

Firemen Need Fish For District Meet Says Chief Fox

Fire Chief Dick Fox entered a plea today for fish—lots of fish—eight or nine hundred pounds to be exact, to help feed the six hundred or more volunteer fire department members that will descend on Rockport July 12 for the quarterly meeting of the South Central District Firemen's Association.

These firemen are members of the volunteer fire departments of 28 South Texas towns and they will meet here to discuss mutual

problems and to bone up on the latest wrinkles in fire fighting. And, as everyone ought to know, quarterly meetings of volunteer firemen just can't possibly be held without a fish fry for the visiting firemen.

Hence the fire chief's plea. "Just tell all these fishermen around here that catch more fish than they can use to get in touch with me or with the fire chief up at Fulton—Raymond Owens. Or if they can't find one of us, with any member of the two departments. We'll be glad to pick the fish up, and we'll freeze them until we need them. The main thing is to tell everyone that we need lots of fish, for it takes a whole lot to make a meal for 600 hungry men and their families."

The towns that will be represented by their firemen run the scale from Alice and Agua Dulce on through Annaville, Aransas Pass, Bishop, Falfurrias, Flour Bluff, Freer, George West, Gregory, Ingleside, Kingsville, Kingsville NAAS and Mathis to Odem, Orange, Portland, Port Aransas, Premont, Rivera, Robstown, Rockport, San Diego, Sinton, Taft, Three Rivers, Reynolds Metals at (continued on page 8)

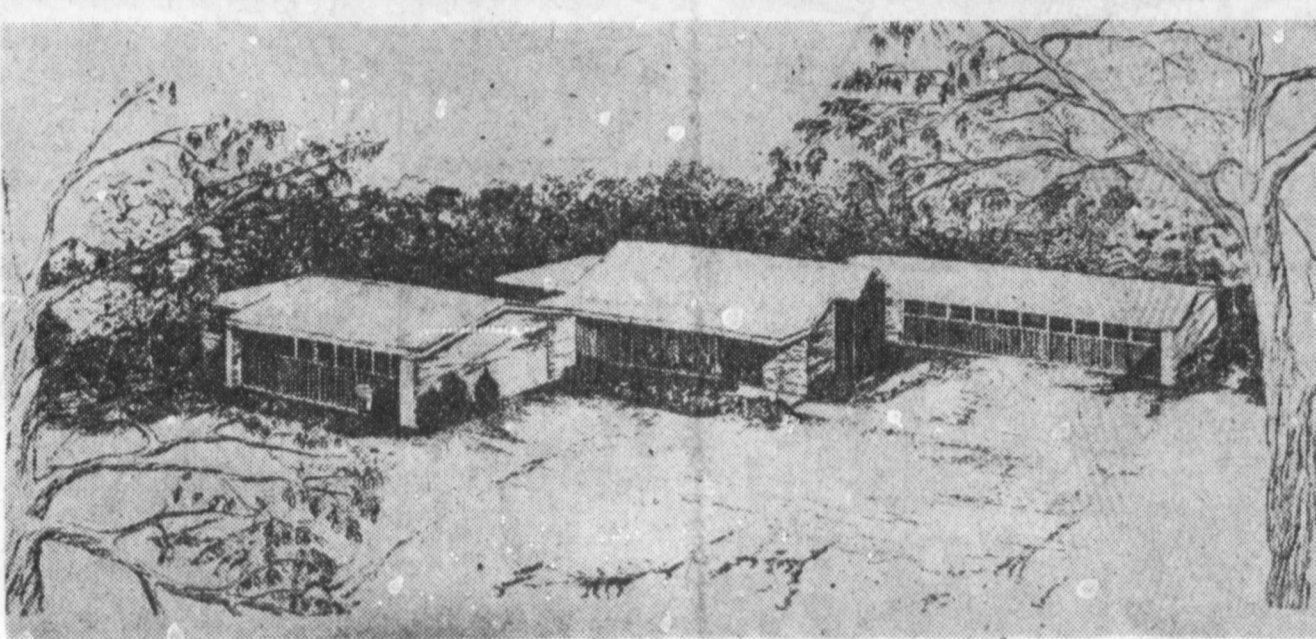

Bishop Jones To Dedicate Center

Episcopal Conference Center at Copano Bay to Be Dedicated and Memorial Cross at St. Peter's To Receive Blessing on Pastoral Visit June 14

The Rt. Rev. Everett H. Jones, D.D., Episcopal Bishop of the Diocese of West Texas, will bless a memorial cross at Rockport, hold services at Rockport and Aransas Pass and dedicate a new Episcopal Retreat-Conference site at Copano Bay on June 14.

First on the day's program at 9 a. m. are morning services at

Rockport's pioneer citizens. Its inscription reads:

"Given in Loving Memory of George William Fulton and Leonora Caruthers Fulton by their daughters, Miss Jewel Fulton, Mrs. Fred Hoopes and Mrs. Elinor Conger."

Following the blessing of the cross, Bishop Jones, aided by Mr. Carter, will celebrate Holy Communion at the Church of Our Savior in Aransas Pass at 11 a. m. The Bishop will also preach the sermon and meet with the Bishop's Committee afterwards.

In the afternoon, at 4 o'clock, Bishop Jones will dedicate the site of the new Retreat-Conference Center on Copano Bay.

The 28-acre site was given to the Church by Mr. and Mrs. Emory Spencer of Rockport over a year ago, and will eventually hold an extensive group of buildings, some of which have already been planned by Abbot and Evans, architects and engineers of Corpus Christi, although the contracts for construction have not been let.

The center building, as now planned, will be a conference room capable of housing 75 people, with a built-in altar at one end that can be closed off, leaving the remainder of the building available for meetings or social gatherings. At the other end of the structure will be a kitchen and offices. A screened-in patio will extend beyond the kitchen, and the entire building will be air-conditioned.

To one side of the conference building and slightly in front of it will be a dormitory capable of handling 38 women. This will have a small lounge and an additional screened-in patio.

At the rear and to the right of the conference building will be the men's dormitory, similar in size and capacity to that erected for the women. Both dormitories will be connected to the conference building by breezeways, covered to give protection from sun and rain. The wooded site has 550 feet of frontage on Copano Bay, and is backed by sand hills. It lies about half a mile from Highway 35, close to Girl Scout Camp Copano, to which Mr. and Mrs. Spencer also donated a site, and close to their home.

Future plans for the conference center include a chapel, to be erected on the highest point of land in the vicinity and additional dormitories for children's summer camps and a play area for athletics, softball, and other games.

Bishop Jones has long been interested in developing a number of such Episcopal Conference centers throughout the state to augment facilities at Camp Capers, at Kerrville, the only one previously possessed by the Diocese. Camp Capers is being used for children's and young peoples' camps, and has long been filled to overflowing.

Dredge Starts on North End of Intracoastal

The Dredge C.S.E. Holland has moved in on the north end of the Intracoastal Canal Cut-off, between Rockport and Old Ingleside, and started a cut to meet the other Bauer Dredging Company equipment which is working towards Rockport from Aransas Pass.

The cut-off, once it is completed, will shorten the route between Rockport and Corpus Christi by 17 miles, and will enable tow boats and barges to avoid the rough water and heavy seas frequently encountered on the present route when they pass the inner end of Aransas Pass, between Mustang and Harbor Islands.

Grading on Little Bay Done Soon

Jimmy Thwing, of the Loyd W. Richardson Construction Company, said today that he expects to complete grading and possibly paving on the Little Bay job at Rockport by the end of June.

In the meantime, he said, work at the Cove Harbor south of town, the fifth to be constructed by the Aransas County Navigation District, is progressing slowly. Draglines have almost completed the groundwork for the levees that will surround the harbor as protection against storms. Thwing said.

Judge Miller Sentences Nine

Roland Andre the only one of the group to ask for a jury trial, was found not guilty of an alleged burglary charge. Elmore Ince, tried for another Aransas Pass burglar, pled guilty and was sentenced to two years, but put on probation.

Norton Harding Freeze and Acie Jarrett Kimbrell, tried for burglary committed on St. Joseph's Island, were sentenced to three years each, and put on probation.

Thomas Webb, of Rockport, was sentenced to two years for forgery; and Daniel Lopez Dominguez, charged with burglary, received a three-year sentence and was put on probation.

ARANSAS GETS DEEP SOMIC RANK WILDCAT

Southern Menerals Corp. of Corpus Christi has scheduled a 9,500-foot rank wildcat four miles east of Rockport in Aransas County.

Located about 2,000 feet west of St. Joseph's Island in Aransas Bay, the No. 1 State of Texas No. 183 is 1,980 feet from the north line and 660 feet from the east line of a 329-acre lease and Tract 183.

This project scales 2,500 feet north of Shell No. 1 State Tract 183, a 12,595-foot dry hole, and 3,900 feet southeast of Sinclair No. 1 State Tract 178, which failed at 10,492.

Shivers to Florida for Prisoner Held at Sarasota

School Valuations Are \$23,053,641

Total oil and utility valuations for the coming year have been set at \$17,494,180 by the Aransas County Independent School District, which is an increase of \$1,933,545 over the preceding year, trustees were told at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

In addition, School Superintendent J. D. Gray reported, real estate and local valuations have risen to \$5,558,461 or \$199,475 above the 1958 figures.

Grand total is \$23,053,641 without including boat valuations which are to be added at a later date.

Gray told the trustees that 14 oil and one gas well have been removed from the rolls as no longer producing leaving 271 producing oil wells and 106 gas wells in the county.

Trustees approved a request for an additional drinking fountain in Aransas County Junior High School and then went on to discuss the cafeteria situation. This, they decided, would be left as it is for another year, without any attempt at large-scale expansion.

Gray reported that summer maintenance work was well underway.

The application of Guy V. Phillips for the position of English and Spanish teacher in the Aransas County High School, was discussed and approved. Phillips, who is married and has one child, is 32 years old, and comes with experience at Lorraine and Eagle Pass High Schools.

The trustees also voted approval of participation in the Federal milk program.

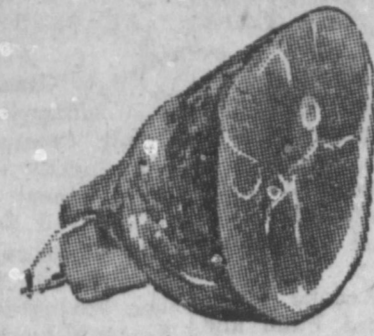

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COAST FISHERMEN ASKED TO SEND IN TAGS FROM CATCH

Cooperation of Gulf Coast fishermen has been asked by researchers in the attempt to find an answer to some of the fishing problems.

The U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service has placed a number of shrimp in the Gulf with blue and green heads. Some 24,000 shrimp with the tinted head have been released near Galveston. In this way the researchers hope to follow the movement of the brown shrimp from the Galveston Bay.

Previously 12,000 tinted shrimp were released off the Florida shore. It is expected they will migrate to the Texas area during the year.

Persons finding these colored are asked to turn them in to the U. S. Fish & Wildlife Service at Galveston, with information as to where they were taken. The service will pay 50c each for such shrimp returned.

The Game & Fish Commission has tagged several hundred Spanish mackerel in the Port Aransas-Rockport area. If you catch one of these fish having a plastic tag, deliver it to your game warden, or send it to the Marine Laboratory of the Game & Fish Commission in Rockport.

MEN OF DRAFT AGE SHOULD ADVISE BOARD OF CHANGE OF STATUS

Austin, Texas, June 5—Selective Service officials are becoming increasingly concerned about the numbers of men of draft age who do not advise their local boards about changes in their status.

This was reported Friday by Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, who has recently returned from a conference of state and territorial Selective Service directors in Washington.

He says officials are worried because up-to-date and accurate information can be "very valuable if this country were to get into an emergency."

Men registered with draft boards are required by law to advise their boards about everything from a change of job to a change of address. The law gives them 10 days to get the information to their boards in writing.

The official regulation reads: "It shall be the duty of every classified registrant to keep his local board currently informed of his occupational, marital, family, dependency, and military status, of his physical condition, of his home address, and of his receipt of any professional degree in a medical, dental, or allied specialist category. Every classified registrant shall, within 10 days after it occurs, report to his local board in writing every change in such status and in his physical condition and home address and his receipt of any such professional degree."

Rockport-Fulton Merger Urged

Home Innis, of the consulting engineering firm of Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam, urged Tuesday night before a meeting of the Rockport Sportsmen's Conservation Association that Rockport and Fulton merge.

The title of his six-point address was "The Curse of Community Complacency."

Innis urged Rockport citizens to become more aware of their personal responsibilities in community development by giving time and energy to civic enterprises and local government. He also said that the residents of any city attempting to grow and become an attractive place to live must be willing to spend money in the form of taxes and bond issues for facilities for a better life.

"An evaluation of your natural and man-made resources is essential," he declared. "If citizens really want their areas to develop properly such an evaluation must be made. This should include information on fuels, mineral resources, development sites for all types of industry, business and commerce, labor, transportation, taxation, local products, fresh water resources, financial data and living conditions."

Equally important with an evaluation of resources, he said, is a definite plan for future development.

"It is necessary as the population of an area increases to provide housing, jobs, recreation, protection, places for religious worship, schools and cultural centers. The art and science which enable you to make these determinations is called 'city planning.'"

NATIONAL DRAFT CALLS FOR 382 TEXANS IN JULY

Austin, Texas.—The state quota for Texas draft boards in July calls for 382 men, Colonel Morris S. Schwartz, state Selective Service director, announced Tuesday.

The state's July call of 382 compares with a quota of 284 for June and 272 for May. The July call is the state's share of a national quota of 8,000 men, all for the Army. The June national quota was 6,000.

Colonel Schwartz also announced that, spite of the slight rise in the state quota, no call for pre-induction physical and mental examinations for July would be issued.

Local board quotas for the July call already have been figured and were sent to the state's 137 local boards Monday.

The July quota will be filled with men who are at least 22 years old on July 1, with the exception of volunteers or delinquents, who may be younger.

Only persons who have been dead for ten years can qualify for election to the Hall of Fame.

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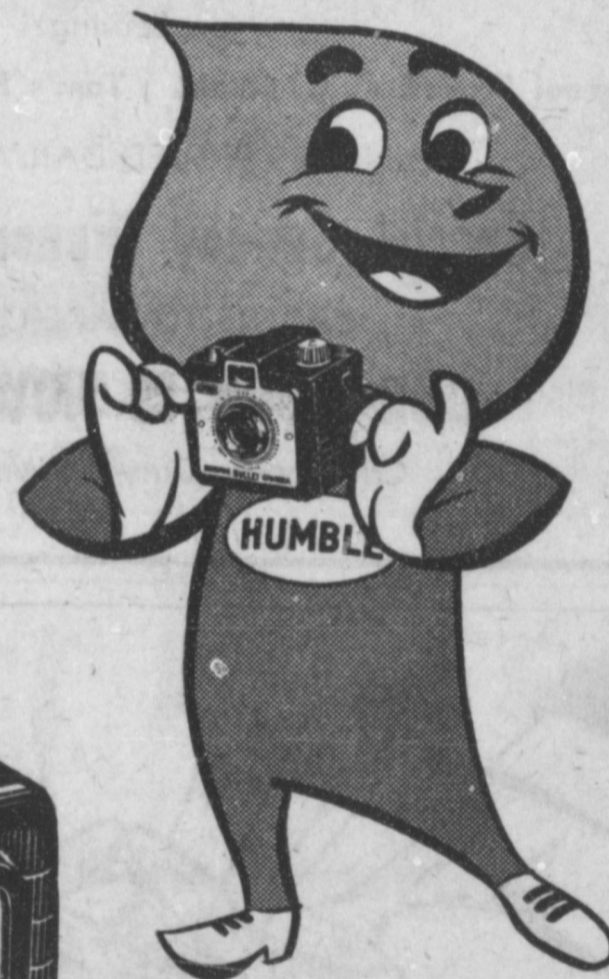
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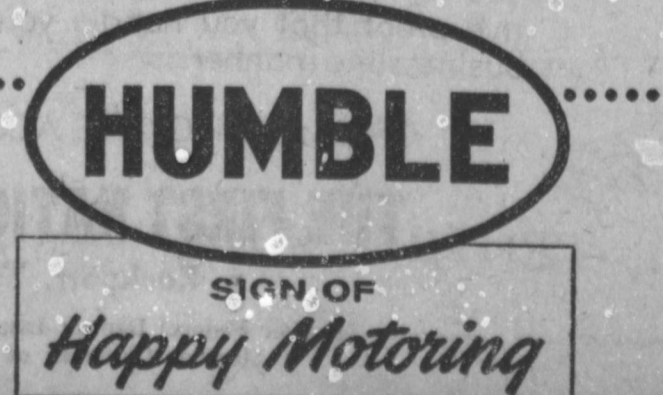
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SOUTHERN MINERALS ASKS ENGINEER PERMIT

WHEREAS, the laws of the State of Texas do not fully set forth the procedure to be followed by candidates filing for said office of Commissioners of said District, and this Board has the power and authority to establish said procedure, and in order to comply with the above mentioned provisions, it is reasonable to require that all persons desiring a place on the ballot as a candidate for Commissioner of said District must apply at least 26 days prior to the election for his name to be placed on said ballot.

THEREFORE, be it ordered by the Board of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1:

1. That all candidates for the Board of Navigation and Canal Commissioners of said District at the election to be held on the 4th day of July, 1959, file their application to become a candidate with the Secretary of this Board at Rockport, Texas, on or before noon the 8th day of June, 1959, said date being 26 days prior to the date of said election;
2. That all of said applications shall be substantially in the following form:

Prof. Taborsky Speaks on Russia

Dr. Edward Taborsky, professor of government at the University of Texas, was the principal speaker at the Ladies' Night dinner given by the Rockport Rotary Club in the Woman's Club Wednesday night.

A Czechoslovakian, Dr. Taborsky was educated at Charles University in Prague and at the time of the Munich Conference in 1938 was Czechoslovakian minister of foreign affairs, escaping to Britain when the Nazis took over in 1939.

Joining President Edward Benes in exile, he served as his personal aid, and accompanied him to Moscow in 1943, to confer with Roosevelt and Molotov.

Before he became a professor at the University of Texas, Taborsky taught at the University of Stockholm in Sweden and at Ohio State University.

Introduced by E. T. White, who was in charge of the program, Taborsky gave a most interesting resume of the present Russian situation, pointing out that one of the reasons that nation could accomplish certain things was because of the ruthless disregard of individual rights, backed up by power, which allowed them to concentrate on a given thing.

If the government wanted to produce more steel, he said, everything was subordinated to that, including people, who were merely cogs in the machine.

Taborsky said that it was his opinion that Russia did not want war now, nor would war develop unless that nation felt that they had an overwhelming superiority in arms and men.

He emphasized the fact that the whole Russian world rested upon ignorance of the masses. Speaking of the exchange program of students and teachers, the University of Texas professor said that Russia had ostensibly cooperated, largely because it was easier to do this than it was to allow free intercourse between Rus-
