

## STRIPPING PLANT TO START BUILDING

**To Be Built On Land Acquired From L. M. Bracht Estate, In Lamar Townsite, Last Barrier Is Cleared Away By Action Of Commissioners**

The last barrier to construction of the Tennessee Gas Transmission Company stripping plant was cleared away when M. L. McWhorter, company representative out of Houston, met with Aransas County Commissioners' Court last Friday to ask that certain streets in the townsite plat be closed and the Commissioners approved the request.

The \$1,000,000 plan will be built on the northern shores of Copano Bay, west of Highway 35, on 31

acres acquired from the L. M. Bracht heirs for a reputed price of \$25,000.00.

The plan will handle gas from Aransas County fields, and, according to informed sources here, will employ a permanent labor force of between 30 and 50 men.

Construction is planned to start in October, and target date for completion is early next year.

In other action, the Commissioners approved a budget item of \$1,100.00 for salaries and transportation of a county agricultural agent, Dan Pawlik, and for Aransas County's first Home Demonstration agent, Miss Beulah Blackwell.

Pawlik has been County Agent for several years, but Miss Blackwell, though serving the surrounding counties on the same basis as Pawlik (part time) has never been employed by this county up till now, according to County Judge John D. Wendell.

Present at the meeting were all four commissioners: Howard Mills, Jack Sparks, Arthur Davis and W. B. Allen, County Judge Wendell, Sheriff A. C. Shivers, County Auditor Millikin, Ellis Clark, Travis Johnson, Fred A. Bracht, Sr., Mrs. Clark Herring and Mrs. Guy Barber.

### Local Shrimper Saved By Prompt Coast Guard Action

The Janet Claire, recently launched by C. L. Grant of Rockport, was saved from sinking last week by prompt Coast Guard action in parachuting a pump to the vessel, which was in a sinking condition five miles off the Port Aransas jetties. Grant, when contacted, said that the Coast Guard flying boat was at the scene within eight minutes after the distress call was sent out indicating that help was needed by the foundering boat.

Grant said that the call was sent out at 11:02, and relayed to the Coast Guard by the trawler South-ern Breeze, while his second boat, the Charles Laughton, stood by to take care of the men on the Janet Claire if they had to abandon ship.

The trouble was caused by a packing on the tail shaft which came loose and allowed a three-inch stream of water to enter the after hold. This water was waist deep at one time.

Within five minutes after the original distress call was received, the Coast Guard plane was en route to the scene, and within less than ten had dropped a power pump which, added to the equipment on board the Janet Claire, was sufficient to keep the water in check. However, it endangered the engine, which had to be shut down, and Patrol Boat 83-428, from the Port Aransas Coast Guard Station took the shrimper in tow, and put men aboard to aid.

Grant said that he owes a deep debt of gratitude to everyone concerned, and that these men, on board the Janet Claire, aided in retrieving the nets and boards—some \$3,000 worth of equipment—by hand, with the result that not a bit of it was lost, although some 30 or 40 fathoms of cable had to be manhandled aboard, plus the weight of the boards and nets.

Upon reaching Port Aransas, repairs to the Janet Claire were readily effected, and she was back fishing the next day.

During the last four days of last week, boats have been averaging between 1,000 and 2,000 pounds a night, according to a number of shrimpers, while the bay catch has been the largest in many years, probably because of greater supplies of fresh water in the bays over the season.

Up until the time storm Ella hit, most catches were being made in the Gaiveston-Cameron, La., area, but since the storm the white shrimp have been running in great numbers. These are 26 to 30 count to the pound, a little smaller than the normal brown shrimp catches.

There has also been a slight increase in brown shrimp catches, although the white catches have been by far the largest.

Carl Burselen was given a five-year suspended sentence. Juquin Santos was given two years in prison.

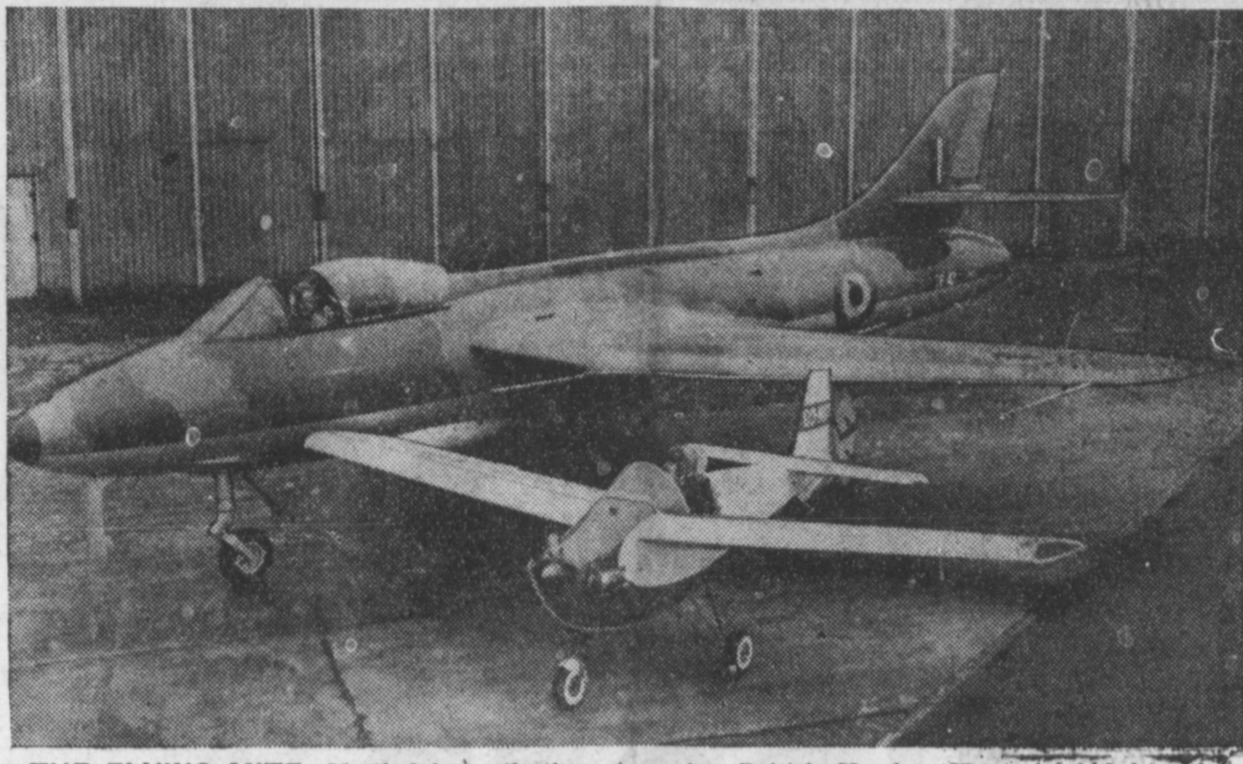
The jury deliberated 1½ hours and returned the verdict at 6 p. m. The case was heard by 36th District Court Judge John Miller of Sinton.

### City Council Deals With Many Matters

The city council, at its regular meeting Tuesday night, dealt with many matters, including various problems attendant upon paving the business route on Highway 35 through Rockport. Because of their interest to all members of the community, The Pilot here reproduces the minutes of the meeting:

The meeting was called to order by the mayor, and minutes of the last regular session were read by the secretary and approved as read, after which the mayor and councilmen made a canvass of votes cast at the September 3, 1958 Special City Election held for the purpose of electing a councilman from Precinct 1 to fill the unexpired term left vacant by the resignation of J. W. Porter. A motion was made by Councilman Hunt, seconded by Councilman Rogero, that the returns of the election be declared in order and accepted by the council. Motion carried. Councilman-elect Jack Horton was duly sworn into office by the secretary.

The current bills were submitted by the secretary and Councilman Hunt moved that the bills be approved and paid. Seconded by Councilman Harrist. Motion carried.

An easement from the Texas & New Orleans Railroad Co. was presented and examined by the council. Councilman Hunt moved that the mayor be authorized to execute on behalf of the City of Rockport the agreement between the Texas & New Orleans Railroad Co. and the City of Rockport covering the right-of-way on Austin Street extending across railroad property. Motion seconded by Councilman Rogero. All voted in favor of the motion.

The acquisition of riparian rights needed for the Street Improvement Project was discussed. James A. Jarboe was authorized by the council to make a survey of what is owned by the Navigation District, Joe Sheldon and others. An appraisal board composed of James A. Jarboe, L. Miller, and A. C. Glass are to submit an appraisal value of the property in question in which the city will participate with the state in purchasing.

The Street Improvement Project in regards to clearing the right-of-way involving S. F. Jackson's buildings was discussed. Mr. Hatch stated that the city had a choice of three methods of acquiring this right-of-way, and suggested that the city choose to pay Mr. Jackson to move the buildings since the time limit of letting the contract was so near and that the entire project was in jeopardy. The cost of moving the buildings was discussed as well as the other expenses which have already been paid and those which will incur before the entire right-of-way is cleared to the satisfaction of the State Highway Department. Mr. Hatch telephoned Ellis Clark to ask the amount of costs Mr. Jackson would ask the city to advance for the moving of the buildings, and was given the figure of \$2,599.00.

Councilman Rogero moved that the city pay Mr. Jackson \$2,599.00 when he had moved his buildings (continued on page 8)

### TRI-MARK OIL CO. TO DRILL DEEP TEST

Tri-Mark Oil Co. of Corpus Christi has filed for permit to drill a 9,025-foot wildcat in the Aransas Pass Field area 1½ miles northwest of Aransas Pass.

The No. 1 Jesus Resendes is 577 feet from the southeast line and 660 feet from the northeast line of a 80-acre lease and Block 7, spotting in Lot 11, James Orick Survey, A-167. It sits 990 feet east of the San Patricio County line.

Five oilers completed on the lease have been depleted and abandoned.

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### Frandong Island Bids Asked Today

The last great island on the Texas coast went on the block Thursday morning, when Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 advertised Frandong Island for sale, the bids to be opened in the Navigation District's office on Oct. 3.

Lying in Aransas Bay, between Rockport and Fulton, and separated from the mainland by only a narrow channel at one point, the island comprises 237 acres of land that can be turned into the choicest kind of waterfront real estate by soil dredged from Little Bay.

Bought by the Navigation District in 1955, to supplement the county's harbor facilities, circumstances arose which made its utilization for this impractical.

Approached by various interested financial groups with plans for development, the district decided this morning (Thursday) to throw the land open for purchase.

The minimum bid that will be accepted is \$65,000, and the purchaser will be required to expend at least \$500,000 within the next three years in development.

Specifications for bidding may be obtained from the Aransas County Navigation District at Rockport, and are printed elsewhere in this issue of The Pilot.

This was necessary, City Secretary Jean Tuer told the council, in order to collect some long standing bills.

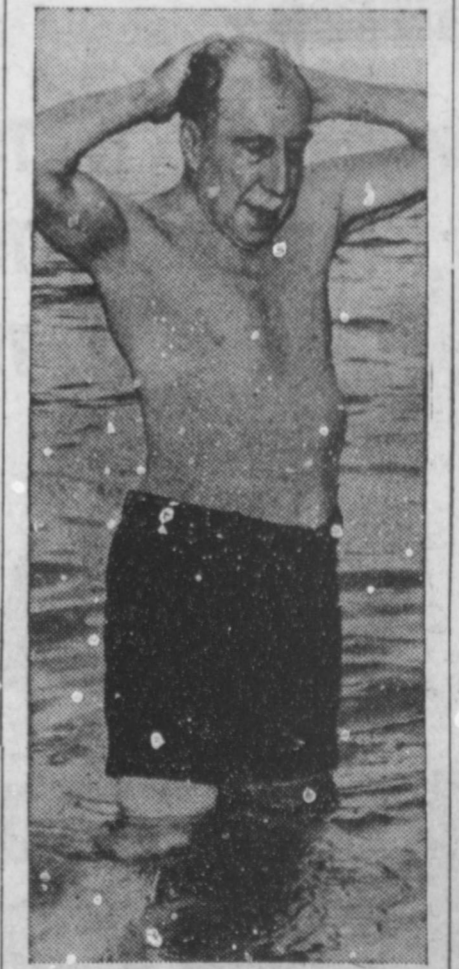
### CURTIS UTZ JOINS PERCH CLUB MONDAY

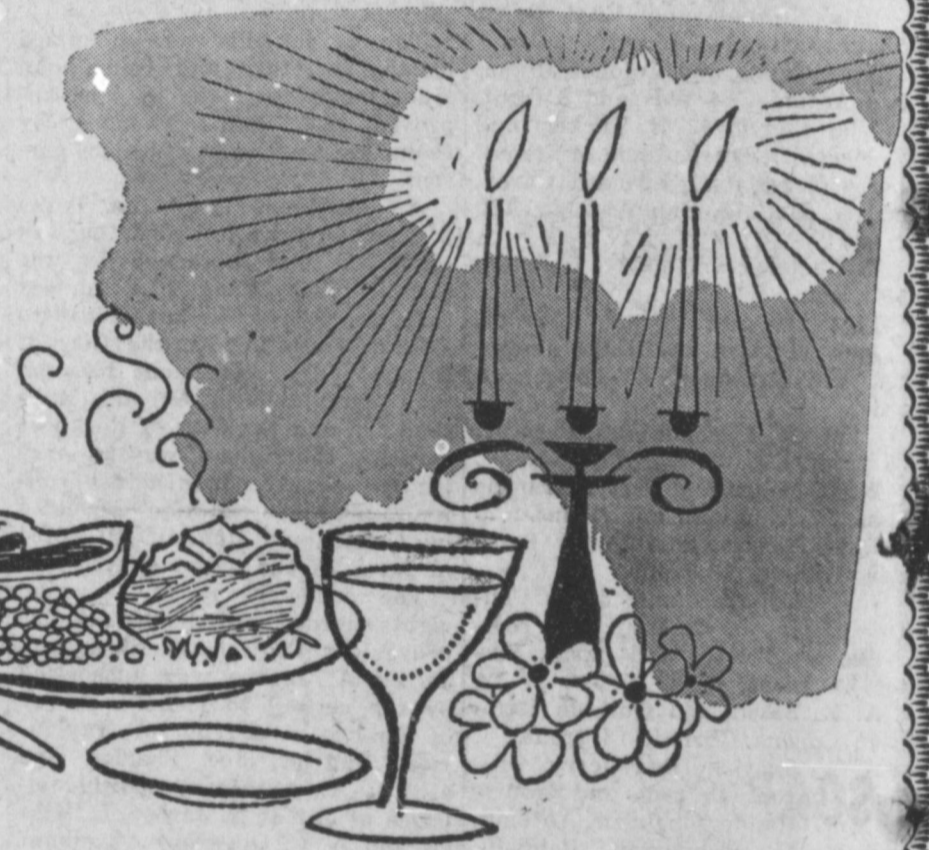

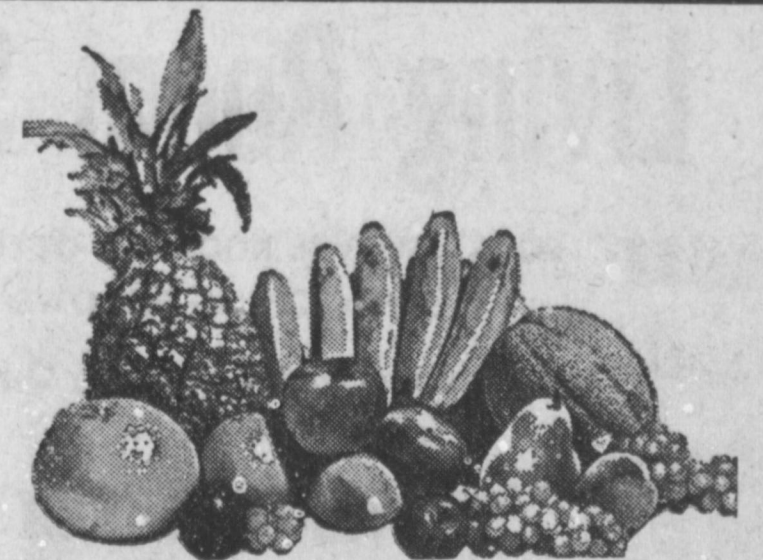

Freeport figures showed the most spectacular rise of all, however, with 1,803,000 pounds of tails produced in July...

Port Isabel landed 754,000 pounds in July against 450,000 in June; Galveston slipped under the wire with a July total of 503,000...

And, despite grumbling by shrimp fishermen along the Coastal Bend, the overall January through July total for this year was only about a million pounds less than in 1957...

Protective Structures Advocated on Islands To Guard from Hurricanes

Dr. W. Armstrong Price of Corpus Christi, consulting geologist and former member of the oceanographic staff of Texas A&M...

Price, who conducted a survey for Corpus Christi on hurricane protection, is of the opinion that numerous hurricanes may strike this coast in the next seven years...

McAuliffe discovered, Price said, that tropical storms and hurricanes crossing the western Gulf of Mexico tended to increase or decrease in strength according to the waxing and waning of the moon...

Price is the author of an extensive scientific treatise "Hurricanes Affecting the Coast of Texas from Galveston to the Rio Grande," published in 1956 by the U. S. Army's Beach Erosion Board.

In his treatise, Price originally predicted a hurricane-rich period for the Texas coast south of Galveston, between 1954 and 1970...

Price's study for the city of Corpus Christi has furnished city fathers with material for a hearing to be held before the Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, at which they will see whether Federal funds may be available for hurricane protection.

Preliminary estimates show that at least \$16.2 million worth of damage would be done to Corpus Christi and the Naval Air Station. This amount could be raised many times, the geologist said...

Frandoleg Island Has Very Interesting History Since First White Man Viewed It

Napoleon Bonaparte Frandoleg had horns measuring nine feet from tip to tip.

Just when the Frandoleg's abandoned the island is not certain, but in 1919, when a great hurricane swept the Texas coast...

But Frandoleg himself lived in Port Aransas for many years after this, and at his death the land passed on to his heirs.

And with the passing of the years, the island changed, as it passed from owner to owner. The storm cut parts of it away...

The Navigation District originally envisaged of the island as an adjunct of the district's harbors, but with changing conditions these plans have been altered.

With this in mind, navigation commissioners have planned a long-range program, calling for a levee to the eastward of Little Bay, reaching from the mainland almost to Frandoleg...

### Laboratory Will Give Shrimp Data That Will Help

The laboratory, according to Ross Leffler, Assistant Secretary of the Interior, will give many answers that will help towards the conservation of shrimp and other seafood. Speaking to the Shrimp Association of the Americas in June of this year, when that organization met in Mexico City, he said:

"We are looking forward to extensive accomplishments in the laboratory to tell us more about behavior of shrimp at their various stages of life and about their food preferences. This, with the considerable field program we have described here, will give us a better

understanding of how shrimp respond to changes in the ocean climate. We hope eventually to learn the biological and physical requirements of shrimp well enough to grow them commercially by artificial cultivation.

"It is my judgment that our two governments must view the future of this resource which is fished jointly together, that we must together critically examine the status of the shrimp resources in the Gulf of Mexico in a manner which will insure the continued maximum sustainable yield. Our government stands ready to actively cooperate in such a joint endeavor.

"Shrimp, whether fresh, frozen or canned, are very popular items in the diet of our people. In fact, the amount consumed per person has doubled in the last 10 years. In 1938, the per capita consumption averaged just under one-half

pound. By 1952 it had reached almost one pound and it has maintained a level of about one pound per person since that time. Our per capita consumption of all fishery products, on an edible weight basis, is only a fraction over 10 pounds. Therefore the shrimp industry—yours, as well as ours—supplies about 10 per cent of the fishery products we eat. I mention your industry, as well as ours, because about one-third of our supply of shrimp is imported and by far the greater part of the imports come from your country.

"The final judge of shrimp—just as in the case of so many other products—is the consumer. So we are giving considerable attention to shrimp to assure that the consumer gets a quality product.

"A powerful food-marketing tool, long utilized by the meat, fruit and vegetable industries of

the United States, is the use of a Federal shield to certify that a product is being produced under sanitary conditions, is wholesome and complies with established quality criteria. The presence of the shield on the label of any food product markedly increases consumer acceptance of and confidence in the product."

### We Arrived At Brussels Miss Jarboe Says

Continuing her story of the European trip made by the Misses Marjory and Maud Jarboe. Marjory says:

We arrived at Brussels, Belgium, the next afternoon via train. I didn't realize we would see much besides the World's Fair, but was pleasantly surprised. Belgium contains 11,000 square miles of land, and has a population of nine million. There are 150,000 more girls than men. The average temperature is 50° F. It rains 195 days out of the year. I could believe this, for the people had very fair skin, as if they had never seen sunshine. French and Flemish are the official languages. The government is a constitutional monarchy—with a parliament elected by universal suffrage. There are more railway lines and engines per head than any country in the world. Their four freedoms are: the freedoms of worship, teaching, press, and association. During the four years of wartime occupation there was no food except black bread and potatoes. Only 1% of the Belgians had meat once during a year so they kept and bred rabbits. Not a rabbit has been seen at the market since the liberation.

The church of St. Gudule is one of the most beautiful I saw in all

of Europe. It is hard to describe its beauty. Its walls are a gray stone with high vaulted windows. Some windows have stained glass from the 16th century. Colors are shades of clear, tinct blues, reds and golds. Stained glass figures have delicate and realistic faces. By comparison the 18th century stained glass figures are stiff, lifeless, and dull. The pulpit was carved out of a tree with Adam and Eve below above are Mary and Jesus; twin figures around the tree is the serpent. Forest of trees around the pulpit help form the foliage. In the foliage are a monkey, a peacock, birds, and other figures. It is considered the finest carving in Europe.

The Grand Place is the finest square of Europe, our guide says. It is beautiful. The buildings surrounding the square are old guild houses (1402). They are Gothic in style. Each guild house is covered with carving, statues, gargoyles. The stone is blackened from coal dust; much of the bas relief carving is gilded. The building are the Hotel de Ville (town hall), King's House, the bread market houses of the meat trade, the brewer's trade, the tailors, the haberdasher, the water and boatmen, the carpenters, the painters, and the bakers. Each guild house has carvings of men active in their particular trade. Now the buildings are mostly museums and government offices.

The town's oldest citizen and symbol is the Manneken—statue of a small boy who was lost. He has over 200 costumes. On the 4th of July he wears his M.F. uniform. Napoleon gave him the Key of the Chamberlain. Manneken's wardrobe has been enriched by various Belgian, English, French, and American costumes.

Belgium exports iron and steel. During the Korean war the U.S. was chief purchaser of their rifles. Besides rifles they manufacture crystal, glass, cement and lace. Due to the Belgian Congo they were the first country in Europe to recover from the war. The Congo exports rubber, sugar, coffee, and radium. Belgium imports almost everything except vegetables; 60% of their meat comes from Argentina; 50% of their coal comes from Germany.

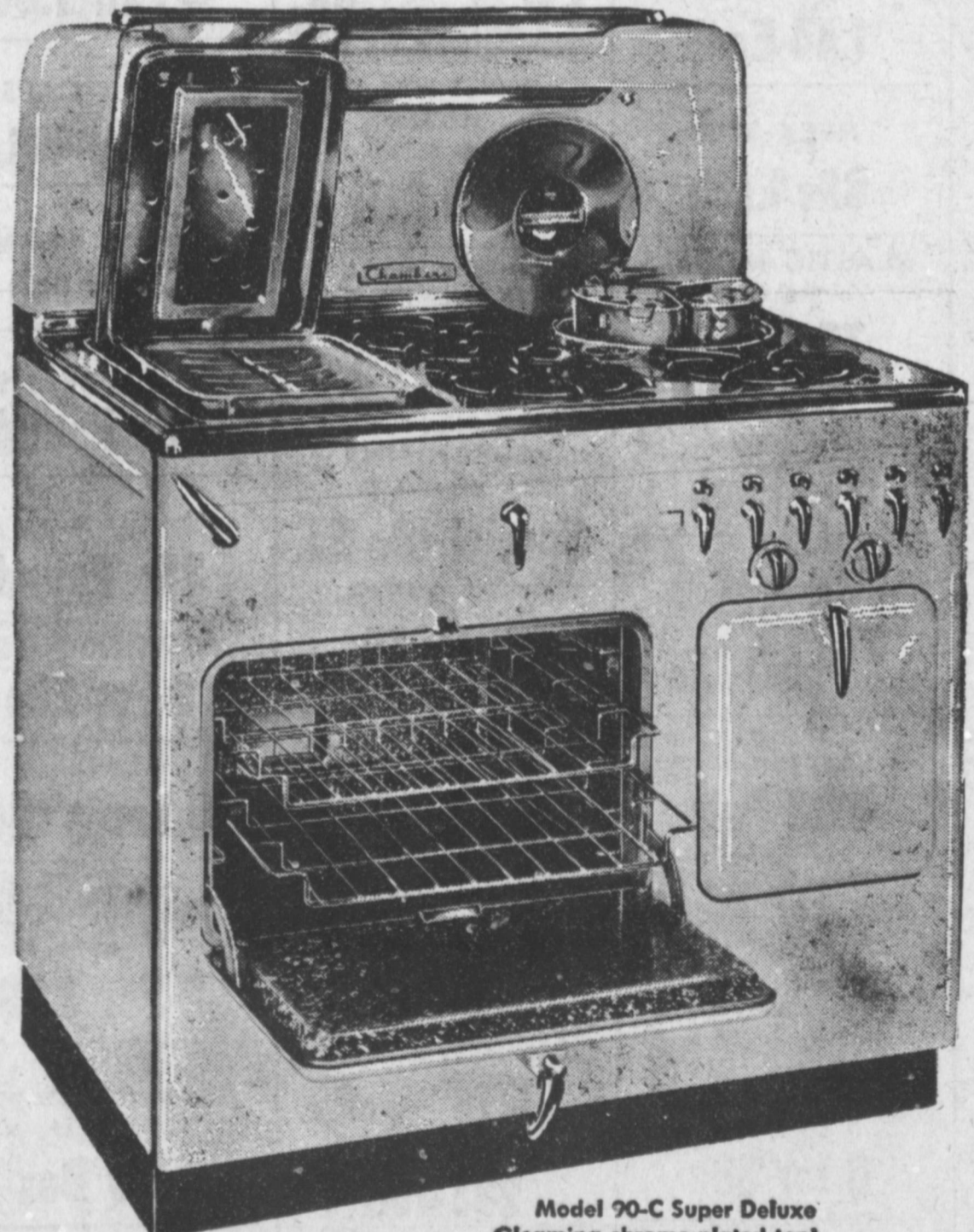
We visited the lace factory, a shop which has a monopoly of Brussels handmade lace because young girls can make more money in other industries. So, when this old lady dies, so will handmade Brussels lace. The tablecloths and place mats I especially liked.

**MRS. HARRY MILLS' FATHER PASSES AWAY**

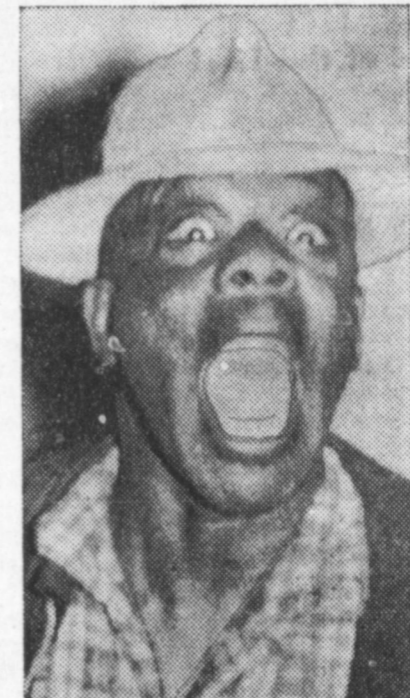
Mr. A. L. Schultz, 77, of Tivoli, passed away at the home of one of his daughters in Telfner on Sunday, Sept. 7.

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**Pirates Lose to Aransas Pass 20-0**

In the first game of the 1958 football season, the Pirates, showing plenty of speed and will, lost to the Aransas Pass Panthers by a score of 20-0, in a contest that was governed largely by the breaks. Aransas Pass recovered its fumbles when it counted and Rockport didn't.

Hayes Warden kicked off for the Pirates and Norman Spears returned the ball for 21 yards. Alex Harvey fumbled the next handoff, and, although he recovered for the Panthers, they lost 25 yards on the play. Rudy Johnson, powerhouse fullback for the Panthers, made three, putting the ball on the 30 yard line. A pass from Harvey to Ronnie Chadwick was incomplete and then Chadwick kicked on the fourth down.

Happner returned to the 35 for the Pirates, and then the Pirates fumbled, with Rudy Johnson re-

covering on the Rockport 31. Johnson made three; Chadwick to Harvey, a pass, picked up three more, and then Rudy Johnson made a couple of yards on each of two carries for a first down.

Alex Harvey kept and tried the line from the Rockport 21, with no gain. On the next play he fumbled, but recovered his own for a loss of a yard. Norman Spears next two passes went incomplete on the Rockport 20 and the Pirates took over, only to fumble immediately and lose possession of the ball.

Harvey made 5 yards for the Panthers which was called back, and a penalty for illegal motion in the backfield made it first down and 15 yards to go. Chadwick rumbled through the line for three; Spears tried for no gain, and a 15 yard penalty against the Panthers set them back on the Rockport 4. yard line, where Chadwick made no gain on the next play. Aransas Pass punted to the Rockport 9 but the play was called back because of an offside penalty against the Panthers, and on the

next play Chadwick booted it to Rockport's 9 yard line.

A handoff, Shivers to Happner, netted 9 1/2 yards for the Pirates, and then Barnard plowed through for two and a half, to the Rockport 32. Happner, who ran hard all night, made three yards; Barnard, another hard runner, made three yards, and then Cabaniss, who also showed plenty of speed, made a yard. Rockport punted from their own 30, declining an offside penalty against the Pirates.

On the first play, Alex Harvey picked up six yards; then Rudy Johnson made a beautiful run around the right side of his own line, and wound up 52 yards away on the Pirate 2.

Harvey made three yards thru the ride side of the line; a pass, Harvey to Chadwick, was incomplete on the Rockport 3; a pitch-out to Chadwick lost 2 yards, and then Rudy Johnson tried the line for a couple, not enough for a first down and the Pirates took on their own three-yard line.

Barnard made no gain; Cabaniss went over right guard for three yards; Barnard made five and the quarter ended.

On the first play of the second quarter, Cabaniss booted the ball from the Rockport 5 to the Rockport 34, where Ronnie Chadwick of the Panthers recovered. Rudy Johnson lost 2; an Aransas Pass fumble, which they recovered, cost them eight more. Harvey made three, and then Chadwick punted out on the Rockport 20.

Barnard tried center for no gain; and on the next play Quarterback Robert Shivers was rushed and had to swallow the ball. Then Barnard made three and Cabaniss punted. However the play was called back because of off-setting penalties and on his second kick his boot traveled from the Rockport 15 to the Aransas Pass 49.

Harvey made two yards for the Panthers; Moreno picked up two more, and Rudy Johnson added six and a first down on the Rockport 40. Johnson made 9 yards in two carries, then Alex Harvey racked up 12 more for another first down, and the ball rested on Rockport's nine.

Rudy Johnson made three yards, and then Ronnie Chadwick fumbled on the Pirate 3 yard line, with Rockport taking over.

Cabaniss made 5; Happner went four; Barnard made 2 and a first down on the Rockport 15. Cabaniss made a half; Barnard made a half; Happner made five; and then Cabaniss punted to the Aransas Pass 45, where Chadwick grabbed it and ran it back 15 yards for the Panthers, winding up about on the Rockport 35. Moreno pitched out to Harvey, but the pass was bad, and although the Panthers recovered, they lost 10 yards, to the 45 yard line. A pass from Norman Spears to Chadwick netted 20 yards to the Rockport 27.

Rudy Johnson made no gain; a pass was incomplete; and then Norman Spears heaved a floater to Ralph Johnson that netted a little over 27 yards and a touchdown. Ronnie Chadwick ran the two points after touchdown, under the new rule promulgated this year.

Ralph Johnson's kickoff was low, and although Monte Rouquette recovered on the Rockport 22, he

didn't get anywhere. Cabaniss made seven, and the half ended.

At the beginning of the second half, Ralph Johnson kicked off and Barnard made a ten yard return to the Rockport 30. Cabaniss made 5 and a pass, Shivers to Cabaniss, netted 7 and a first down. Shivers to Happner brought no gain; Shivers to John Goff, brought a ten yard pickup and a first down on the Aransas Pass 48. Shivers lost 12; Happner made 7; Shivers pass to Warden was intercepted by Herbie Freeland, of the Panthers, who ran it back to the Rockport 36.

Rudy Johnson made 7 for Aransas Pass; Harvey made 1 and Spears 3 and a first down. Spears' pass to Chadwick was intercepted by William Kelly of the Pirates, who had a very busy evening, as he also recovered a couple of fumbles at various times during the play.

He ran it back to the Pirate 20, then, on first down, Happner picked up four. Shivers went around left end for three, and then Shivers hand off to Happner netted 10 or 11, moving the ball to the Pirate 38. Cabaniss made two; Shivers was swarmed under and lost 8; Cabaniss made nine; then he kicked to the Panther 48, where Rudy Johnson was nailed in his tracks as he caught it.

From the Panther 48, Rudy Johnson made 8 yards on his first carry, and then 3 more. On the first down in the next series, Johnson carried, but his gain was nullified by a holding penalty of 10 yards. Then Spears made a bad pitchout to Chadwick, who fielded it, but not until 10 yards had been lost. Spears made no gain on the next play, but on the next play he shot a pass to Troy Shirley, 30 yards away, who made a wonderful catch on the Rockport 29. Harvey made a yard, then a pitchout, Spears to Harvey, lost five; Spears to Harvey was knocked down by Pena for the Pirates, and an Aransas Pass fumble was recovered by William Kelly, one of the best ball hawks on the field Saturday night.

Kelly's recovery, which came on the last play of the third quarter, did little good, for one the first play after the fourth quarter opened, the Pirates fumbled, and Troy Shirley, of the Panthers recovered on the Rockport 30.

Rudy Johnson made the first carry, and made a beautiful run through a broken field, shaking off tacklers until he reached the one-foot line. Chadwick carried for no gain and the Pirates were offside. Rudy Johnson tried thru center, with no gain, and then went thru for the touchdown. However, the Panthers were unable to convert.

Ralph Johnson kicked off, and Hayes Warden returned for the Pirates to their own 33 yard line.

A five yard penalty was called

against Aransas Pass for delay of the game, making it first and five for the Pirates. Cabaniss made three and Jo Boy May made a couple, but a five yard penalty was called against the Pirates for illegal motion in the backfield. Then the quarter, Shivers, carried for a five yard loss. Cabaniss made three and then, on next play, kicked to the Aransas Pass 38.

Aransas Pass declined an illegal motion in backfield penalty and took the kick. Rudy Johnson made five yards; Chadwick racked up four more; and then Rudy lost 2, and on the next play Chadwick fumbled and William Kelly made his second recovery of the evening for the Pirates, on the Aransas Pass 37.

Jo May made a couple for the Pirates, and then they fumbled, only to have Mike Johnson recover. However, the ball went over to Aransas Pass on down on their 37, and in two gallops Rudy Johnson carried for 26 yards.

From the Rockport 43, Spears tried a pass on the first down, only to have it knocked down. Rudy Johnson rumbled through the Pirate line for five, and on the fourth down, unable to make the needed yardage, Aransas Pass kicked to Rockport's 19.

On the first play, Cabaniss carried for two, then Shivers passed to Cabaniss for 18 yards, winding up on the Rockport 39. Then Rockport fumbled again, and the Panthers took over, drawing a 15 yard penalty on the first play for clipping. 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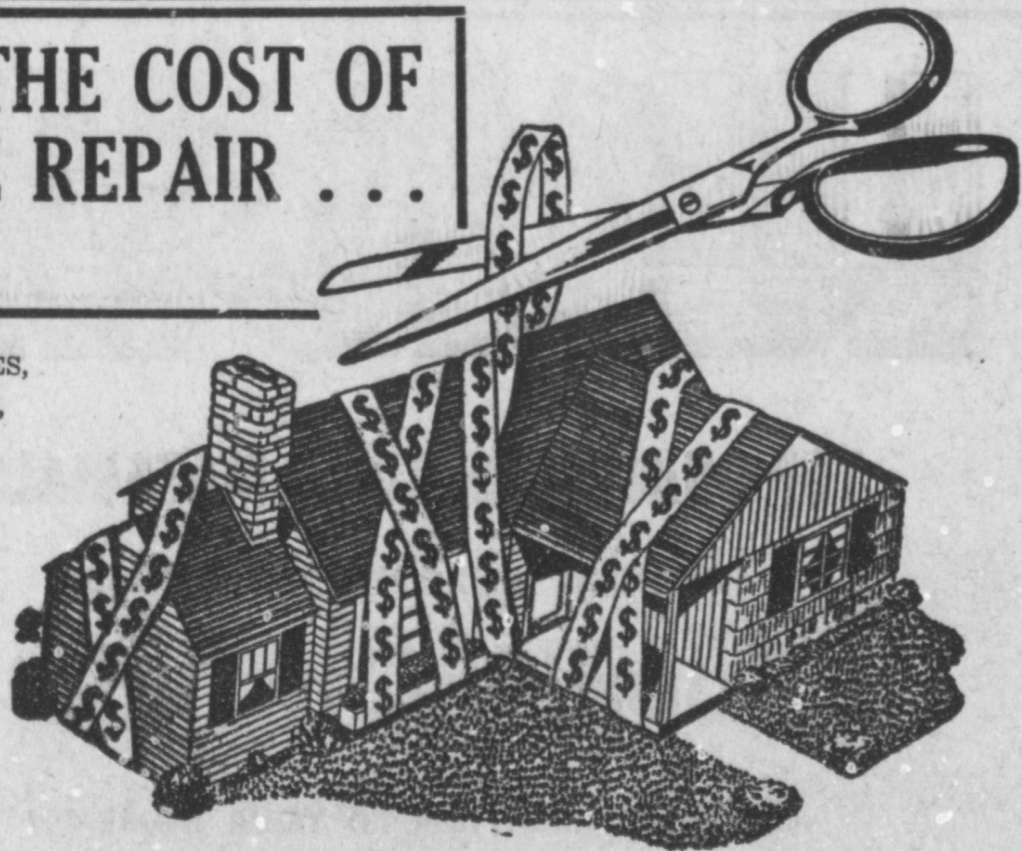

**Dependents Can Now Qualify For Social Security Insurance**  
Social security payments of retirement and family insurance will be increased beginning next January, and persons who are now receiving those payments do not need to apply for the higher amount. They will be paid automatically, but according to H. M. Cleveland, district manager of the Social Security Administration in Corpus Christi, benefits are now payable under the new law to some persons who could not qualify before, but they must be applied for. Dependents of a disabled worker who is receiving disability insurance benefits now can qualify for payment. Children under 18 or disabled, a wife of any age who has a child in her care who is entitled to benefits, and a wife age 62 or over should file a claim. Some disabled people who could not qualify for benefits under the old law because they had not worked as much as 1 1/2 years in the three years just before they were disabled can now become entitled to the benefits. A total of at least five years of work covered by the law is still required, Cleveland reported. A parent who was dependent upon a child who died after 1939 could not qualify for benefits under the old law if any other person who might become eligible survived. Now, such a dependent parent may qualify even though the deceased worker left a widow or child. Anyone whose social security payments were stopped because of marriage, may now again become entitled to the benefits if the marriage was to a person who was also receiving payments. Some people in situations similar to those above may have been notified that they did not qualify for payments when they applied in the past. Cleveland says that these people should get in touch with their social security office at 530 South Water St. in Corpus Christi promptly about filing new applications.

beyond the 100 foot right-of-way and when he had executed and delivered to the State of Texas a good and sufficient deed to the property contained within the 100 foot right-of-way. Motion seconded by Councilman Horton. Councilmen Rogero, Horton, and Harrist voted "For" and Councilman Hunt abstained from voting. Motion carried.

Councilman Harrist moved that the ordinance granting the city the right to condemn property in Aransas County needed by the United States government for right-of-way purposes in regards to the Gulf Intracoastal Waterway project be passed and approved. Seconded by Councilman Hunt. Motion carried.

Councilman Rogero moved that the city complete the purchase of the Simmons property for \$3,150 understanding that the state will participate in only one-half of their upper limit of \$2,740. Motion seconded by Councilman Horton. All voted in favor.

Homer Faber, Dysart Pest Control operator, voiced his objection to the high license fee required by the City of Rockport for first control operators to operate in the City of Rockport. He stated, however, that he did not object to the ordinance nor to paying a license fee, but that the amount of the fee was higher than any other city in the United States and asked that the council consider this matter. It was suggested that the initial license fee remain the same, but that an amendment be made to the ordinance allowing a modest renewal fee. The secretary was instructed to check and report what the usual annual license fee was charged by other cities in this area.

Mr. Jarboe presented a sketch plat of the proposed subdivision of Block 145, D-M, and asked the council's consideration of approval of the annexation of this block into the city limits. The petition for annexation to be presented at next regular council meeting.
