## Virus Research **New Target of MOD**

March of Dimes funds in 1959 will be used to broaden the historymaking virus research program of the National Foundation which already is the largest of its kind in ready is the largest of its kind in existence, it was announced here Annual Banquet today by Mrs. Leonard LeBlanc, Aransas County campaign director.

"Scientists under National Foundation grants have made some of annual banquet from March 3, a the most creative medical advances of our time," he said. "They have blazed new trails not only in the fields of polio and polio prevention but also in the whole realm of medical knowledge."

Among these scientific milestones listed were: important break-throughs in knowledge of encephalitis; important data on how insects transmit disease to man; the first successful method of growing polio virus in nonnervous tissue, without which the Salk vaccine could not have been created; discovery of a whole group of heretofore unknown viruses, called ECHO viruses, some of which are harmful to man; basic facts about the nature of nucleric acid, which has been called the "automatic pilot of life."



The work will consist of grading, structures and paving of 2.7 miles from State Highway 35 to Eighth Street and State Highway 35 to Lady Clare Street in Rockport, including installation of curb and gutter, and local interests were hoping that the work could be finished before the start of the summer tourist season in June.







Employers will pay the same increase as the workers, making the total Social Security tax run per cent instead of 41/2 per cent.

The rate for self-employed persons goes up from 3% to 3% per cent, also on a \$4,800 taxable base. An estimated 11/2 million will pay the maximum 27 yer cent increase.

On the benefit side, a retired worker now getting the maximum of \$108,50 a month will receive \$116 a month, effective with his first 1959 check delivered during the first week in February. At the bottom of the scale the retired worker getting \$30 will get \$33.

In between, the minimum increase will be \$3 per month or a 7 per cent increase over the current benefit, whichever is greater. For the retired worker at the

maximum with a wife also receiving the permissible maximum based on the worker's record, the payment will go up to \$174 from

The largest possible monetary increase is for a family where several individuals are receiving benefits. The family maximum of \$200 a month is boosted to \$254.


