Federal Boating Act Summary Is Released

Widespread rumors and considerable apprehension among local boatmen have accompanied news day for observation and treatment Federal Boating Act of 1958.

To give a better over-all indi- illness. cation of the detailed coverage of the new laws, a general summary of the act has been released by the United States Coast Guard. duties of the superintendent's of-The act provides for the following: fice as well as his own.

(1) Effective immediately, the operator of a vessel shall stop and render assistance if involved in a boating accident, and shall furnish his identification to others involved. Further, the operator is required to give notice to and file a written report with the cognizant authorities.

(2) The Coast Guard is authorized to impose civil penalties for reckless or negligent operation of vessels, including pleasure craft of all types.

(3) Every state may assume concurrent jurisdiction on navigable waters of the United States within such state and enter into enforcement agreements with the federal government.

(4) The present Coast Guard system for numbering of undocumented vessels shall be continued until April 1, 1960, valess a state assumes the functions of numbering prior to that date. On and after April 1, 1960, the Coast Guard will renumber all undocumented vessels propelled by machinery of more than 10 horsepower, unless a state shall have assumed the functions of numbering within that state.

(5) The Coast Guard is directed to compile, analyze and publish information obtained from reports of boating accidents together with the findings concerning the causes of such accidents and recommendations for their future prevention.

(6) The Coast Guard is required to establish standards, rules and regulations with respect to certain functions described in the law.



If this district is formed, taxes—positively higher than city, county, or school taxes, and quite possibly of ruinous proportions—will follow quickly and surely. The sure way to avoid these taxes is to vote against this sewer and water district. If there is no district, there will be no sewer and water tax.

Your approval of the formation of a sewer and water district will bring into being a new taxing agency for all property owners within this district. Boats and automobiles, as well as real estate, will be subject to taxation.

With Christmas only a month a bit too soon to start following aren't necessary anyway. these three simple rules to insure delivery of your gifts before Christmas: Wrap them securely, Longhorn. address them correctly, and MAIL THEM EARLY.

The Postmaster said you shouldn't take chances on mailing poorly wrapped packages. Use corrugated mailing cartons, plenty of heavy brown wrapping paper, and be sure that every package is tied with strong cord. Cartons containing several gift packages should be stuffed with tissue or old newspapers to cushion the contents.

The Postmaster also reminds us that size and weight limitations for Parcel Post packages vary according to place of mailing and destination. He suggests that you secure Pamphlet No. 2 at the Post Office, which tells all about packaging and wrapping parcels. Always include an extra label with your return address and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Small communities are getting interested in bison for display purposes, some farmers with small acreages are beginning to look upon the bison as a potential livestock animal and professional cattle buyers are bidding higher prices for the Texas longhorn, the Department of the Interior reports.

Surplus bison, which are raised on some national wildlife refuges, are donated to public parks or are sold alive or butchered at prices established annually. The longhorns are sold at public auction. Some elk are included in the disposal program, but these are assigned primarily to public

The highest price paid for a longhorn at this year's auction steer. was \$313.22 for a 1,795-pound steer at the Fort Niobrara National Wildlife Refuge in Nebraska.







To the Citizens of The Fulton Community

I have been asked why I am so interested in working for a Water and Sewer District in the Fulton area. Because I have been accused by some as doing so for purely selfish reasons, and to publicly answer those who have made such charges, I submit my reasons:

1. There is a definite need to improve on the treatment of sewage now collected by many inadequate septic tanks and cesspools in this Fulton area.

2. Unquestionably, it is advisable to provide a public water supply free from sub-surface contamination. A water supply for everyone which will be approved by the Texas State Health Department will be a great asset.

3. I place a high value on securing better living conditions, not just for Live Oak Points Tracts where I live, but for this Live Oak Peninsula, from Rockport to the Copano Bay Causeway. I believe each and every one of us in this area has a responsibility to carry his share of the load to obtain a good water supply and a healthy sanitary sewer system for our community, where it is needed now.

4. I believe that the formation of this Water Improvement District is not only the most economical way to provide adequate water and sewer utilities. but it is a very democratic approach with adequate safeguards to the individual.

For example, after you have convinced the State Board of Water Engineers that you are on sound footing, all you can do first, is to ask the voters to approve or disapprove the creation of a District. At this first election, next Saturday, you can't ask the voters to give you any money, vote any bonds or set up any tax-not one penny's worth can you obligate the taxpayers to pay. If the voters approve the forming of a District, the directors elected have to present their mature plans to the voters at a later date.

5. It is highly probable that the new Congress, which meets in a couple of months, will pass some legislation highly favorable for financing public works at substantial savings in the rates of interest. At the present time our Fulton community has no legal body which can take advantage of favorable legislation for community betterment. If we create this Water District, we will be on an equal footing with other small cities and will qualify, without having the taxes to pay that inevitably go with city government.

6. I believe that if every property owner kept books on his expenses for individual water wells and sewage treatment tanks over a five-year period, that the great majority would find out that their expense would be more than what they would pay in five years for community water and sower systems. In addition to the saving, they would have the peace of mind that goes with better sanitary conditions and an approved water supply.

Remember, next Saturday we can open the door of your community to the opportunity for better living and higher property values, if you approve the formation of a Water District. You are in no way voting any tax of any kind next Saturday, by voting for a Water District.

Last, but not least, I have great faith in this Fulton community and I believe, after working a year and a half with other civic minded citizens of Fulton, that a Water District now will be a great practical asset to all of us. It will be the first big physical step to a better community in which to live and work. Now is the time to get started.
