

Along The Waterfront



Fifty floating buoys are being placed in coastal bay waters as navigational aids to sports fishermen.

The purpose of the buoys is to mark good fishing reefs which are often difficult for fishermen to locate. Formerly these reefs were either unmarked or marked with stakes, jugs, poles and various other items. The new buoys are constructed of fiber glass. They serve as permanent markers for designated reefs.

They are cylindrical buoys which extend two feet above the water. They are orange and white striped with the letters TG&FC stenciled on the side.

The locations were selected by the marine biologists working in the area. The buoys will be placed in the following bays:

Aransas, Copano, Corpus Christi, Galveston, Matagorda, San Antonio, Tres Palacios, Trinity and the Lower Laguna Madre.

All locations have been approved by the U.S. Coast Guard. More precise descriptions of the positions of the markers will be given in a forthcoming article in the Texas Game and Fish magazine.

Maintenance of the buoys will be under the Marine Fisheries Division at Rockport. Future plans call for additional markers on the many more fishing spots available to sportsmen.

C of C Directors Discuss Folder, Hear Committees

The Chamber of Commerce directors at their regular meeting on Tuesday night, discussed the folder now being assembled and heard reports of committees.

Mrs. Mary Juergens reported that although the tourist promotion committee had made all necessary arrangements to get weekly fishing news disseminated through radio and TV outlets in Houston, San Antonio and other cities, that the fishing guides and camps that were supposed to furnish the news had fallen down on the job. The first week, she said, four out of five had reported, but by the fourth week no one was reporting.

The committee, she said, had decided to take an ad in the San Antonio sports show magazine.

The Merchants' Committee had completed plans in Rockport and Fulton for street lights, Mrs. Juergens said, and Central Power and Light employees would install them. This started Wednesday morning.

The directors instructed Mrs. Juergens to send letters to legislative representatives and to the Hale-Aikin Committee of Twenty-Four, protesting the arbitrary adopting of that committee's tentative report recommending a nine and a half month school year. Only 61 county committees had a chance to express their opinions on this before it was adopted, but there are strong indications that the rest of the counties are not willing to go along with this. As a matter of fact, the original 61 reports were split about 50-50 on the matter, according to all reports.

A nominating committee consisting of Mrs. J. D. Griggs, Rev. A. Arnott Ward and Jack McCready was appointed by President Jarboe to come up with a slate of nominees to replace the five directors whose terms expire this year. These include Mrs. Griggs, Reverend Ward, McCready, Jack McDavid and Leonard LeBlanc.

The date for the annual banquet was set for the first Tuesday in March, which will be March 3.

Directors voted Mrs. Juergens a Christmas bonus.

ATHLETIC BOOSTERS TO MEET SATURDAY

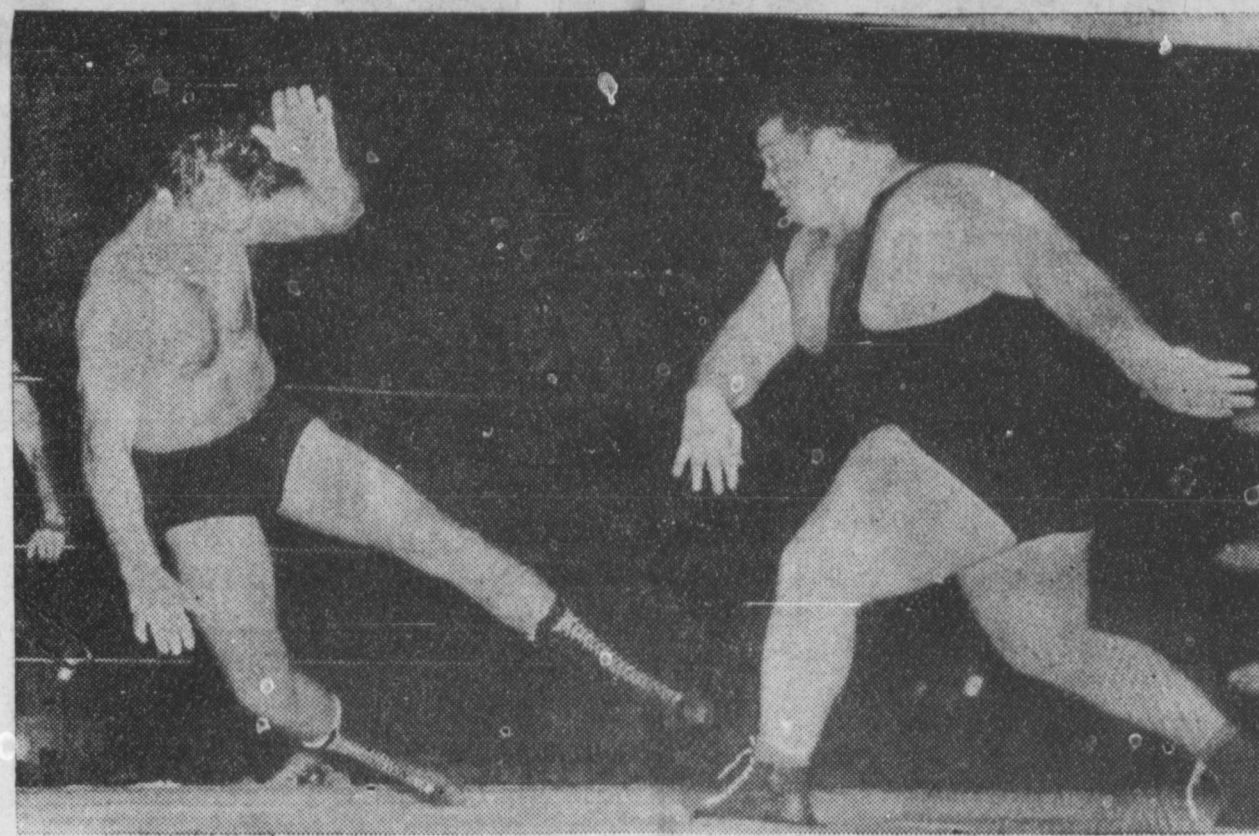

Ranger Klevenhagen, Who Helped Solve Local Murder, Dies

Johnny Klevenhagen, famous Texas ranger who fought his gun battles under a rule that gave his opponent the first shot, died Wednesday of a heart ailment.

The slender ranger's investigations had sent him against some of the state's toughest fugitives and he had gun battles on crowded city streets and in isolated rural areas.

Although most of his 17 years as a ranger were spent in the 46-county Houston district, Klevenhagen also took part in such highly publicized investigations as the 1952 murder at Alice of Jacob S. Floyd, Jr.

He was well known in Rockport, where he helped solve the hitchhike murder of Roland Thomas Dostier three years ago.

A few years ago he saw an escaped convict, Joe McCamey, fire five shots at him from a distance of 30 feet on a crowded Houston street. Klevenhagen waited until the frightened bystanders had reached safety and then "shot him loose from his pistol."

In 1956 he tracked down Tillman Halson, Jr., who had fled to the Brazos river bottoms after a Washington County sheriff's deputy had been shot.

A man of few words, Klevenhagen filed this report with his superiors:

"Searched on horseback and foot. After 275 hours located subject in Yegua creek bottom. Subject resisted and fired on ranger. Subject was killed."

Another rule of Klevenhagen, only 46 at death, was that an officer should never be proud of being tagged a gunfighter.

"He should never kill another human unless he is forced," he once said in explaining his belief that an opponent always should have the first shot.

Captain of Ranger Company A since Sept. 22, 1956, Klevenhagen was hospitalized several weeks after being stricken with the heart ailment last Dec. 20 while he was returning from the funeral services of a close friend, James Marion (Silver Dollar Jim) West, an oil millionaire who adopted police (continued on page 8)

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Portland Man Hurt in Wreck

One man was seriously injured and three others were shaken up and bruised when their late model car rolled over several times 12 miles north of Rockport on Highway 35 Wednesday night, winding up in a water-filled ditch.

All occupants of the car were residents of Portland.

Marcelino Rojas, 19, driver of the car, said he lost control of the vehicle when he was blinded by the lights of an approaching car. Rojas said he blinked his lights several times but the other driver failed to dim his lights. Rojas was not injured.

Santiago Rojas, 24, owner of the car and brother of the driver, suffered cuts on his head, possible chest injuries, and a badly bruised leg.

Less seriously injured were Epifanio Hinojosa, 18, with head cuts, and Ramon Ramirez, 23, who was only badly shaken up.

All of the injured were taken to Elliot-Hughes Hospital here for treatment.

The car was practically demolished.

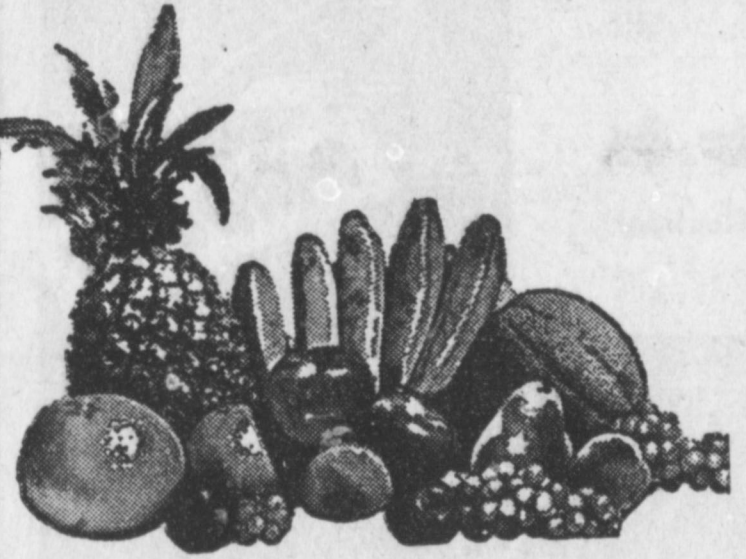

Income Tax Fax
Questions and Answers About Your Individual Income Tax Report for 1958, as Presented By the Texas Press Association.
 Now is the time to think about the tax bill you are going to pay next year because now is the time you can do something about it. You can take action now that will reduce the bill, or, if tax is withheld from your paychecks, increase the refund you will get. There are no simple questions in taxes. These columns are intended to help you in a general way to know the questions about your income and deductions and to give information of a general nature so you will be aware of the savings that may be open to you. Each taxpayer has individual circumstances and individual problems. Perhaps the simplest question you can ask is: "Do I have to file a tax return?"

You do have to file if:
 You are under 65 years of age and your income is \$600.00 or more or if you are over 65 years of age and your income is over \$1,200.00. The above applies to statutory income so before we can completely answer your question, "Do I have to file an income tax return?" we have to know the source of your income. Many kinds of income are not taxed, such as: Social Security payments; Unemployment Insurance benefits; compensation for injuries; and some pensions. Many other types of income are not statutory income subject to tax.

That is what some later columns will be about—what income is taxed and what is not taxed. Assuming you have statutory income of over \$600.00 or \$1,200.00 you are required to file an income tax return regardless of whether you are a man, woman or child. You are required to file even though you may owe no tax.

Also, if your income was from self-employment and was more than \$400.00 you are required to file an income tax return and report and pay your self-employment tax even though you do not owe income tax.

If you worked for wages and had income tax withheld from your paychecks you should file a tax return even though your earnings were less than \$600.00. This because Uncle Sam will, in that event, refund to you the tax withheld from your wages.

Shrimp Production Continues to Hold Up in Month of October

Shrimp production along the Texas coast, according to the latest release from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, rose a little in October, as 11,890,000 pounds of tails were landed at Texas ports during that month, as against 11,569,000 in September, although production for the first 10 months of 1958 was slightly smaller than the same period a year ago.
The total from January to October, inclusive, this year, was 76,126,000 against 77,246,000 a year ago.
The Aransas Pass-Corpus Christi area was one of the big producers during the month, with 1,515,000 pounds of tails, although this was a drop from September, when 2,072,000 pounds were landed.
Brownsville landings topped them all, when boats from there brought in 1,808,000 pounds, against 1,520,000 produced there in September. Third was Freeport, with 1,179,000 pounds against 1,548,000 the month before, and this was followed by Port Isabel, with landings totaling 1,016,000 pounds. Galveston only landed 431,000 pounds during the month; Port Lavaca and Palacios reported 240,000 pounds, and Rockport was close behind with 239,000 pounds, which was considerably less than the 345,000 pounds landed in September.
No oyster landings have been reported as yet.
Galveston and Freeport landed 100,000 pounds of fin fish, against 67,000 pounds in September, and Port Isabel reported 2,000 pounds, but no other Texas port showed any landings.

work as a hobby.
He was stricken again Nov. 15 while attending a Houston football game between Rice and Texas A&M.
Survivors include the widow and a son, John, a Texas A&M student.
A native of Comal County, Klevenhagen when to San Antonio in 1930 at the age of 18, determined to become a Texas Ranger. His age caused him to be turned down when he applied for a job with the San Antonio Police Department but he later admitted he grew a mustache and reapplied.
"I guess I did hedge a little on my age," he recalled. He got a job as a motorcycle officer in 1930. He later served as a chief deputy constable, a Bexas County sheriff's deputy, and as an investigator for the district attorney. It was in 1941 that he was notified by telephone that he had qualified to become a Ranger.
"I meant a cut in salary for me but I grabbed my hat, shouted that I was quitting, and lit out for Austin," he said.
The name Klevenhagen soon became a by-word to law enforcement agencies throughout the Houston district.
Klevenhagen's record caused Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., director of the Department of Public Safety, to say in Austin Wednesday that the state had lost one of its best law officers.
"The state has suffered an irreparable loss," Garrison said.

FAMILY INSURANCE FOR DISABLED WORKERS

A disability of indefinite duration is an unpleasant thought for anyone, but recent changes in the Social Security Act relieve some of the financial distress to a family when a disability cuts off the earning power of a worker, according to Thomas W. Wilson, Field Representative of the Corpus Christi district office of the Social Security Administration.
The new legislation provides for the payment of monthly social security benefits to certain dependent members of a disabled worker's family. Children under 18 years of age or disabled and the wife who has such a child in her care may now receive payments by filing an application. A wife may also qualify after she is age 62.

Aransas County Reaches 139.7% of Bond Quota

During the month of October the citizens of Aransas county purchased \$1,687 in Series E and H Savings Bonds.
This announcement was made recently by Fred Bracht, Chairman of Aransas County's Savings Bonds Committee.
"Sales for the first 10 months of this year totaled \$81,016," Chairman Bracht reported. "We have now achieved 139.7% of our 1958 goal of \$58,000."
Sales in Texas during the first 10 months of 1958 were \$146,136,258 which represents 83.5% of the 1958 goal of \$175,000,000.
"Under a recent change in Treasury regulations, individuals who hold F and G Bonds that mature after September 1, 1958, may invest the proceeds from the maturing bonds in E and H Bonds without regard to annual purchase limits," Bracht announced. "This information should be of interest to hundreds of people in this area who hold maturing F and G Bonds," the chairman stated.
Even though U.S. Savings Bonds are limited to \$10,000 investment each on Series "E" and "H," annually, the purchaser may still make a substantial investment if he so desires.
The limit is \$10,000 each calendar year. The limit applies on Bonds originally issued during a calendar year to and held by an individual, or to him with another as co-owner. For the purpose of computing this limit, bonds issued co-owners may be applied to the holdings of either or apportioned between them.
"Some people are interested in making a large investment of this kind," Bracht said today. "In cases where substantial sums of money are received and need to be invested, Savings Bonds make an ideal investment. They have the traditional safety, ease of redemption and guaranteed return.
Series "E" Bonds pay interest at the rate of 3 1/4% per annum (compounded semi-annually) when held eight years and 11 months to maturity. Series "H" are issued at par and mature at par and pay interest by check semi-annually with rates comparable to the "E" bonds on early redemption. Series "H" Bonds pay 3 1/4% interest if held for their full 10 years to maturity.
