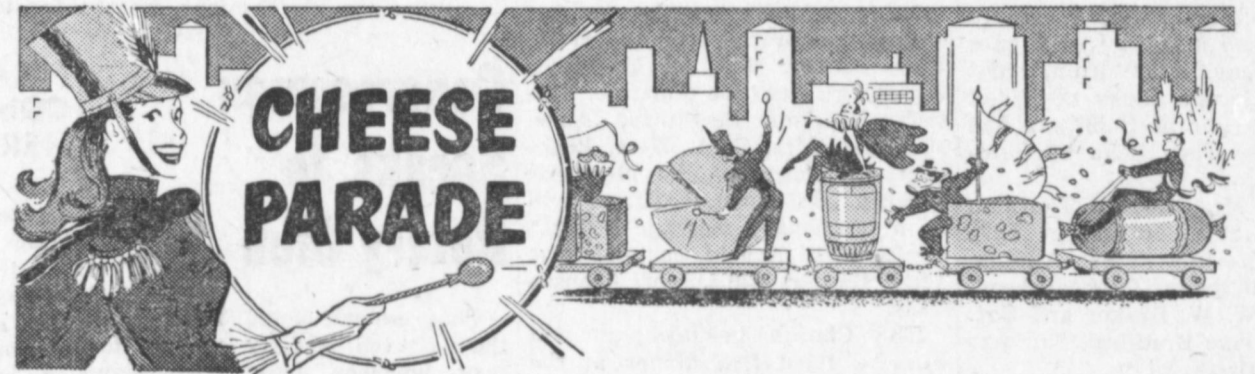

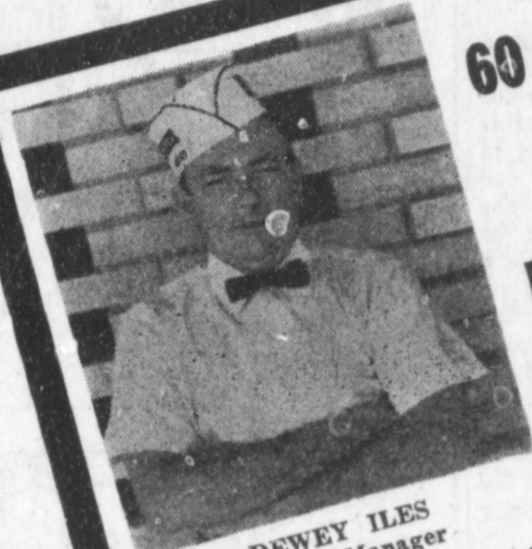

Badgers Beat Pirates 47-7

A pair of big, work horse ends that caught passes like mad—Sidney Donaldson and Charles Jordan—an excellent quarter in Gordon Box, and the hard running of Milton Spiegelhauer and Glenn Carr behind a tough line, combined to give the unbeaten Bishop Badgers a 47-7 win over Rockport at Bishop on Friday night.

Bishop opened the scoring when Gordon Box sneaked over from one yard out. Rockport moved ahead temporarily on a 63-yard pass play from Hayes Warden to Monte Rouquette. Carl Snyder kicked the extra point.

Then the Badgers began to pull

away. Milton Spiegelhauer scored from seven yards out and Sidney Donaldson ran for the points after.

In the second quarter, Box scored again from three yards out. Charles Jordan kicked the extra point. Later Box passed to Jordan for a score in a play that covered 16 yards.

The half ended with Bishop leading 27-7.

Neither team scored in the third quarter but after the fourth quarter opened Larry Graham scored from 13 yards out.

Box passed to Jordan for another score. He hit him again with a pass in a play that covered 74 yards for the final score. The last two points after touchdowns were kicked by Jordan.

Bishop gained 156 yards rushing and 249 through the air.

Rockport was held to 50 yards on the ground and 101 in the air.

In addition to Donaldson, Jordan, Box and Glenn Carr were the Badgers' outstanding players Friday night.

Happner, Weatherly, Snyder, Warden, McCabe, Rouquette and Pena played tough ball for the Pirates.

Jordan kicked off for the Badgers and Gene Gregory took it for the Pirates, winding up on the Aransas County forty-yard line from where Happner, Pena and Warden made one apiece before Carl Snyder punted and the Badgers took over on their thirty.

Spiegelhauer made no gain; Graham made 2; Carr 4; and Spiegelhauer 8. Carr was smeared, Spiegelhauer made a couple, then Carr's pass was incomplete and Gordon Box booted the ball into the Pirate end zone.

Happner made a yard; then he made two—Warden with no receiver had to eat it for a loss of ten, and Snyder kicked to Carr who ran the ball back 22 yards. Then Box passed to Donaldson for 9; made half a yard himself on a keeper, and passed to Jordan for 16 yards more. Spiegelhauer made three; Box made 1; then Box made a yard and the touchdown. No PAT.

Snyder took the kickoff and barreled up field for fifteen yards to the Rockport 33 before he was tackled. ACHS was penalized five yards for offside on Happner's carry; Rouquette made two around end; Happner made one, and then Warden's pass on the next play was intercepted on the Pirate 37.

Box was smeared after gaining about half a yard; then he went around end and fumbled, with the Pirates recovering on their own 24. Pena failed to gain, but a personal foul against Bishop advanced the ball fifteen yards. Happner made a yard in two carries; but was called back and the Badgers penalized five yards for offside; then Pena made two and Happner 3, to the Badger 46.

At the beginning of the second quarter Mike Johnson was smeared on the first play; then Pena failed to gain on the Statue of Liberty before Warden tossed one thirty yards to Rouquette and he ran another 33 yards for the touchdown. Snyder kicked the point and the score was 6-7, favor of the Pirates, but that was the last time they were ahead all night.

Snyder kicked off and Charlie Jordan got a 22-yard runback. On

the first play, Box hit Donaldson with a 16-yard pass; then he passed to Jordan for 19 yards before he handed off to Carr, who trundled around his own left end for 17 yards, to ACHS 14. Box's pass was incomplete; Donaldson made 5; Spiegelhauer raked up seven; Box to Donaldson was broken up, and then Spiegelhauer plowed through for three and the touch-down. Donaldson ran the extra two points.

Happner took the kickoff and ran it back 12 yards, only to be smeared on the first play from scrimmage. Pena made 3, Happner made 6, and then Snyder punted to the Bishop 42. Carr was clobbered for a half-yard loss; Spiegelhauer made 2, and then a Badger pass was ruled complete on the Pirate 40 because of interference with the receiver.

Box to Donaldson netted 11 yards; then Larry Graham rambled for 22 yards; then Box, on a keeper made three more and the touchdown. Jordan kicked the point.

The Badger kickoff was put in play on the Pirate 20, from where Rouquette made three, Pena 3, and then a fumble, recovered by O'Neil, gave the Badgers the ball once more, on the Pirate 27. Larry Graham made 14; then Box carried and the Badgers were penalized to the Pirate 30. Box failed to gain, then he heaved one to Donaldson for 30 yards and a touchdown. No PAT.

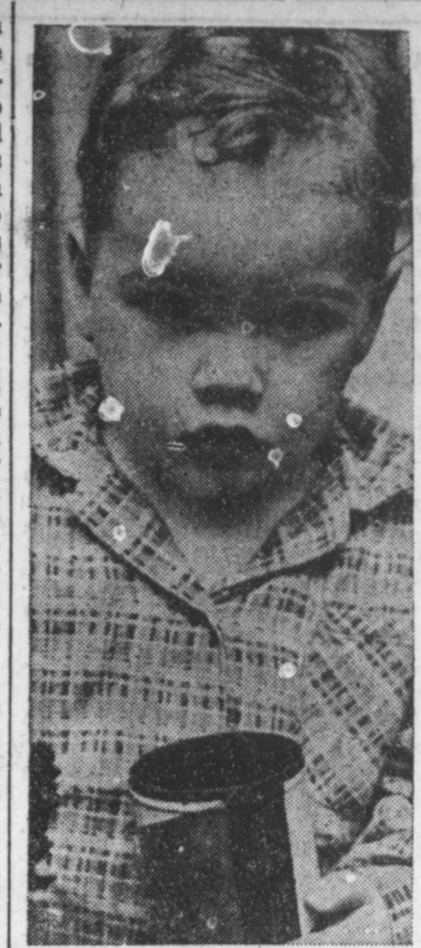
Box's kickoff was received by Pena who ran it back 20 yards; and in three plays from scrimmage the half was over.

Mike Johnson kicked off in the second half, and Larry Graham ran the ball back for 23 yards before he was smeared.

On the Badger 27 Spiegelhauer carried for two; Box lost 4; then a pitch back to Carr netted three before Box punted. Happner ran it back 16 yards. Happner lost 3; Pena lost 3; a third try failed to gain, and, although Happner to Rouquette was good for nine yards, it wasn't enough and the Badgers took over on downs.

Graham made two; Box lost six; a pass was incomplete and the Badgers punted. Happner ran it back seven to the Pirate 45. Pena made 2; Happner made 3; Johnson to Rouquette was incomplete, and Snyder punted.

On the Badger 23 Box lobbed one to Charles Jordan for a 30-yard pass and run play; then Graham made 4; Box to Donaldson

Happner made 7; Pena made a couple; then the Badgers intercepted the next one. But Jordan carried and fumbled, and it was the Pirate ball again. Johnson made a couple, another play failed to gain for the Pirates and then Johnson heaved another long one that was intercepted by the Badgers. Carr tried the line and was smeared for a ten-yard loss; then Box's long pass was intercepted by Warden on the Pirate 20 for the last play in the third quarter.

Happner made nothing; Pena made 3; then Warden made 14 yards. Happner made 5; Pena made three; then a pass to Happner was intercepted.

From the Badger 43 Spiegelhauer made 6; then the Badgers were penalized five on offside and Graham made a beautiful twisting, driving run of 20 to the Pirate 43. Box made 6; then Spiegelhauer got five more; Box on a keeper made 3; Carr made 6; then Spiegelhauer added enough for a first down. Then Graham went around his own right end for 13 yards and the touchdown. No PAT.

Two more touchdowns were made by the Badgers before the game closed. Box to Charles Jordan, several plays later, was good for 20 yards and a touchdown, and then Jordan also kicked the extra point. Then, late in this quarter, Box lobbed a long one to Jordan, who took it and set sail, the whole play moving 73 yards for the touchdown, and then Jordan kicked the point after.

SONTAG BRINGS WHOOPING-CRANE CLIPPING

Les Sontag brought a clipping from the Sargent County News, of Forman, North Dakota, where he used to live, showing that people in that area are interested in the whooping cranes, also. The clipping reads:

"Whooping cranes are expected to arrive in North Dakota in October, announced John Hewston, public relations chief for the game and fish department.

"Whooping cranes migrate through North Dakota each fall, as they make their way from breeding grounds to winter headquarters on the Gulf of Mexico in Texas. These rare birds show up at various points around the state through October. They travel alone, or in small groups. Occasionally they tag along with sandhill cranes.

"Whoopers are large, white birds with black wing tips. At last count there were only 38 left in the entire world. Report any observations of these rare visitors to the game and fish department immediately."

TEXAS CHAMPIONS OF FREEDOM

ERASTUS "DEAF" SMITH

Scout, Soldier and Hero of San Jacinto

In 1821 people did not usually come to the untamed Texas Territory for their health. But one man did just that — Erastus Smith, from New York by way of Natchez. He wandered over the wild frontier country, learned its topography, made friends with Anglos, Mexicans and Indians. He grew strong and well, but never regained his hearing. When Texans began their fight for independence from Mexico, "Deaf" Smith — scout and soldier — took his place with Fannin, Bowie, Travis, Milam, Sam Houston and the other champions of freedom. His best known service to his chosen country was the destruction of Vince's Bridge, just before the battle of San Jacinto. Bridging Vince's Bayou, then in flood, it offered the only means of communication between the Texan and Mexican armies and the remainder of Texas. When Deaf Smith destroyed it, on the morning of April 21, 1836, he effectively isolated the Mexicans from reinforcements and prevented an orderly retreat. The fact that it also isolated the Texans was of no importance to Smith. He and his people would win. They were fighting for liberty and the right to live as they chose.

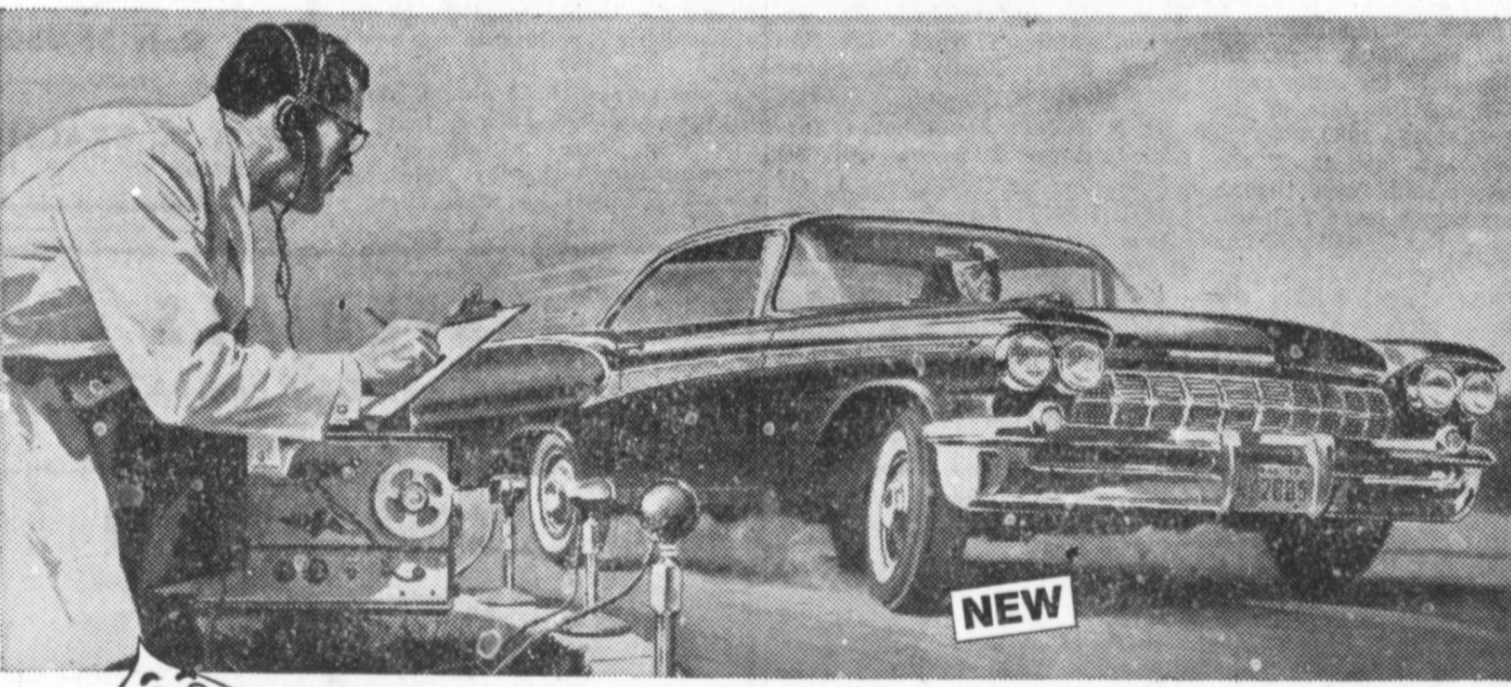

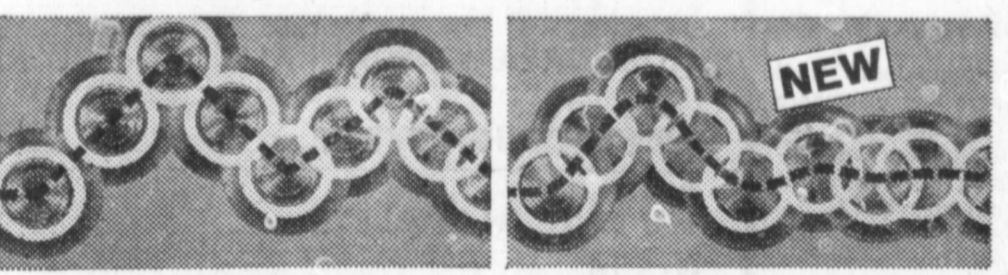
