Contracts have been signed on practically all teachers needed for the Aransas County school system, according to Dr. H. F. Elliot, president of the school board.

"Of course there are a few who are leaving for various reasons," Dr. Elliot said. "Miss Rose Mary Walthall, Mrs. Diane Schuster, Miss Norma Jarboe, and Mrs. Martha Ballou (nee Slavinka) have already told us that they would not teach in the local system next year, and three others have not returned their contracts, but outside of that we're in pretty good shape.

"As you know, J. D. Gray, of Pearlland, will replace Pat Greene, who is retiring, and A. B. Lefevre comes to us from the Pharr-San Juan-Alamo Independent School District to replace Jack Horton, retiring principal of the high school; and Chester Barre has been made principal of the junior high school for the coming year.

"We have had applications for the positions of elementary school music teacher, and high school language teachers, as well as for the few elementary positions we still have open, and are in fine shape, as far as the faculty for the coming year is concerned."

Curb and Gutter Negotiations Now Underway On Route

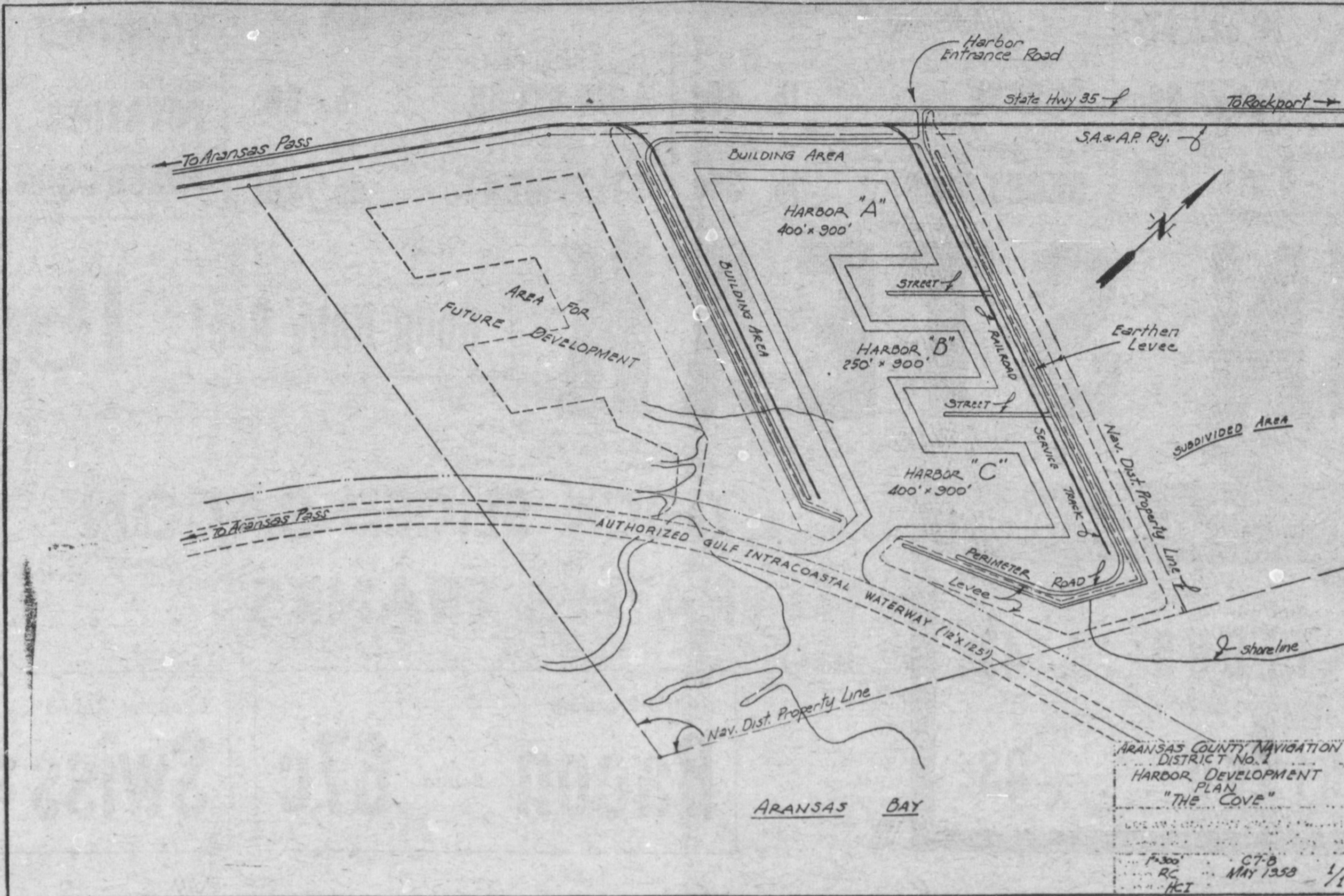
Negotiations for right of way needed for the widening and paving of the Highway 35 Business Route through Rockport are proceeding nicely, according to Martin C. Haskett, law partner of City Attorney Dick Hatch, who is handling the interviewing of property owners along the route.

He has seen practically everyone along the part of Austin Street which will be curbed and guttered; property owners along Market Street from the corner of Market and Austin to the corner of Market and Church, and a few of those along Church Street.

In general, those people with property along the route have been very receptive, Haskett said, only one or two interposing any objections to the project.

Navigation District Harbor Development Plans for "The Cove"



The plan indicates the location of harbor development improvements south from Rockport, at "The Cove." It will be noted that the proposed harbor is to consist of a series of rectangular dredged areas to provide earthen fingers for building development purposes. Each finger will be served with a paved street constructed so as to service the rear of each building lot. Each lot will front on the

harbor. Provision is made for railroad service by dedicating sufficient areas for present and future construction of railroad service tracts. Also, all of the building areas surrounding the harbor will be serviced by a paved street.

Provision will be made for utilities such as water, gas and electricity. The gas and electricity will be provided by public or private utilities companies in a dedicated right-of-way on district property.

The area shown for future de-

velopment composes approximately one-half of the Navigation District property acquired for the harbor development purposes. Provision will be made for a separate future access channel to the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway similar to that shown for the original harbor development. In the future, protective earthen levees can be constructed around the area for future development in a similar manner to that planned for the original harbor

Excellent transportation facilities are foreseen since the harbor is situated alongside the Intracoastal Waterway, the S.A. & A.P. Railroad and State Highway 35. "The Cove" is located approximately three miles south of Rockport. To the north is a subdivided area, and on the east is Aransas Bay.

The district commissioners have approved this layout as their long-range plan of development at "The Cove." It is not intended to con-

struct the complete harbor shown on the north one-half of the district property. Preliminary estimates of construction cost indicate that on the order of 65% of the proceeds of the bond issue will be spent to construct portion "A" and parts of portion "B". Final engineering planning is underway, and the exact area to be developed under the first phase plan is dependent on construction costs now being developed by the consulting engineers of the district.

Fulton Lumber Changes Hands

Ownership of the Fulton Lumber Company changed hands here this past week, with Seth H. Steele and Randal G. Stivers taking over from J. W. Wilkinson, who has operated it for the past 10 years.

As soon as the necessary articles of incorporation can be drawn, the word incorporated will be added to the title.

Steele, who came here in 1950, is a past president of the Chamber of Commerce, the Rockport Lions, and a member of the First Methodist Church, and has been engaged in the contracting and real estate business since he came here.

He now is engaged in constructing the new Rooter Drug Store for Arthur Bracht, having just finished face-lifting of the one owned by Joe Johnson.

Stivers moved to Rockport in 1955, and has been in the contracting and real estate business ever since. He is a director and treasurer of the Chamber of Commerce, and a member of the Bishop's committee in St. Peter's Episcopal Church.

Wilkinson and his family, well-known through their long stay here, have moved to Navasota, where he has opened a novelty shop.

BALL PARK NEAR COMPLETION

Riparian Rights Clarified By Attorney General

Owners of beach property along the water's edge own only to the water's edge, the School Land Board warned Tuesday and land created by filling or dumping toward the sea is public and not private.

Attorney General Will Wilson said at the meeting in which the matter was discussed that residents constructing such fills could lose their beach frontage in attempts to increase the land area by filling on the seaward side of their property, no matter whether they owned riparian rights or not. Such rights do not give anyone the right to make such fills he said.

Land built up beyond the water line belongs to the state, he said. Riparian rights do not give full rights, the attorney general said, and submerged lands belong to the state. Private property stops at the water's edge, and the only legal expansion possible is for the land to be built up by natural causes.

In view of the confusion prevailing along the coast as to what the rights of waterfront owners are, the ruling by the attorney general is of great interest in this area, where some landowners have filled in front of their property.

Those who do so, the attorney general said, run the risk of being cut off from the beach, as state ownership will continue to extend to the normal waterline.

Housing Project Bids To Be Opened

Bids on a 27-unit housing development at Aransas County Airport, to house members of the 813th AC&W Squadron, will be opened on June 12, at Richard-Gebar Air Base, near Kansas City, according to Captain Bert W. Smith, commanding officer here.

There will be one four-bedroom home, according to the specifications, and 26 having three bedrooms each. Cost of each unit is supposed to run around \$15,000.

Allowing approximately two months from the time bids are opened until the contract for the buildings is let, construction on these units should start sometime late this year, and the specifications call for completion within six months after the letting of the contract.

Two more additions to the station's personnel occurred this week, with transfer of Staff Sergeant Cornelius Scoffler here from Thule Air Force Base, in Greenland; and of Staff Sergeant Bruce R. McMahan, from Keesler Air Force Base, near Biloxi, Miss.

Scoffler is a diesel maintenance man, who will be in charge of the local station's power plant. McMahan, formerly a personnel man in the Air Force, has just finished re-training at Keesler Air Force radar maintenance school.

Both men are married and the McMahans have two children.

In addition to the opening of bids on the housing project, the Air Defense Command has re-advertised for bids on erosion control at the squadron headquarters at Aransas County Airport, and for construction of sidewalks, as the first bids made on both projects were rejected as too high.

Personnel at the site under 25 have been participating in driver's improvement courses being given by personnel from the State Highway Department and from Foster Field.

Highway Sergeant Hale, from Corpus Christi, showed films and talked on safety, as did Mr. Kranoz, director of safety at Foster, and a representative of Foster's police section.

Baccalaureate, Commencement Speakers Chosen

Baccalaureate and commencement speakers have been chosen for the graduating exercises at Aransas County High School, and dates for these two events and for the eighth grade graduation exercises have been set, according to Pat H. Greene, retiring superintendent of the Aransas County School District.

Eighth grade graduation will be held in the high school auditorium on Monday, May 26 at 8:30 a. m. The baccalaureate sermon will be preached by the Rev. Asa F. Avant, pastor of the First Methodist Church, on Sunday night, May 25, at 8 p. m. The commencement address will be delivered on Monday evening at 8, in the high school auditorium, by C. O. Chandler, superintendent of the Victoria Public Schools.

Chandler, who has taught or administered Texas schools for 28 years, is a member of the Planning Committee of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce; a member of the Planning Committee of the City of Victoria; a past president and member of the Rotary Club; and a member of the Optimist's Club of that city.

Chandler's teaching career began in 1928 at Corrigan, Texas. He was a high school principal at the mature age of 19 years old, and he also coached athletics.

After a couple of years, he was elected superintendent of the Moscow school system, six miles south of Corrigan, and he stayed there for nine years, during the summer attending school at Sam Houston State Teachers College to work towards securing a degree.

When school was going on, Chandler taught, coached, and sponsored school activities. While there, he says, he was exposed to his first building campaign, when the system passed a bond issue of \$250,000 to build a combination elementary and junior high school.

After nine years at Moscow he resigned to become superintendent of schools at Chester, Texas.

Chandler left teaching for a period, and was in the employ of the Humble Oil Company, but after 14 months, he says, he realized that his only happiness was in teaching, and went to Katy, Texas, as superintendent.

From there he went to Orange as an elementary principal and stayed there for the next 10 years. He has been superintendent of schools at Victoria since 1955.

Johnson Asks Funds For Area

Sen. Lyndon Johnson Monday urged a Senate appropriations subcommittee to approve \$2,580,000 in construction funds for two projects on the Intracoastal Canal in the Coastal Bend.

He asked that a budget recommendation of \$1.4 million for realigning the canal for the Rockport-Aransas Pass cut-off be boosted by \$90,000, and asked \$1,150,000 for work on the channel from the canal up the Guadalupe River to near Victoria. The Budget Bureau recommended \$1 million for this.

FULTON WATER DISTRICT PETITIONS SENT OUT LAST WEEK

Petitions were mailed this past week to the State Board of Water Engineers, Austin, bearing the signatures of 67 Fulton property owners requesting them to check into the proposed Water Control and Improvement District, and to conduct a public hearing on such an improvement in the Fulton area.

This Water Control and Improvement District would include the area north from Nine-Mile Point at Copano Bay to Frndog Island on the south and to the old railroad grade on the west.

M. W. Cochran, chairman of the committee for the consideration of these improvements, has asked for a hearing on this proposition within the next 30 days.

The proposed Water Control and Improvement District has been a project of the Fulton Lions Club for almost a year and a mass meeting of the citizens of Fulton was held recently, resulting in the circulation of a petition for such a district.

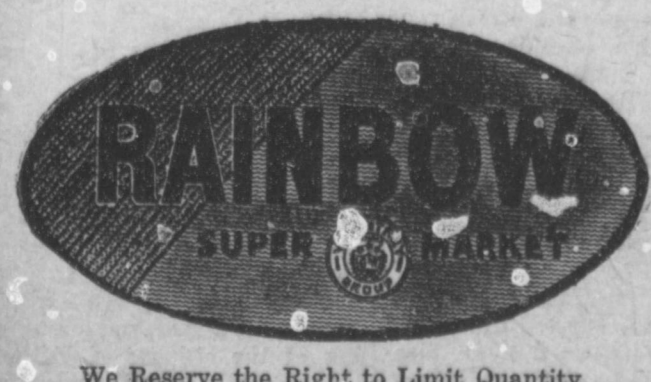

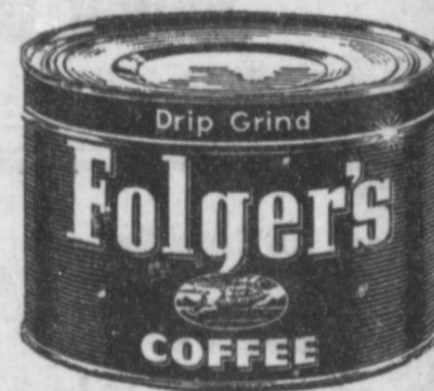

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SUGGESTIONS FOR GETTING RID OF BOATING'S OLDEST PROBLEM—THE SEA GULL

Few chores are more discouraging than the prospect of cleaning off a boat after it has served as a resort area for several hundred sea gull families.

After extensive investigation of this sea gull problem, Popular Boating magazine has come up in the current (May) issue with a number of tongue-in-cheek suggestions for ridding yourself of the critters. Here are a few:

1. Rig your boat with a phonograph and speaker system. Loud and unfriendly recorded voices can then be used to scare off the birds. The voices can shout rude epithets like "Take off!" "Scram!" and "Your father is a chicken!"
 2. Put your laundry to work. Cover your boat with flapping laundry and streamers. Not only you but your boat may end up cleaner.
 3. Stuffed owls sometimes work on buildings in driving off unwanted birds. Why not try them on your boat. However, a word of warning. A Massachusetts boatman recently tried this ploy, only to return the next morning and find 35 friendly owls pacing the deck.
 4. Give them the electric chair treatment. Cover your boat with electric wiring. The first gull who lands will get a painful shock. As he squawks and hops about on one foot, stick your head through the cabin door and shout, "Last one in the water is a rotten egg!" No seagull wants to be a rotten egg.
 5. Use dynamite, acid, poison gas! The boat may be completely worthless after this treatment, but at least you will have shown those gulls who is boss.
 6. Put up a "For Sale" sign. This will solve the problem for the owner if not for the boat. The skipper might then consider making a down payment on a surplus submarine.
- While some of these suggestions can be classified under the "last resort" category, says Popular Boating, "they were nevertheless formulated by boatmen who have spent long hours watching gulls on their own boats at anchor."

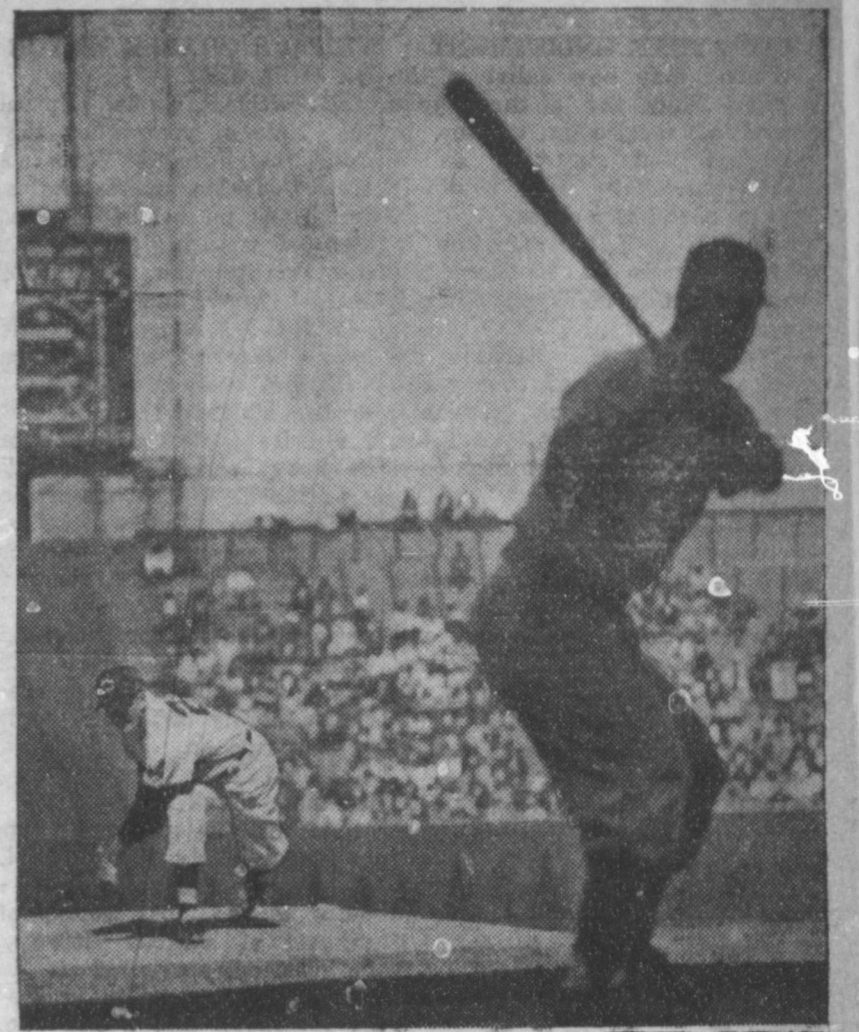

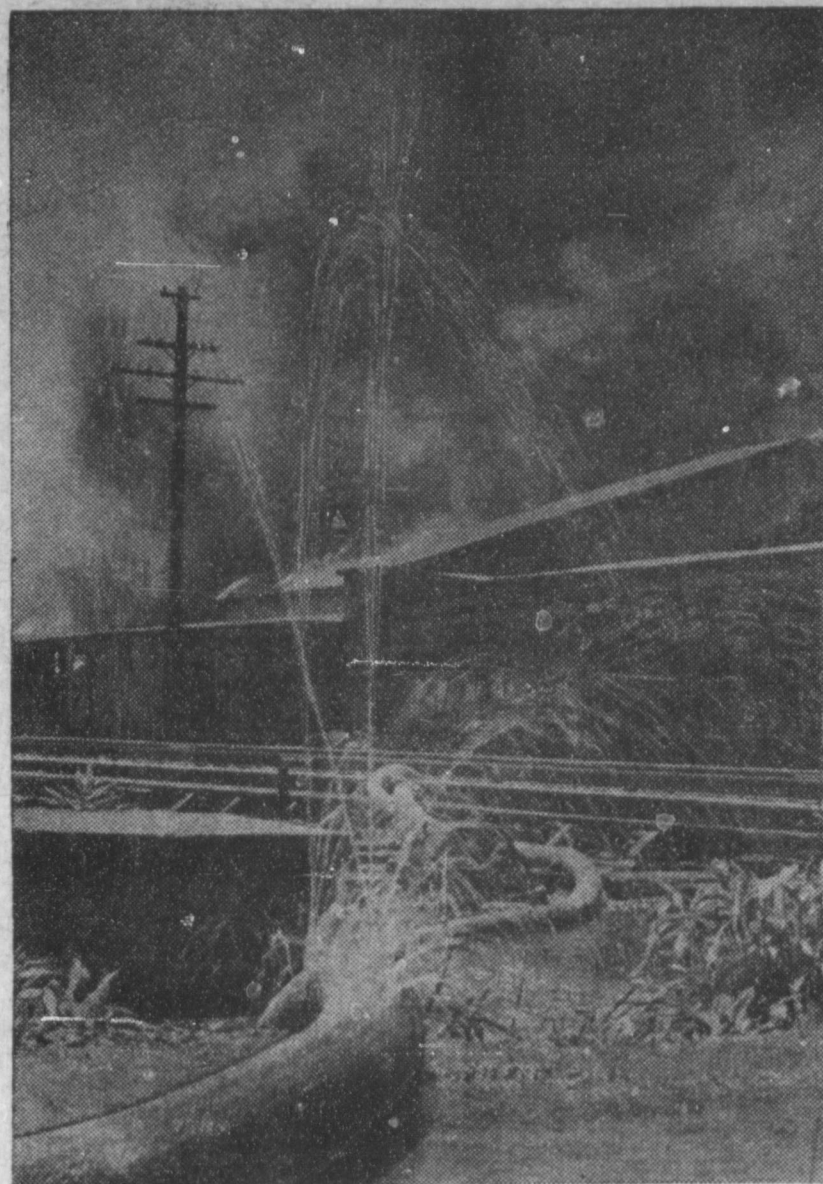

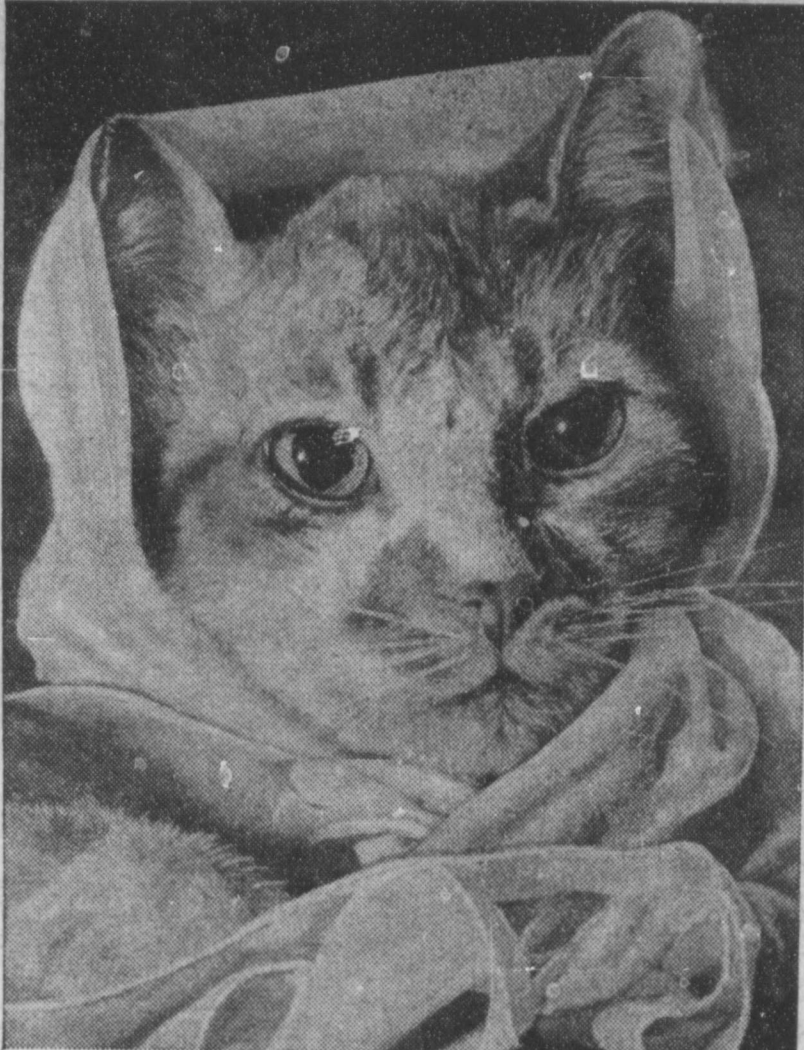
LASSITER'S CLEANERS GETS FACE LIFTING

The gals win and lose, but which ever way the cookie crumbles they keep coming back for more.

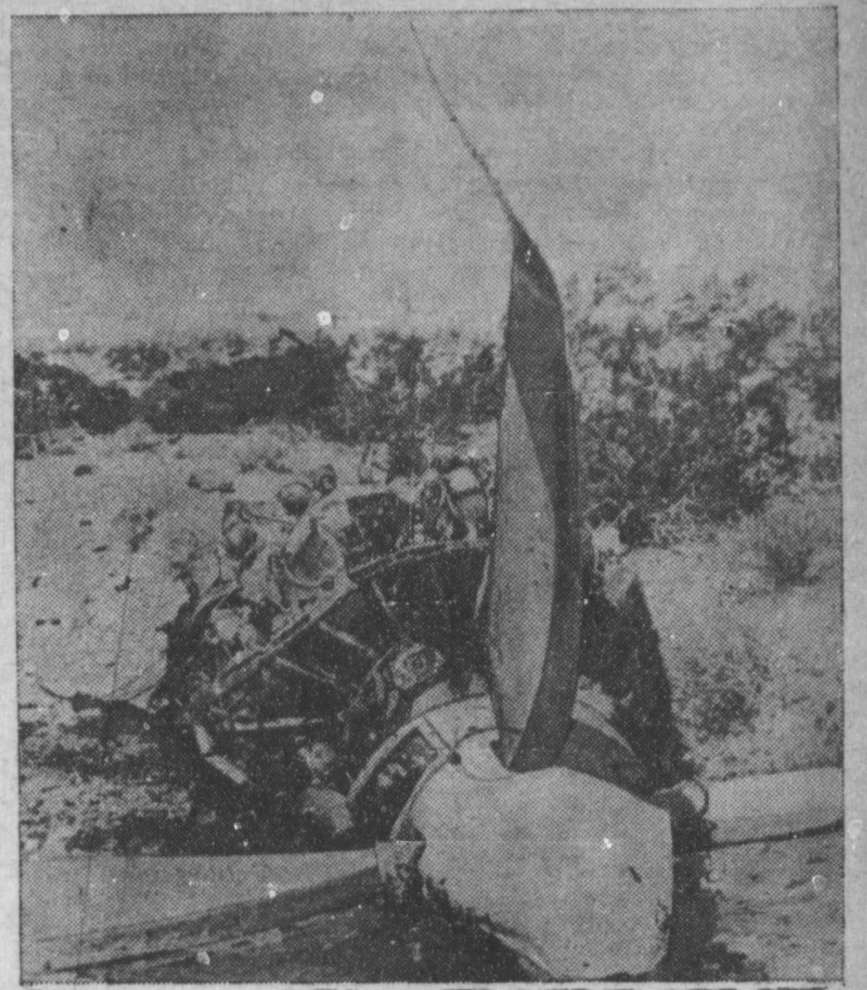

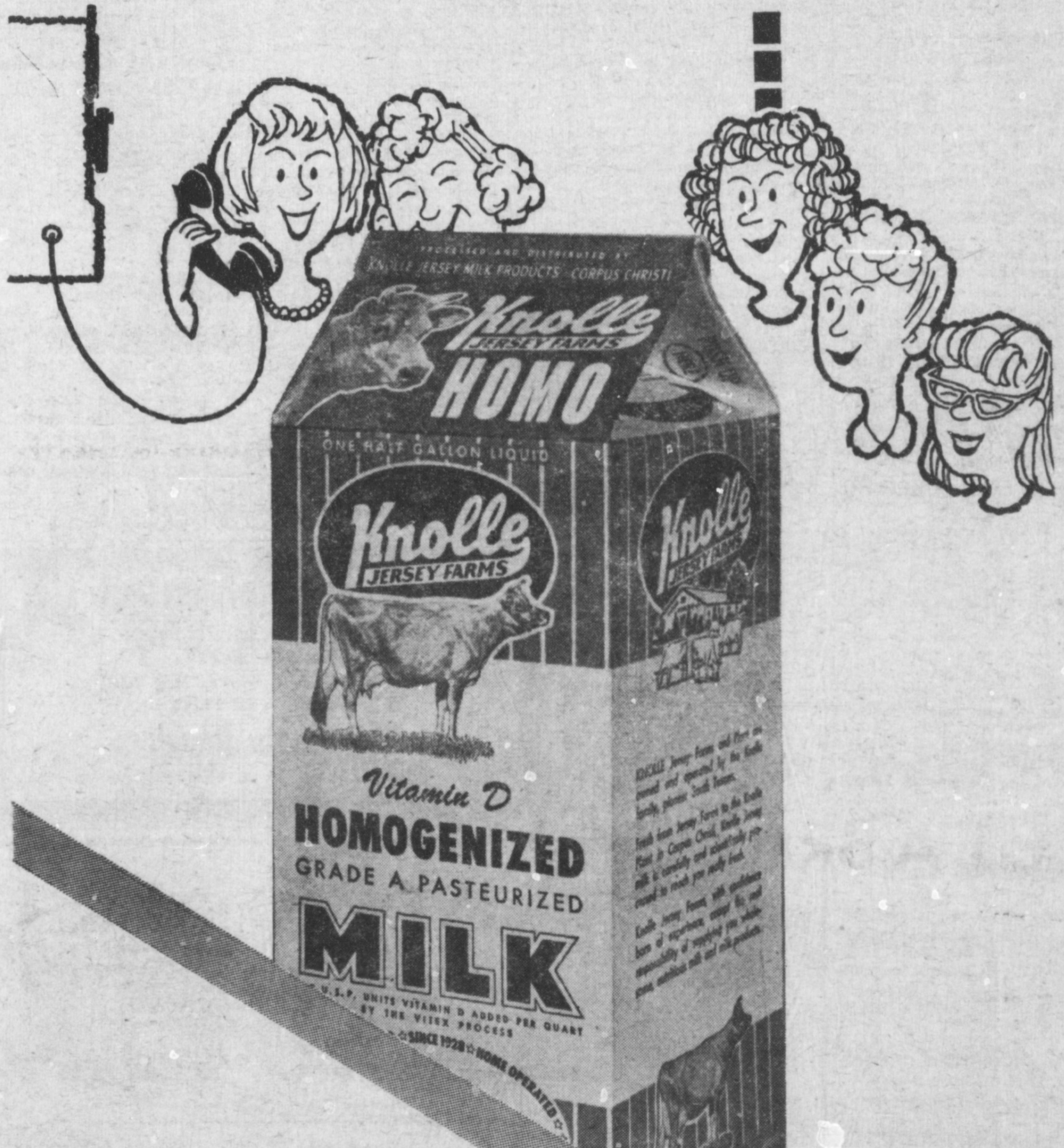

Shrimp Landings

Shrimp landings on the Texas coast continue to drop, and latest figures released by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service show that only 1,404,000 pounds of tails were landed in February, compared to 1,779,000 the month before.

Brownsville continues to lead the rest of the coast, bringing in 634,000 pounds, against 793,000 in January. Port Isabel was second, as it was in January, but showed a drop of 90,000 pounds in February, total production being less than 400,000 pounds.

The Aransas Pass-Corpus Christi area was third again, with 261,000 pounds compared to 315,000 pounds in January. Rockport was up a thousand to 66,000 pounds; but Freeport dropped from 10,300 in January to only 4,300 pounds in February. Port Lavaca and Palacios dropped 10,000 pounds, and only reported half that much as being landed. Another 5,000 pound catch was turned in by Galveston, and there were no shrimp landed at Sabine Pass and Port Arthur.

Galveston produced 950 barrels of oysters in February; Sabine Pass and Port Arthur turned in 608 barrels, but all three ports were way below their production of a year ago. Rockport, despite the fact that more oysters have been produced here than in many years, has nothing to show on the report.

The Sabine Pass - Port Arthur area reported 2,000 pounds of freshwater fish landed during February, and 17,000 pounds from salt water, which is a marked rise over the preceding month. However, as a whole, the finfish catch dropped off about 5,000 pounds. Galveston and Freeport reported 85,000 pounds against 59,000 in January. Port Lavaca and Palacios dropped from 32,000 in January to 16,000 in February. Aransas Pass, Corpus Christi and Rockport had a combined total in February of only 18,000 pounds, compared with 33,000 the month before; Port Isabel dropped to 9,000 from almost twice that much landed in January.
