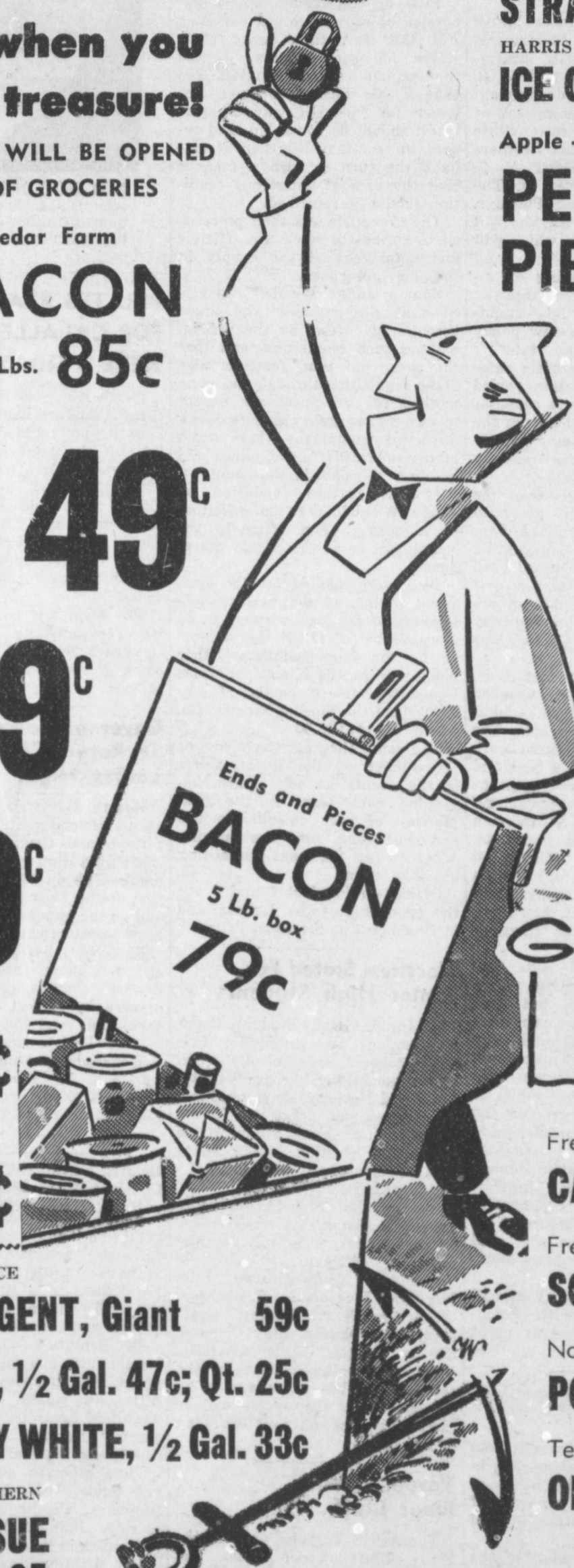

**IT'S THE LAW in Texas**

**Law and Belief**

Our laws have their roots deep within our beliefs.

And the laws shift as our beliefs change. Thus working backwards, you can find a people's deepest beliefs by discovering their notions of justice—about adults, children, nature, animals, and other things.

Until this century, the laws held children fully responsible for crimes. Like adults, they faced trail and punishment—often prison or death. Today we seek mainly to reform child offenders, rather than to punish them.

Some primitive people hold inanimate things like stones and rivers guilty of offenses.

For centuries the laws held animals morally responsible for their acts, and therefore try-able in courts.

"And if an ox gore a man or woman to death," Exodus XXI says, "the ox shall be surely stoned."

Says Plato in The Laws: "If a beast of burden or any other animal shall kill anyone, except while the animal is competing in the public games, the deceased's kins-folks shall prosecute it for mur-

der."  
Courts in the Middle Ages duly summoned animals to appear. As late as 1750, a French court tried a she-donkey and condemned her to death, but it later pardoned her because of "good character."

The philosophers Descartes and LaMettrie taught that animals automaton, highly complex machines without feelings.

As a result the laws came for a time to allow much cruelty to animals.

But in recent years, the laws have changed back again to protect animals from abuse. We have evidently changed our minds about the nature of animals.

Our beliefs about crime—what causes it, and who's to blame, and how to control it—find expression each year in our legislation, in our court decisions, and jury verdicts.

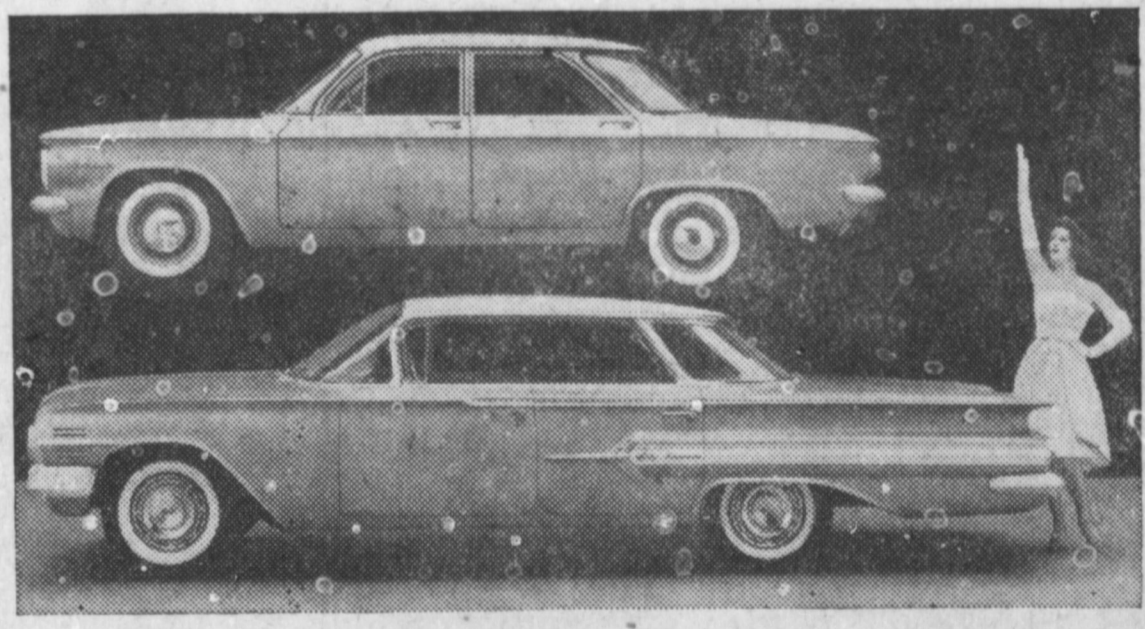

**County and State Still Tax Lost Mustang Town**

For nearly 50 years Miss Minnie Talbot, of 1523 N. Chaparral, Corpus Christi, has been paying taxes on a lot in the town of Newport, only to find out recently that no Nueces County official knew where the elusive municipality was located!

And that touched off a search that has dipped into the history of the Republic of Texas, when S.M. Houston ordered the original survey of Mustang Island.

County Attorney Franklin Smith pulled that old map from the files at Austin, trying to find out whether Newport actually exists, or whether it was only a figment of some real estate promoter's imagination.

Newport has been lost since April 3, 1911, and it's not even a ghost town, for apparently it never was. Since the day it was platted on that date surveyors have never been able to pin it down, although the plat shows that it was on the south end of the island, next to Corpus Christi Pass, which is also lost.

Smith is trying to trace any transfers of land made in Newport since 1911.

"We're not trying to decide title," he said. "We just want to make sure the people paying taxes have title." But, more than that, he'd like to take the entire town of Newport off the Nueces County tax rolls.

But that's not as easy as it seems, for attorneys around the attorney general's office have never been faced with a similar problem and have no precedent by which they can be guided. It seems as though losing towns just isn't done in the best regulated circles, and they say they do not know whether the vanished village can be removed from the rolls or not.

But Smith says that the state may take the town off the tax rolls if Nueces County commissioners will review the problem and find good cause for taking the lots off the rolls of the county. Otherwise, if the state did not drop the property and the county did, the county tax-assessor-collector would still have to collect on the thousand or

**Old Bell At Goliad Ruined By Cannon Shot**

High in the rock-built belfry of La Bahia at Goliad, where for more than two centuries they have looked down at the faithful as they came to prayer, swing two bells that have seen much of the colorful history of Texas, from Indian raids to the Texas Revolution and, later, modern day living.

The first, in the north arch, is silent now—except when some boy, more daring than his fellows, eludes the caretaker and climbs to the tower on feast days to tap it lightly.

It was cast just seven years after the little chapel was built atop a steep and rugged hill in the wilderness of the San Antonio River bottoms, and on its side is a Spanish cross. Around its edge are words and a date—"El Santissimo. Cramento. 1756."

In the western arch is a similar bell, likewise bearing a cross and inscription: "S. Santonio. 1749." But, unlike the first, which is in fair condition despite its 200 years, this second is riven with a crack from rim to crown, and half way up one side is a hole through the metal.

Tradition says that when Fannin and his men were quartered in the old presidio surrounding the mission, they tried to signal for help by ringing the bell, which was silenced by a cannon shot from

the Mexican forces.

Nobody knows just when the bells came to La Bahia, but the story is that the priest in charge had asked for bells from any mission to replace the small ones that were used after the mission was founded, and that had become cracked and useless. Fifty cows were eventually traded to the fathers at Refugio mission for a bell, supposed to be the one damaged by the cannon shot.

A third bell, placed in the tower of La Bahia in 1910, is larger and more modern, and is mounted on a yoke in the center of the belfry floor. It is used regularly to call the worshippers and for observance of feast days, such as that of St. Isidor, on May 15.

On that day there is a big procession around the old church on the grounds of the mission, and young boys stationed in the tower, tap the old mission bells. And for many years, a traditional custom during this celebration was the sprinkling of water of the four cardinal points—perhaps taken from the rites of a more ancient Indian spring festival. Afterwards celebrants took part in Los Matachines or the Indian rain dance.

**Writer Says Texas Is Batty**

"In the limestone regions of Central Texas, there lives a bat species known to mammologists as 'Tandarida brasiliensis.' Their incredible numbers give Texas undisputed claim to the title of 'bat capital of the nation,'" writes H. Burton in the September issue of Texas Game and Fish, the monthly magazine published by the Texas Game and Fish Commission.

Burton, State Department of Health, describes the small mammal as one having a dark grey coat of downy fur, commonly called the "Mexican Free-tailed" bat.

Across the border, in Mexico, live the vampire, or blood-lapping bats," he writes. From 1908-1920, the vampires caused an epidemic of rabies which began in southern Brazil and spread through Argentina, Uruguay, and Paraguay, wiping out whole herds of cattle.

The vampire's possible relationship to the insect and fruit eating bats of Texas, according to the author, is causing considerable worry. Texas' insect eating bat population runs into the uncountable millions, most of them living close together in massive colonies. When a single one of these bats gets infected with rabies, the disease may quickly spread throughout the whole colony and subsequently into other colonies and

other species. "As for the threat this situation poses for humanity," he points out, "instances of unprovoked rabid bat attacks have been extremely rare."

Other interesting articles in the issue include two on white-winged doves, one on stocking bass in the fall, bow fishing, and an annual summary of the hunting seasons.

**CHECK ON YOUR ACCOUNT EVERY THREE YEARS**

Everyone should have a look at his social security record at least once every three years, says Geo. A. Miles, Field Representative of the Corpus Christi office of the Social Security Administration.

Wages may not be credited to a worker's account if he failed to give the employer his social security number. Or, the employer may not have reported the wages at

all due to lack of information about the provisions of the law. The sooner a worker discovers an error in his account, the easier it is to correct his earnings record. Since all future retirement and family insurance payments will be based on each worker's earnings record, it is important that the record be correct.

A special postcard for requesting a statement of your earnings has been prepared. Miles says that you may get one of the card forms from the Social Security Administration, 530 South Water Street, Corpus Christi. It is called an Earnings Request Card.

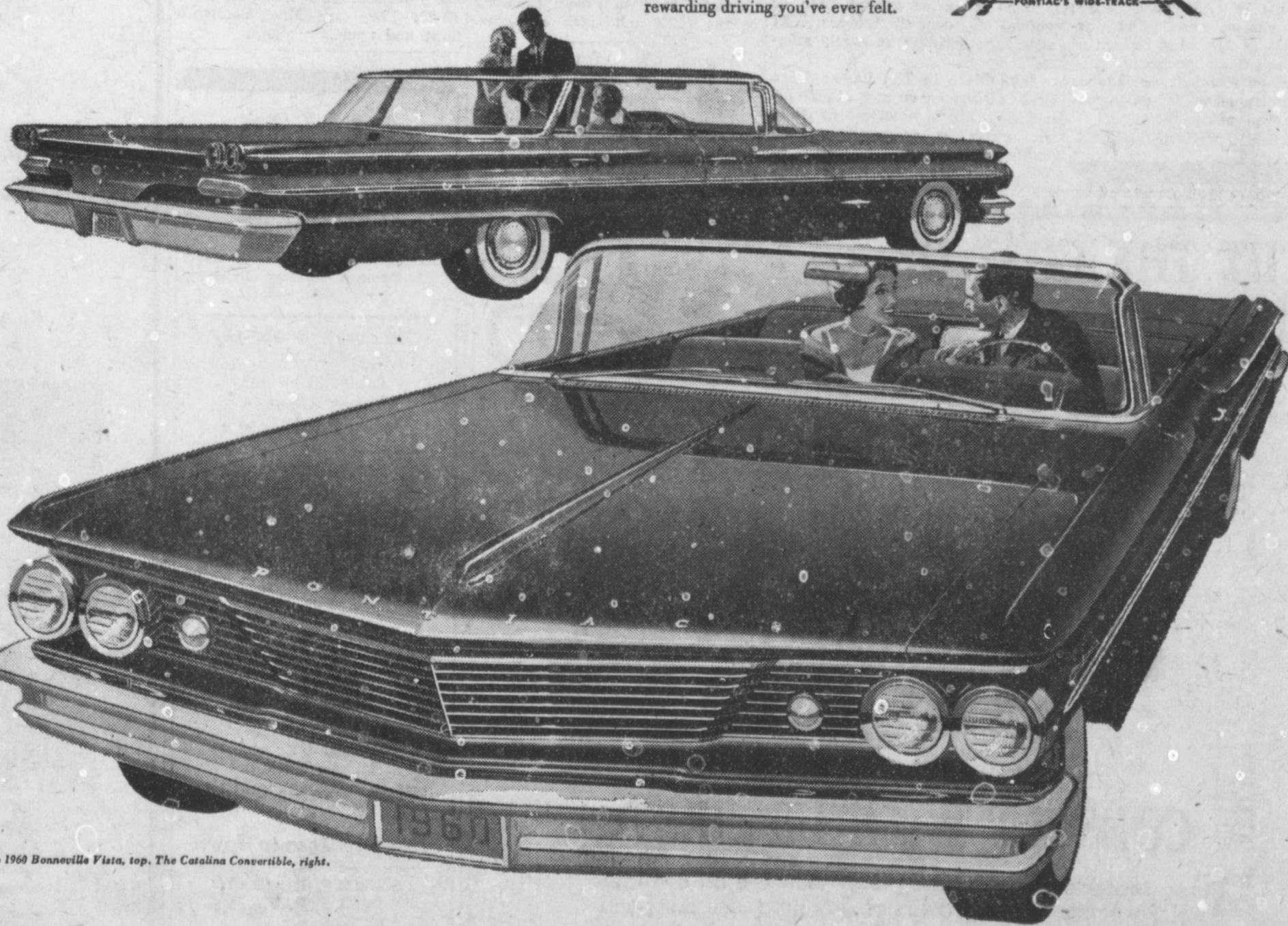

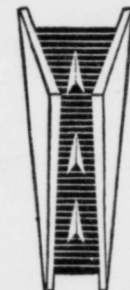
