### KNOW TEXAS

Texas has always been famous as a cotton state; but in recent years this crop has taken second place to another "crop": In 1932 the value of the oil business was \$50,000,000 more than cotton.

Texas holds second rank to New York as the greatest export state in the union. Texas leads all others in export of raw materials; New York being leader in manufactured goods.

Sam Houston, Mark Anthony, and Napoleon Bonaparte stand out as the three generals in history who have captured the combined head of an army and a government in the same battle.

Deaf Smith captured a Mexican courier just before the battle of San Jacinto who had a saddle bag initial ed W. B. Travis. It was his souvenir from the massacre at the Alamo.

Casualties at the Battle of San Jacinto were: Texans, 6 killed, 24 wounded; Mexicans, 630 killed, 208 wounded and 730 captured.

The original of the constitution of Texas was lost in Tennessee. Only the newspaper reports were over-rafted, and in the archives of the State today, a copy of the document, as printed in the Texas Telegraph, reposes.

The "New Orleans Grays," organized in 1835, was the first military unit organized on American soil to go to the aid of the settlers who had decided to throw off the yoke of the Mexican tyranny. Adolphe Stern, former alcalde of Nacogdoches, outfitted the company of fifty men.

Texas sold 100,000 square miles of land comprising portions of Oklahoma, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico, to the United States government for \$10,000,000.

Southwestern Texas has one of the largest spring areas to be found in the world. Ten notable springs flow almost one billion gallons of cold spring water daily. The largest Pecan spring in Val Verde county, flows 245,000,000 gallons daily.

The famous King ranch, close to Kingsville, Texas, is larger than the entire state of Delaware. This big ranch, covering several counties and operated as a unit since the early fifties, has recently been divided among the King heirs.

Texas produces 86 per cent of all the sulphur mined in the world.

Dallas has \$30,000,000 worth of hotel rooms in which to house the visitors to the Texas Centennial Exposition in 1936.

## MAKING COLLARS DEMON- STRATED TO HARMONY H. D. CLUB

Roller collars can be quickly and  
easily designed from a flat collar  
which has been blocked from your  
foundation pattern, we learned at a  
demonstration on designing and making  
collars, given by the county demon-  
stration agent.

Take the plain flat collar and re-  
design shape if you desire to, but  
leave the neck line as it is. Start  
slashing the collar from the outside  
edge to inside edge as near the neck-  
line as possible without cutting col-  
lar in to. Do not begin slashing  
nearer than one-half inch of the cen-  
ter back. Slash according to amount  
of roll you wish to have in collar.  
Now lap the slashes over, the amount  
depending on how much you want  
the collar to roll. Pin this on paper  
and cut the roll collar.

## CLAIREMONT H. D. CLUB

"Collars should be one half inch  
smaller than the neckline if they are  
to fit correctly and keep the facing  
from showing at the back," said the  
Home Demonstration Agent, to the  
Clairemont club which met at the  
home of Mrs. Wesley Osmon, on  
April 29.

If the material is sheer such as  
batiste and voile the collar should  
be from three fourths to one inch  
smaller. What we term as flat col-  
lars are not perfectly flat. To make  
a flat collar you decide upon the neck  
line of the garment and block off a  
collar that is exactly the width of  
the neckline then take make the  
fourth inch from center to top or  
more depending upon the material  
to be used for the collar. The  
collar is stretched to fit neckline and  
most of this is done from center  
back to a little beyond the shoulder  
seam you will have a slight roll which  
will conceal the facing used to attach  
the collar to the dress.

## BEDSPREADS DEMONSTRATED TO GIRARD 4-H GIRLS

"If cotton prints are used for bed-  
spreads be sure that they are fast  
color prints," said Miss Jones, the  
C. H. D. agent to the Girard 4-H  
club in a demonstration of designing  
our beds.

Spreads made of cotton prints or  
tufted spreads quilted spreads, made  
of "gunny sacks" were demonstrated  
to our club. We learned that if  
prints were used in making spreads  
for a double bed that the spread  
would be more attractive if we did  
not have a seam down the center of  
the spread but planned the making of  
the spread so that the seams would  
be on each side of the bed.

## POLAR 4-H CLUB

"Gunny sacks" can be used to  
make suitable spreads, especially for  
the beds that are on the sleeping  
porch. Our home agent said that it  
was better not to use these  
sacks any more but leave them in their natural  
color or dye them a dark green,  
brown for successful results in dye-  
ing.

First they should be well cleaned  
and have all sacks used in the spread  
as near the same mesh as possible.  
If they are lettered in black it may  
be necessary to use a commercial  
dye remover to remove the letters.  
Before washing the sacks singe them.  
They are then ready to be made into  
spreads. Using a facing out of a  
durable cotton material, white if it  
is to be dyed is suggested. This  
facing should be about one half inch  
in width when finished. Now it is  
ready to be put in the dye bath.  
Don't wash sacks in a washing ma-  
chine.

## CLAIREMONT 4-H CLUB

Flowers attractively arranged  
gives a delightful touch to your bed  
rooms, the home demonstration agent  
held the Clairemont 4-H Club girls  
in a demonstration on finishing  
touches for bedrooms on May 1st.

We discovered that at this time of  
the year there were lots of pretty  
wild flowers which could be used to  
make lovely bouquets for our bed-  
rooms. Just a bunch of flowers in  
a vase does not mean beauty added  
to our rooms unless they are cor-  
rectly arranged. First we have to con-  
sider the container used, for instance  
you would not want a bowl made of  
pottery for daisies or a glass bowl  
for zinas or roses. If you use a wide  
container the right proportion can  
be attained for the height of flow-  
ers used by making the height equal  
one and one half times the width of  
the container. If a tall vase is used  
make the arrangement one and one  
half times the height of the vase.

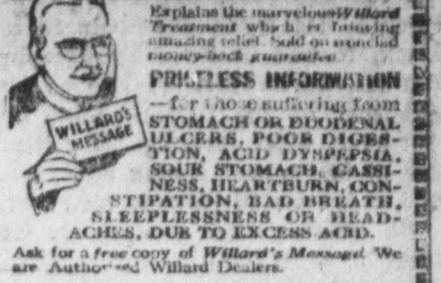

**Daniels Finds All Publishers Out of the Red**

The nation's publishers of newspapers, all of which were deeply in the red two years ago and had not emerged last year, are again in the black, it was declared by Josephus Daniels, ambassador to Mexico and publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer, after meeting his colleagues at the annual Spring convention of the Associated Press in New York.

"I haven't found a publisher who says he is still in the red," he told the New York Times. "Many of

them are making larger profits than they made before the depression. I told them that in view of this improvement it was incumbent upon them to support the administration."

Asked whether he approved of the President's \$4,880,000,000 public works relief program, Mr. Daniels replied: "Of course. This country spent \$30,000,000,000 during the World War for purpose of destruction. Why can't it afford to spend very much less in peace time for constructive purposes? I spent \$4,000,000,000 myself when I was Secretary of the Navy."

**Dr. Brown Says Overwork, All Hoop**

Austin, May 9. — "One of the most maligned words in the dictionary is overwork," said Dr. J. W. Brown, State Health Officer. "It is employed as an excuse to avoid unattractive social engagements. It is used to impress others with one's particular importance. It is frequently mentioned as the reason for one's business failures. And it certainly is most unjustly blamed for many bodily ills."

"As a matter of fact overwork is not nearly the hobgoblin it is painted to be. Abstractly speaking, overwork is a very decent term, behaves itself on most occasions, and does little damage to the lives of most of us. And more likely than not, where lack of health is concerned, overwork has had little if anything to do with the situation."

"Actually, work of a normal amount, or even above average, is not prone to do one any real damage. On the other hand, certain practices associated with the work or with living are likely to be the real offenders. Those who, for example, are victims of impure air, illogical diets, auto-intoxication, worry lack of exercise and insufficient sleep are usually the first to blame work for their sorry condition. And, no doubt, even an average amount of work can easily turn into a sense of overwork when one's capacity to do the job has been weakened by enervating habits."

"The best bulwark against ill effects from hard and sustained work in the conscientious adoption of a well rounded and properly balanced health program. And by this suggestion

is not meant a frantic adherence to a long list of fancy rules, but only a reasonable sense of the primary duty everyone owes to himself to get plenty of fresh air and some exercise, to eliminate the excessive use of stimulants, to obtain an average amount of sleep, to eat moderately; in short, to treat one's body with the respect that it demands."

**KNOW TEXAS**

Texas has always been famous as a cotton state; but in recent years this crop has taken second place to another "crop": In 1932 the value of the oil business was \$50,000,000 more than cotton.

Texas holds second rank to New York as the greatest export state in the union. Texas leads all others in export of raw materials; New York being leader in manufactured goods.

Sam Houston, Mark Anthony, and Napoleon Bonaparte stand out as the three generals in history who have captured the combined head of an army and a government in the same battle.

Deaf Smith captured a Mexican courier just before the battle of San Jacinto who had a saddle bag initial ed W. B. Travis. It was his souvenir from the massacre at the Alamo.

Casualties at the Battle of San Jacinto were: Texas, 6 killed, 24 wounded; Mexicans, 630 killed, 208 wounded and 730 captured.

The original of the constitution of Texas was lost in Tennessee. Only the newspaper reports were ever ratified, and in the archives of the State today, a copy of the document, as printed in the Texas Telegraph, reposes.

The "New Orleans Grays," organized in 1835, was the first military unit organized on American soil to go to the aid of the settlers who had decided to throw off the yoke of the Mexican tyranny. Adolphe Stern

Texas sold 100,000 square miles of land comprising portions of Oklahoma, Kansas, Wyoming, Colorado, and New Mexico, to the United States government for \$10,000,000.

Southwestern Texas has one of the largest spring areas to be found in the world. Ten natable springs flow almost one billion gallons of cold spring water daily. The largest Pecan spring in Val Verde county, flows 245,000,000 gallons daily.

The famous King ranch, close to Kingsville, Texas, is larger than the entire state of Delaware. This big ranch, covering several counties and operated as a unit since the early fifties, has recently been divided among the King heirs.

Texas produces 86 per cent of all the sulphur mined in the world.

Dallas has \$30,000,000 worth of hotel rooms in which to house the visitors to the Texas Centennial Exposition in 1936.

### MAKING COLLARS DEMONSTRATED TO HARMONY

H. D. CLUB

Rolled collars can be quickly and  
 easily designed from a flat collar  
 which has been blocked from your  
 foundation pattern, we learned at a  
 demonstration on designing and mak-  
 ing collars, given by the county dem-  
 onstration agent.  
 Take the plain flat collar and re-  
 design shape if you desire to, but  
 leave the neck line as it is. Start  
 slashing the collar from the outside  
 edge to inside edge as near the neck-  
 line as possible without cutting col-  
 lar in to. Do not begin slashing  
 nearer than one-half inch of the  
 center back. Slash according to amount  
 of roll you wish to have in collar.  
 Now lap the slashes over, the amount  
 depending on how much you want  
 the collar to roll. Pin this on paper  
 and cut the roll collar.

### CLAIREMONT H. D. CLUB

"Collars should be one half inch  
 smaller than the neckline if they are  
 to fit correctly and keep the facing  
 from showing at the back," said the  
 Home Demonstration Agent, to the  
 Clairemont club which met at the  
 home of Mrs. Wesley Osmon, on  
 April 29.

If the material is sheer such as  
 batiste and voile the collar should  
 be from three fourths to one inch  
 smaller. What we term as flat col-  
 lars are not perfectly flat. To make  
 a flat collar you decide upon the neck  
 line of the garment and block off a  
 collar that is exactly the same size  
 as the neckline then take off one-  
 fourth inch from center front or  
 more depending upon the material  
 to be used for the collar. When the  
 collar is stretched to fit neckline and  
 most of this is done from center back  
 to a little beyond the shoulder seam  
 you will have a slight roll which will  
 conceal the facing used to attach the  
 collar to the dress.

### BEDSPREADS DEMONSTRATED TO GIRARD 4-H GIRLS

"If cotton prints are used for bed-  
 spreads be sure that they are fast  
 color prints," said Miss Jones, the  
 C. H. D. agent to the Girard 4-H  
 club in a demonstration on dressing  
 our beds.

Spreads made of cotton prints or  
 tufted spreads quilted spreads, made  
 of "gunny sacks" were demonstrated  
 to our club. We learned that if  
 prints were used in making spreads  
 for a double bed that the spread  
 would be more attractive if we did  
 not have a seam down the center of  
 the spread but planned the making of  
 the spread so that the seams would  
 be on each side of the bed.

### POLAR 4-H CLUB

"Gunny sacks" can be used to  
 make suitable spreads, especially for  
 the beds that are on the sleeping  
 porch. Our home agent said that it  
 was better not to attempt to dye  
 these sacks any of the pastel shades  
 but leave them in their natural color  
 or dye them a dark green, rust or  
 brown for successful results in dye-  
 ing.

First they should be well cleaned  
 and have all sacks used in the spread  
 as near the same mesh as possible.  
 If they are lettered in black it may  
 be necessary to use a commercial  
 dye remover to remove the letters.  
 Before washing the sacks rinse them.  
 They are then ready to be made into  
 spreads. Using a facing out of a  
 durable cotton material, white if it  
 is to be dyed is suggested. This  
 facing should be about one half inch  
 in width when finished. Now it is  
 ready to be put in the dye bath.  
 Don't wash sacks in a washing ma-  
 chine.

"Flowers attractively arranged  
 gives a delightful touch to your bed  
 rooms," the home demonstration  
 agent told the Clairemont 4-H Club  
 girls in a demonstration on finishing  
 touches for bedrooms on May 1st.

We discovered that at this time of  
 the year there were lots of pretty  
 wild flowers which could be used to  
 make lovely bouquets for our bed-  
 rooms. Just a bunch of flowers in  
 a vase does not mean beauty added  
 to our rooms unless they are cor-  
 rectly arranged. First we have to con-  
 sider the container used, for instance  
 you would not want a bowl made of  
 pottery for daisies or a glass bowl  
 for zinnias or roses. If you use a wide  
 container the right proportion can  
 be attained for the height of flow-  
 ers used by making the height equal  
 one and one half times the width of  
 the container. If a tall vase is used  
 make the arrangement one and one  
 half times the height of the vase.

**Daniels Finds All Publishers Out of the Red**

The nation's publishers of newspapers, all of which were deeply in the red two years ago and had not emerged last year, are again in the black, it was declared by Joseph Daniels, ambassador to Mexico and publisher of the Raleigh News and Observer, after meeting his colleagues at the annual Spring convention of the Associated Press in New York.

"I haven't found a publisher who says he is still in the red," he told the New York Times. "Many of them are making larger profits than they made before the depression. I told them that in view of this improvement it was incumbent upon them to support the administration."

Asked whether he approved of the President's \$4,880,000,000 public works relief program, Mr. Daniels replied: "Of course. This country spent \$30,000,000,000 during the World War for purpose of destruction. Why can't it afford to spend very much less in peace time for constructive purposes? I spent \$4,000,000,000 myself when I was Secretary of the Navy."

**Dr. Brown Says Overwork, All Hokey**

Austin, May 9. — "One of the most maligned words in the dictionary is overwork," said Dr. John W. Brown, State Health Officer. "It is employed as an excuse to avoid unattractive social engagements. It is used to impress others with one's particular importance. It is frequently mentioned as the reason for one's business failures. And it certainly is most unjustly blamed for many bodily ills."

"As a matter of fact overwork is not nearly the hobgoblin it is painted to be. Abstractly speaking, overwork is a very decent term, behaves itself on most occasions, and does little damage to the lives of most of us. And more likely than not, where lack of health is concerned, overwork has had little if anything to do with the situation."

"Actually, work of a normal amount, or even above average, is not prone to do one any real damage. On the other hand, certain practices associated with the work or with living are likely to be the real offenders. Those who, for example, are victims of impure air, illogical diets, auto-intoxication, worry lack of exercise and insufficient sleep are usually the first to blame work for their sorry condition. And, no doubt, even an average amount of work can easily turn into a sense of overwork when one's capacity to do the job has been weakened by enervating habits."

"The best bulwark against ill effects from hard and sustained work in the conscientious adoption of a well rounded and properly balanced health program. And by this suggestion

is not meant a fanatical adherence to a long set of fancy rules, but only a reasonable sense of the primary duty everyone owes to himself to get plenty of fresh air and some exercise, to eliminate the excessive use of stimulants, to obtain an average amount of sleep, to eat moderately; in short, to treat one's body with the respect that it demands."
