

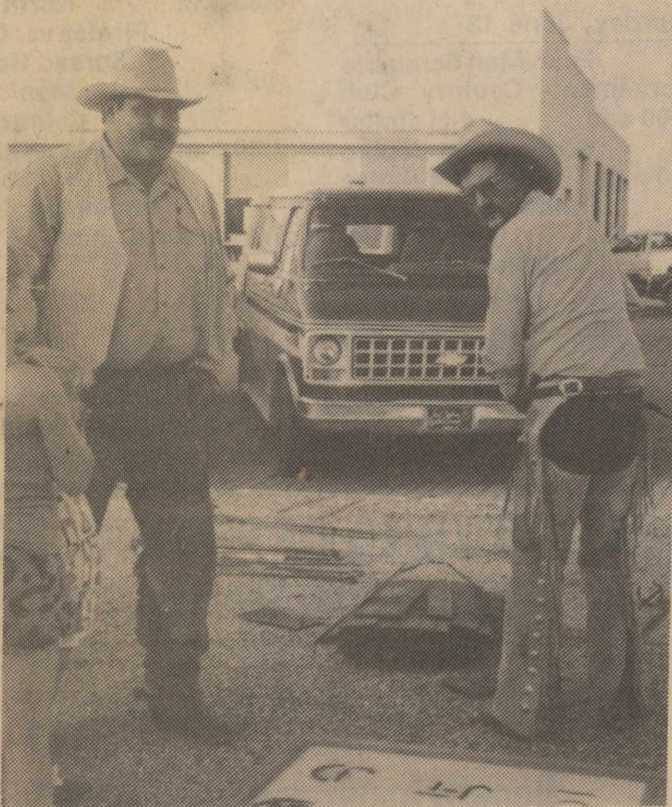

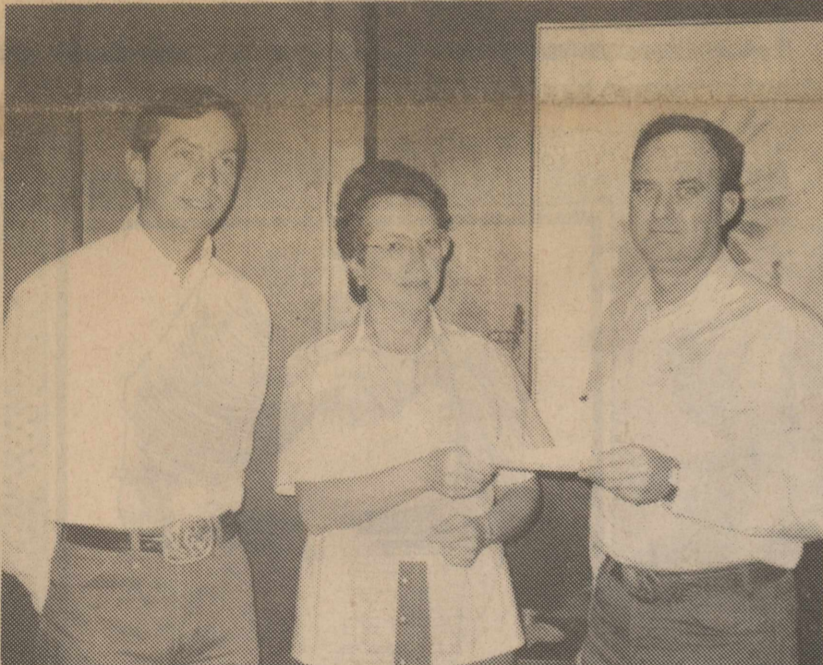

### Sheehan Not A Candidate

Bill Sheehan, 69th District Judge, has announced that he will not be a candidate for re-election for the term beginning January 1, 1991.

Sheehan was elected Judge of the 69th Judicial District, which is composed of Dallam, Hartley, Moore and Sherman Counties, at the general election in November of 1978. He is now

servicing his third four year term, which ends December 31, 1990.

Sheehan stated that this term of office will complete his eligibility for retirement, and that he is making this announcement early so those who are interested in seeking the position for the next term of office will have sufficient time to make their plans.

### 4-H Youth Rodeo

Sherman County 4-H Youth Rodeo will be Saturday, June 13, 1987. The rodeo will begin at 10 a.m. with team roping. Team roping consists of two divisions: Junior (ages 12 and under) and Senior (ages 13-18). The books will close on team roping when the first steer runs. First place buckles and pay back will be given.

After team roping the rodeo events will begin. The events will be barrels, pole bending, goat ribbon, steer daubing, calf riding, break-away roping, steer riding,

goat tying, chute dogging, and ribbon roping. Age groups for these events will be 6 and under, 7-9, 10-12, and 13-15 years of age. Books were closed for these events Monday, June 8, 1987. Buckles will be awarded for 1st place in each event. One saddle will be awarded to an all-around girl, and to an all-around boy.

A concession stand will be open at the Youth Arena. The Sherman County 4-H Horse Club will be barbecuing hamburgers. They are also serving nachos, brown-

group, all Stratford listings will be located in the same area of the plaza. Amarillo's Centennial Plaza will be a tribute not only to Amarillo but also to those families and businesses throughout the Panhandle who helped mold Amarillo to what it is today.

Families or businesses wanting to record their name(s) in an engraved brick in the Amarillo Plaza should pick up the necessary forms from the Stratford Chamber office. A 4 inch x 12 inch brick containing either 14 or 28 spaces costs \$30. A larger 12 inch x 12 inch brick with

84 spaces is available for \$150 and a 12 inch x 24 inch brick with 62 spaces is available for \$250.

Purchasers names engraved in the brick pavers will stand as a record for future generations of those businesses and individuals who made Amarillo a product of the Panhandle. The focal point of the Plaza will be water geysers surrounded by a granite apron engraved with a timeline of major events for the past 100 years. Large shade trees will enframe the plaza and an amphitheater

will be built for outdoor activities and performances. The area will be enhanced by granite sculptures with additional areas for public sculptures. The Centennial Plaza is to be located on a historic site and will serve as a documentation of the events and people who made Amarillo what it is today.
