

The Highway Commission at Austin, Yoes said, assured that the necessary money would be forthcoming from the city immediately, had let the contract for Loop 70, the Highway 35 Business Route through Rockport, to Heldendels Brothers.

Baptists See Model Of Their New Church

Members of the congregation of the First Baptist Church were shown a scale model of the church that will be built here by architect Sam Pennington of Corpus Christi, who is drawing the plans and specifications for the building, which is estimated to cost approximately \$95,000.

The new church is being financed by a bond selling campaign, kicked off last week when Eilliam Colson, secretary of the Kingdom Builders Foundation of Corpus Christi met with the congregation.

The bonds, which come in denominations of \$100, \$250 and \$500, bear interest at the rate of

Coulson discussed the plans, which call for a masonry sanctuary with an area of 4500 square feet, seating 375 persons, and an additional educational unit of 2000 square feet which will house a nursery, library and Sunday school classrooms.

The Lions Club gave a fish fry which brought in over \$300; an outboard motor was raffled off; and all the money the club made from the barbecue at the Fourth of July drag races went into the

Aransas County Commissioners voted funds; so did the Aransas County Navigation District; while in response to letters written by Cochran big and little donations were made to the cause.

To date, about \$6,500 has been raised, and while the building is completed the department hasn't paid for all of it. As Fire Chief Owens said:

" All donations are still thankfully received until we get those obligations settled."

H. H. Dick, a local contractor, was made chairman of the building committee.

Practically every merchant in Aransas County helped. Lumber companies and everyone else furnished materials at cost. Labor was donated by members of the fire department or at cost by contractors who had to be called in. Alex Lerma, local painting contractor, painted the building for practically nothing, and Plumber Simon Lee Sorenson donated most of the fixtures and labor for the plumbing.

Today, about 18 months after the Lions took hold, the neat, green, masonry building stands in a central location in Fulton, large enough to contain an assembly hall and room for two fire engines. For, while the Lions Club had been hustling money and building materials, the Aransas County

Emergency Corps, parent organization of both the Rockport and Fulton fire departments, was hustling for a fire engine, even though its own funds were limited, and finally produced the badlyneeded piece of equipment. Through County Judge John D.

Wendell a Navy surplus truck was purchased and thoroughly over-hauled by members of the Rockport fire department. Then approximately \$1,100 in Emergency Corps funds was spent, to convert the truck to a fire engine, so that it would meet the State Underwriters' Rural Fire Department specifications.

in response to pressure from local military installations, research groups, teachers, and prominent business leaders," he said, "people who are interested in making available to San Antonio at the graduate level program of the same caliber of excellence that has marked these departments in St. Mary's undergraduate school."

"However," he continued, "it was repeatedly insisted that a graduate program must not interfere with undergraduate work, and that only an excellent program, of high quality, be sponsored."

The great growth of the University has posed many problems, Father Buehler said. In 1940, with 740 students, St. Mary's had 30 Brothers of Mary and 8 lay instructors, the cost of construction that year being only \$8,000.

In 1950, with 31 Brothers, who

are dedicated to self-denial and Saturday 7:00 a.m.; Friday night teaching, and 37 laymen, there were 1,129 students and instruction costs had jumped almost Today, less than 10 years later,

St. Mary's has about 1,600 fulltime students, 419 part-time in evening classes and at Kelly Air Force Base, as well as 2,500 in community service classes for which no credit is given.

To teach these 4,500 people, there are about 45 brothers, 65 full time lay teachers, and 35 specialists, while teaching costs have sky-rocketed to over a quarter of a million dollars a year.




