Chapman Gives His Decision Annexing Girard to Jayton

Cravey Calf Wins 4-H Show

The 27th annual Kent County Stock Show was held at Clairemont last weekend with 118 animals being exhibited by Kent County 4-H club members.

Vena Lee Cravey exhibited the grand champion calf. Her 970 pound Hereford had been the blue ribbon winner in the heavy weight class. Reserve champion was shown by Deborah Stewart her second place heavy weight Angus. W. L. Mayer was the winner of the rate of gain contest with a 2.69 pound average daily gain from Nov. 2 until the day of the weigh-in at the show.

David Geeslin exhibited the first place light weight with his Hereford entry bred by Manuel Davis. Lisa Cravey showed the blue ribbon winner in the middle weight class with a Hereford bred by J. H. Daugherty Sr. He is also breeder of the champion calf.

Stewart Estate was the breeder of the reserve calf. Mayer Ranch bred the rate of gain winner.

Larry Taylor showed the grand champion market hog, with reserve honors going to Sharon Edwards.

The two animals placed one-two in the middle weight market hog class. Light weight class winner was Sharon Edwards.

Heavy weight hogs honors were won by Steve Carr.

Sharon Edwards showed the grand champion lamb, with the reserve honors going to Billy Wilson, on his first place cross bred wether. The champion was a Hampshire. Sharon Edwards showed the first place fine wool lamb.

Manuelita Davis exhibited the winner in the Quarterhorse filly class. Randy Hall won the Davis Memorial Trophy.

Showmanship winners were Cheryl Pickens, in the ewe division, Sharon Edwards in the sheep division, Lisa Cravey in the beef division, and Manuelita Davis in the horse division.

The Girard School District is now officially attached to the Jayton School district, according to a ruling made by District Judge Ben Charlie Chapman on Wednesday.

This case has been on file in district court since April of 1960 when the case was tried and the judge announced at the end of the trial that he would make his decision and enter the judgment at a later date. It took him almost nine years to decide to enter his judgment.

As a prelude to this decision, and the thing that prompted it, the Chronicle is told, a group of 162 qualified resident voters in the Girard School District presented the Girard School board

with a petition, asking them in effect to do anything they could to prevent their school from going into Dickens County. Following this, the Girard board petitioned the District Judge to make the ruling that he made.

This ruling is the direct result of lengthy negotiations between the Girard Board and the Jayton Board, Superintendents Bob Pierce and M. H. Galbreath, and County Superintendent Bob Gallagher and the County School Board.

Supt. R. N. Pierce told the Chronicle Thursday that all of the school people involved were aware of the proposed events and in approval with them, as they were unfolded.

As a part of Judge Chapman's final ruling, Supt. Galbreath is to be paid off for his three year contract and Mrs. Galbreath for one year. It is estimated this will amount to about \$45,000.00.

Judge Chapman's ruling lifts the injunction against the Kent County School Board and permits it to go ahead with the annexation proceedings. The Girard board was given until May 1 to finish its work and the current school term. The Dickens County school board, of course has the right to appeal Judge Chapman's decision to the State Appeal Court.

An election has been set for April 5th to elect a new seven man board for the new district. They will be elected, the top seven, to the board without regard to where they live, Girard, Jayton or Clairemont. School officials said Thursday they hoped the people would elect at least two from Girard and one from Clairemont, and even more if they wanted to.

The two superintendents of the schools with the presidents and secretaries of the two boards met Wednesday night to plan a smooth merging of the two systems.

Pierce said the Jayton facilities could enfold the 80 or so Girard students with no problem. The Girard board will meet soon to elect their teachers. Pierce said they were planning this to meet the needs of the new district. He said there possibly would be a change in the name of the school district to the Kent County School or to the Jayton-Girard School District. All other aspects of the school is expected to remain the same, he said.

A maintenance man will be employed to care for and maintain the Girard school property. The well will be maintained and the premises made available to be used as a community center to suit the desires of the people of the community, Pierce said.

Wednesday was the deadline to file for a place on the board election. The names of all seven members of the Jayton board have been filed. That of Billy Wallace, Ed Murrell, Buddy Gallagher, Bill Parks, Sleepy Browning, Raldo Goodall and Gerald Fincher.

Also Garth Gregory, C. V. Hagar, Chas. Kimmel and Buck Thompson and perhaps others. A full list will be published next week.

Jayton now has about 250 students enrolled. Girard has about 80. Allowing some to transfer this would make about 300 or more in the new district.

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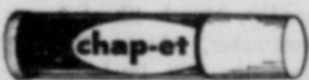

WHEREAS, She was born on March 4, 1915 in May, Texas, but had lived and visited in all parts of Texas and other Southwestern States; and

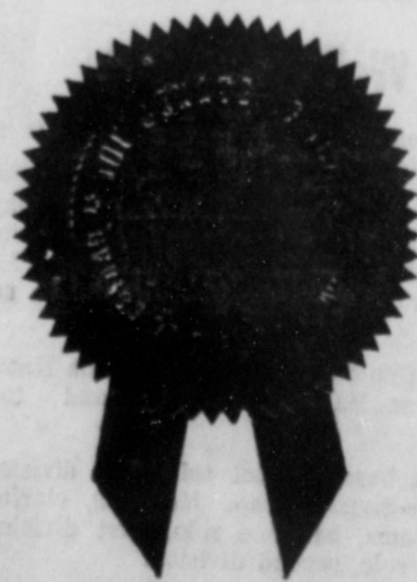
WHEREAS, She was a close supporter of her husband in his endeavors as a newspaper publisher and as a Primitive Baptist Minister; and

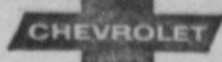
