Palm Sunday, a number of local churches are observing Holy Week services.

At the First Methodist Church the morning service for Palm Sunday the anthem was "Send Out Your Light", directed by Mrs. E. F. Everett with C. D. McClure at the organ. Sunday night there was a layman's program with Jack Horton, principal of the High School, the speaker.

Holy Communion will mark the Maundy Thursday service from 6:30 to 9 p.m. Easter Sunday the anthem will be "Holy Art Thou".

Palm Sunday was observed with morning prayer at 9 o'clock read by Harry Carter, lay minister, for St. Peter's Episcopal Church. Samuel H. Frech, lay reader from the Church of the Good Shepherd will lead the meditation at 2 p.m. on Good Friday.

The Good Friday service at 7:30 will have a candlelight setting and the theme for the message will be "The Cost of Our Deliverance."

The anthem "Remember Jesus Christ" and a men's chorus composed of Jimmy Little, John Moseley, Travis Bailey, J. Allen Frye and Floyd Smith, singing "Tis Finished, The Saviour Cried" will be directed by Mrs. Norvell F. Jackson with Mrs. Frye at the organ. Holy Communion will be celebrated.

The Easter Sunday service will begin at 10:50. The subject of the message will be "The Resurrection" and the anthem will be "The Heavenly Alleluia" from Mozart, preceding the observance of communion.

The blessing and the procession of the palms was observed on Palm Sunday at Sacred Heart Catholic Church, with the Rev. Fr. G. J. O'Doherty officiating.

On Maundy Thursday at 8 p.m. the children's choir will sing the Mass and at 3 p.m. Good Friday, there will be the Adoration of the Cross. On Saturday the service will start at 10 p.m. and continue till midnight, with the children's choir again singing the Mass, directed by Sister Ludhema.

There will be only two masses on Easter Sunday, at 7 and 9 a.m.

Regrettable Death Occurs Saturday

A very regrettable death occurred here Saturday when Ronald LeBlanc, 18, of Morris, La., carried away by youthful boastfulness, died of alcoholic poisoning.

LeBlanc, in company with Virgil Thibodeaux and Irvin Benoit, also of Morris, and Thomas Pruitt of Beeville, were engaged in a talk fest at their cabin in a local tourist court. LeBlanc, who is reported to have been drinking earlier, made the statement that he could drink a bottle of vodka in a very short time, with no ill effects.

Upon the vodka being obtained, he drank a fifth in about a quarter of an hour, and became unconscious. Later, when Mervyn Jones and Alan Reed, of Rockport, dropped by for a visit, they noticed LeBlanc's condition, and insisted that a doctor be obtained.

Dr. L. G. Wood recommended that the unconscious boy be rushed to a hospital, and an ambulance was called, and carried him to Aransas Pass, where he was pronounced dead.

Analysis of his blood showed that it contained approximately 40 times enough alcohol to produce intoxication, and his death was supposed to have been caused by this fact.

Deputy Sheriff Sherman Munday, who investigated the occurrence, said that none of the other young men were to blame for LeBlanc's death.

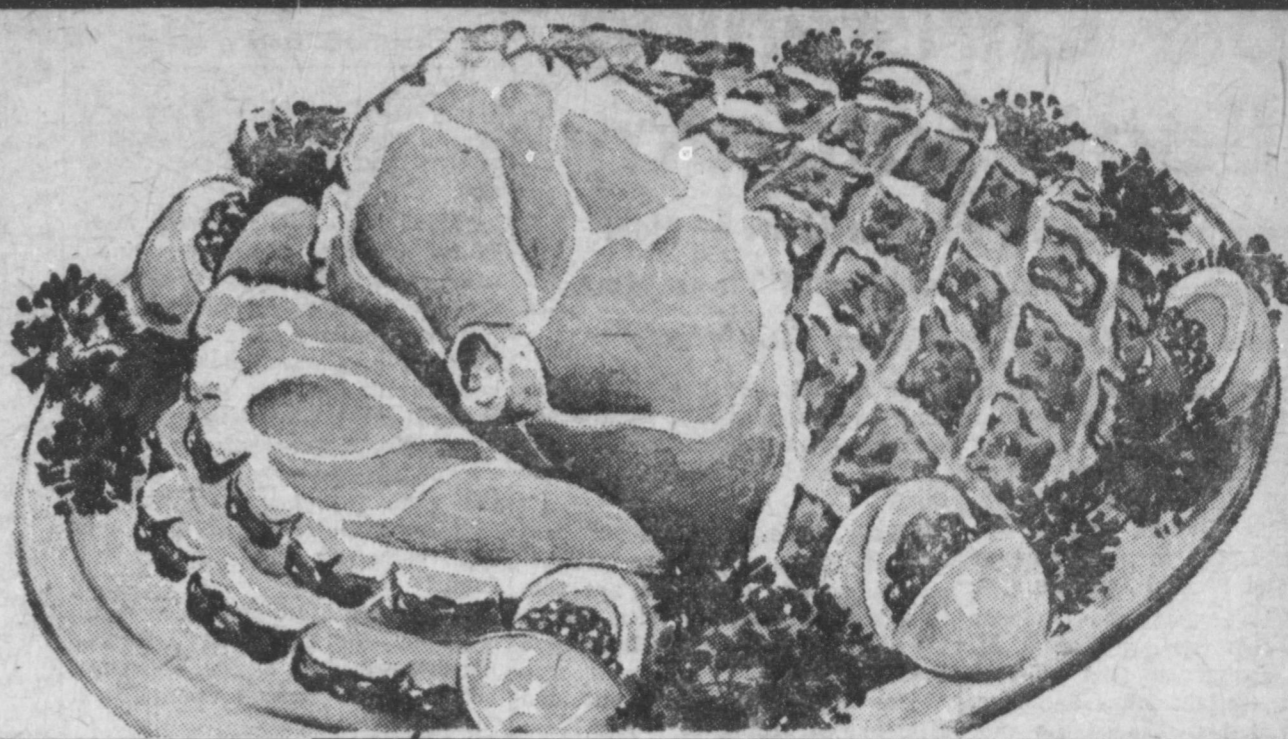

# Triple Christening of Boats Saturday

Casparly and Wendell Put Last Units of Fleet into Operation With Launching of Three New All-Steel Vessels at Port Arthur This Week

The first triple christening to be staged by a Gulf shipbuilder marked completion this week of one of the largest work boat orders ever placed with a Texas shipyard, as three new offshore drilling vessels were added to the fleet of Casparly and Wendell, of this city.

Mrs. Delo Casparly was sponsor of the 85-foot Swaps; Mrs. T. M. Casparly christened the 95-foot crew boat, Gallant Man; and Mrs. Jerry Wendell sponsored the 136-foot supply vessel, Belmont, in ceremonies at Burton Construction and Shipbuilding Company in Port Arthur.

The three boats were the last of a \$1.2 million order, one of the largest of its kind ever signed by a Texas firm, which called for two 136-foot supply vessels; two 95-foot, high speed crew boats; and two 85-foot combination crew and cargo boats, which will be used to supplement the four larger vessels.

This brings the Casparly and Wendell offshore fleet to seven, all-steel, ultra-modern vessels, operating in service of major offshore oil and drilling companies. In addition, the firm operates an-

other 95-foot crew boat, the Chevron, for Standard Oil. Four other company-owned boats service rigs in bay service along the Texas Coast.

"With these new vessels," said Delo H. Casparly, "we are instituting a package deal, and are able to offer complete service for a rig with a team of three boats and their crews."

The big tenders, Belmont and Hialeah, according to Jerry Wendell, the other partner in the firm, are of the type now used by a number of offshore drilling contractors.

The 95-footers, Gallant Man and Count Fleet, follow the design of another boat in the Casparly and Wendell fleet, the Whirlaway, which marked a new departure in crew boats when it was launched a little over a year ago.

"These boats and the Chevron, which we operate for Standard, are just alike," Wendell said, and are exceptionally fast and able, carrying drilling crews to their rigs in air-conditioned comfort, at 20 miles an hour."

The 85-footers, Swaps and Assault, are somewhat slower, as they have only a single pair of engines each, instead of the tandem GM diesels that power the other hulls.

"Our engine order for the six of them amounted to over a quarter of a million dollars," Casparly said, "and we purchased the 32 engines through the George Engine Service, of New Orleans, La.

All of the vessels are twin screw, and on the big boats four tandem diesels, developing 1200 h.p., give them a speed of about 14 miles an hour. On the 95-footers there are four tandems, but the power is translated into speed for crew comfort. The western Gulf of Mexico is rough, and we have done everything possible to stay at sea and do their work with a minimum of trouble."

brarian, says that \$700 for new books was one of the outcomes of that first race, held over a year ago.

"Hundreds of dollars badly needed for purchase of new equipment came from this and subsequent races," said Fire Chief Dick Fox. "The Timing Association needed ticket takers, and fellows to help keep order on the grounds, although the crowds are generally very orderly. We were glad to do it, and depending on the size of the gate, we earn from \$200 to \$300 every time. This all goes into out volunteer fire department fund."

And some of it goes elsewhere, too, but for that story, Dudley Bracht, president of the Rockport-Fulton Area Safety Council had to be contacted.

"We had some boys around town that had heavy feet on the accelerator," Dud says, "but formation of a local hot rod club, sponsored by members of the fire department, sure helped matters a lot. A couple or three of the worst ones didn't believe the rest of the boys meant what they said about safe driving, and were dropped. Then they had a heck of a time getting back in, and now they drive a lot more safely. It's not the boys around town that are so bad, now, it's some of these teenage girls. Maybe the club will let them apply for membership. I don't know. But the fire department has spent part of the money it has earned at the races on the local club, and has \$75 laid aside to help the boys get their charter with the national organization."

Malcolm Boquet, president of the Aransas County Youth Sponsors Association was enthusiastic, also, for Judge Wendell and the commissioners' court, adhering to a rule they laid down early, farm the concessions out to groups like the one that Boquet heads.

"Our youths," Boquet said, have long dreamed of the day when they could have their own recreation center, and some of them have worked hard at it. We had about \$1200 or \$1300 saved up, and the school board told us that we could have an old barracks building on the Rockport school grounds if we could move it to another location which they would allow us to use.

"The cost of moving and fixing the place up was around \$2100, and we just didn't see where we could raise the rest of the money. Then we got the concessions at the last two race and we have raised between \$700 and \$800. This is enough to carry out our original plan. But now some people think we ought to set our sights a little higher.

"There's one thing about it, another race or two with the teenagers in our group handling the concessions would furnish money for a lot of extras."

And there's another segment of Rockport that's pretty happy about the whole thing.

On the day that there's a drag race in town, local restaurants are crowded, and gas stations do a land office business.

## C. of C. Group Sets Sights On Water District

At a meeting of the Civic Affairs Committee of the Chamber of Commerce, Tuesday night, a number of projects were put forward as of paramount importance to the community, including paving, beach lighting, formation of a water district, separation of the sheriff's office from the tax collector's, and obtaining of more funds for Goose Island State Park.

Chairman of the committee Seth Steele also made a number of sub-committee appointments.

Paving of the Highway 35 Business Route was discussed thoroughly, and it was the opinion of the committee members that the Chamber of Commerce, through the committee, should go on record with the Highway Department as extremely concerned with the delay of this project.

Cecil Cole then presented to the committee a plan, made up by the CPL engineers, for lighting the beach at Rockport. This plan, more or less to specifications furnished by the committee, envisaged two different means of lighting the beach. With mercury vapor floods, set to lighten the waters off the beach, the cost was \$938, Cole said. With incandescents lights, he stated, the cost would be around \$800.

Chairman Steele asked what the cost would be of lighting the beach in the same manner as the rest of the harbor area, and was told that such lights cost around \$4.50 per month each for current, but that there would be no charge for poles and other equipment as has been included in the other estimates.

After some discussion, the committee settled upon three lights of this type for the beach, and Mrs. Mary Juergens was instructed to write a letter to the Aransas County Navigation District, asking if it would cooperate in such a project, as only the district could contract with CPL for such lights in that area.

M. W. Cochran and Chester Johnson recommended that the committee take as its main objective this year formation of a county-wide water supply district, patterned after the Lower Nueces Water Supply District or others like it serving other communities.

It was pointed out that, with the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off seemingly assured, it would throw open as plant sites a great deal of ground in lower Aransas County that was without an assured industrial water supply at this time.

Johnson said that such a district would be of great help also in solving the present problems of the Carbon Black plant south of town.

Cochran suggested that the Navigation District be investigated to

see whether it was the proper body to form such a water supply district, or, if it already had the needed powers.

James A. Jarboe, chamber president, said that the district did have such power, provided that it did not have to cross the area of another district to obtain water. However, he said, where this happened, it must give way to the other district, and he suggested that probably the only safe way to obtain such water without conflict would be to finance a pipeline to Calallen, and to draw water from the Wesley Seale Dam.

Judge John D. Wendell said that the district, or Aransas County, should certainly get its name in the pot as far as water from the Nueces watershed was concerned, before other cities in the area had been allotted all the water from the watershed.

Steele delegated Cochran as chairman of a sub-committee to investigate the possibility of forming such a water supply district.

Separation of the sheriff's office from that of the tax assessor was next discussed, and members of the committee were informed that Sheriff Shivers was much in favor of such a move, and either job, with the recent increases in population, was one that demanded one man's full time.

Judge John D. Wendell pointed out that the tax assessor's office was one of the most important in the county, and that such a change would probably cost the county very little.

On a motion from President Jarboe, the committee resolved to take upon itself the preparation of the necessary petition to the commissioners' court, asking that an election be called to determine whether or not this should be done. Upon Judge Wendell's recommendation, it was decided that this should probably be combined with the general election in November.

Seth Steele suggested that an effort be made to secure more funds for improvement of Goose Island State Park. This was heartily approved by all members of the committee. However, they also voted to contact the state park board, pointing out that the cattle guards which had been installed one the main roads leading to the park were traffic hazards, and to ask if something could not be done to remedy the situation, which was due to bad design.

### Farm Housing Program Expanded

An expanded farm housing program, designed to speed up farm building construction improvement as well as act as an additional anti-recession measure, was announced today by Walter T. McKay, Farmers Home Administration State Director.

Now an owner of a farm in agricultural production and on which the operator plans to produce at least \$400 worth of farm commodities for sale or home use may qualify for the 4 percent long-term housing loan provided that he meets other standard eligibility requirements.

Formerly an eligible applicant had to own a farm that produced a more substantial part of the operator's annual cash income.

Loans may be made to build, improve, or repair farm houses or other essential farm buildings, and to provide water for farmstead and household use. Mr. Conrad said that in addition to financing major construction, the loan funds can help meet many other needs for farm and farm home modernization such as adding bathrooms, utility rooms, better kitchens, and many other improvements to the home as well as to farm service buildings. While tenants and farm laborers are not eligible, the owner may borrow to do the construction work or make improvements for them.

The loans are made to farm owners who need credit to finance building improvements or repairs, but find that adequate credit is not available through banks or other regular credit channels. The interest rate is 4 percent and loans may be amortized over periods up to 33 years.

Eligibility for loan assistance is determined by the three-member County Farmers Home Administration committee, and applications are now being accepted in FHA county office 306 Katz Bldg., Corpus Christi, Texas.

The Church of Christ What It Teaches

Mat. 16: 13-20. "When Jesus came into the coasts of Cesarea Philippi. He asked His disciples, saying, Whom do men say that I, the Son of man, am? And they said, Some say that Thou art John the Baptist; some, Elias; and others, Jerimias, or one of the prophets. He saith unto them, But whom say ye that I am? And Simon Peter answered and said, Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God. And Jesus answered and said unto him, Blessed art thou, Simon Bar-jonah: for flesh and blood hath not revealed it unto thee, but my Father which is in heaven. And I say also unto thee, Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build My church; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give unto thee the keys of the kingdom of heaven: and whatsoever thou shalt bind on earth shall be bound in heaven. Then charged He His disciples that they should tell no man that He was Jesus the Christ."

Now we invite your attention to a brief study of the foregoing passage of Holy Scripture. Cesarea Philippi was perhaps the most northern point to which Jesus traveled during His personal ministry. His first question here asked the disciples reveals at least four of the popular views that men of that day held concerning Christ; but all of them were wrong. He was neither John the Baptist, Elias, Jerimias, nor one of the prophets. Men's views are quite often wrong; therefore, we should check them by the Bible. Then Jesus put the question directly to His disciples, "Whom say ye that I am?" Peter promptly replied, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God."

This is the great central truth of the Bible: the Old Testament points forward to it, while the New Testament points backward to it. Yes, Jesus is the Christ, the Messiah, that the prophets of the Old Testament had prophesied of for many centuries. There were at least 333 different prophecies concerning Him, and He literally fulfilled all of them.

Jesus blessed Peter for thus confessing Him, and He blesses every other man who will sincerely thus confess the Christ. Sweeter words never graced mortal lips. Then Jesus promised to build His church upon this great truth, the divinity of Christ, saying, "And I say also unto thee, Thou art Peter, and upon this rock I will build My church; and the gates of Hell shall not prevail against it."

The church of Christ then is founded upon the divinity of Christ. Furthermore, His church was not built prior to this time, but later; for Jesus said, "I will build My church"; and as all students of language know that "will build" is future tense. Jesus knew that He would die; but that would not prevent His building His church.

This He did after He ascended back to heaven, and it was established on the first Pentecost thereafter. 3,000 souls were added that day. And the Lord continues to add to the church such as should be saved. (Acts 2:47) My friends, did the Lord build the church of which you are a member? Why not check on this question before it is too late? You have a cordial invitation to attend the church of Christ Easter Sunday, April 13th, and every other Sunday in 1958.

### Corpus Christi Prepares For Buccaneer Days

Corpus Christi, Tex. — Pirates will invade Corpus Christi with great gusto on Buccaneer Days this year. There is a prize worth capturing to any hot blooded Buccaneer, Jayne Mansfield, the movie star who is one of the nation's best arguments against the sack look, will come from Hollywood to participate in the major events of the celebration.

The celebration opens Wednesday, April 9, and continues through April 13. Pirate ships will sail into the yacht basin April 10 for a night landing amidst fire-works and dancing in the streets. The first of the spectacles will be Night in Mexico, with entertainment and the coronation of a senorita chosen to wear a beauty crown.

Friday night, Miss Buccaneer Days will be chosen at the Beauty Pageant. Miss Mansfield will be a judge of South Texas beauty. The event has taken on significance as two of the three Miss Buccaneer Days who have entered state-wide competition have won the title, "Miss Texas."

The Pirates Dance, follows the Beauty Pageant, Jayne Mansfield and her husband, Mickey Hargitay, a celebrity in his own right as Mr. Universe, will be the honor guest of the dance.

Saturday morning, Jayne Mansfield will be seen in one of the celebrations most unusual features, the boat parade. Yachts, sailboats, and every type of small vessel will sail through the yacht basin, decorated with flags, bunting and paper mache figures and adorned with some of South Texas best real-life figures posed on the decks, plus Miss Mansfield.

Saturday night, the Illuminated Parade will stretch out for more than two miles as lighted floats and bands move along city streets. The parade circles Buccaneer stadium track before crossing the city to the bayfront. A stadium show will proceed the parade. One of the features of this will be a Mr. Buccaneer contest, with Miss Mansfield crowning the victor and Mickey Hargitay as judge.

The press of the Southwest will be special guest of Buccaneer Days and will be taken by bus to the stadium show and parade.

During all the hours of Buccaneer Days, a variety of events will take place over the city. The bayfront will be the continuing scene of boat races, both sailboats and powerboats, and water skiing competitions. Other activities will also be carried on along the water. Tennis, golf, archery, skeet shooting and handball tournaments will be among the sporting events. Other activities run the gauntlet from twirling to chess.

### New Communications System for CAA to Go Into Operation Here

With "push button" ease, pilots of aircraft over South Texas will soon be able to talk directly to the San Antonio Air Route Traffic Control Center, maintained by the CAA, as peripheral air-ground communication centers at Rockport, Kingsville, Laredo and Brownsville go into operation within the next thirty days.

Norman Cox, CAA man at Corpus Christi, says that the Kingsville station, which can handle four channels at once is the largest of the four. That at Rockport handles two stations, and the other two will handle between two and three each.

These stations, which are nearly complete, are part of 250 similar ones being installed by CAA to facilitate direct communications with aircraft while in flight, and enables the control center to talk directly to the pilots.

This will reduce the critical control lag now existing when messages from planes have to be relayed to control centers by other communication facilities.

CAA representatives have been concerned with this for a long time for, amazing as it seems, air space is limited, a fact pointed up by the terrible crash a year or so ago, when two airliners collided over the Grand Canyon.

The tremendous growth of both civil and military aviation has caused approaches over air terminals, and on routes throughout the country to become more and more scarce.

The new stations at Rockport and elsewhere through South Texas will do much to increase the capacity of the local airways, CAA officials point out, and to bring a more orderly flow of traffic in the vicinity of this city and of others in the area.

Like all such stations, these will be unmanned, but by a mere push button, the controller at San Antonio can talk to any pilot within a hundred miles of any such station, and may switch from one to the other with no interruption.

Operating on VHF and UHF, radio channels, the unit can send and receive messages at the same time, and these messages are relayed, where necessary, through some 103,000 miles of telephone wire from any one of the 250 stations to any control center within the immediate area.

To insure continuous, uninterrupted service throughout the year, and to care for the delicate electronic equipment, the stations are air-conditioned, although they have no personnel.
