

#### Shrimp Bill Reaches Floor

Austin, Tex. - Rep. Maurice S. Pipkin's HB12 to conserve shrimp in Texas coastal water finally has reached the floor of the House. It had been bottled up in a subcommittee for weeks while various segments of the shrimping industry negotiated on terms in the legislation.

As finally approved by the House Game and Fisheries Committee the bill provides for an open season on shrimp in bay and inside waters Aug. 15 to Dec. 15.

It provides for closure of Gulf of Mexico waters for 45 days from May 15 or June 1 to July 1 or 15, depending upon biological factors. Bait shrimpers are to be allowed

to take shrimp at anytime with nets of 25 feet. A limit of 250 pounds of shrimp a day is set in

Saying that it took from three to five years of talking before action followed, he stated that it was time to begin on the drainage problem in both Rockport and Fulton, portions of both of them becoming water-logged after a wet season such as we have been hav-

Another need, Jarboe said, that must be met in the not too far distant future was that of an assured water supply. This could be remedied in two ways, he said. One of these was by tying on to the San Patricio Municipal Water District lines at Aransas Pass with a large sized main, and this would do as long as there was no great demand for industrial water. 

Have you ever thought about how many telephones you can call right from your own home. Each year a report of the World's Telephones is published by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company.

You can call 118 million telephones in the world. The surprising thing is that almost 64 million are in the United States, which is about 54%. Of the 64 million telephones in the United States 89.4% are dial operated. No other country in the world comes close to this number of telephones.

There are only fifteen countries in the world that have over one million telephones. The United Kingdom ranks second in the world with only a little over seven million telephones and only 79% of these are dial operated.

A notable addition to the World's Telephone Report this year is the official information about the Union of Soviet Socialist Republic's. Since we like to compare our standard of living to Russia's, I thought you would be interested to know that there are only three and a half millon telephones in the entire Republic of Russia and that only 46% are automatic operation.

This all proves that the United States' progress in the field of communication exceeds all other countries of the world.
