Mrs. A. L. Bachman Heads Cancer Drive

At 9 a. m., April 21, the Woman's Club at Rockport will be the meeting place for the American Cancer Society workers who will participate in the Cancer Society fund raising campaign. Some organization who needs money will serve doughnuts and coffee.

Mrs. A. L. Bachman will again head the drive and will need all available help in making this effort successful. She urges you to please attend this meeting and learn more of the needs for this activity.

Aransas County has increased so much in population since the last drive it will be necessary to materially increase the county quota. Remember, 60c of every dollar is spent in the State of Texas. Since most of this county's hospital patients are sent to Houston, 60% of our money is used in the cancer clinic there.

The two pilots are from Seattle, Wash., and have a deep-rooted personal interest in the fight against cancer. They will do everything possible to beat the current record of 65 days in the air and bring outstanding attention to the 1959 Cancer Crusade. This Cancer Crusade special event is sponsored as a public service by a newly-formed corporation called Crusade Flight, Inc. This is a volunteer project and is being conducted at no cost to the American Cancer Society.

The single-engine plane will be clearly marked ACS Crusader in "Safety Slight" fluorescent aircraft paint, giving it tremendous "visibility." The pilots will use a PA system to urge the public's support for the fight against cancer.

Ed Barnard will run a 7-minute film at the Cove next week, also cooperating.

San Pat VFW to Meet Monday On VA Hospital

New steps toward seeking a Veterans Administration hospital for South Texas were taken at a meeting of the San Patricio Council, Veterans of Foreign Wars, here at 8 p. m. Monday.

Commander Jack A. Buck, of Mathis, said that resolutions composed at the meeting will be transmitted through VFW channels to Houston officials. The resolutions will be presented to VA Administrator Sumner T. Whittier of Washington, D. C., when he comes to Houston April 15 to consult with South Texas veterans organizations.

Comprising the council are VFW posts in Odem, Orange Grove, Alice, Mathis, Sinton, Ingleside, Aransas Pass, Rockport, Beeville and three in Corpus Christi.

Precinct One Vote Calls for Second Election

Because Precinct 1 candidates Frazier Cantrell and Jack Horton tied with 62 votes each in Tuesday's race for councilman, residents of that part of Rockport will get another shot at electing someone to represent them.

State law governing such cases says:

"At any election, general or special, if there be an equal number of votes given to two or more persons for the same office, except executive offices as provided in the Constitution, and no one elected thereto, the officer to whom the returns are made shall declare such election void as to such office only, and shall immediately order another election to fill such office; and notice shall be given, and such other election shall be held in the same manner as the general election. Provided, however, if the 2 persons concerned shall agree in writing, filed with the returning officer upon a different method of deciding which of the two shall be declared elected, the decision shall be made in that manner and the special election not ordered."

Election judges Mrs. A. L. Brundrett, Mrs. Fred Diederch, Mrs. Mary Alice Gray, and Mrs. J. H. Malchar checked and rechecked, but the count came out the same every time, with the result that the City Council met Tuesday afternoon, canvassed the votes, and set a new election for May 14, at which time the question of who shall be councilman from Precinct One will be decided.

However, there's an unexpected kicker in the law. City Attorney Dick Hatch, after consultation with the Attorney General's office, says that as many people as wish can file for the place and run, and that the race is not confined to Cantrell and Horton if anyone else wishes to become a candidate!

Filing must be done on or before midnight Monday, April 13, absentee voting starts April 24 and stops May 10. Voting place is the City Hall, and election judges are Mrs. A. L. Brundrett, Mrs. Mary Alice Gray, Mrs. Fred Diederch, and Mrs. J. H. Malchar.

Horton, a tourist court operator, is filling the unexpired term of Col. James W. Porter, who resigned approximately a year ago, and is owner of the Oleander Courts, Cantrell, charter boat operator, owns the fishing craft Balboa and has been in the tourist court business since coming to Rockport, selling out a couple of years ago to Bill Hottle, present owner of the Balboa Courts.

In Precinct 2, V. A. Dully, Jr., defeated Roy Rogero by a count of 107 to 88. Dully, a tourist court operator, is a newcomer to politics; Rogero, co-owner of The Pilot, has served three terms as councilman.

Refuge Head To Leave Wildlife Post

Claude F. Lard, manager of the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge the past 2½ years, expects to leave in about two weeks for a new assignment.

Lard has been named assistant regional supervisor of branch refuges in Region 5, a 10-state New England region. His headquarters will be in Boston.

Lard's principal duties will be the evaluation of land to be acquired for more water fowl refuges.


Lard came to the Aransas refuge in November, 1956, from Louisiana, where he had been manager of the Lacassine National Wildlife Refuge.

Disaster Fund Set Up Here As United Fund Makes Drive Ready

Directors of the Aransas County United Fund, at their Wednesday night meeting, approved a goal of \$10,560 for this year, set up a disaster fund to be administered by the county judge, mayor of Rockport, chief of the fire department and the head of the United Fund, and discussed procedures to be followed in the upcoming drive, slated for the middle of the summer.

In passing the resolution establishing the disaster fund, directors pointed out that the United Fund had an excess of approximately \$2,800 and that there was no valid reason why this should not be allocated to some worthy cause.

Because Rockport and Live Oak Peninsula are subject to annual threats from storms, the directors said, they deemed it wise to establish a fund to be held in reserve against such disaster, if one should occur, and to build it up to \$10,000, so that instant relief might be obtained if needed.

They therefore allocated \$2,500 of the excess funds to this, to be known as the Aransas County Disaster Fund, and earmarked \$1,500 from this year's drive for the same purpose. A similar amount will be set aside every year until the desired total is reached.

In other action, the directors approved the following requests for participation:

USO, \$346; Corpus Christi Chippled Children's Hospital, \$500; Boy Scouts, \$1,500; Red Cross, \$1,549; Junior Youth Organization, \$150; Library Board, \$600; Blinded Veterans Foundation, \$26; Gonzales Warm Springs Foundation, \$1,100; Youth Sponsors Organization, \$125; Mental Health Foundation, \$35.06; Girl Scouts, \$1,680; Aransas County Emergency Corps, \$1,000; Aransas County Youth Council, \$350; and the Heart Association, \$100.

In the ensuing discussion about organizations that refused to take part in the United Fund, it was pointed out that although the Cancer Fund had been invited to participate, and could, under the terms of its charter, it preferred to run its own drive, expecting to obtain more money in that manner.

Cedar Bayou Work Progressing

Latest reports from Cedar Bayou indicate that, despite a slow start due to wet weather, good progress is now being made on the levees on the south side of the pass, with approximately 25% of this work completed.

Kingfisher Dredging Co. of Port Lavaca has indicated that dredging will probably start about April 15. Two dredges may be used at the commencement of the work, if he carries out plans as indicated.

Burglars Held, Others Sought

Sheriff A. C. Shivers said Monday morning that two Rockport establishments had been burglarized Sunday night.

Burglars gained entrance to the Del Mar Grill by smashing the glass of the front door with a brick and took about \$60 in change and some candy and cigars.

A Billups filling station on Highway 35 was entered the same night, and about \$12 to \$15 was taken.

Deputy Sheriff Sherman Mundine, while investigating both cases, arrested three other burglars and cleared up the March 20 burglary of the Star Package Store here.

An 18-year-old youth was arrested about 3 p. m. Monday afternoon in Austwell by Mundine and Deputy Slim Haynes, and two juveniles, 15 and 16, were arrested later in Rockport in connection with the latter theft.

In signed statements the three youths admitted attempting to enter the store, owned by Bob Naper, through a rear entrance, Mundine said. Failing this, they smashed the glass in the front door, he continued.

Naper reported loss of 27 bottles of liquor in the break-in, as well as a quantity of gum and cigarettes. Mundine said that a small amount of the liquor was recovered after the youths were arrested.

He is continuing investigation of the Sunday thefts.

Work On North End of Cut-off Scheduled in May

According to H. L. Sisson, head of the Corps of Engineers office in Corpus Christi, the Bauer-Smith Dredging Co. expects to put another dredge into operation dredging on the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off between Rockport and Old Ingleside about the middle of May.

One of the company's dredges is now at work on the route, which will shorten the Houston-Corpus Christi canal route by approximately 17 miles, and is working north from the Aransas Pass channel. The cut-off, paralleling the shore between Rockport and Ingleside, will pass just outside the Aransas County Navigation District's new harbor at the Cove, a mile south of Rockport, and very close to Conn Brown Harbor at Aransas Pass.

First FHA Home Now Building In Shadyside Addition

The first FHA financed home is now underway in Shadyside Addition, according to Leonard LeBlanc, of the Rockport Lumber Co. It will be a three bedroom, stone veneer and frame, he said.

Other construction recently completed by the company includes a boat barn and apartment on Highway 35, built for G. U. Deitzel of San Antonio.

The lower portion of the building has room for nine closed boat stalls for outboards, and the upper story is an apartment that the Deitzels intend to use for summer living. In addition, Deitzel had LeBlanc construct two single bedroom houses on the same property.

Plans for Athletic Boosters Barbecue Proceeding Nicely

According to Sheriff A. C. Shivers, president of the Athletic Boosters Club, plans for the Athletic Boosters' barbecue scheduled for Saturday, April 11, are proceeding nicely.

The barbecue proceeds will go to pay off the \$600 balance due on the big clock at the Pirate stadium, installed last fall, during football season.

There will be plenty of barbecued chicken and all the trimmings, and the price will be one dollar a plate to the public.

However, as a membership drive is part of the program, Sheriff Shivers said, all paid up members, whether new or renewal can attend free of charge by showing their membership card.

Membership in the organization costs \$2.

The scene of the barbecue will be at the Lions Pit, in front of the Woman's Club building.

Edwards Tract On Lamar Peninsula Sold to G. Warren

Cochran Realty Handles Sale for Asby Minor James of Austin who Is Improving Tasselfoot Village; Other Construction Booming Ahead

Sale of the 830-acre Kate Edwards tract on Lamar Peninsula was completed this week by Asby Minor James of Austin to Guy I. Warren, of Corpus Christi. The transaction was handled by M. W. Cochran.

This acreage is located just north of the old Lamar Townsite, and has a mile of waterfront on St. Charles Bay, while 450 acres of the tract are covered with live oaks.

Warren said that he purchased the tract for an investment.

Other Lamar developments were also well underway this week.

LIGHT VOTE MARKS SCHOOL ELECTIONS

Three Aransas County School trustees and two for the Aransas County Independent School District succeeded themselves here last Saturday in an election that was marked by a paucity of votes, only about 100 ballots being cast for all five men.

Rob Johnson and Charles A. Roe, Jr., totaled 52 votes. Twenty-nine of these were cast for Roe in Precinct 2; Johnson, running from Precinct 3 and 4 received 14 votes in Fulton and nine at Lamar.

In the county vote, Richard Fox, from Precinct 2, totaled 19 votes; Arthur Bracht, Precinct 3, 14 votes; and Roscoe Johnson, running for trustee at large came under the wire with 51 ballots.

L. O. Hill Dies This Morning As Result of Two-car Crash Monday

L. O. Hill, of Fulton, died early this morning, at three o'clock, as the result of a two-car crash late Monday morning a mile east of Gregory on Farm Road 632.

With Hill at the time of the crash were his wife, who received rib injuries, and his sister, Mrs. G. H. Jones.

Taken to Spohn Hospital, Hill was found to have injuries of the right arm, leg and chest. Mrs. Jones received a fractured lower jaw, and both she and Mrs. Hill are still in the hospital.

Willard Wayne Griffin, a retired naval chief petty officer, driver of the other car, received a bruise on the abdomen, but was listed as in good condition immediately after admission to the U. S. Naval Hospital at Corpus Christi.

Highway Patrolmen J. W. Bissett and K. D. Woolsey said that Hill was driving towards Ingleside when the nearly-head-on collision occurred, and both vehicles were demolished.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m. Saturday from the First Presbyterian Church.

James has a nine-hole pitch-and-putt golf course under construction, and is lengthening the fishing pier and channel leading to Old Tasselfoot Village. In addition, a new water supply has been tapped for the area and a clubhouse is being constructed to be used by residents. In addition, shelters are being erected and camping facilities provided along the north boundary of the property on the boat channel.

Biggest news, however, after the sale of the Edwards tract, is that foundations are being poured as rapidly as possible on the Bay Petroleum Company's \$1 million plus stripping plant on the northern shore of Copano Bay.

W. H. Van Meter, in charge of the job for the Olsen Construction Co. of Houston, said that the foundations will take approximately three weeks to finish, and then pipe fabrication will start on the site.

The plant, which belongs to a subsidiary of the Tennessee Gas Transmission Company, is scheduled for completion in about six months, according to Van Meter, and he is adding men to his work force as rapidly as conditions will warrant until he reaches a maximum of 75 or 80.

The stripping plant, when completed, will handle about 50 million cubic feet of gas per day, and will manufacture LPG products. Permanent employees will number between 12 and 15, he said.

Between the stripping plant and the James and Warren developments, the contractor for the Mother House of the Schoenstatt Sisters of Mary has poured floors and foundations for the \$120,000 building, one of only two in the United States, and expects to start up with the walls in the near future.

The completed structure will be located on grounds formerly belonging to the little Chapel of Our Lady Star of the Sea, of which the late Bishop Ledvina, of Corpus Christi, was so fond.

Closer to Rockport, on this side of Copano Bay, the 27-unit government housing project at Aransas County Airport, planned to care for part of the personnel at the 813th AC&W Squadron, is 99% complete, County Surveyor James A. Jarboe said this morning.

Topping still has to be put on the streets, landscaping must be completed, and a few minor details of installation have to be finished, Jarboe stated, but final inspection is slated for April 28.

Former Rockport Teacher Writes Second Book

A former Rockport educator, Mrs. Violet West Sone, who taught school here from 1936 to 1942, has written her second book, "13 Innocents Abroad," scheduled for publication on April 30 by Naylor's of San Antonio.

Mrs. Sone, when she lived here, published her first book, "Finger of Earth," a volume of verse centered about the Rockport region. Her latest deals with a trip to Europe, made by 12 women and one lonely and intrepid male.

In one delightfully whimsical volume are those experiences best suited to every reader who would partake, vicariously, thrills and excitement shared with those fortunate enough to tour the Old World.

There are all sorts of trips to Europe. Violet West Sone's was complete, comprehensive and richly satisfying in every respect, and she imparts an attention to detail and a pervading, dry humor which makes the book well worth reading.

The author was born near Beverly, Kansas, migrating during high school days to West Texas, where she attended the West Texas State Normal School, and embarked on a teaching career at 16.

She is the wife of Robert A. Sone, county attorney of Floyd County, and the mother of two children.

She served, during her career, as president of the Corpus Christi branch of the American Associa-

tion of University Women, second vice president of the Texas Division of the organization, and member of its state education committee.

Her published work has appeared in the pages of Jack and Jill, Different, Texas Outlook, Naylor's Epic-Century, and the annual publication of the Texas Folklore Society. "Finger of Earth" was written as a master's thesis at the University of Texas.

Border Raider

The greatest Indian fighter of them all—General Ranald Slidell Mackenzie—is best known in Texas for the raid into Mexico which still bears his name.

Mexicans renegades, Kickapoo, Lipans, Mesquero Apaches and all sorts of border riffraff, safe in villages below the boundary, raided across the Rio Grande. They tortured, murdered, raped, stole, and sold their captives into slavery, finding sanctuary across the river.

The situation was intolerable and Mackenzie was told, orally, by his commanding officer, General Phil Sheridan, that President Grant wanted the mess cleaned up, and that it was up to him—Mackenzie—to do whatever was necessary.

Stationed at old Fort Clark, in the outskirts of present-day Brackettville, as commander of the Fourth Cavalry, Mackenzie shod his horses and drilled his men, waiting until the time was ripe. Then suddenly one night he gave the command to saddle and ride and, without taking anyone into his confidence but his adjutant, led 400 men and 20 Seminole Indian scouts across the Rio Grande.

When the pack mules couldn't keep up, the colonel ordered his troopers to fill their pockets with hardtack, then cut the packs loose, so the jarheads could stay with the column.

Sixty miles below the border, at Remolina, he led a torrential flood of men, horses and guns against three villages occupied by the renegades and tribesmen, burning the huts and jacals to the ground. At least 19 warriors were killed, against one man for Mackenzie, and a number of others were wounded. Forty women and children were captured, as well as Castillitos, the Lipan chief, and 56 head of stolen ponies.

Herding his captives together, Mackenzie kept his men in the saddle and spurred for Fort Clark, carrying his three wounded men in horse litters, with squaws and papooses on the backs of repossessed horses.

The troopers had been without food for nearly two days, except for the hardtack, and the Indian children had to be tied to their ponies, lest they fall off when they slept from exhaustion. His officers threatened mutiny when they discovered he had no formal orders for the foray; the troopers cursed him for a mad man, and slept, reeling in their saddles.

Thirty-two hours after they had left Fort Clark, after 160 miles of continuous marching, broken only by the fight, they boiled across the river and fell off on friendly soil to sleep.

Mackenzie's raid, as it came to be known, threw practically every politician in the United States and Mexico into a terrific tizzy over invasion of a friendly nation by troops from another. Mexican protests were vicious, voluble and vigorous, but President Grant would not leave a loyal officer holding the sack. In spite of howls for Mackenzie's scalp, he, General

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Rockport History In Corpus Christi Caller Last Sunday

In the Sunday Corpus Christi Caller there was a story by staff writer Travis Moorman that is reprinted here because it contains so much Rockport history, as a service to The Pilot readers who may have missed it. Dated Sinton, it says:

In 1910 Roy Jackson opened a Ford agency in Rockport and sold his first automobile to Charlie Cleveland.

Forty-nine years, give or take a few days, and some 15,000 sales later, Jackson sold his last Ford the other day — again to Charlie Cleveland.

Jackson's agency, The Roy Jackson Motor Co., was the oldest Ford dealership in Texas under a continuous ownership. He recently sold it to Gene Pullin of Taft and transfer of the agency franchise was approved last week.

Jackson's son, Milton, was president and operating manager of the agency from 1955 until its sale.

Jackson came to Rockport in 1905 to enter the seafood business. Five years later he got a yen to own an automobile. About the same time he learned he could purchase the Ford agency at Rockport for \$150 and decided to sell himself his first car.

This agency, owned by a Dr. Miller and E. E. Jacobs, a Rockport jeweler, held a franchise for the city only and had handled only three cars. Jackson obtained his agency franchise for Aransas, Refugio and San Patricio Counties.

"It's possible I could have gotten additional territory for the asking since some dealers then had as many as 17 counties," Jackson said. Jackson's first Ford cost him \$1,025. Cleveland paid \$1,000. The dealer was a little "sportier" than his first customer and paid an extra \$25 for Presto headlights in place of the standard carbide lights.

Both cars had solid aluminum bodies, brass radiators, and a kick like a mule. The car Cleveland bought the other day was an air-conditioned model. So was the first, but by nature. Years ago, Jackson traded Cleveland out of that original car and has displayed it on his showroom floor when showing the new models each year.

Cleveland said he ran that first Ford for five years, transporting hunters and fishermen to Rockport and in a taxi service. He still regards it as one of the best jit-

neys he has ever owned. Jackson had it brought up from the warehouse to the showroom when transferring the agency and it chugged the six blocks without missing a lick.

"Practically all of our early customers were buying their first car and we had to teach them how to drive — at least well enough to get it home," Jackson said.

"In my time, I've taken in chickens, cows and boats on car trades," Jackson said. "I guess I traded for just about everything but a lion and I had a chance at that but turned it down. I've regretted it ever since."

Seems a circus got stranded in Mathis for several months. The Jackson Ranch is some five miles south of that city and on still days they could hear the lion roaring up a storm. Jackson was propositioned to take the lion in on a car trade for \$300. Mrs. Jackson objected so strenuously to owning a lion that he turned it down. A week or so later, the owner sold the big cat for \$500.


"I still wish I'd made that trade," Jackson said Thursday, chuckling. "I've often wondered what Rob Welder (late Sinton rancher) would have said if I'd called him telling him I was sending him out a present and then sent that lion out to his home."

"I can recall lots of amusing incidents over the years, some that didn't seem particularly funny at the time," Jackson said. "I remember one time a company man came down to Rockport with a 'burr under his tail' over some company matter. I took that fellow back in the parts room and showed him my layout and assured him I was doing everything I could to make the agency one of the best — even had \$300 worth of spare parts in stock! I suppose the average agency carries \$30,000 in parts now."

Jackson estimates he sold more than 15,000 new Fords in his 49 years of dealership. Before paved roads, they were about the only cars able to negotiate the South Texas roads, especially when it rained, he said.

Jackson opened his Sinton dealership in 1917 and many of his original customers still come around for a new one when the models change. T. B. Owen has purchased more than 50 Fords from the agency and the Hart family more than 100.

He sold T. C. Hart his first car and taught him how to drive it out to the farm. Then Earl and Irving, sons of T. C., purchased

their first car from Jackson as did their sons, Eddie and Cecil.

Under the new ownership, the agency will be known as the Gene Pullin Motors, Inc. Pullin was employed by Jackson at the Taft Motor Co. for a number of years.

Pullin said he will retain the personnel already associated with the business. Among these is James R. Kirkpatrick, parts manager who has never drawn a paycheck from anyone except Jackson. Kirkpatrick came down from Beeville in October, 1918, to work a couple of months while sweating out the draft. Along came the Armistice and Jimmy stayed on. Another veteran of the business is Claude Reynolds, who retired two years ago after 40 years with the firm.



SOCIAL SECURITY REPRESENTATIVE SCHEDULES VISITS

A representative of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration will continue his regular visits to Rockport during the next three months, according to H. M. Cleveland, district manager.

Anyone wanting information about his rights and obligations under the Social Security Act should meet with the representative who will be in the courthouse at 9 a. m., on Thursdays, April 16 and 30; May 14 and 28, and June 11 and 25.

Applications for old-age, survivors, and disability insurance benefits will be accepted by the social security representative.

Persons who have reached retirement age may earn as much as \$2,080 in a year and receive some social security retirement insurance if they file an application for the benefits, Cleveland stated.

It is not necessary to have an appointment to see the representative; however, an appointment may save time and can be obtained by writing to the Social Security Administration, 530 South Water St., Corpus Christi.

Homestead Subject to Sale For Taxes

Many Texans have the mistaken impression that their homestead cannot be seized and sold for delinquent taxes. In many cases, this idea has led to considerable grief and monetary loss which could have been avoided. A homestead should be rendered to tax assessors like any other property, and taxes assessed against it should be paid as faithfully as those on any other taxable property.

The deadline for rendering property for taxation is April 1, so far as most city taxing agencies are concerned. The last date for rendering real and personal property for state and county taxes is April 30. State taxes are collected by the County Tax Collector.

Under the Texas Constitution, each family is entitled to claim one piece of real property as their homestead. This claim must be established by an affidavit filed with the county tax assessor on or before April 30, each and every year. This affidavit must be filed by the owner himself. A lending agency cannot do so, even though it may actually pay the annual

taxes thereon from a fund created by the owner's monthly installments.

When the homestead affidavit is properly filed, the owner becomes entitled to an exemption of State taxes up to the value of \$3,000 or 200-acres in the case of farm lands. This is an exemption from payment, not a complete exemption from rendition and assessment. There is no similar exemption with reference to county or city taxes.

The homestead claimed for tax purposes need not be the property which is actually occupied by the owner as his residence.

When the homestead affidavit is not filed by April 30, the taxpayer loses his right to the \$3,000 or 200-acre exemption, and consequently becomes liable for more taxes than he would otherwise be required to pay.

Property taxes are assessed against the person who is the record owner of each piece of real and personal property on the first day of January of each year. Individuals purchasing property during the year should make sure that the taxes for all previous years have been paid. Otherwise, the purchaser may be forced to pay hundreds of dollars in delinquent taxes to protect his property. Unpaid taxes create a lien against the property which can be enforced regardless of change of ownership.

One should keep in mind to make some arrangement for the previous owner to pay his pro-rata share of taxes for the current year. Otherwise, the buyer may find it necessary to pay the entire taxes for that year.

When taxes are not paid by the deadline prescribed for the particular taxing unit (city, county, state, or district), monetary penalties and interest are added from month to month. In addition, the property becomes subject to seizure and sale to satisfy the tax lien. This lien applies to all property, whether homestead or not.

LT. DICK DOWLING

The Fighting Irishman Who Stood Against an Army

Austin, Texas. — The 2.4 billion-dollar appropriation bill which passed the House late Tuesday includes \$165,000 for operations during the next biennium of a free ferry between Harbor Island and Port Aransas on Mustang Is'nd.
House advocates of the provision that will relieve Nueces County of some \$70,000 a year in ferry costs said the problem now is to make sure the money is not taken out of the bill by the Senate or the Free Conference Committee into which the bill is certain to go.
Rep. Harold Parish of Taft appeared before the House Appropriations Committee to ask for a "freerod" to Port Aransas, the only community in Texas that doesn't have one.
Rep. W. N. Woolsey helped the cause by serving on the committee which wrote the \$165,000 item into the bill.
The appropriation would relieve Nueces County of responsibility for ferry operation under a minute order signed with the highway department at the time the new causeway, now under construction, was authorized.
