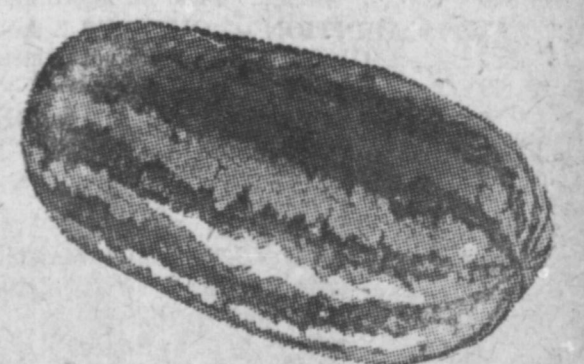

SAN ANTONIO PLANS TEXAS TALL TOWER

Thousands of TV fans in South and Southwest Texas will receive vastly improved television service when a giant new tower, to be used exclusively by San Antonio stations WOAI-TV and KENS-TV, goes into operation this fall. It is estimated that the area covered by the two stations will be almost doubled -- to approximately 18,900 square miles of exceptional signal quality, with usable signal extending far beyond this area.

James M. Gaines, president of the Texas Tall Tower Corporation, has announced October 1 as the target date for the transmission of programs from the new tower, which, with transmitters and associated equipment, represents an investment by the two stations in excess of \$1,250,000.

Erection of the giant structure was begun on June 9 when the first piece of steel was bolted into place on the 673-acre site at Elmendorf, 17 miles southeast of San Antonio. On June 24, the tower had reached a height of 531 feet, and the construction time table calls for the erection of 4 or 5 sections, each 30 feet long, daily.

Complete elimination of cancer as a health problem depends on future research, the society says. Because of this, the ACS last year allocated more than \$11,300,000 to cancer research. Currently more than 1,000 scientists supported by the ACS are working on some phase of cancer in major research centers. Since 1945, the society has devoted more than \$60,000,000 to research.

DWI Cases On Upswing Here

DWI arrests in Aransas County are on the upswing, although, according to an analysis of records in the Corpus Christi district office of the Texas Highway Patrol, highway patrolmen stationed in the district made less arrests for DWI in 1957 than in 1956 and the conviction percentage was the same each year.

In 1956 highway patrolmen made 448 DWI arrests in the district and as of June 1, 1957, 382 had resulted in DWI convictions for a conviction percentage of 85%.

In 1957 highway patrolmen made 399 DWI arrests and as of June 1, 1958 337 had resulted in DWI convictions for a conviction percentage of 85%. The figures for 1957 include the 16 counties that comprise the district until Sept. 1, 1957. Liveoak, McMullen and Bee counties are not included after that date. Brooks County is included only after that date.

In 1957 highway patrolmen made 10 DWI arrests in Aransas County. As of June 1, 1958, 10 had resulted in DWI convictions for a conviction percentage of 100%. On 1956 DWI arrests the conviction percentage as of June 1, 1957, was 92%. Of the five cases dismissed in 1957 DWI arrests, none were in the above county. Of the 19 cases pending none were pending in the above county. Of the 22 cases reduced to a lesser charge, none were reduced in the above county. Of the four cases in which the defendant was not billed by a grand jury, none were billed in Aransas County. Of the 12 DWI cases in which a not guilty verdict was returned either by a judge or jury, none of such verdicts were returned in Aransas County.

Jacksons Ask Engineer's Permit

Jackson Marine Service have asked the U. S. Engineers for a construction permit at their boat yard, recently purchased from R. R. Rice. They propose to excavate an area and construct a wharf at the old location of the Gibson Fish Company dock.

An area approximately 35 by 150 feet would be excavated to a depth of 5 feet at mean low tide, and the excavated material would be placed on shore. The 6 by 185-foot wharf would extend parallel to and one foot away from the applicant's north property line and would have a deck elevation of 6 feet at mean low tide. According to the plans submitted the face of the wharf would be 83 feet from the near bottom edge of the federal project.

NOTICE OF HEARING ON PETITION FOR CREATION OF ARANSAS COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1

THE STATE OF TEXAS STATE BOARD OF WATER ENGINEERS To all persons owning land within the proposed Aransas County Water Control and Improvement District Number 1; to all persons who may be affected by the creation of such district; to the sheriff of Aransas County, Texas; and to all other interested parties: TAKE NOTICE that on the 4th day of August, 1958, at two o'clock p.m., at the Office of the State Board of Water Engineers in the City of Austin, Texas, a petition for the creation of ARANSAS COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER 1 will be heard and determined before the State Board of Water Engineers, as provided by law. That the area and boundaries of the proposed District shall include

all lands and proper located within the boundaries of such District, as defined in the aforesaid petition, and which boundaries are as follows, to-wit: BEGINNING at the south line of the Wm. M. Carper Survey A-47 and west line of Railroad Ave., in the Fulton Townsite in Aransas County, Texas; THENCE south 79 degrees and 52 minutes east 905 feet to the northwest corner of the T. Crocoline Survey A48; THENCE South 4224 feet with the west line of the T. Crocoline Survey A-48; THENCE east 4597.7 feet with the south line of the T. Crocoline Survey A-48 to Aransas Bay; THENCE north 9 degrees and 9 minutes east 21604.2 feet to Aransas Bay shore; THENCE north 84 degrees and 46 minutes west 3000 feet to the west line of State Highway No. 35; THENCE south 23 degrees and 14 minutes west 11600 feet to Railroad Ave. extended; THENCE south 11 degrees and 43 minutes west 6700 feet with the west line of Railroad Ave. to the point of beginning, and containing 2492 acres, more or less. FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the proposed District shall be named and known as "ARANSAS COUNTY WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NUMBER 1," and is to be organized under the provisions of Section 59 of Article 16 of the Texas Constitution, and pursuant to the sta-

tutory laws of the State of Texas thereunto enabling, particularly Chapter 3A, Title 128, Revised Civil Statutes of 1925, as amended. FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the purpose of the organization of the District shall be for and include all works and facilities in any manner incident to, helpful or necessary in the following respects: (a) Controlling, storing, preserving and distributing its waters and flood waters, the waters of its rivers and streams, for domestic, municipal, industrial or other useful purposes permitted by law; (b) Controlling, abating and amending any shortage, or harmful excess of water, including the gathering, conducting, diverting and controlling of local storm waters or other local harmful excesses of water, and to protect, preserve, and when necessary restore the purity and sanitary condition of the State's waters; and (c) Collecting, transporting, processing, disposing and controlling of all domestic, industrial or commercial wastes, whether of fluids, solids, or composites, to the end that the purity and sanitary conditions of the State's waters may be protected, effected or restored. FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the general nature of the work to be done by and within the District at the present time is the acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of a water supply and waterworks system for domestic, industrial and commercial purposes, and the acquisition, construction, maintenance and operation of a sanitary sewer collection and disposal system all as more particularly described in an engineer's report filed simultaneously with the filing of the petition, to which reference is hereby made for more detailed description, and the control, abatement and amendment of the harmful excess of waters and the reclamation and draining of overflowed lands within the District and such other construction, installation, maintenance, purchase and operation of such additional facilities, systems, plants and enterprises as shall be consonant with the purposes for which the District is organized. AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that according to the aforesaid petition there exists a necessity for the organization of such District in order to provide for the acquisition of a water supply and the installation, maintenance and operation of water purification and distribution system together with a sanitary sewer system within the limits of the proposed district, and to control and abate local storm waters and local harmful excesses of water so as to promote and protect the purity and

sanitary condition of the State's waters and the public health and welfare of the community; that the project and the work to be done in accomplishing the purposes of the proposed district is entirely practicable and feasible due to the nature of the soil and contour of the land and will serve and be a benefit to all of the land lying within said District, and will be a public benefit and utility; that the topography of the lands present no feature which would make a consummation of the project impracticable from an engineering standpoint; that evidence in substantiation of this in the form of preliminary engineering report prepared by competent engineers support the purpose, utility, feasibility and necessity thereof. AND FURTHER TAKE NOTICE that the project is estimated to cost approximately \$495,000. UPON THE FILING AND PREPARATION of the aforesaid petition, the State Board of Water Engineers, on the 13th day of June, 1958, issued its order calling the hearing herein noticed and provided that upon the day and at the time and place set for said hearing, any person whose land is included in, or would be affected by the creation of such district, may appear and contest the creation thereof and may offer testimony to show that such district is or is not necessary, would or would not be a public utility, and would or would not be feasible and practicable. ARANSAS BAY WELL PREPARES DUAL COMPLETION C. G. Glasscock-Tidelands Oil Co. and Coastal States Gas Producing Co. No. 1 State Tract 123, indicated Aransas County Catahoula discovery 3/4-miles northeast of Fulton, was to move in work-over and dual complete as an oiler on perforations from 5,643-44 feet and as a gas-distillate producer from section at 5-123-25 feet. Water cushion hit the surface in 1 1/2 hours and oil in one hour and 50 minutes on a drillstem test under 1,000-foot water cushion through 3/4-inch chokes from 5,643-44 feet. In two hours on a 1/2-inch choke the project made 8.6 barrels of oil with a tubing pressure of 940 pounds. It tested 4.3 barrels of oil in testing on 7/64-inch choke for 3 1/2 hours with tubing pressure 1,325 pounds. Bottom hole flowing pressure was 390 and 2,050 pounds, shutin 2,510 pounds. On a test of perforations from 5,123-25 feet the project showed a working pressure of 1,650 pounds on 1/2-inch chokes and 1,850 pounds on 12/64-inch choke under 1,500-foot water cushion. About 10 feet of distillate was reversed out. Bottomhole flowing pressure was 2,150 and 2,240 pounds and shutin pressure was 2,320 pounds. Recovery was 200 feet of distillate and gas-cut mud on a two-hour drillstem test through 1/2-inch chokes from 5,622-24 feet. Working pressure was 1,750 pounds, bottomhole flowing pressure 2,355 and 2,395 pounds and shutin pressure was 2,535 pounds. The well is bottomed at 7,519 feet and has 7-inch pipe at 5,770 feet. Location is on a 320-acre lease in Aransas Bay.
