Yacht & Supply Building Program Making Headway

The foundation is being laid for a 110 by 100 foot reinforced concrete slab, all steel structure at the Rockport Yacht and Supply Co., Inc., which will give an additional 200 feet of covered repair trackage for inside repair work, a new office, stock room and show room.

This new structure, to face on the street to the side of the new First National Bank building, will have adequate parking facilities.

The company is owned and operated by the T. Noah Smith Estate and T. Noah Smith, Jr., president.

It has a 250 foot frontage on the harbor and includes a hydraulic boat lift, capable of lifting 100 tons. It maintains 7 boat stalls, five for accommodating boats 40-60 feet and two for boats up to 100 feet.

In addition to the regular repair facilities a general line of marine products and marine hardware will be stocked.

H. H. Dick is the contractor in charge of construction.

Scouters Hear Camp Copano Report

The Executive Board of the Whooping Crane Girl Scout Council met in regular session Monday in Sinton, with Lincoln Borglum, president, presiding.

An extensive report from the camp development chairman, Chester Johnson of Rockport, showed that Camp Copano is in excellent condition for the camping season which will begin June 8.

Concrete block gate posts have been constructed for the entrance to the camp, painted in Girl Scout colors. Girl Scout insignia will be of ornamental iron work and a lock chain between the two posts will protect the camp from unauthorized traffic.

Mr. Borglum, noted sculptor, is going to model figures of whooping cranes to perch atop these gate posts.

A walk-in refrigerator has been completed. Extensive mowing and brush clearing has been done; the lake level has been lowered and mosquito fogging machines ready for use.

The entire swimming area on the water front will be roped off by the water front director and counselors prior to the opening of the camp, and every square foot of the bottom will be examined for debris. Nets will be erected to protect the area from jelly fish and other water pests.

The entire area to be used for swimming is of safe depth, and all swimming at all times will be under the supervision of at least two qualified life savers.

Phone Rates Reduced In Fulton Area

Rockport and the neighboring Fulton area will be affected by adjustments in some telephone service charges which will be effective June 11, according to an announcement today by Jaek Valentine, manager for Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

The principal changes will be the establishment of a ten cent charge for local calls on pay telephones and a reduction in mileage charges for more than 100 customers in and near Fulton who pay mileage for Rockport telephone service. No change applies to rural eight party service.

According to Valentine, a large number of Fulton customers have rural eight party service. The manager said ample lines are available in the area to change these to city service if the customer desires.

Along with the ten cent pay phone charge, the manager announced that the charges for miscellaneous items of telephone equipment in Rockport will also be adjusted, in keeping with the higher costs of providing these services, the manager said. Less than 20 Rockport telephone users will be affected by this change.

Valentine said the rate changes will appear on telephones bills which are dated June 11, for the month following. For most telephone users at Fulton the reduction in mileage charges will result in an appreciable saving on the monthly telephone bill.

The manager said the nickel raise on pay telephone calls was inevitable. "We have delayed placing the higher charge in effect just as long as possible," Valentine declared. "Now, the higher costs of providing this service leaves us no choice."

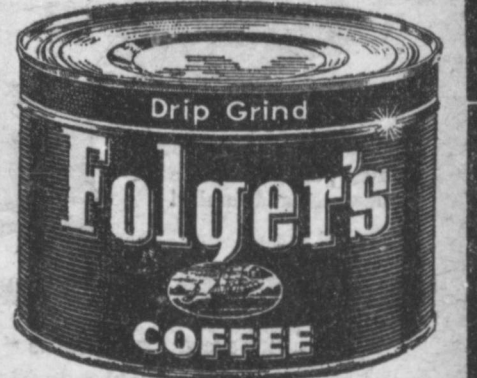

Work Is Completed On Artificial Snapper Bank

The first artificial snapper bank constructed off Texas — an experiment promising great results — was completed Tuesday afternoon.

The bank, setting precedent in the western Gulf, is located in an area approximately 6 1/2 miles southeast of Port Aransas.

Stanley Smith, president of the Smith Brothers Dredging Co. of Port Lavaca, reported that two yellow buoys and two flags were left to mark off the area for fishermen.

"The buoys and flags should stay there about a week or two," said Smith, whose firm was low bidder at \$7,000 on the contract offered by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Smith said he laughed at the project at first and felt it wouldn't be a paying proposition, but "quickly changed his mind."

The firm's barges moved onto the site last Saturday afternoon and the actual dumping of 200 junked car bodies began the following morning.

"The water looked like it was alive with ling," Smith said enthusiastically. "I'm sure we could have picked up 1,000 or 2,000 pounds of ling out there Sunday."

The cars, cabled together in

groups of fives, were dumped in approximately 60 feet of water, and the man-made bank rises some 12 feet from the bottom.

Smith explained the cars were tied together in this fashion to make certain that upon hitting the bottom enough would stick above the mud to give shelter for small fish.

Large game fish will hang around the bank attempting to feed off the smaller ones when they leave the shelter.

"Fishing should be good at the site for king and ling almost immediately," Smith predicted, "and within six weeks it should be good for snapper."

The worst problem confronted in building the bank, according to Smith, was the gathering and hauling of cars to the special site. Junked bodies were obtained from Port Lavaca, Victoria, Beeville and Aransas Pass.

Rough water in working off small equipment also made the work somewhat dangerous.

Artificial banks were built off Florida and Alabama with great success, and Texas officials and fishermen will watch the progress of their pet project with great interest.

AN ORDINANCE

AN ORDINANCE ADDING AN EXCEPTION TO SECTION 3 OF THE FIRE ZONE BUILDING CODE ORDINANCE PASSED AND APPROVED THE 13th DAY OF MAY, 1957.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF ROCKPORT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. There shall be added to section 3 of the Fire Zone Building Code Ordinance passed and approved the 13th day of May, 1957, an exception reading as follows:

"Parapets shall not be required on the following walls: When the roof construction is entirely incombustible and the wall on which the parapet is not required faces a street and such wall is at least 100 feet from the property line across such street."

SECTION 2. All other provisions in such Ordinance shall remain in full force and effect.

DRAFT QUOTA CALLS FOR 538 TEXANS IN JULY

Austin, Tex. — The state quota for Texas draft boards in July calls for 538 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, said Thursday.

The state's July call of 538 compares with a quota of 519 for June, previously announced. The July call is the state's share of a national call of 10,000 men, all for the Army.

The state director of Selective Service also announced that approximately 1,700 men were scheduled to take pre-induction mental and physical examinations in July.

Local board quotas for the July induction and pre-induction examinations are scheduled to be mailed by state Selective Service headquarters on June 2.

The July quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on July 1, with exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

Some reservists and National Guardsmen also may be called up if they fail to participate satisfactorily in their units.
