Right now a Texas Legislative committee is in the midst of a check of the State Reform School for boys at Gatesville. This committee is headed by State Representative Vernon Stewart of Wichita Falls, a veteran legislator.

This writer is personally acquainted with Mr. Stewart, and our opinion of him, is a very favorable one.

Many times in the past few years, we have driven down through the State School. As you approach Gatesville from the north on Texas Highway 36, parts of the School are on each side of the road. The Mountain View Farm is off the road a way back to the north-east of the main buildings.

It does not give one a very good feeling to drive through this area. Many times we have seen these boys, usually in groups of 20 to 30. They are usually almost half Latin and half Negro, with a white boy in the group now and then. They range in age from 9 to 10 up to 13 or 14 in the area along the road.

Many times in the spring and summer you can see them along side the road in the bar ditch, or in the fields nearby, down on their knees side by side, picking the grass with their hands. The guard stands nearby. If the boys are chopping cotton, sometimes a guard will be horseback, with a gun across the saddle.

Sometimes you can see them near the road playing basketball at outdoor goals.

They always look neatly attired in white shirts and jeans.

Perhaps no one really knows as to how much brutality, if any, has been going on, except the ones involved. But it should be for the public good to check them out now and then.

## Management Of Irrigation Is An Important Thing

Irrigation is more than cranking the motor on your pump. The thing that separates one irrigation farmer from another is management. There is also more to irrigation than running water down a furrow.

The management of irrigation water requires many things. An underground irrigation pipe from the well will usually be needed. Underground pipe will eliminate water losses due to seepage and evaporation. It carries water to the place where needed without erosion. Valves spaced at periodic intervals on underground line permit portable gated pipe to be used.

The water intake rate of soils varies with each particular soil. Deep sands absorb water rapidly while heavy clays take water very slowly. To be able to manage water, the length of run, the amount of water to apply and the time of set should be fitted for each type of soil.

Sand and sandy loams take water rapidly and are to be sprinkled. The size of the sprinkler nozzles and the pressure needed should be such that no runoff or ponding results. The length and size of the main and lateral lines should be designed so excessive pressure loss will not result.

Many farms being irrigated today should not be irrigated in their present state. The slope may be excessive, resulting in tail water erosion.

The slope of the land may need to be changed by field leveling or bench leveling on the tighter soils. For sandy soils and sprinkler irrigation, parallel terraces may be needed.

The farmer should have a good working knowledge of the consumptive use rate of the crop, the amount of water needed and amount of water delivered to the area, the normal time needed for the soil to absorb the required amount of water and how to detect changes in intake.

## Strawn Well Is Completed

Midwest Oil Corp. completed a well as a Strawn discovery 12 miles southwest of Claiborne in Kent County.

Location is 818 feet from the south line and 2,049 feet from the west line of Section 7, Block 5, H and GN Survey.

The well potential to flow 161 barrels of 42 gravity oil. It is producing on a 19-64-inch choke from perforations at 7,156-69 feet where it was acidized with 300 gallons.

## GOVERNORS COMMITTEE MAKES FOR REACHING PLANS FOR THE TEXAS PUBLIC SCHOOLS

The new school plan has just about everyone in these parts rather shook up, you might say.

Governor Connally's Blue Ribbon educational committee has recommended broad and far reaching changes in the entire state program.

In general they want to combine the school in each county to schools of a minimum of 2600 students. For example, in Crosby County they have three schools, Crosbyton, Ralls

and Lorenzo and all three of them have a total of 2600 pupils. It is thought by some this was used as a guide line.

Jayton and Kent County people can well be concerned over the matter. They may leave a county school in Kent County for awhile, but eventually, and that not too long in the future. It would create too many inequities.

There would be only a very few schools left that Jayton could compete with, and that would require much travelling.

It is true, the ideal school would need more students than in Jayton; in order to offer a few more courses that some of the students may want.

But it is also true that the Jayton school is now doing a very fine job.

It has a very low figure of drop outs, with many, many going through all twelve of the grades right here in the local system.

Also, a very high percentage of the Jayton students go on to college, and a very high percentage of them make the grade and graduate with good grades.

One local school spokesman said this week, that he felt if some schools are of poor academic quality and are not conducting good schools, the Texas Education Agency is at least partly at fault for allowing this to happen. They are in constant touch with these little schools and know how they are doing, and accreditate them each year.

The editor of the Chronicle has seen the film that the Girard PTA plans to show. It is rather interesting. It outlines generally the new program from a financial standpoint.

It states that if the new plan is put into effect the cost of local education will go up by about two and a half times. It would cost about four percent of the annual income, it is said. And it will also take most of the responsibility of the school from local people and put it in the hands of the State and National Educational forces.

There is something you can do. It may help little, or more than that, who knows? New State leaders will be Governor Preston Smith, Lt. Governor Ben Barnes; State Senator David Ratliff of Stamford and State Representative Renal Rosson of Snyder. A telephone call, or a letter or personal visit to any or all of these men would help.

Jayton Superintendent R. N. Pierce is in Austin this week working on the matter. The committee has put out a map, which I have not yet seen. I am told that the present plans are to put Girard into a Dickens County unit with Spur, Patton Springs and McCadoo.

County Supt. Bob Gallagher has attended a number of meetings about the plan, and he, too, is working on the matter.

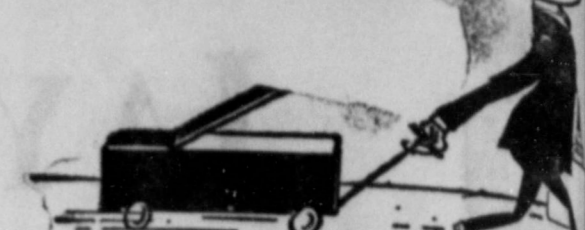

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**NOTICE TO BIDDERS**

Notice is hereby given that the Kent County Commissioners Court will receive bids on the following described 600 gallon Asphalt Unit. All bids must be sealed and received at the County Courthouse in Jayton on or before 10:00 A. M. on February 10, 1969 at which time all bids will be opened.

The units furnished under this specification shall be of the latest improved model in current production (as offered to commercial trade) and shall be of good quality material and workmanship. All equipment and components furnished under this specification shall be of new manufacture in accordance with sound engineering practice.

It is required that the unit be completely assembled, adjusted, all equipment including standard and extra equipment be installed, and the unit made ready for continued operation, prior to delivery to the purchaser.

Bidders shall submit with their bids, detailed specifications, photographs, and all other related data necessary to fully describe the equipment the bidder proposes to furnish. This literature shall include an engine chart corrected to standard conditions of air temperature and pressure showing the horsepower and other engine characteristics.

If the equipment offered differs from the provisions contained in this specification, such differences must be explained in detail on separate sheet attached to the bid and labeled as such. All such bids will receive consideration if such deviations do not depart from the intent of the specifications and are in the best interest of the purchaser.

**Specification**  
All equipment and components shall meet or exceed the following specifications:

1. TANK. Elliptical in shape made from tank steel with not less than No. 12 gauge shell and not less than No. 10 gauge heads, all electrically welded. Tanks to be equipped with not less than No. 12 gauge steel placed crosswise inside of the tank to prevent rapid shifting of material. Not less than 2 in. overflow pipe inside the tank and not less than 2 in. clean-out opening. Unit to have charging opening with gasket, basket type strainer and quick acting fastener or fasteners. Thermometer well in tank fitted with an inspector's type thermometer registering up to

500 degrees F. Tank to be insulated with no less than 1 1/2 inch thick rock wool blanket, with 18 gauge metal jacket.

2. HEATING UNIT. Two sets of not less than 6 inch U-type return heat flues located in lower half of tank. Necessary arrangements provided for expansion and contraction. Two removable heavy duty torch type burners shall be furnished. A 20-gallon fuel tank with safe piping to burners. Burners to use kerosene and are to be properly shielded from draught. Fuel to be pumped from tank to burners with a fuel pump V-belt driven with clutch connected to engine with by-pass around the pump through relief valve to maintain proper pressure under all engine speeds. A connection is to be provided for connecting up an additional torch if desired for separate thawing, drying, etc.

3. PUMP. Rotary type with not less than 2 inch suction and discharge openings. Pump to have a capacity of not less than 100 gallons per minute at 400 RPM. Pump valves and piping are to be enclosed in weatherproof warming housing of reinforced steel with ample door. Pump is to be provided with pressure relief valve to eliminate all danger of excessive pressure in lines and permitting by-passing of material when valves are closed.

4. ENGINE. Four-cylinder air cooled gasoline engine of not less than 20HP. with enclosed gear reduction drive; clutch air cleaner; governor; magneto carburetor and electric starting SYSEM complete with battery. Engine to be directly connected to material pump through flexible coupling. Wisconsin Model VE-4 or equal.

5. VALVE MECHANISM. So arranged that operator can do the following. Fill tank through pump from drums or supply tank; circulate material in the tank while heating; spray from tank through hand spray; spray from tank through spray bar; gravity draw-off connecting from tank to fill hand pots; drain pump and pipe lines without draining tank; transfer material from one outside source to another; arrangement to shut off flow to rear bar when using hand spray.

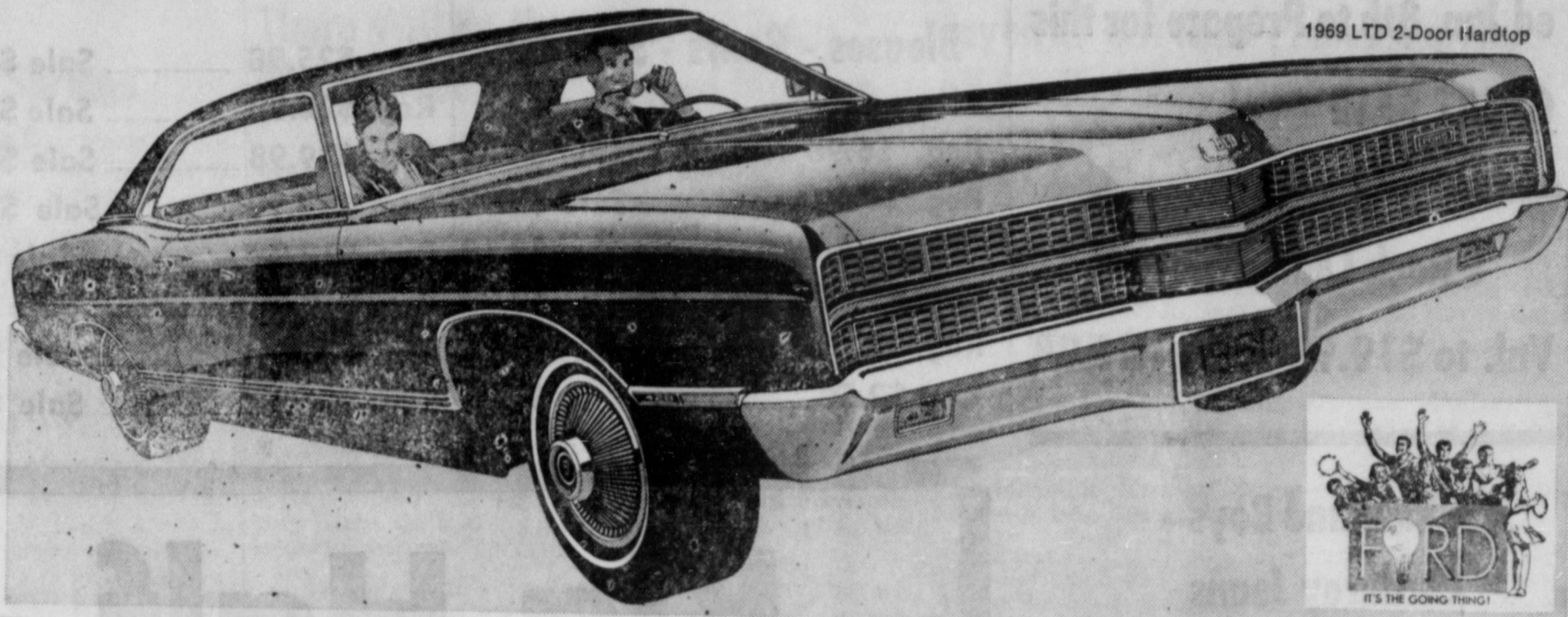
