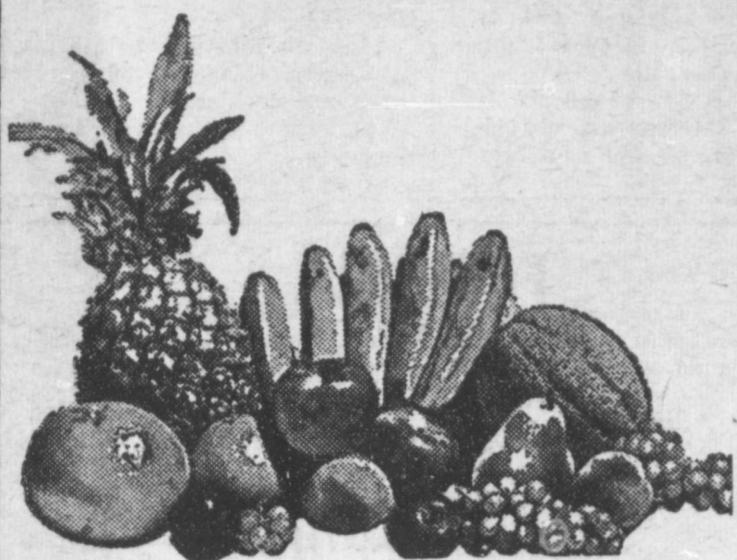

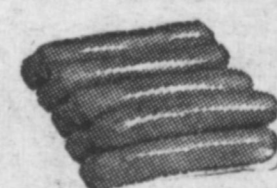

### TIDEWATER HAS ARANSAS GASSER

Tidewater Oil Co. No. 1 State Tract 125, Aransas County Half Moon Reef Field producer, 3 1/2 miles northeast of Rockport, has been completed for a daily open flow of 2,025 million cubic feet of gas plus one barrel of 43.3 gravity distillate to 18,900 cubic feet of gas.

Production was through perforations from 9,494 to 9,505 feet, 9,512-20 feet and 9,532-42 feet in 5 1/4-inch casing at 9:830 feet, the total depth. Flowing pressure on adjustable choke was 1,197 pounds and shut-in pressure was 4,702 pounds. Location is on a 320-acre lease in Aransas Bay.

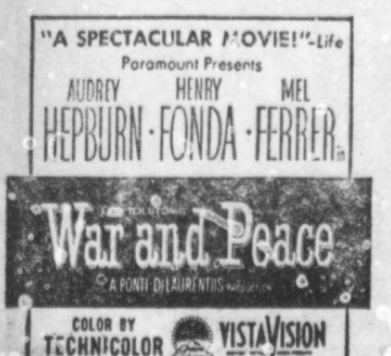

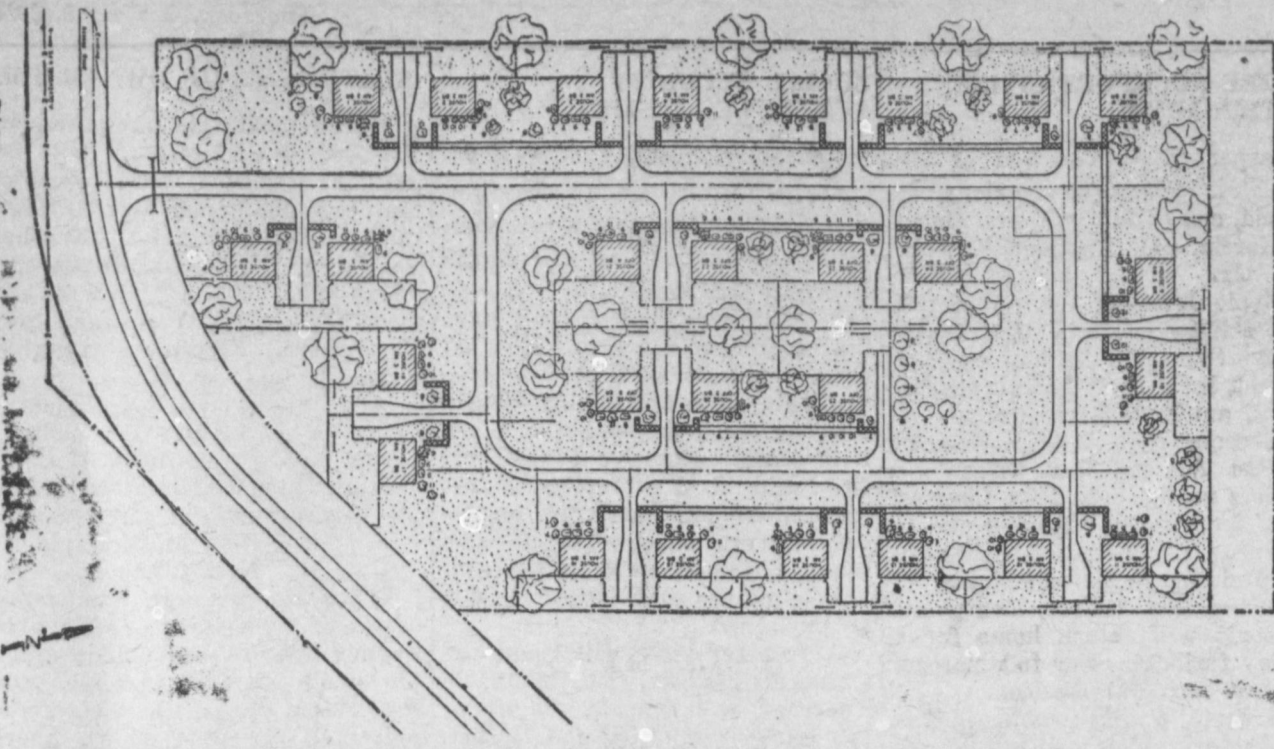

Box 426, Rockport, Texas, until 11 A.M., November 15, 1958, and then publicly opened and read, for furnishing all plant, labor, material and equipment and performing all work required for the construction of harbor development at The Cove for Aransas County Navigation District No. 1, hereinafter termed OWNER.

2. The work shall include site preparation, the dredging of approximately 548,000 cubic yards of material to form a new entrance channel and harbor, depositing the dredged material to form an embankment and levee, constructing drainage structures, a railroad crossing, and any of the following listed additions as may be elected by the OWNER:

Additional Work Item No. 1.— Includes constructing approximately 5,950 linear feet of asphalt pavement as specified and shown.

Additional Work Item No. 2.— Includes installing approximately 3,030 linear feet of four-inch steel fuel line as specified and shown.

Additional Work Item No. 3.— Includes installing a water supply line along one of two alternate locations as specified and shown. 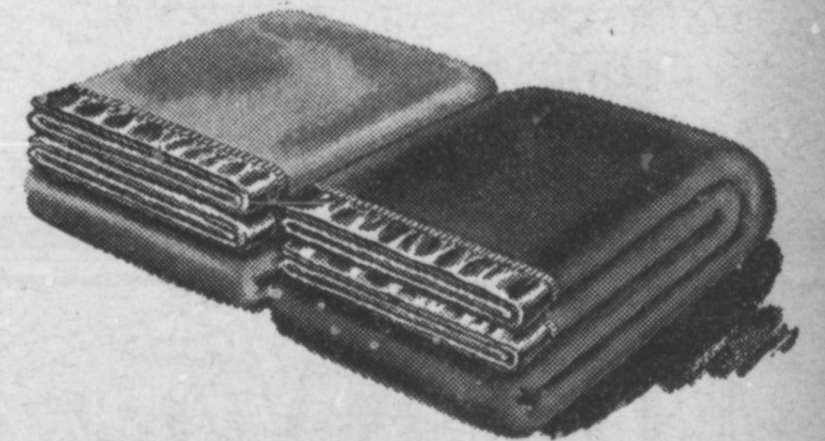

## Shrimp Standards Developed For Marketing

According to Assistant Secretary of the Interior, one of the outstanding developments in the shrimp industry during the past year was the promulgation by the U. S. Department of Agriculture of voluntary U. S. standards for frozen raw breaded shrimp. These standards were developed through the enlightened cooperation of the breaded shrimp industry, the National Fisheries Institute and the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries. These standards now open the way for use by the industry of these same shields which have done so much to assist the

growth of the meat, vegetable and fruit industries. We are confident that the fishing industry, through the use of voluntary standards and inspection services is entering a new period of growth and stability.

There was recently established, through the Fish and Wildlife Act of 1956, a national policy to promote the growth of the fishing industry. Under this act, the Department of Interior is named as being primarily responsible for all activities pertaining to the fisheries. Under this authority, there was effected a transfer of certain fishery functions previously performed by other agencies. The Bureau of Commercial Fisheries, as a consequence of the transfers, will henceforth develop and promulgate all voluntary U. S. standards for fishery products, and, on July 1, 1958, established and will operate its own fishery products inspection and certification service. The purpose of the transfer was to assure you that all aspects of the program will be in the hands of persons experienced in the commercial fisheries.

The National Shrimp Breeders' Association, several of whose members are present here, recently expressed an interest in undertaking continuous or lot inspection of the entire population of its several member plants. The Association requested the Bureau of Commercial Fisheries to recruit, train and make available the necessary in-

spectors. This we have done. The prospective inspectors are even now attending a two-week orientation course at our College Park, Maryland, technological laboratory. The course is being given by the staff technologists who worked on the development of the breaded shrimp standards. The services of these trained men will be available as of July 1, 1958.

The growth of domestic demand for shrimp since World War II and a growing interest in sources of supplies have created a need for detailed information regarding the shrimp fisheries of foreign countries.

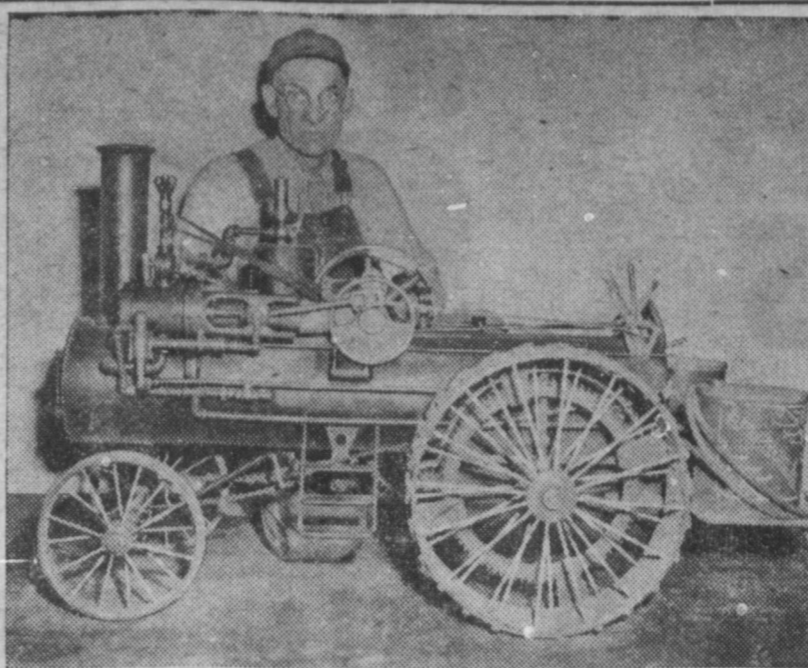

**Wildlife Service Continues Search for Fish Resources**

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Vessel Silver Bay has returned to port at Pascagoula after a 28-day exploratory trawling cruise that reached as far west as Freeport, Texas, and that covered most of the northern Gulf of Mexico in a search for information on distribution of red snapper and grouper, and the possibility of catching them in modified trawling gear. One hundred and thirty-six drags were made between the Dry Tortugas and Freeport, according to Harvey R. Bullis, Jr., in charge of Gulf fisheries exploration for the Service, using a 4 1/2-inch nylon fish trawl equipped with rollers.

Catches of snapper and grouper were generally poor, with individual catches per drag running from 0 to 200 pounds of snapper and 0 to 400 pounds of grouper. However, the total catch for the first 78 drags was only 2995 pounds, composed of five species of snapper and seven species of grouper. Moderate catches were made of salt water perch and piggy inside to 50-fathom curve.

In the last 58 tows, individual catches went from 0 to 175 pounds of red snapper, the total catch being 1699 pounds. Best fishing was again confined to the 40-50 fathom depth range, south of Galveston, where the snapper averaged 17 pounds.

Numerous subsurface schools of fish, tentatively identified as chub mackerel, scad, and round herring were seen on the vessel's fish-finder.

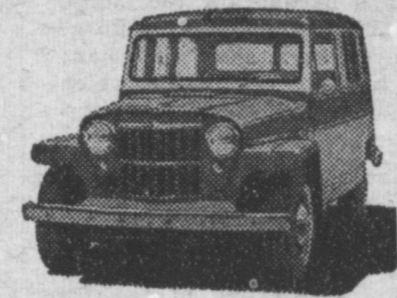

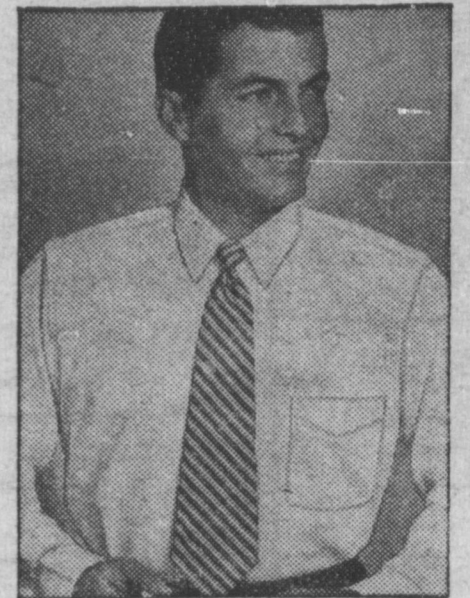

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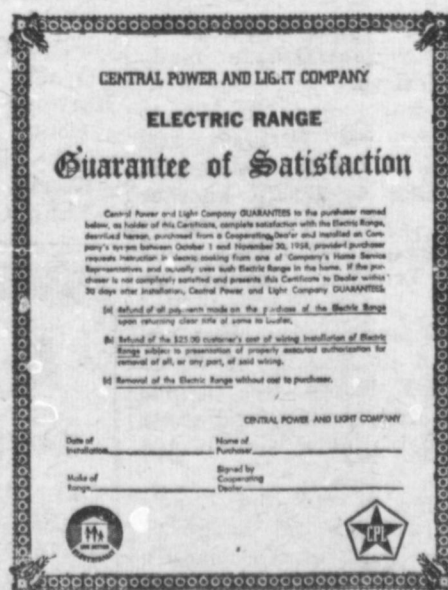
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
