Future Homemakers Sponsor UNICEF Drive

For the past three years the Wesleyan Service Guild has been interested in the Halloween Trick or Treat collections for the United Nations Children's Fund in the Rockport-Fulton area. As more people have become familiar with this work, collections have risen from about \$69.00 the first year to approximately \$169.00 last year.

UNICEF was organized by the General Assembly of the United Nations to combat hunger among the world's children. It soon developed a four-fold program to provide, protect, teach, and train.

The symbol is a child drinking milk. UNICEF has also attacked such diseases as malaria, TB, yaws, leprosy and trachoma. Better health standards have been established everywhere UNICEF has worked. UNICEF operates in 100 countries, where it has been asked to help. Each country must match dollar for dollar the money spent by UNICEF, and it usually spends more than that amount.

UNICEF's main job is to see that people get the things they need to help themselves.

Money comes from donations from various countries, and from individuals. Senator Wiley of Wisconsin has said, "Dollar for dollar, I know of no single appropriation made by Congress which does more good for more people."

Catholic Youths Meet, Elect Georgia Kresta

Delegates from Catholic youth groups around Rockport and the surrounding counties met at Sacred Heart Parish hall last week for the Fall Deanery Youth council meeting, conducted by Father Thomas Meany of Rockport, Deanery Moderator of the Diocesan Council of Catholic Youth.

Representatives were present from Refugio, Woodsboro, Taft, Rockport, Beeville, Goliad, and Sinton.

The following were elected Deanery officers for 1959-60. President, Georgia Kresta of Rockport; vice-president, Barbara von Dohlen of Goliad; Secretary, Ann Ermis of Woodsboro; and Treasurer, Tim von Dohlen of Goliad. They will represent the youth of this area at the Diocesan Convention to be held in Kingsville in December.

The immediate work of the Deanery youth council is to encourage youth activities in the communities represented. The young people were encouraged to call attention to National Catholic Youth Week celebrated from October 25 to November 1, 1959, with the theme "Spiritualize Youth—Vitalize Nations."

Mention of Catholic Youth Week was made in the Congressional Record by Hon. John O. Pastore, Senator of Rhode Island. He said: "The theme of this year's Youth Week aptly summarizes what the family of nations most needs. In order that each member of that family be assured of his individual dignity, and be accurately informed of the source from which he will derive his positive contribution to the common interests about which turns the opportunity for meaningful existence—the youth of the country must prize the power of spiritual motivation."

Dr. Charles Malik, President of the 13th Session of the General Assembly of the United Nations is an editorial on Youth Week wrote: "The world cannot save itself—Christian youth and especially Catholic youth, knows this very well, and that is why theirs is a great historic responsibility. It devolves upon this youth to help in mediating this salvation to the world."

Engineer Says Weather Drag

Give the Contractor Forty-Five Good Days For Work, Yoes States, and Loop 70 Should Be Completed Except for Landscape Work

"The paving job on Loop 70 should be completely finished within forty-five good working days," Resident Engineer M. G. said for the Highway Department, when queried about the project which has kept the town in a soupy mud or blowing dust for most of this year.

"Of course," he added, "we have no control over the weather. But if the contractor could get twenty

good working days, he should have part of the asphalt on, enough to stop the dust, and with another twenty-five days after that we should be finished. The weather is all that's holding us up now."

The job, which originally was supposed to have been finished in time for the past summer's tourist season, was delayed time and again in 1958, when letting of the contract was held up by a small group of people objecting to highway department plans for the interchange at the T. Noak Smith corner, and the double highway between there and the Tom O'Connor residence.

The Pirates really turned in a whole of the game, and are to be congratulated on this win. Their teamwork was good, and their determination to win really pulled them through what is probably the toughest contest they will have in district play.

A HISTORY of Rockport, Fulton, St. Mary's, Lamar and El Copano By Mrs. Will W. Wood

Aransas City seems to have gone out of existence by 1846, but nothing dismayed Colonel Power, who turned his attention to promoting a townsite at Copano. Joseph E. Plummer had built a one-story shell-concrete house at Powers Point, and a small community had gone up at what is known as the town of Copano, about a mile up the bay from Powers Point. The town was surveyed and platted by Lyman H. Ward, surveyor, prior to 1847.

The townsite at Black Point was still marking time as the decade ended. Joseph F. Smith was patiently waiting the outcome of the litigation between himself and Power. In 1848 the Colonel belatedly attempted to strengthen his title. On June 28 he put Fram Milton in possession of the whole of the Black Point area as his tenant. Power's litigation with Governor Henry Smith in Brazoria County, the governor's old bailiwick, had back-fired; and instead of Power recovering judgment on Smith's promissory notes, the latter had recovered a judgment against Power in excess of \$20,000. This was now on appeal.

While Major John H. Wood was always interested in making land acquisitions along the coastal area, his land and ranching acquisitions until 1849 were largely confined to other areas, because Smith's litigation with Powers had unsettled all the land titles in the coastal area. Smith and Wood had become friends, and this relationship

was later to ripen into various partnerships in various successive land promotions, particularly in the development of St. Mary's and later the City of Rockport. While Wood's partnership with Smith in the development of St. Mary's and Black Point is somewhat vague, it is known that Wood definitely contributed financially to the platting and later development of this area.

Major Wood was descended from a noble and wealthy family in New York and Boston. Ancestor Pieter Stoutenburg was the first treasurer of the Dutch Amsterdam Colony, and his grandfather, Jacobus Van Stoutenburg, founded Hyde Park, New York.

Another grandfather, Major Richard De Cantillon, was prominent in the American Revolution. Immediately after the Texas revolution, through family backing and land script gained through service in the Texas Army, Wood began to acquire ranches in what is now Port Lavaca, San Patricio and Victoria counties. He located his first ranch near the present town of Ednam moving in 1840 to Victoria, where he became Texas' Army Quartermaster. He married Nancy Anna Clark in 1842, and was living in San Patricio in 1843. In 1846, while briefly encamped with General Taylor on Live Oak peninsula, he envisioned a town at that site.

Hallowe'en

Superstitions together with customs through the ages go into our celebration of Hallowe'en, or "Holy Eve," on October 31. The day is so named because it is the eve or the festival of All Saints, but many of the beliefs and observances connected with it arose long before the Christian era, in the autumn festivals of pagan peoples.

Even after November 1 had become a Christian feast day honoring All Saints, the peasants of Drunuid clung to the old pagan beliefs and customs that had grown up about Hallowe'en. On the eve before spirits, they believed the dead roamed abroad, and they lighted bonfires to drive them away. It became picturesque superstitions. Folk came to believe that they could foretell the future on that night by performing rites. In the British Isles, great bonfires blazed and laughing bands of "guisers," young people disguised in grolatens craved from turnips, gathered in every village.

Many of the older traditions of Hallowe'en are still in practice today. People still "bob" apples, carve pumpkins, and the youngsters still dress up in costumes of witches and goblins to roam about the streets in search for "Trick or Treat." Frequently whole communities celebrate Hallowe'en as they did in earlier days.

Downtown Pep Rally

The school spirit of the Aransas County High School was seen in the downtown pep rally on October 22, which started in front of Dr. Wood's office and proceeded to the street between Roaten's and the Central Power & Light Company. The band marched in front of the students who performed a snake dance.

Coach Segler was asked to speak to the group as was David Pena, football player. The school song was then sung and the rally was dismissed.

The Future Homemakers of America held its annual F.H.A. initiation October 19-21.

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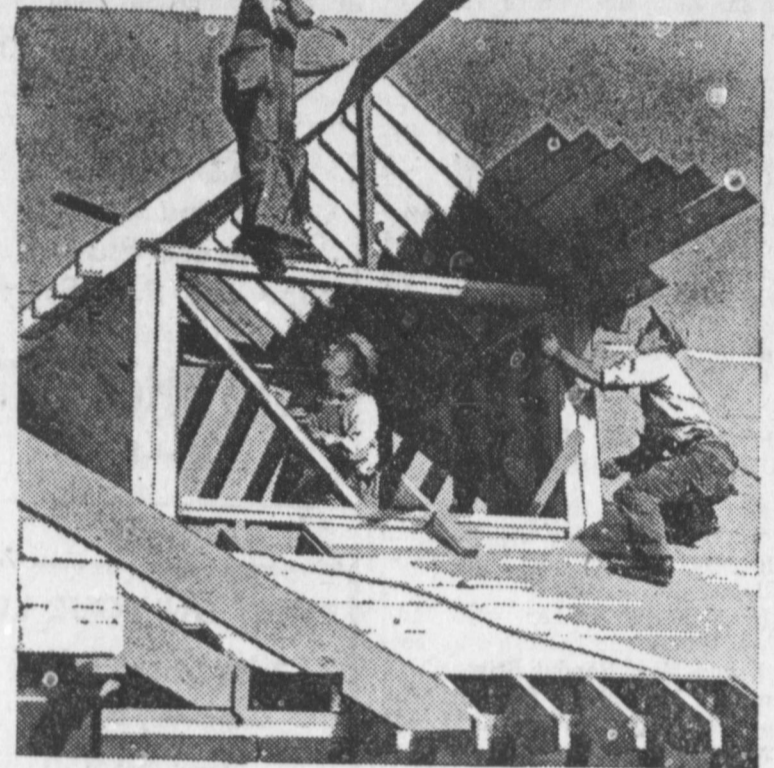

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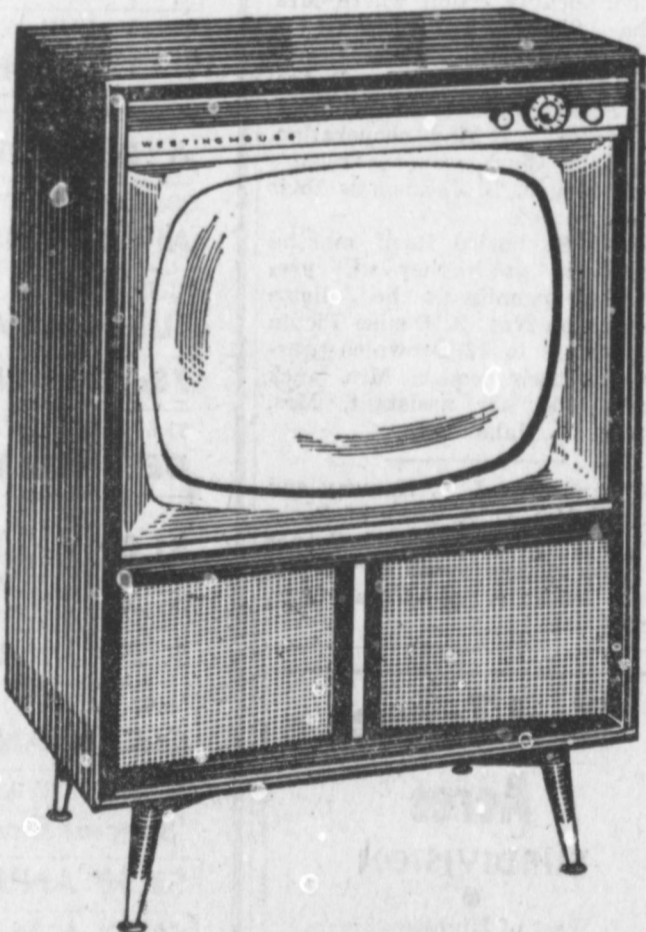
