Law Enforcement Plans Will Draw Rockport Residents

Plans for a five county law enforcement conference to be held at the Lone Star Park building in Aransas Pass on Saturday, May 10, have been completed, according to Judge W. B. Womack, of the Corporation Court.

The program will start at 2 p. m. with a call to order by Judge Womack, followed by a color ceremony, staged by the Aransas Pass VFW post.

The invocation will be by Rev. A. Arnott Ward, of the First Presbyterian Church in Rockport, and will be followed by an address of welcome by Aransas Pass Mayor Conn Brown. Judge John D. Wendell will make the response.

Introduction of guests will be by Fred P. Robbins, city manager of Aransas Pass.

Judge John Miller, of Sinton, of the 36th Judicial District, and Judge Joe Wade, Beeville, who presides over the 156th District Court, will have charge of the business sessions.

First on the agenda will be a talk by Richard Rudeloff, county attorney of Bee County, who will speak on examining trials and voluntary statements. Searches and seizures and arrests without warrants will be handled by William E. Nicholas, county judge of San Antonio, and this will be followed by a panel discussion on juvenile delinquency.

Members of the panel will be H. W. Herridon, superintendent of the Odem Independent School District; T. L. Bishop, Baptist layman, Aransas Pass; Dale Hasson, pastor of the First Methodist Church, Aransas Pass; and John Monroe, county judge of Bee County.

H. H. Albert, lie detector operator of the Texas Department of Public Safety office in Corpus Christi, will demonstrate his equipment.

Representative Harold Parrish will be present.

The meeting will end with a benediction by the Rev. Fr. Gregory Boesch, pastor of St. Mary's Star of the Sea, Aransas Pass, and the retiring of the colors.

A fish fry and shrimp boil for assembled guests is then scheduled at the VFW hall, just across the street.

Sponsoring organizations of the conference are the cities of Aransas Pass, Rockport, Gregory, Portland, Ingleside; the American Legion and VFW posts of Aransas Pass, the Aransas Pass Junior Chamber of Commerce; the First State Bank of Aransas Pass; the Texas Shrimp Association; and the Bar Association of the 36th and 156th Judicial Districts.

Esmeralda Rodriguez Top Speller In Aransas County Schools

Esmeralda Rodriguez, daughter of Mrs. Dora Rodriguez, of Rockport, will be one of 19 county spelling champions who will compete next Saturday in the Terrace Room of the Driscoll Hotel in Corpus Christi for a trip to Washington and the National Spelling Bee.

Esmeralda, a pupil in the 8th grade of the junior high school, won the right to compete in try-outs between local seventh and eighth grade pupils in the last week in April.

She and 18 other county champions will try their best to spell each other down in the Caller-Times Regional Spelling Bee. All 19 are top spellers in their respective counties.

They will be subject to spelling any word in the dictionary, many of which most grammar school students can't even pronounce, let alone spell.

The winner of this contest will receive a trip to Washington, where he (or she) will participate in the national spelling bee during the week of June 9-13.

Besides trying to win the grand prize of \$1,000, the students will be taken on tours of the capitol building and many other places in Washington.

In addition, the winner of the regional meet will receive a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica, a Paper-Mate pen desk set, a trophy and a plaque.

The runner up will get a \$20 cash award, and all who take part in it will be taken on a boat ride around the bay Saturday morning.

The winner's trip to the national capitol will be paid for by the Caller-Times.

Bicycle Inspection And Rodeo to Be Launched by Troop 49

Troop 49, Boy Scouts of America, cooperating with President Eisenhower in National Safety Good Turn Year, has set aside Saturday, May 17, as Bicycle Safety Day.

Sergeant H. E. Hale, of the Texas Highway Patrol, has promised to be present and help with various phases of the program, which is scheduled for the Chamber of Commerce site.

Bicycles will be checked for such things as brakes, handle bar grips, loose chains, wheels, rear reflectors, headlights and horns or bells.

Riders will be given a short written examination at the Chamber of Commerce building, and then will test their skill by going through an obstacle course.

After satisfactorily completing the inspection, examination and skill tests, bike owners will be entitled to receive a Junior Highway Patrol Safety Bicycle membership card.

All boys and girls are welcome, Scoutmaster Louis W. Tuer said, and he hopes that all the young people of the community that ride bicycles will take advantage of the opportunity to have their bicycles checked, to see if they are really safe to ride.

Tuer says that, according to the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, three out of every four youngsters between the ages of six and 15 ride some 20 million bikes on American streets and highways. One of these cyclists is injured every 19 minutes, day and night, and every 21 hours a cyclist is killed.

He urges all parents of bicycle riders to insist that their children take part in this newly initiated program, not only to make sure their bikes are safe, but also to help train them in safe riding habits.

A safe bike rider today, he says, is a safety conscious automobile driver tomorrow.

County Democratic Committee Meets Sets Filing Fees

The Aransas County Democratic Committee met Wednesday night, and, according to Chairman Emory M. Spencer, set the filing fees for local offices in the various precincts at 7% of that office's 1957 earnings, which is considerably lower than in the majority of counties in the Coastal Bend. May 17 is the last day to pay filing fees.

With the final deadline for filing past, the political picture is much as same it has been for some time past.

There are two candidates in the state representative race, Harold Parish and Sonny Wakefield; three are running for district attorney of the 36th Judicial District, Dick Hatch of Aransas Pass, Rocky Harkey and John H. Flinn, of Sinton.

John D. Wendell and Chester Johnson have filed for county judge.

Ed Barnard, Mrs. Robert L. Harrell, W. E. Beasley and Mrs. Thelma Ratisseau are running for district and county clerk.

Ettoil Eller is running for reelection as county treasurer; Jack Sparks and John H. Klaeser for commissioner of Precinct 2. J. H. Mills, running for re-election as commissioner of Precinct 4, is opposed by Elmo Brundrett. In Precinct 1 there are three candidates for Justice of the Peace, C. O. Bailey, Louis E. Grimm, and G. D. Johnson, and F. Iansen is unopposed on the ballot for Justice of the Peace in Precinct 3.

E. N. Adams of Lamar, is seeking the place of Precinct Chairman No. 4 on the Democratic Executive Committee; R. Y. Ayers, Jr., in Precinct 2; and E. T. White and R. D. Torres have filed for County Democratic Chairman.

Management of the new store will be under the direction of Bill Jones who promises the biggest and best grand opening sale that Rockport has ever had. Door prizes will be given and there will be a free gift for every child who attends the opening.

The formal opening date will be announced at a later date and the public will be informed from time to time on the progress of the new store.

Michael, who came here seven or eight years ago, to found the school, is a well-known figure along the coast of Texas, for he has art classes in many of the towns, including Victoria, Cuero, Rockport, Corpus Christi, Bay City, Lake Jackson, Freeport, and others of the coastal cities.

Summer art students are familiar here, also, for during the classes he conducts here, people come from as far away as California and Virginia to attend.

PLANS MADE FOR YOUTH RECREATION CENTER HERE

In a general called meeting Monday night at the Aransas County courthouse, the youth recreation sponsors and the Youth Council representatives of the high school met to discuss plans for a youth recreation center.

Representatives of the board of education of the Aransas County Independent School District were also present and offered to lease to the group lots on the high school campus and a vacant building on the grounds of the Rockport Elementary School for a youth center.

The youth recreation sponsors voted to sign a five-year lease, with the cost of moving the building, improvements, maintenance and insurance to be paid by them. Engineers Find Rock and Caliche Under Cove Site

Engineers from the firm of Lockwood, Andrews and Newman, of Corpus Christi, told the Navigation District Commissioners at their regular meeting, that sandstone, caliche and shell underlay the site chosen for the Cove Harbor south of town, but that these would probably add to the stability of the basin, once it was excavated.

Homer C. Innis, of the engineering firm, informed the commissioners that test borings had uncovered the fact that there was a lens of rock of considerable extent, about five feet under the surface. However, he stated, analysis had shown that it was so soft that it would present practically no difficulty from the dredging standpoint, although it would stiffen the walls of the harbor considerably.

Innis and Clem Williams of his office, presented the commissioners with sketches depicting a number of different layouts for the harbor, which the Navigation Board intends to complete as soon as the Intracoastal Cut-off goes through, and a bond issue can be voted to pay construction costs.

All of these harbors were surrounded by embankments offering storm protection in case of a blow, and they were so laid out that they gave a maximum of shelter and room, with a minimum of exposure from any direction.

After considerable discussion, Commissioners Picton, Owens, and Atwood, settled upon one layout as being the most feasible for this area, and told Innis to go ahead with further planning, and with cost estimates on the work necessary.

The Navigation Board intends to ask the Aransas County Commissioners' Court to call an election in June for issuance of bonds necessary to complete an industrial harbor at the Cove, and to do some work in the Little Bay area.

In other action, the board took under advisement a request of the Chamber of Commerce Tourist Promotion Committee to keep rest rooms open on the waterfront all year round. The board promised to take this matter under advisement.

Innis told the board that if federal appropriations became available any time soon, it was probable that work on the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off between here and Aransas Pass might start some time this year.







STATE DRAFT CALLS FOR 3,140 FOR PRE-INDUCTION PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS

Austin, Texas. — State draft boards are being asked to forward 3,140 men for pre-induction physical-mental examinations in June, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Friday.

At the same time, the 187 boards over the state are being requested to send 519 men in June for induction into the Army. State Selective Service headquarters is scheduled to mail the board quotas Friday.

The quota for examination in June drops from a figure of 4,247 in May. The induction figure of 119 compares with 677 for May.

Draft examination figures took a jump upward in April, when more than 4,000 men were ordered examined. From January through March, the calls for this purpose ran about 2,000 a month.

Quotas for examination in 1957 ran as high as 3,000 a month, but in the last quarter of 1957, only 42 men were examined.

The June induction call of 519 is the state's share of a national quota of 10,000 men, all for the Army. Most of those inducted will be 22 years old.

None younger can be called up unless they are volunteers, delinquents, or some who fail to participate satisfactorily as reservists or members of the National Guard.

MRS. JUERGENS REPORTS ON RETAIL MERCHANTS MEETING IN BROWNSVILLE

A study of ways to reduce state expenditures to meet a state government deficit rather than seek additional revenue by imposing new taxes has been recommended by the Retail Merchants Association of Texas as the best solution to the state's money ills, Mrs. Mary Juergens, manager of the Retail Merchants Association said today.

She said RMA members at its recent convention in Brownsville voted to request the Texas State Tax Study Commission and the Texas Research League to study ways of achieving economy in the state government.

The RMA is recommending to the two groups and the governor that such a study include possible consolidations of departments and agencies, the elimination of useless and unnecessary services and a closer scrutiny of all state expenses, Mrs. Juergens said. The RMA has noted that the two groups studying the money problems have been devoting most of their attention on hearing arguments pro and con on various types of new taxes that might be imposed, including sales tax, income tax and gross receipts taxes, she said.

"It is the opinion of RMA members that the tax load on consumers and businessmen alike are already excessive, and what is needed now more than anything else is a reduction in taxes that will increase the purchasing power of families and thereby stimulate our economy," Mrs. Juergens said.

The RMA has voted to support corrective legislation that would reduce the cost and expedite the collection of small claims and debts.

Small claims courts can take action only on cases involving \$50 or less, except wage and salary claims where the amount is \$100. The RMA will ask that the amount be made \$100 for all actions.

The RMA is also interested in having the jurisdiction of justice

courts raised to cases involving \$500. The present maximum is \$200. These changes are needed because the value of the dollar has greatly decreased since the limitations were set because litigation in higher courts is too expensive and requires an excessive amount of time. Corrective legislation involving mechanic lien laws and bonding of public construction work also has the endorsement of the RMA she said. The present lien laws and bonding laws on public works are ineffective to enable material furnishers to recover just debts, Mrs. Juergens said. The RMA is joining with the Texas Statewide Group of the National Association of Credit Men in seeking to make the laws in these two fields effective and adequate.
