Officers and Men at Radar Site Entertain Rockport Residents by Guided Tours through Base Friday

OFFICERS AND MEN AT RADAR SITE ENTERTAIN ROCKPORT RESIDENTS BY GUIDED TOURS THROUGH BASE FRIDAY

Officers and men of the 813th Aircraft Control and Warning Squadron at Aransas County Airport were hosts Friday afternoon to guests from Rockport who were shown the facilities at the base and saw, first hand, the ceaseless watch maintained to protect America against surprise attack.

"The control phase of the squadron's mission," said Major Verle Harris, station commander, in a preliminary explanation, "deals with controlling our own aircraft, keeping them on certain flight plans, and helping them in case they develop engine or other trouble which would force them to land.

"The second phase deals with early warning and destruction of a possible enemy attack. As this station has been in operation for a period of time, we feel sure that you will be interested in knowing something of the work we do, and the part which we contribute to nation-wide defense."

Guests were piloted through the installations in groups of five to eight and inspected the bachelor officers' quarters, power room, bachelor airman's quarters, orderly room, store room, operations room, power house, recreation building, and the messhall, where they were served coffee and doughnuts at the end of their tour.

Major Harris said that tentative plans call for an open house on Armed Forces Day, May 16, when the general public will have a chance to inspect the base as soon as security plans can be worked out.

In the words of one of the visitors who made the rounds:

"The most exciting and awesome place was, of course, the operations room itself. It is reassuring and comforting (but horrible, too) to realize that in a network embracing our land, and even our own small town, endless relays of faithful fellows are sitting perched over these radar screens, without interruption, searching, spotting, reporting . . .

"It is sad that such a way of life has become necessary.

"The fellows manning the various posts in this room never took their eyes off their work.

"All the men were so keen, courteous and kind. And everything was spotless and in perfect order. The barracks for officers, those for the enlisted men, were perfect, and the houses built for the married men are ready and being furnished, as many of the families will move in in June.

"Their storeroom was a model of efficiency. They know where every single thing is, and can find it right off, from the smallest screw to mammoth equipment. And if they are short anything, they can get it from other points by air in no time at all, as they have 'hot wires' to all other Air Force bases like this one, which all have the same inventory system.

"They rate practically perfect in control of this.

"The power station was marvelous. They are now using electricity from special high tension lines. But huge Diesel engines and generators stand at the ready in this power house and, in event of outside power failure, they can switch their own power on in less than a minute, and make the change over from outside power to their own generators in less than 30, if the engines are already running.

"They practice this often and have to maintain the 30-second time limit on the switch-over.

Another interesting room was the one in which they were in constant communication with planes in the air. It was weird to pass devices from which pilots far overhead were talking at you."

"We also visited the dispensary, sick bay and PX.

"The tour ended at the mess hall, where we were taken through the spotless kitchen, store rooms, refrigerators, etc. Then to the dining room where we had hot coffee, doughnuts and sweet rolls. It took us two hours, and was 3 p.m. when we left."

Lloyd Richardson Gets Cove Contract

The contract for construction of Aransas County's fifth harbor, authorized three weeks ago, has been signed by Aransas County Navigation District Commissioners and Jimmy Thwing of Lloyd W. Richardson Construction Co. of Aransas Pass.

Contract price is \$211,689.19, and work is supposed to start within 15 days, although, in order to save money and facilitate the project, the Navigation District has given Thwing to delay this "until such time as the present construction of the Intra-coastal Waterway progresses to the area adjacent to the 'Cove,' or until such time as he requests issuance of work authorization, which has been held up, pending these developments.

This harbor, a mile south of town, is to be dredged to a depth of 11 feet below mean low tide, and will extend for 1,200 feet east and west and approximately 750 feet north and south, and will be in the form of a capital "E." Available dockage in the new basin will amount to almost a mile and is planned for work boats of all types, as well as for light industries.

A feature of the new harbor is a high levee surrounding it on all sides to furnish protection to boats in case of storms.

Access will be furnished by highway and rail, and it is planned to use it as a barge terminal as well.

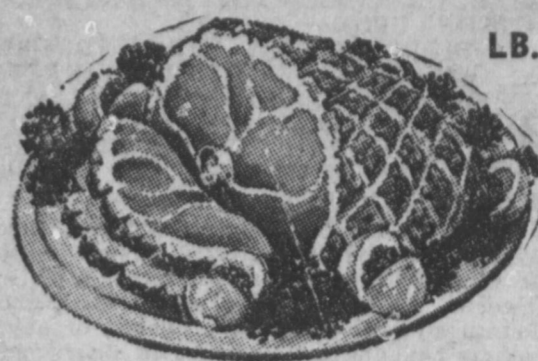

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

Robert M. Williamson

Guardian of the People's Rights

Robert M. Williamson, wise and witty editor, lawyer and statesman of San Felipe, Stephen F. Austin's colony, was respected and loved by his neighbors of early-day Texas. They called him "Three-Legged Willie" because of a stiff knee he always used a very fancy cane. One of the many stories told of Three-Legged Willie is dated 1834, when, as the colonists' troubles with Mexico grew to fighting pitch, he and other patriots of San Felipe marched to join the loyal Texans at the Guadalupe River. There his assignment was to protect a precious 4-pounder cannon. A Mexican force under Captain Castenado arrived to demand the cannon. Williamson hand-lettered a large sign which he placed on the cannon, in full view of the Mexicans. The message on the sign was brief and to the point. "Come and take it!" 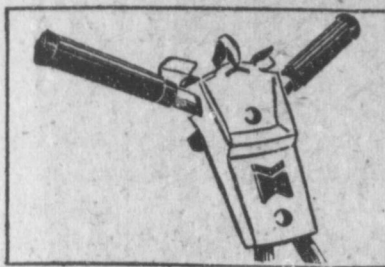
