# **Water Plant Hopes Soaring**

The decision to build the first plant on the gulf and a second on the west coast was announced Monday night by Secretary of the Interior Seaton. Three others, one on the east coast and two inland, also are to be constructed. Seaton said he will announce

soon the exact location for the gulf and west coast plants. He said one is expected to produce fresh water from sea water at a cost of less than \$1 per 1000 gallons.

Seaton's announcement, in a speech to the National Watershed congress, drew this comment from Rep. Young (D-Texas):

"I'm happy the interior department has seen fit to build the first plant on the gulf. I'm hopeful now it will go to Texas, and especially to my district."

Corpus Christi and Rockport, both in Young's district, are Presbyterian Church here. among several Texas cities seeking the plant. Other Texas cities have filed for one of the two inland brackish water plants.

Rep. Kilgore (D-Texas), who represents a section of the Rio Grande valley, said:

"We're hopeful Seaton's announcement puts us a step nearer getting a plant."

# **Activates Fishing Boat Loan Program**

A mortgage and loan insurance program designed to facilitate financing the construction of modern fishing vessels was announced today by Secretary of the Interior Fred A. Seaton.

Under this program the Government guarantees the repayment of mortgages and loans up to 75 percent of the vessel cost. For this guarantee, the vessel owner will pay the Government a premium of one percent of the amount due on mortgages, except that when the mortgages is for 50 percent or less of the vessel cost, the rate will be three-quarters of one percent. The premium on loans will be one-half of one percent.

A mortgage does not apply until a vessel has been constructed and -registered. The term "loan" applies to that period before completion and registry. Mortgage insurance will be limited to 15 years for a vessel. The vessel owner will protect this investment against insurable losses through private com-

Regulations governing this mortgage and loan insurance program will appear in the Federal Register. They will be effective 30 days from date of publication. The proposals were first carried in the Federal Register on January 23, 1959. A 30-day period for comment was allowed.

The insurance function was transferred from the maritime Administration, Department of Commerce, in April 1958, under the provisions of the Fish and Wildlife Act of 1956.







# **New Shrimp Law** Has Many Changes

changes, additions, penalties, and try net doors. dfferences in definitions that will probably only be clearly defined after a number of cases have been taken through the courts.

The law's text is substantially as follows:

"Commercial Gulf Shrimp Boat." License fee, \$30.00. License expires

"Commercial Bay-Bait Shrimp Boat" is boat used for catching shrimp for pay or sale from the "inside" or bay waters. License fee, \$30.00. License may be purchased in January and February only and expires March 1 of the following year.

"Shrimp House Operator" is any person, except Wholesale Fish Dealer, who operates shrimp house for pay or for unloading or handling shrimp from a Commercial Gulf Shrmp Boat or a Commercial Bay-Bait Shrimp Boat. License fee, \$50.00. License expires August 31. (May not buy or sell.)

"Bait-Shrimp Dealer" is any person, except Wholesale Fish Dealer, who operates establishment in any coastal county for pay or purpose of handling only bait shrimp or other fish bait for retail or wholesale purposes, either fresh or frozen. License fee, \$50.00. License expires August 31.

"Sports Bait-Shrimp Trawl" is any trawl, net or rig used for catching shrimp for bait for one's own personal use. License fee, \$3.00. License expires August 31.

No other trawl or boat licenses are required for catching shrimp. Commercial Fisherman's License and Sports Fishing License are required when applicable.

Boat and trawl license now in effect will be valid until September 1, 1959, except those used for taking shrimp commercially in inside or bay waters will be valid until March 1, 1960.

Shrimp Size For both inside and outside waters, the legal shrimp count (except bait shrimp) is not more than 65 headless and 39 heads-on for white shrimp, and 50 headless ad 30 heads-on for brown or pink

OPEN SEASON: The open season for taking shrimp in inside cember 15, both inclusive (except

for bait shrimp). TRAWL SIZE: During the open season, a trawl not larger than 65 feet tfrom board to board with not less than 2 inches stretched mesh may be used. Only one trawl per boat is permitted, except for a 12-

foot try net. SHRIMPING HOURS: No shrimping shall be done in inside waters between sunset and sunrise during the open season.

It is unlawful to head any shrimp aboard a boat in inside waters, or to dump same, except in artifical passes, canals or basins.

It is unlawful to take or catch shrimp from any natural or manmade pass leading from inside to outside waters.

Bait Shrimp

A Bay-Bait Shrimp Boat operator may take shrimp from all coastal waters, at any time and of any size, for sale as bait shrimp only. Not more than 250 pounds of heads-on bait shrimp may be taken per day per boat. For the purpose of taking bait, it is unlawful for a boat to use more than one trawl, except one try net, of a size not to exceed 25 feet from board to

#### board and with not less than 11/2 inches stretched mesh. A try net shall not exceed 5 feet from board to board. During the closed season in inside waters, it is unlawful to have on board more than one set The new shrimp law has many of trawl doors and one set of

It is unlawful to process for human consumption any shrimp taken for bait purposes.

It is unlawful to sell for transportation outside the State of Texas any shrimp caught for use

It is unlawful to sell bait shrimp to any cafe, restaurant, hotel, packer, canner or breader.

It is unlawful to buy, sell or use for human consumption any bait shrimp, either fresh or frozen. **Outside Waters** 

"Outside Waters" are defined in part as that portion of the Gulf of Mexico extending from the shoreline seaward and within the jurisdiction of the State of Texas. The season is closed in outside

waters from June 1 to July 15, both dates inclusive (except for bait shrimp). There are no limitations on the

number or size of trawls towed by a commercial gulf shrimp boat. Mesh size of trawls shall not be less than 1 inch square or 2 inches stretched. Any try net shall not be larger than 12 feet from board to board.

Shrimp for Personal Use Shrimp may be taken for per sonal use, from all coastal waters, by means of a cast net, dip net, bait trap, or minnow seine not larger than 20 feet in length and manually operated; or with a "Sports-Bait Shrimp Trawl" with not less than 11/2 inches stretched mesh, not larger than 12 feet from board to board, and with boards not larger than 12 by 18 inches.

During the closed season, shrimp may not be taken for personal use for any purpose except for use as

During the closed season, no person (catching shrimp for his personal use) may possess more than 2 quarts of shrimp, either fresh with heads-on or frozen, or both, to be used for bait only. Shrimp taken during the open season for personal use must meet the shrimp count requriements, except quarts of bait shrimp of any size per person may be possessed.







"Along the lower coast there are 350 birds at the Second Chain of Islands in San Antonio Bay; 130 at the mouth of Mission Bay; 25 hid out in the midst of a cane flat at the mouth of the Guadalupe; 120 at Hog Island; 16 at South Bird Island in the Upper Laguna Madre; 35 at Green Island in the lower Laguna; and 35 or 40 more scattered between Port Lavaca and

Rockport." All these islands carry their usual complement of other nesting birds, Sprunt said, and Green Island is remarkable for the great numbers of reddish egrets found there this year.

"Reddish egrets are Texans," he said, "and very few of them are found anywhere else. When they were censused in 1950 there were only about 2800 at Green Island, which was a drop of about 1200 from a census taken in 1939, when 4000 were counted. But there are that many there this year again."

Green Island is different from most of the rest of the nesting
