

## Along The Waterfront



AUSTIN—A bill setting size limits on trout, redbass and flounders caught by sportsmen was sent to a House subcommittee for one week.

The limits would be the same as now apply to fish caught by commercial fishermen. The bill (HB538) by Rep. John Huebner of Bay City fell only two votes short of winning approval by the game and fish committee. Unless procedural rules are suspended, bills automatically go to subcommittee.

Huebner's bill would put a 12-inch minimum on trout and flounders and a 14-inch minimum on redbass. He told the committee the measure was sponsored by sportsmen's groups and said he knew of no opposition to it.

The committee recommended passage of another Huebner bill (HB641) to prohibit taking oysters, clams and mussels from designated polluted areas for sale. The state health department would determine the areas.

Also approved was a bill (HB564) to allow landowners in the Panhandle and west of the Pecos River to select applicants for antelope hunting. At present the game and fish commission picks the hunters through public drawings. The commission would continue to be required to determine if enough antelope were available in the area to permit a harvest.

At Taylor Oak Trailer Park, Loren Ball, Oklahoma, caught 20 nice trout, Tuesday. He made a number of nice catches the past week.

Several other guests have made good catches, but did not turn in a report.

## Bishop Wins First In "Toast of Coast" Meet Held Here

Three Rockport athletes won places in the Toast of the Coast Relays here last Friday, which starless Bishop, gleaming its points one and two at a time won, with 38.

Richard Happner captured two fourth places in the senior division, one each in the 100-yard dash and the 180-yard low hurdles. Barefooted Carl Snyder, unweighed by shoes, went sailing over the bar at 10' 6" for a three-way tie in the pole vault, and, in the junior division, Roger Beasley was second in the 120-yard low hurdles.

The balanced Badgers from Bishop took exactly one blue ribbon in 15 events. Gordon Box won the discus.

But Bishop wound up with 38 points. George West had 32, Three Rivers 30, and Tidehaven 29 in a close race for second. Flour Bluff scored 19 and Tuloso-Midway 15 1/2.

Glynn Carr, Bishop's high-point man, scored only 8 1/2. He hustled for two seconds and a fourth in the field events, then ran a leg on a second-place relay team.

Henry Pickett of George West charged to impressive victories in both hurdles. He was the meet's only double winner. Pickett also was the top individual scorer with 11 1/2 points.

Donald Edwards of Three Rivers dashed 100 yards in 10.3 seconds, despite the adverse conditions. He broke the meet record on a slow dirt track. Edwards was running at an angle into a chilly south wind.

Edwards scored 10 points himself. Five records were broken. Most noteworthy were the 10.3 dash by Edwards, and a pole vault of 11-2 by Dean Nix of Tuloso-Midway.

Construction of an office for the C. L. Olsen Company of Houston, contractors for the Bay Petroleum Company stripping plant on Lamar Peninsula, started Wednesday morning.

According to W. H. Van Meter, of the Olsen Company, actual erection of the plant will start early next week.

The plant will have a capacity of 50,000,000 feet daily producing propane, butane, iso-butane, and natural gasoline at the rate of 33,000 to 48,000 gallons.

In addition, he said that recreational equipment had been installed in the lounge room, and that the department now had 19 members with more coming in.

School superintendent J. D. Gray reported that ping pong tables, the gift of the club, had been installed in the Youth Recreational Building near the high school. The material for these tables was paid for by the Lions, and they were constructed by the shop class at ACHS under supervision of Philip Baldwin.

Deputy District Governor John J. Harris, of Corpus Christi, paying his official visit to the club, complimented it highly on the work that it had done, especially on providing the fire station so badly needed in the community.

In other business, the Lions instructed Gray to compose a letter to be sent to the some 250 people who had contributed either time, money, or material to the project, thanking them; set Ladies Night for March 30, at the Yacht Basin Cafe in Fulton, with the program to be outlined by M. W. Cochran and Lion Stanley; and granted permission to Father Thomas Meany to utilize the Lions hall for the next five weeks in preparing confirmation classes. Carl D. Snyder, local teacher, was a visitor.

The letter that will be mailed to the 250 or more donors to the club's fire station project is as follows:

Fulton, Texas  
March 18, 1959  
"In the early summer of 1958 it became apparent to the citizens of Fulton that if the community was to receive the maximum protection it needed against the ravages of fire, an attempt must be made to secure a fire station.

"This seemed a futile dream at first, for there was no land upon which to build the structure and no funds to buy either the lot or the materials for construction. However, a group of determined men overcame these difficulties by soliciting the help of the entire Fulton-Rockport community and obtained the necessary land, materials, money and labor to make this dream a reality.

"Words are inadequate to express the sincere thanks to each of you who helped in this monumental undertaking. However, the completed structure stands as a permanent tribute to you and depicts your unselfish help.

"You have a special invitation to come and visit the completed building and see what your contribution has helped to provide for our community. When you pass the site in the days ahead, remember the little, yet vivid words, "thank you" from a community that cares."

## Shrimp Bill Likely to Win House Okay

A conservation bill designed to preserve the shrimp industry by closing harvest seasons in the bays and Gulf appears likely to win House passage.

The proposed regulations outlined in a bill (HB12) by Rep. Maurice Pipkin staved for five weeks in a subcommittee before winning committee approval last week.

"It's a tough bill," admitted Rep. Harold Parish of Taft, chairman of the subcommittee which moulded enough industry agreement to get the bill at least to the House calendar. Parish predicted the Senate would not take it in its present form but said he thought most of the House members' objections had been soothed. It is the first major game and fish legislation to move to the calendar in either house. Other key bills, including the prohibition of nets within 300 yards from shore in salt waters, licensing of boats, and a measure to give the game and fish commission state-wide regulatory authority, remained deep in cold storage as the Legislature began work in the second half of the session.

Pipkin's measure was rewritten in subcommittee would close the season in the bays from Dec. 15 to Aug. 15 and would provide for a 45-day closed season in the Gulf with approximately June 1 to July 15. The commission could alter the starting period 15 days either side of June 1.

There is now no closed season in the Gulf and shrimpers are permitted to work the bays from Sept. 1 to Dec. 31 and from March 1 to July 1, Parish said. Bay bait shrimpers could take shrimp during the closed season but only to be sold as bait and not for human consumption. These provisions likely will stir up a hornet's nest with the commercial fishermen.

Parish said bait shrimpers now sell to canners.

Backgrounding the issue is the shrimp peeler. Until eight years ago the industry controlled itself through refusal to market small shrimp. Shrimp then were peeled by hand. Then a shrimp peeler was invented in Louisiana to clean all sizes of shrimp. Thus the shrimpers could find a market for any sized shrimp and as a result the total poundage began to drop rapidly through premature harvest.

Parish said the revised bill would prevent the taking of shrimp when they were young—a young shrimp increases its size four times in 30 days. Parish said the bill also would put teeth in enforcement provisions preventing the taking of red shrimp which require more than 65 to make a pound or 30 a pound for white shrimp.

## Car Licenses Lagging, Says Mrs. Weber

According to Mrs. Margaret Weber, deputy in the tax collector's office, car registrations for the county are lagging. With the deadline March 31, she is anticipating a last minute rush similar to that with poll taxes on January 31, and warns that it may be impossible to take care of everyone in such case.

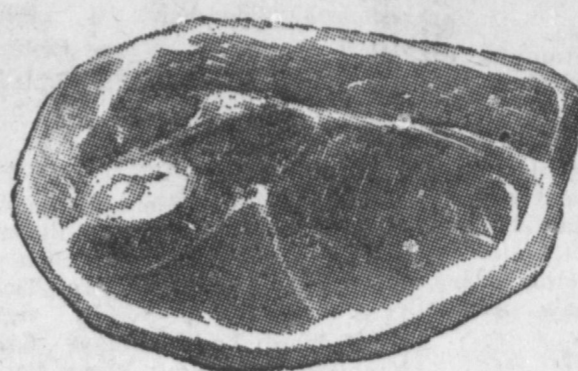

We hope that citizens in the community, aware of this lack, will come to our rescue. The life they save by doing so may be their own, or that of some member of their family."

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**Aransas Pass-Pt. Aransas Causeway Work Nearing Completion In Parts**

Barring bad weather or other unforeseen circumstances, the new Port Aransas Causeway is expected to be opened to traffic in the late fall of this year.

The new, toll-free road will replace the existing rickety structure over which Nueces County charges a toll, and clear the way for dredging a portion of the Intra-coastal Canal Cut-off, which will shorten the water route between Houston and Corpus Christi by 17 miles.

M. G. Yoes, resident engineer from the State Highway Department in Corpus Christi says that the state and federal government are sharing the cost of the new road.

The Corps of Engineers, U. S. Army, is responsible for construction of the bridge, which arches high over the site of the Intra-coastal Canal. Constructed at a cost of about \$603,000, the struc-

ture will have a vertical clearance of 50 feet so that towboats and their barges may pass without delay beneath it. The horizontal clearance is 125 feet, and the bridge and its approaches are 2096 feet long.

Elmer C. Gardner, Incorporated, of Houston, is prime contractor and expects to complete this part of the causeway next month, although dredging of the canal beneath it will take considerably longer.

The balance of the causeway is being built by the State Highway Department, as far as Harbor Island, and there will be no toll on this portion of the roadway between the island and Aransas Pass, but a ferry toll will still be charged by Nueces County, which operates the two ferries between Harbor Island and Port Aransas.

The two-lane highway is roughly 250 feet south of the existing plank-and-fill roadway over which generations of sportsmen have traveled to the Tarpon Capital of the World, as it is sometimes called. There will be three bridges in this part of the causeway, covering that part of the route that could not be easily filled, and their length will total 2700 feet. The remainder of the facility will be constructed of fill dredged from borrow pits to the south of the roadway.

The Austin Bridge Company is doing this work for the Highway Department, Yoes said, and the cost of this part of the new thoroughfare will be approximately \$900,000, Yoes said.

When finished the new causeway will be 6 1/2 miles long.

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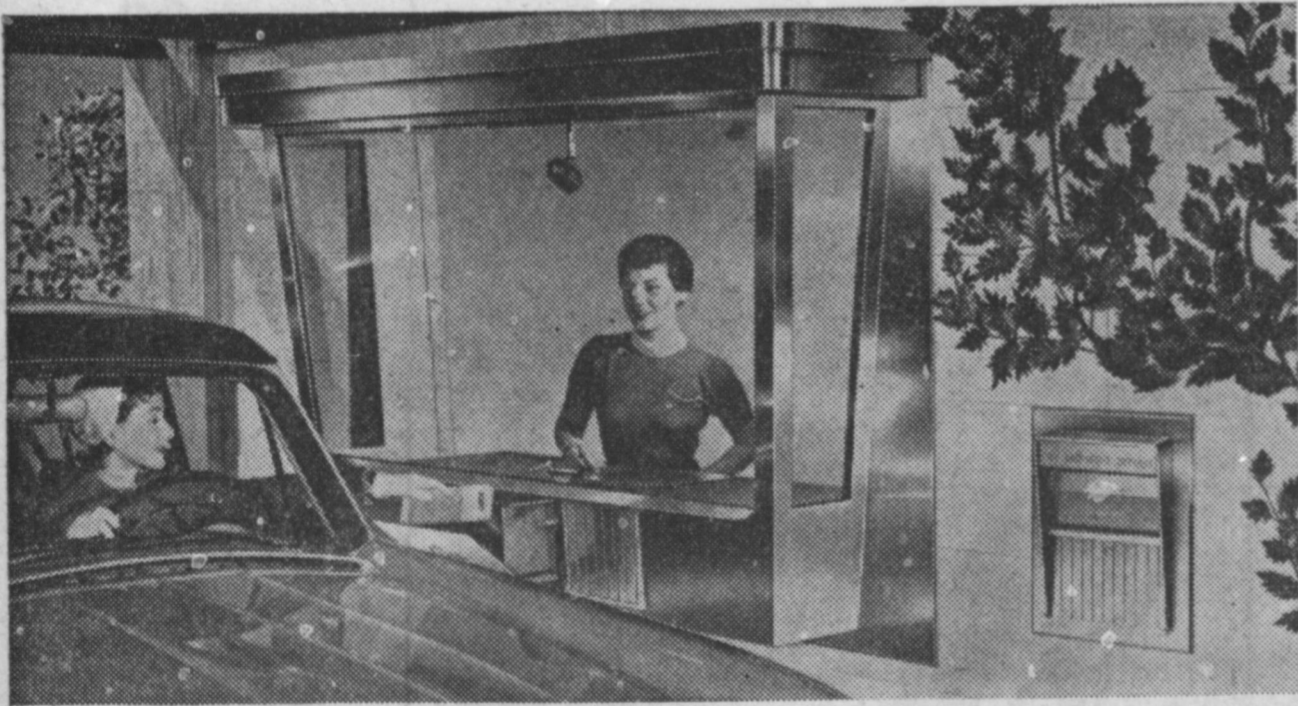
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**Philip Pritchett Joins Research Group**

**SOCIAL SECURITY PAYMENTS FOR DEPENDENT PARENTS**

A dependent aged parent of a deceased son or daughter may now receive social security payments even though the deceased worker was survived by a widow, widow or child. H. M. Cleveland, district manager of the Corpus Christi social security office says that this additional family insurance is possible as the result of recent social security amendments.

Dependent mothers and dependent fathers to whom this provision applies should get in touch with their social security office promptly, according to Cleveland.

Before a dependent mother at age 65 can receive the benefits, they must file proof of dependency with their social security office. Generally proof must be filed within two years after August 1958, when the law was amended, or within two years after the death of the son or daughter.

**Institute to Dredge Channel and Basin At Port Aransas**

The University of Texas Institute of Marine Science has applied to the U. S. Engineers for permission to construct a small boat channel just west of the south jetty at Port Aransas to care for the Institute's research vessels.

The Institute will dredge a channel and basin, construct a bulkhead and place rock riprap at this location. The riprap will start 17 feet west of the jetty and extend shoreward for 175 feet.

At this point the concrete bulkhead will start and continue around three sides of a 75 by 80 foot area, and then continue towards the Aransas Pass channel for another 175 feet to the shoreline.

A channel 30 feet wide and a basin will be dredged within the bulkhead to a depth of 6 feet at mean low tide. Spoil from the dredging will be placed on shore.

**Letter to Editor** From Harold Parish c52

Harold Parish, state representative from this district, took time out to write The Pilot a letter. He says: c52

Dear Editor: Enclosed is a copy of articles that appeared in some of the papers concerning our road to Port Aransas. As of now, I have been fighting a long time to get a free road to Port Aransas which would encourage and bring about the probability that most of the traffic that goes to Port Aransas will come through our District, thereby being of tremendous benefit to our local merchants, cafe owners and service station owners. c52

I am also enclosing a copy of a letter I received from the Texas Education Agency concerning the increased local tax rate that would be brought about by the Hale-Aiken Committee recommendations that have been presented up here. The break-down shows what the local cost is to local units under the present law and what it would be under the change, as recommended by the Hale-Aiken Committee, and the increased taxes on our local school districts which would be a total local ad valorem tax rate increase of nearly 30%. c52

This will mean, of course, that the budget-balanced, or nearly budget-balanced, school districts such as Aransas, Refugio, Gregory-Portland, Sinton and Taft would not receive any substantial increase in state aid whatsoever, as they are financed by local funds. c52

(NOTE: Parish determined this prospect in a check with the TEA on effects of the proposed \$800 a year pay raise for teachers and the other program expansions projected in the Hale-Aikin bills in the Legislature. c52

The \$800 a year salary hike for teachers represents a 24 per cent increase from \$3,202 a year to \$4,000 a year. c52

Parish found the Aransas County School District which includes Rockport and Fulton now must raise at the local level \$91,500 a year. If the Hale-Aikin program is adopted the local cost will be \$118,767 a year, an increase of \$27,267.—EDITOR. c52

Our present problem is to try to solve the deficit and provide c52

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### Bishop Garriga Noted For Humanity

The Most Reverend M. S. Garriga, D. D., LL. B., Bishop of the Diocese of Corpus Christi and Mr. South Texas of 1959, is an immensely human person, beloved by his flock for this quality, which is rapidly becoming a legend. His humanity takes many forms. Since leaving the pastorate of St. Peter's in Laredo to take over his bishopric in 1949, almost 50 churches and chapels, three hospitals, 16 schools, eight rectories, eight convents and two homes for the aged have been built under his direction. c52

Yet nothing is too small for the bishop's genuine interest. Recently, at a Rockport meeting, clergy and members of a church organization all had to defer their welcome until he superintended the parking of a car that had arrived simultaneously with his, so that the ladies in it wouldn't get their feet wet. c52

Bishop Garriga was born 72 years ago in the shadow of the old Point Isabel lighthouse—where his father was assistant keeper—and has risen to become ranking prelate in the most intensely Catholic diocese in Texas. Ordained in San Antonio in 1911, he served as chaplain of the 144th Texas Infantry in the 36th Division during World War I. c52

He became a domestic prelate in 1935; a year later he was named coadjutor bishop of Corpus Christi, titular Bishop of Siene and vicar general of the Corpus Christi diocese. He became pastor of St. Peter's in Laredo in 1943, returning to Corpus Christi in 1949; in 1952 he was invested with the Knight's Grand Cross of the Equestrian Order of the Holy Sepulchre in Jerusalem. c52

In addition, the late Pope Pius XIII, appointed him assistant to the Pontifical Throne, entitled to special privileges in ceremonies in the Holy City. c52

He has also been the recipient of the Silver Arrow, the highest award of the Boy Scouts of America. c52

Although spiritual and temporal guidance of his flock of 500,000 takes most of Bishop Garriga's time, he has, in his spare moments developed into a photographer of sympathy and understanding, whose thousands of slides and prints are envied by many a professional for their excellence. c52

A man at one of the Corpus Christi camera stores said: "The Bishop has more camera equipment than we have, and don't forget, he knows how to use every bit of it." c52

Welcome anywhere, from the lowliest stick-and-mud jacal along the border to the pilot's "office" or a commercial airliner, many people know of his hobby and go out of their way to help him with it. Several years ago, a passenger on a Brownsville flight, making conversation with the pilot in the airport coffee shop afterwards, asked: c52

"Why did you circle over that spot between Harlingen and Brownsville?" c52

"Oh!", came the reply, "we had Bishop Garriga up forward with us, and he wanted to take some pictures." c52

Another anecdote tells of a time when news photographers, covering an august assemblage of Catholic prelates, were surprised, on developing their prints, to see the good bishop leaning from his aisle seat, taking photographs of them and the speaker. c52

"But that was the only way I could get them," the Bishop said, when queried about this. c52

When asked to see some of his own prints, he replied, with an impish twinkle: c52

"But that would take a month!" c52

So, as he is an extremely busy man, as well as a greatly-beloved one, it was necessary to compromise on an afternoon shortly after he had returned from Laredo's annual Washington's birthday celebration. There, following a long line of other distinguished Texans, he had been chosen Mr. South Texas, because of his contributions to religion, education, and youth work, his stand against communism, and promotion of better understanding between people of all faiths. c52

Asked, from a technical standpoint, to pick out the best picture he has ever made among the thousands of 35 mm slides he has accumulated, he threw up his hands, but finally selected several he had made of religious paintings. c52

However, there was no question in his mind about the one he liked best. c52

"This one," he said, holding up a tremendously appealing picture of a child. c52
