Aransas Bay Closed To Oystering After 20th of Month

According to fish house operators in the area, the Game and Fish Commission edict issued Dec. 1, closing all of Aransas Bay to oystering until further notice after Dec. 20, will work a hardship on a lot of little fishermen who have already had one of the poorest shrimp seasons in many years.

"If they want a lot of hungry people around here for Christmas," one of them said, "they've certainly picked a good way to put some of them on the bread-line. They boys haven't made much shrimping and about the only break they've had recently was the fact that oystering in the region was fair, and they've been getting some good oysters."

The Game and Fish Commission notice was issued under article 964, P.C. 1925, State of Texas, applicable to public oyster reefs, and provides that the commission may close any public reef against anyone taking oysters from it when the commission believes that the said reef is being overworked or damaged in any way.

It hits the fishermen in this area particularly hard as it closes the only area in the region from which any sizable amount of oysters has been taken. There are few oysters in Mesquite Bay this year, they say, and a few in San Antonio Bay, but the bulk of the production has been coming from Aransas Bay, as Copano Bay oysters are oily, probably because of wastes from the numerous wells operating in that area.

Houston Editor To Be Banquet Speaker Here

George Carmack, editor of the Houston Press, has accepted an invitation from the Chamber of Commerce to speak at the annual banquet scheduled March 5, Manager Mrs. Mary Juergens told chamber directors Tuesday night at their regular meeting.

Carmack is familiar with this part of Texas and with the tourist business, being one of its most enthusiastic promoters.

In other business, President Jack McCready appointed a nominations committee to prepare a slate of directors for elections to be held shortly after the first of the year. Chairman is Norvell Jackson and other members are Herman Johnson and J. T. Slocum.

After some discussion, it was decided not to attempt to decorate the streets for Christmas, as directors expressed concern that this might delay paving Loop 70, the Highway 35 Business Route, still further.

The board also discussed the possibility of issuing a street map, and James A. Jarboe was asked to present figures on the approximate cost.

Reports of various committees were heard, and Mrs. Juergens told the group that game nights for tourists would start at the VFW Hall on Dec. 17. However, she said, those on Christmas and New Year eve would be omitted, but that thereafter they would be given every Thursday night.

New Presbyterian Minister Arrives

Reverend Cecil Lang, Jr., new pastor of the First Presbyterian Church, arrived in Rockport with his family on Dec. 1, and will preach his first pastoral sermon on Sunday, Dec. 6.

The Reverend Lang was born



in Knoxville, Tenn. in 1925, of Texas parents temporarily out of their own state. However, they moved back to Texas in 1931, and he has lived here ever since.

He attended school in Kilgore, graduated from Mineral Wells high school, and spent two years in Texas Technological College at Lubbock, before entering the army where he spent three years.

Returning from his military service, he spent two years at Austin College, Sherman, where he received his B. A. degree in English. He also spent three years in the Austin Presbyterian Seminary, at Austin, where he received his Bachelor of Divinity degree.

After receiving his degree, Rev. Lang was pastor at Overton, Texas, from May 1952, until Oct. 1954, and went to Killeen, Texas in November 1954, to accept a call to the pastorate of the First Presbyterian Church of that city, where he remained until he accepted the call here.

His father, Cecil H. Lang, Sr., is also a Presbyterian minister, and will preach at his son's formal installation here on Dec. 27, coming from Tyler where his pastorate is located.

Mrs. Lang is the former Nancy Stiles, born in Clarksville, Texas, and reared in Lubbock, where she graduated from Texas Tech in 1947. The Langs were married August 27, 1948, and have three children: Mark Stiles, born on Christmas day, 1950; Lynn Elizabeth, born March 28, 1953; and David Cecil, born Dec. 18, 1954.

Well in Aransas Flows 102 Barrels

Appel Petroleum Corp. No. 1 Emma Huddleston, Aransas County Fulton Beach Field well in William Lewis Survey 93, has been completed for 102.5 barrels of 43.8 gravity pipeline oil daily.

Production is from perforations at 7,046-50 feet in 5 1/2 inch casing at 7,210 feet total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 1,024-1. Flowing tubing pressure through 9-64 inch choke was 565 pounds.

Certificate of Title Needed on Trailers

A. C. Shivers, County Tax Assessor-Collector predicts that there will be a lot of frustrated trailer owners next February and March when re-registration of motor vehicles is due.

By the terms of a new law, trailers over 4,000 pounds will have to have certificates of title for the first time. Titles can be obtained now while there is still time to meet certain requirements regarding proof of ownership and serial numbers. February and March will be a very poor time for handling this new requirement.

ARANSAS TOP COUNTY IN BOND SALES

Sale of Series E and H Savings bonds issued by the Treasury Department in Aransas County has reached a total of \$78,117, according to county chairman Fred Bracht, who said that this is 126% of the quota set for the county this year.

Of the nine other counties included in District 7, of which Lon C. Hill is chairman, Kenedy has reached 114.5% of its quota with a total of \$22,905; Bee County, 79.1% of its quota with \$151,078; Brooks, 78.6%, with \$294,000; Nueces, 62.6% with \$3,175,406; San Patricio, 57.6% with \$357,065; Live Oak, 53.9% with \$32,882; Jim Wells, 51% with \$124,136; and McMullen County, with a quota of \$20,000 has sold no bonds whatever.

October sales in Aransas County were \$2165; Bee, \$11,431; Brooks, \$8446; Jim Wells, \$19,106; Kenedy, \$124; Kleberty, \$18,251; Live Oak, \$7964; Nueces, \$248,399; and San Patricio, \$54,864.

Boat Owner Killed As Craft Explodes

A shattering explosion aboard a fishing vessel killed the owner, Charlie Leo Branch, 51, of Aransas Pass Sunday morning.

The impact blew William Yardley, 43, also of Aransas Pass, 150 feet from the boat, throwing him onto an island. Yardley, under observation at Aransas Hospital, suffered a head injury, lacerations and contusions, but is not believed seriously injured.

The explosion occurred sometime during Sunday morning about 35 miles north of Port Aransas in the Intracoastal Canal.

The wreckage was discovered when the tug Bob Hoppers, towing a barge, passed by.

Branch's boat, built locally by Ted and Steve Atwood about a year ago, and sold to Branch earlier this year, was a total loss. The remains of its hull and cabin were grounded, parts of them sticking above the water level.

A Coast Guard spokesman said the explosion is believed to have occurred in a butane cook stove aboard the diesel powered vessel. An investigation is to be conducted by the Office of Marine Inspection, U. S. Coast Guard.

Branch, who owned and operated the fishing vessel, had lived in Aransas Pass a number of years.

He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Rosalee Mary Branch; one son, Charles S. Branch of Aransas Pass one daughter, Mrs. J. D. Starr of Freeport; one brother, Oma Branch of Fort Myers, Fla., and five grandchildren.

Funeral services were at 2 p. m. Tuesday at Cage-Marshall Funeral Chapel with the Rev. Chandler, pastor of the Second Baptist Church, officiating. Burial was in Prairie View Cemetery.

DICK PICTON ELECTED CBTA DIRECTOR

Dick Picton was elected a director of the Coastal Bend Tourist Association Tuesday at the regular meeting of the organization, making the third Rockport man on the board. Others are Emory M. Spencer and James H. Sorenson, Jr.

Lon C. Hill, president of the CBTA, told delegates at the fifth annual membership meeting, that "tourism and conventions must go hand and hand."

Hill said, "It won't be long before we have an active, energetic well-run tourist-convention business. We've got more to offer tourists than any other city in Texas. It's up to us to first sell it to ourselves."

"I think the day will come when the city and county will even appropriate money for a tourist program," Hill said.

Hill, who bows out as CBTA president Dec. 31, said he thought the past year had been a successful one for the CBTA. "I've felt we tried to create interest in conventions and I think we have been helpful."

"Tourists and conventions are big business," Hill said. "I started in the tourist business in the Valley 30 years ago. It's a slow grind and requires lots of hard work and elbow grease."

"We sold the Valley on citrus fruits and vegetables with cotton as a sideline and now the Valley is reaching the point where their tourist income is on a par with the citrus industry."

The board of directors will select their 1960 officers Dec. 11.

Dredging the channels will be done by the Loyd Richardson Construction Company of Aransas Pass, and Strickhausen said Wednesday afternoon that the dredge would move in some time after the first of January.

In addition, Marineland Investors, Inc., also of Corpus Christi, is holding approximately 650 acres of adjoining land for future development.

The property in question lies across the road from land purchased a year ago by Corpus Christi oilman Jack Modesett, and comprises the Gwynn land and adjoining acreage.

Copano Ridge Subdivision No. 1, comprising 55 lots, was sold within 15 days after its opening by Strickhausen, and three more subdivisions are now being developed.

The channels, which interlock, will begin in Copano Bay, cut into the shell ridge between the bay and lake and swing both north and south, forming a Y with the entrance extending for approximately 2400 feet in either direction.

Three legs to the Y will be 200 feet in width and six feet deep. To extend the water frontage the entrance channel will be continued through the shell ridge to Salt Lake and swing northward along the shore of that body of water.

The 60-foot lots will be back to back, between the channels and the lake or bay. A street between two rows will give access to the lots, which will all front on Copano Bay, a channel or the lake.

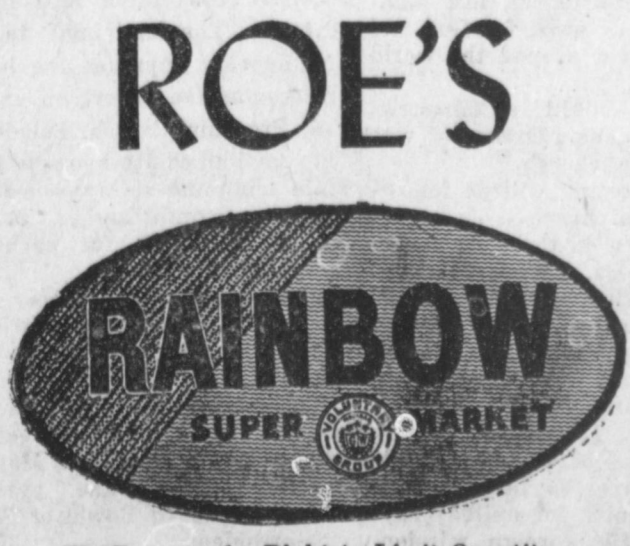

A HISTORY
of
Rockport, Fulton, St. Mary's, Lamar and El Copano

Mrs. Will W. Wood

In February, 1862, the first units of the blockading squadron made appearance in the waters of the then Refugio County. In the last part of the month a force of Marines from the U.S.S. Afton landed on Mustang Island and burned the homes and buildings of Mesdames Thomas B. Clubb and Robert A. Mercer, and captured the patrol sloop used by Captain Benjamin F. Neal's Battery. The Afton next turned its attention to the village of Aransas (St. Joseph's) on St. Joseph's Island across Aransas Pass and Mustang Island. Here about 50 marines were landed and remained several days, pillaging and plundering at will, and burning several houses and buildings. Major Daniel D. Shea, commanding at Fort Esperanza, upon learning of the raid, hurried to the village with a detachment of riflemen. He moved stealthily into the vicinity of the village hoping to take the enemy. The raiders discovered his presence and got back to their vessels. The Afton, after getting out of rifle-range, bombarded the village and Shea's detachment. The affair concluded in a parley. The Federal Commander landed under

a flag of truce and turned over to Shea a sack of mail which he had captured, and transmitted messages from the crew of the blockade runner McNeill, which had been taken by the Federals a few days before. The Yankee apprised Shea that the Unionists had come "not to fight but to stop the trade." Captain Neal, whose battery was stationed on Shell Bank Island, kept his garrison on the alert to resist any entrance into the bay.

The advent of the Federal squadron with its depredation caused a mass evacuation of old settlers from the islands off the coast, so

that by the middle of 1862 they were practically depopulated of civilians. The islands have never recovered their population or prosperity.
