Navigation District Commissioners Go to Valley

Chairman Thomas Dick Picton, Commissioners Raymond Owens, and Ted Atwood, of Aransas County Navigation District No. 1 will leave Friday morning for Port Mansfield and Brownsville on an inspection tour of those harbors and related facilities. They will be accompanied by Ellis L. Clark, attorney for the Navigation District, and Homer C. Innis, of Lockwood, Andrews and Newnam, Corpus Christi, which firm engineered the District's Fulton Harbor in 1955, the recently completed Little Bay project, and the Cove Harbor, south of Rockport, now under construction.

In Raymondville they will visit the Willacy County Navigation District whose chairman, F. E. McManus, will accompany them to Port Mansfield for an inspection of harbor facilities there.

At Brownsville a conference will be held with F. W. Hofmotel, port director, who will conduct the party on a tour of the Port of Brownsville and the Industrial Shrimp Harbor between Brownsville and Port Isabel.

The Aransas County Navigation District officials are seeking comparative data on land valuations, leases, and management procedures.

The Aransas County-Fulton Area Safety Council are sponsoring School Traffic Safety Week in Rockport.

Texas School Traffic Safety Week will be observed in thousands of Texas school classrooms during the week of Sept. 20-26, in response to an invitation extended to the State's school teachers by Governor Price Daniel.

This same citizen insisted that he, and he alone, should bear the entire cost of the respirator himself, and that the money already collected, amounting to \$104, be devoted to purchase of extra attachments to be used with the equipment he was donating.

The community as a whole owes this citizen a vote of thanks, none the less heartfelt because it must be given to a man who resolutely refuses to be recognized.

The Fulton Fire Department have expressed their gratitude to him, and wish also to thank those other public spirited people who, by their generosity, have made it possible to add to this gift.

Unusual Motel Planned at Lamar

One of the most unusual motels in this area is that now under development by Ashby Minor James on his property near the Big Tree on Lamar Peninsula. ARANSAS PASS WINS GAME FRIDAY NIGHT

The Aransas Pass Panthers came from behind to down the Rockport (Aransas County) Pirates, 12-6, Friday night before 2,500 fans at Roosevelt Stadium in Aransas Pass.

Olivarez kicked off for the Panthers and the Pirates' Carl Snyder fell on the ball on the 32. Warden was smeared for a five-yard loss on the first play, and then Pena made four through the line. Warden's pass to Rouquette was incomplete and Snyder punted to the Panther 39 where Rudy Johnson gathered it in and set sail for 10 yards before he was downed on the Panther 49. He made eight through the line on the first play.

A hand off to Witt netted a yard before Snyder and Jo May made the tackle for the Pirates. However, Johnson made three more and a first down on the next play.

Witt lost a yard when Rouquette and Barnard tackled him behind the line of scrimmage, and then Rudy Johnson picked up a yard over left tackle, before Spears, Panther quarter, on a keeper, loped down field for 14 yards, winding up on the Pirate 25. Johnson failed to gain, being tackled by Pirates' Tommy McCabe and Jim Weatherly, and Spears' pass on the next play was intercepted by Warden on the Pirate 21.

A hand off to Pena netted 4 yards; Pena made two more; then Happer made six, to the Pirate 34. Warden tried left end and was smeared for a six-yard loss. On the next play Warden fumbled and recovered for a yard gain, and then Snyder punted to the Panther 20.

Norman Spears received and clobbered by most of the Pirate line, but the play was called back on account of illegal procedure by the Pirates, and Snyder kicked again to Spears on the Panther 30, where Spears was hit and fumbled, with the ball being recovered by Monte Rouquette.

Warden handed off to Pena, who made 9 1/2 through the line, and the next play Warden made it for the first down on a quarter back

sneak, to the Panther 19. Dale Barnard carried and fumbled when hit. There was a big pile up, and the ball squirted out of the fumble like a watermelon seed, only to be recovered by Rudy Johnson, on the Panther 15.

On a hand off, Rudy Johnson skirted the left of the Panther line for seven and was tackled by Tommy McCabe. Butch Witt fumbled on the next play, but the Panthers recovered for a two-yard loss. Spears to Durbin was incomplete, and then Spears kicked, with the ball rolling dead on the Pirate 31.

Pena carried for a yard, then he loped around left end for 10 yards and a first down. On the next play Happer made six, then Barnard went over center for three at the end of the quarter. On the first play in the second quarter Happer made the extra yard needed to the Panther 47 and a first down.

The Pirates fumbled on the next play and lost a yard, although they recovered. Pena around left end lost a yard; Warden to Rouquette was incomplete, and then Snyder punted to the Panther 18.

Durbin carried for the Panthers and made no gain when tackled by Pena. On the next play, Spears to Durbin, a pass, was good for 20 yards; but this was called back on an offside against the Panthers, and Spears kicked. Pena caught the kick and ran it back to the Panther 27. On the next play Happer spurred through the center of the line for 28 yards and a touchdown, but the point after was no good when McCabe's kick missed.

Warden's kickoff went out of bounds on the Panther 31 and the Pirates were penalized five yards for illegal procedure.

Warden kicked off again, and on the first play for the Panthers Rudy Johnson carried and made a couple, before Pena and Barnard made the tackle. Bayless made no gain on the next play, as Gardner and Snyder tackled, and the play was called back on an offside against the Panthers, making it second and 13. However, Bayless to Johnson picked up the necessary yardage before Pena, Warden and Happer smeared the Panther fullback on the Aransas Pass 46.

From here Bayless to Spears netted three; a fumble, recovered by the Panthers, brought six more, and then Johnson rumbled through to the Pirate 40. Bayless tried inside his own left

end and made five; Bayless to Spears on a hand off was good for eight more to the Pirate 27. Rudy Johnson made three, then 10 more, and a penalty against the Pirates for a personal foul moved the ball to their nine-yard line. Rudy Johnson made seven more, then a yard and a half, before he finally picked up the last 18 inches to pay dirt and tied the score. The point after was no good, as Gene Gregory smeared an attempt at a run.

With three minutes to go in the second quarter, Olivarez kicked off and Gail Williams received for the Pirates, being tackled on his own 37. The Pirates fumbled and the Panthers recovered on the Pirate 35. Bayless' pass was incomplete, as was another on the second play, but a third, Bayless to Durbin, was beautifully executed and put the ball on the Pirate 11. With a minute to go, Rudy Johnson skirted left end for a touchdown, and once again the Panther try for extra point was no good.

Olivares kicked off, and Rouquette, who received, ran it back six yards to the Pirate 44.

Mike Johnson shot a long pass for 25 yards to Rouquette on the next play, winding up on the Panther 31. Another long pass from Mike Johnson to Carl Snyder netted 14 yards, and put the ball on the Aransas Pass 17. Another pass by Mike Johnson was incomplete and Warden replaced him at quarter.

On the first play after the replacement, Warden shot a pass to Rouquette, who made a beautiful diving catch for a gain of 11 yards, on the Panther 6. Warden to Happer made two, then Warden was forced back and smeared on the Panther 20, for a loss of 17 yards, and that was the last time that the Pirates threatened seriously. A five-yard penalty against the Pirates for delay of the game put them back still farther. Warden to Pena was incomplete, and a pass by Mike Johnson, who replaced him on the next play, to Rouquette, was also incomplete, so the Panthers took over on their own 25. Bayless lost five yards on the next play, and that was the end of the half.

Snyder kicked off and Olivares caught it on the Panther 25, running it back to the Panther 39. Rudy Johnson, on the next play, went through to the 49 and a first down. Rudy Johnson picked up four yards before Pena tackled, but the play was called back because of illegal procedure by the Panthers. Rudy Johnson then went over left tackle to the Pirate 45 where he was tackled by Snyder. A hand off to Witt was called back, and Spears' jump pass on the next play went incomplete, leaving it third and 10. A pitch back to Witt was nearly intercepted and lost a yard. Spears punted to the Pirate 14.

Warden handed off to Pena, who made a yard, then he handed off to Happer and there was a rain of red flags. This left it second and 13, because of the Pirate offside, and then Barnard lost a yard on the next play, and two more on the one that followed before Snyder punted to the Panther 43 where Norman Spears garnered it in and scooted back to the Pirate 44. Bayless to Rudy Johnson on the next play put it on the Pirate 30.

On the first play of the next set of downs, Bayless' handoff to Spears netted two yards before Barnard tackled. Bayless' pass to Rudy Johnson was short, but Johnson recovered although he lost five yards. Gains Gardner broke up another pass, Bayless to Olivares, and then McCabe's tackle when Rudy Johnson tried the line held him to two yards, not sufficient for a first down.

Happer ran from the Pirate 30 for a yard, then went around right end for five more. Pena made 5 around left end for the first down, Warden was smeared for a yard loss on the Pirate 40;

his pass to Rouquette netted two; and then, on the next play, when unable to pass, he ran 18 yards to the Panther 43. Warden to Happer was good for 3; the next, a repeat, made 1; then Mike Johnson was sent in and fumbled on an attempted Statue of Liberty play which Wofford recovered for the Panthers on their own 47.

Rudy Johnson made 4 in two tries; Bayless' attempted pass was incomplete and Spears then punted, with the ball rolling dead on the Pirate 20. Warden's hand-off to Pena was good for 8, and then Happer made two more for the first down, as the third quarter ended.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter, Pena made 6 yards around left end; Happer made 3 over right end; then Warden on a keeper, picked up the needed yardage for a first down.

From the Pirate 41, Pena made 7 over left tackle; Happer added five for a first; then two more, before Warden was clobbered for a seven yard loss, making it third and fifteen. Mike Johnson sent in to toss one to Rouquette, had no luck, and Snyder kicked. Spears took it on the Panther 12. Rudy Johnson went around his own left end for a couple before Gains Gardner tackled him; then Rudy netted three more and on the next play Spears made it to the Panther 42.

He made no gain on the next play; Rudy Johnson made 8, then 1 yard and 35 inches, and added the extra inch on the next play, winding up on the Pirate 48. Spears loped down field 11 yards to the Pirate 37 before he was stopped by Gains Gardner, and on the next play tried it again through center, only to be tackled after making a yard by Snyder; then Spears made five and was clobbered by Rouquette.

From the Pirate 26 Rudy Johnson tried and lost 3 yards, as May and Rouquette hit him hard, making it 13 yards to go. Bayless made a beautiful twisting run for 12 1/2 yards, and then added two more on the next play for the necessary yardage for a first, to the Pirate 15.

The Panthers fumbled on the first play, but the Pirates declined an illegal motion penalty as Gardner recovered and the Pirates went over their own ten. Mike Johnson handed off to Happer for no gain; his pass to Rouquette was incomplete, and a second pass was intercepted by Durbin, who was tackled by Snyder on the Pirate 39. From here, Spears carried and lost a yard; Bayless' fumble was recovered by the Panthers for a two yard gain; his pass on the next play was incomplete, and then Rudy Johnson made it to the thirty, just as the game ended.

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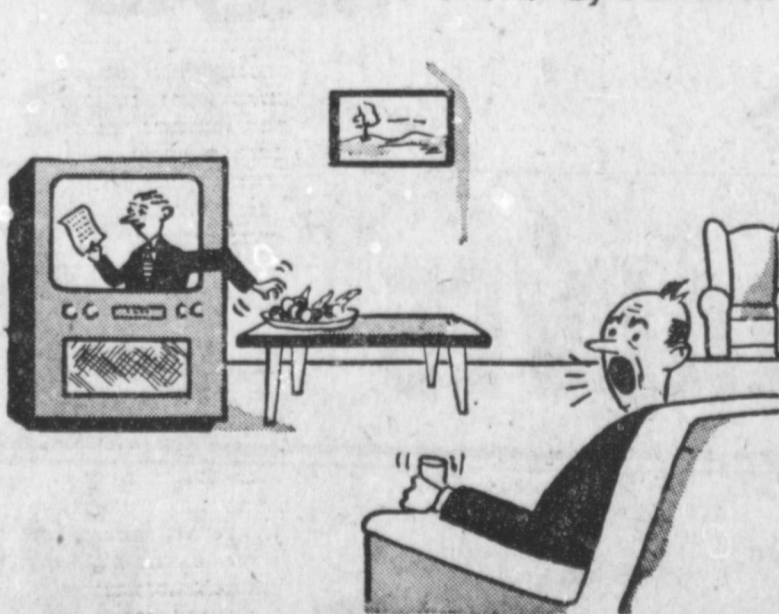

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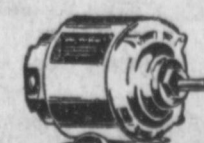

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A HISTORY of Rockport, Fulton, St. Mary's, Lamar and El Copano By Mrs. Will W. Wood

A customs house was almost immediately established at Aransas City, as was a postoffice. The first collector of this port was Colonel Geo. W. Fulton. He resigned in the winter of 1838. Governor Henry Smith was collector 1838-1839, Major Samuel Hewes, 1839-1840; Alexander Stevenson, 1840, Henry Redmond, 1843-1846. The port still had a collector at the time of annexation.

On June 15, 1839, a citizen's meeting was held at Aransas City to protest the removal of the customs house. Colonel Henry L. Kinney presided over this meeting and at its adjourned meeting on June 17, Colonel James Power, Colonel Geo. W. Fulton, Edward Fitzgerald, Joel T. Case, R. C. Jackson and Colonel Kinney were the committee appointed to draft resolutions.

The port of Aransas City had been established at a propitious period, and the loss of the customs house at that particular time would have been a staggering blow to its prospects. Although the war was officially continuing, a persistent unofficial trade began between the citizens of northern Mexico and the citizens of Texas. The caravan routes led through Refugio County. The Mexican government frowned upon this unofficial trade existing during the state of war.

HOW TO ESTIMATE YOUR SOCIAL SECURITY PAYMENTS

"How much will I get from Social Security?" That question is frequently asked at the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration, according to H. M. Cleveland, District Manager.

"The exact amount of retirement, disability, or family insurance which is payable cannot be determined until a claim is filed. At that time, an electronic computer figures the benefit amount at the highest point under the provisions of the law.

"It is possible, however, for a worker to get a close estimate of the amount of his benefit," Cleveland said. "By doing so, a worker nearing retirement age will know what to expect when he retires. A younger worker can estimate how much would be paid to his dependents in the event of his death."

A booklet entitled, "How to Estimate Your Social Security Payments," is available at the social security office. A copy may be obtained by writing to the Social Security Administration, 530 South Water Street, Corpus Christi. Ask for booklet number 30.

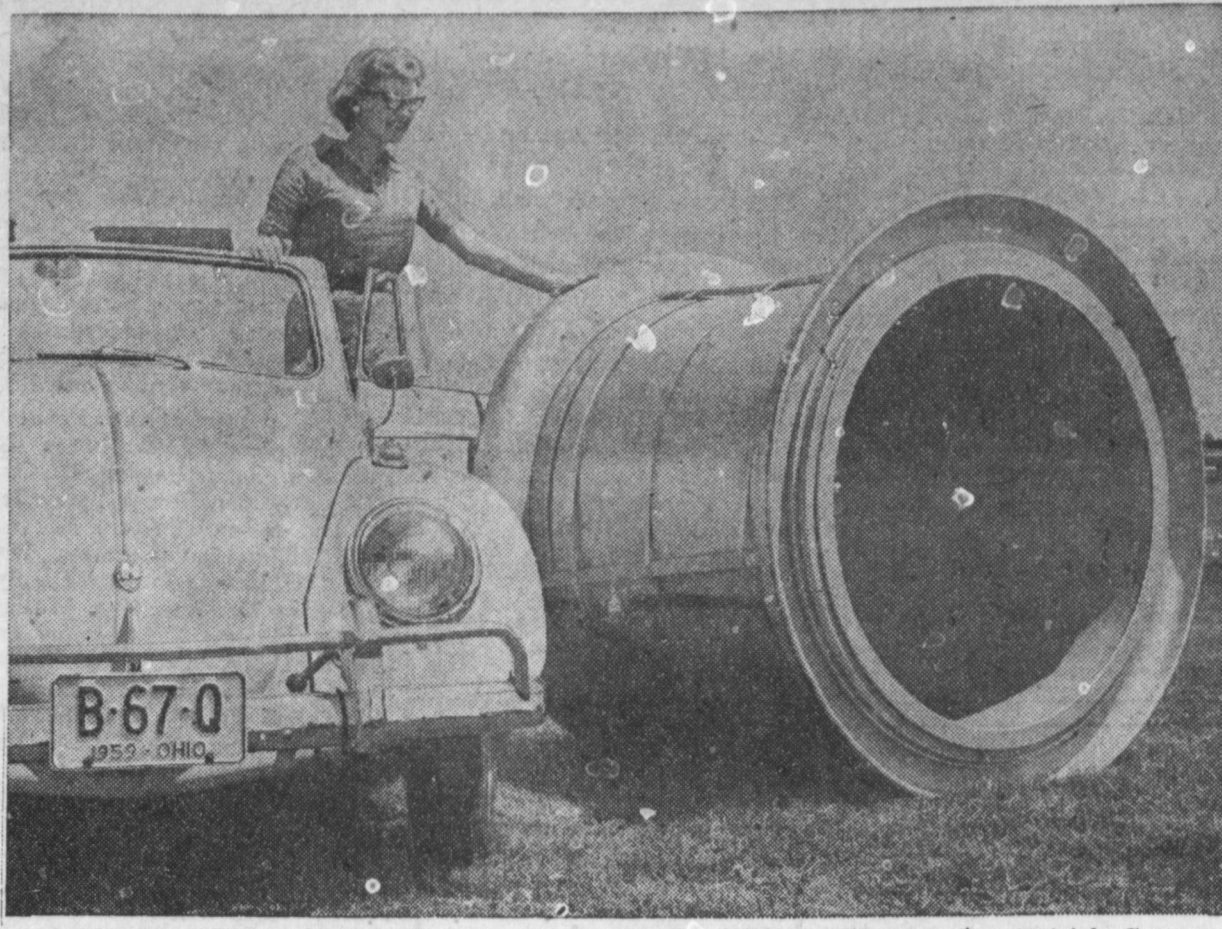

Glass Floats Much Prized As Decorations

Much prized because of their rarity and decorative qualities are the glass balls occasionally picked up by beachcombing along the shores of the Gulf, but it is a rare collector in this area that has over one or two.

These glass balls are fish net floats, broken loose from the net of some Norwegian or Portuguese fisherman and carried by currents across the wide Atlantic, to be deposited on Texas sands.

They are of all sizes, shapes and colors, ranging from a scant two inches across to giant floating buoys with a circumference of 48 inches.

Most of them are crude, bubble-filled glass, and of a bluish or bottle green. More rare are deep blue, golden, amber, amethyst, milk white or crystal clear. Some are egg-shaped; others are cylindrical with a knob on either end, for fastening to the nets. These fishermen, for obvious reasons, call rolling pins.

Christopher Faye, a Norwegian inventor these glass floats more than a hundred years ago for cod fishing. To sceptics he demonstrated that they would not become waterlogged at depths as great as 300 fathoms as the best of light wood floats would do, nor would the pressure crush them.

Storms tore Faye's nets loose and scattered the floats far and wide, their travels limited only by the continents and by the ocean gales and currents that introduced them to many nationalities. And fishermen travel far themselves, so, in time, the floats came to be used in Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Germany, England, Belgium, Portugal, Spain, the United States, Russia and Japan.

Occasionally they may be identified by their raised brands. A Christian cross in high relief

UNDER 17, OVER 65 GET EXEMPTIONS TO HUNT, FISH

AUSTIN—Exempt fishing permits are not required of all fishermen under 17 and over 65 years, according to the fiscal director, Texas Game and Fish Commission. "These are only courtesy cards, more or less," said the director. "Certified drivers' licenses or other legal documents are just as valid."

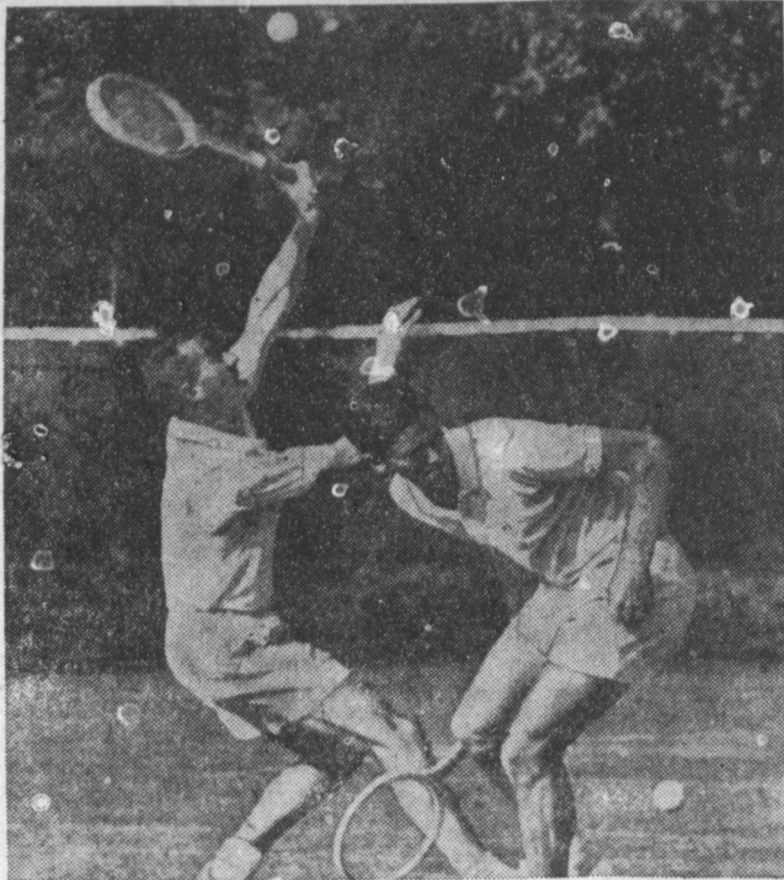
With the exception of deer hunters, the same holds true for exempt hunting licenses. Anyone in the same age group must have exempt licenses when hunting deer because of the license tags that must be fastened on the deer kill.

Persons residing on their property who wish to hunt on this property must have an exempt license. This license is not valid for any other piece of property, however. If you do not reside on the property, you will need a regular residence license. Persons under 17 and over 65 need only the one (age exempt) license in all cases, but only if they hunt deer. Otherwise, any valid identification with your request."

Sidney Freeborn Finds Way to Control Pest

Sidney Thurston Freeborn, Jim Wells County rancher, and son of Mr. and Mrs. Sidney Freeborn, of George West and Rockport, may have found a way to eliminate prickly pear from rangeland, according to a story that appeared recently in the Corpus Christi Caller Farm and Ranch magazine.

Bill Dove, of Alice, SCS range conservationist said that Freeborn has worked out a complete range conservation program for his ranch; and getting rid of prickly pear is an important goal in the program.

Freeborn and Dove, in working out the range program, concluded that prickly pear, plowed up and left on a fairly good grass turf, was not likely to take root again and survive.

So, beginning with this theory, the first step in the program was to defer the pasture and let a good turf of native grasses develop. As a result of this deferment program, a good stand of native grasses was established on the pear-infested rangeland; and, in order to let the grasses produce a good seed crop and shatter on the ground, Freeborn delayed the beginning of root-plowing until July 20.

On that date he began the improvement program which he hopes will eliminate the brush and prickly pear and, at the same time, increase the production of grass.

In a pasture of nearly 500 acres, where both brush and pear were thick, Freeborn used three different types of treatment. On areas where the brush was large, he chained, raked and burned the brush before he started root-plowing. On another area, he plowed with having first chained and burned the brush; and on a third but smaller area he dragged a chain over the rangeland after it had been rootplowed.

During the rootplowing operation, he overseeded the range with buffel grass, using two pounds of live seed to the acre. The plowed and seeded land will be deferred until the grass has become established.

Cost of the operation ranged from \$10 to \$17 an acre, depending on the treatment it received. Cost of the seed was additional.

Examining the plowed rangeland last week, Dove said that there was an excellent kill of brush, and the poor condition of the prickly pear is encouraging. The prickly pear plants that fell on the native grass turf shows every sign of being killed. It is only on those plants lying on bare ground that there is any sign of survival.

"As long as the pear leaves are on the grass turf, they are not putting out new roots," Dove said. "This may be the way to control prickly pear."

Last March Freeborn chopped brush on one of the pastures on his ranch. Before the brush was chopped, it took 10 men 10 hours to round up 50 head of cattle in the pasture. After the brush was

chopped down, two men gathered the same number of cattle in two hours.

Freeborn said that the savings in labor costs alone would pay for having the brush chopped down. Continuing his range improvement program, Freeborn is now chaining, stacking, and burning the brush on a 1,299-acre pasture. Following this operation, he will let native grasses become established, and next year he will root-plow the area to get a permanent kill of the brush.

In order to provide rotation grazing, Freeborn has launched an extensive fencing program on the ranch. When he took over operation of the 5,000 acre ranch, there were only two pastures—one a small tract and the other taking in the remainder of the ranch area. When Freeborn completes his fencing program, he will have the ranch divided into 13 pastures.

The Freeborn ranch is located 19 miles north of Alice. It is a part of the large Schaeffer ranch of nearly 40,000 acres. Freeborn is a former vocational agriculture teacher at Orange Grove.

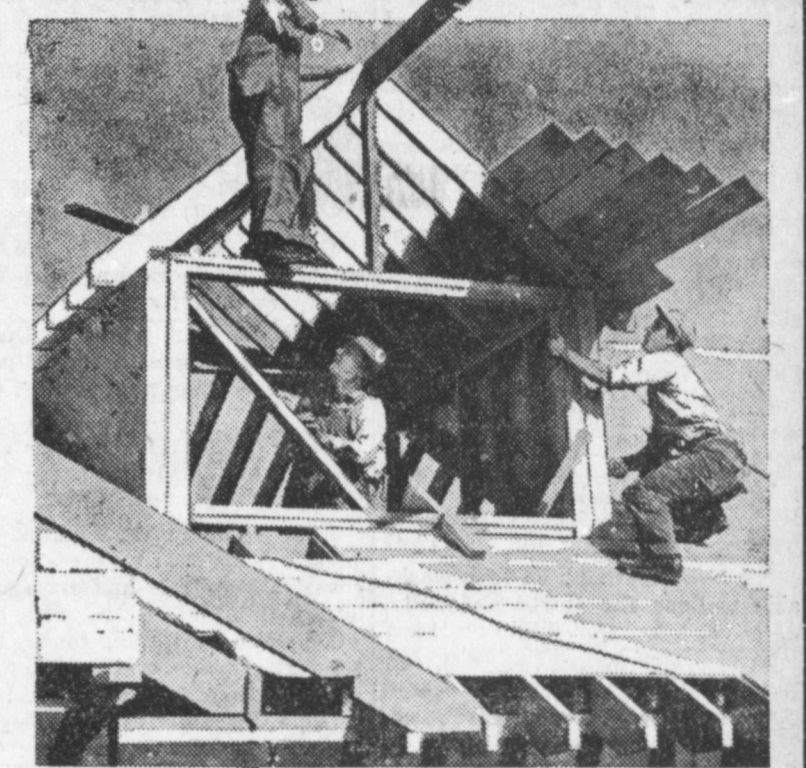

Game Commission biologists operating on the Gulf Coast are attempting to learn about the movement of shrimp. They are studying the habits of the shrimp population right now in Copano Bay. Some 7,000 shrimp have been caught, tagged and liberated in the same area. Some of them got their heads stained red; others got a small plastic disc fastened to their sides.

Reports already are trickling in from bait dealers, and others, on shrimp that have been caught. Thus far, returns coincide with a predicted movement from Copano Bay through Aransas Bay toward the Gulf pass at Port Aransas. It is hoped that returns from the Gulf will show any movement from the pass.

Fishermen have been asked to watch for these marked shrimp and notify the Marine Laboratory at Rockport.

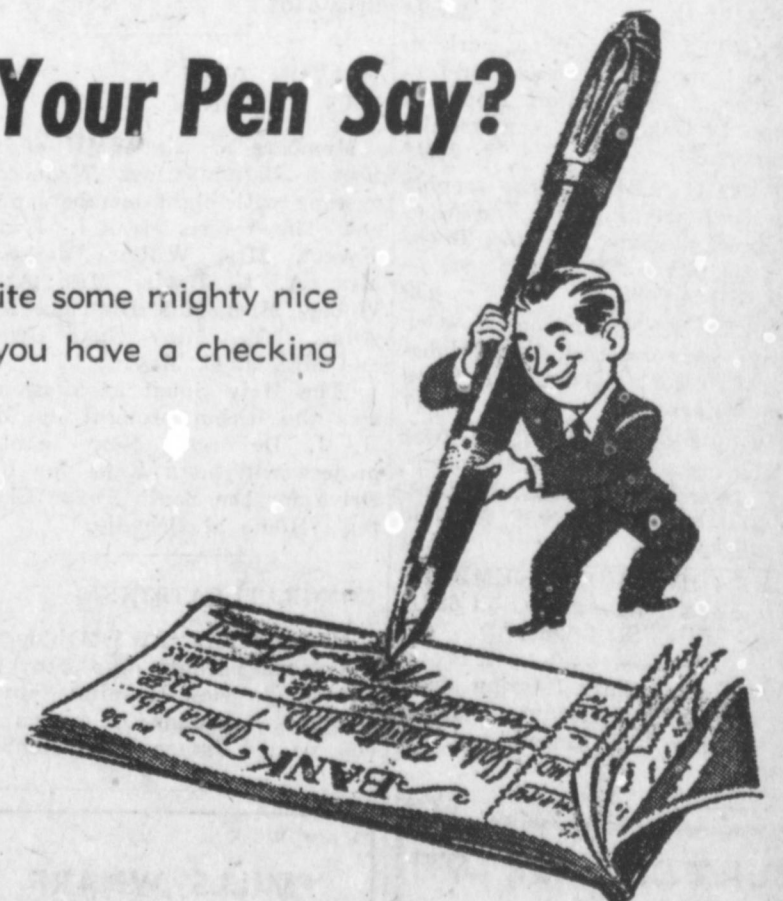
