This basin will not be bulkheaded he said, but it will be protected by a levee of medium height against storm damage.

"Recent soil borings have shown sandstone, shell and caliche underlying the area," he said, "and this will permit us to dredge with a steeper slope than in sand or silt, and it will also mean the sides of the basin should stand up well without bulkheading.







#### ROCKPORT VISITOR IS AUTHOR OF BOOK ON EXODUS

J. Bunyan Blackwell, brother of a former owner of The Pilot, whose past feats have included cowpunching, teaching, hunting, mail carrying and preaching is now an author.

And while there are thousands of people around San Antonio who know J. Bunyan Blackwell, there are many more thousands through the prickly pear country that know his last name only. M/Sgt. Gerald B. Stockton Master Sergeant Gerald B. Stockton was born at Liberty Hill, Texas, and graduated from high school there in 1928. He later attended Southwestern University and the University of Texas. He was employed in his father's drug the Armed Forces.

Sergeant Stockton's first experience with the air arm was in March, 1934, when he first enlisted in the old Army Air Corps. He was assigned to Randolph Air Force Base near San Antonio where he received six weeks of basic training. This was followed by a nine-month course in airplane and engine mechanics at Chanute Air Force Base, Illinois.

The Air Corps was still in its infancy in those days and the sergeant worked on the "line" maintaining such old ships as PT-3's, PT-3A's and PT-11D's, old hand crank jobs, which were used at the time as primary trainers for aviation cadets. Beside the present day Air Force super sonic jets and super-charged propeller driven air-craft, those old "crates" would seem like museum pieces.

At this point, the build up in Armed Forces strength was terrific, and on Jan. 31, 1942, the sergeant and his unit were moved en masse to Australia where they participated in the early engagements of the Southwest Pacific. > In November of 1942, Sergeant Stockton was moved, as the fighting in the Pacific progressed in favor of the Allies, to New Guinea, where he stayed with his urit until early 1944 when he was returned to the United States for a special assignment to Combat Crew Training at Sioux City, Iowa. Later in 1944 he was returned to he combat area in New Guinea, where he remained until VE Day. Immediately after VE Day, he was rotated to the United States.


Guardian of Man's Right to Self-Rule

Historic and architecturally beautiful Castroville, 20 miles from San Antonio on the Medina River, is an endering monument to a great and wise man who had unbounded faith in the capacity of intelligent men for self government. And he chose Texas as the country in which to prove his faith. Henri Castro, Parisian banker, scholar and humanist, learned about Texas when he aided the young Republic to obtain a French loan in 1840. What he learned fired his idealism and determination to help his fellow men in independence of thought and action. So, backing his concept of freecom with his own great personal fortune, he contracted to bring a colony from Alsace to settle in the new counery. Although war with Mexico made Texas ports unsafe, Castro successfully landed 27 ship oad, of Rhenish-French immigrants from 1844 to 1847. In that time he had settled 405 families and

457 single men in the peaceful, pleasant villages of Castroville, Quihi, Vandenburg and D'Hanis. There he expended more than \$200,000 to equip his colonists for a successful agriculture economy, and planned with them for progress in trade and industry.




