Letter to Editor

Dear Mr. Editor:
 I noticed in the Jayton paper that the Girard School District had been transferred to the Jayton District without a vote of the Girard voters having any voice in it at all. Of course there was a petition signed preferring if we should rather (should it be moved we had rather it be kept in Kent County but it did not mean to do away with our school or our independent school nor the holding of our rights. I do not believe any power has the right to force us to give up our local self government to the will of any president, governor or any other power.

If our home people want to vote to move our school out to another school it should be of the will of the qualified voter of our home people. (just a petition). The time has come that the people should have a voice according to law and that law should be based on right and respect to their home people.

You may say old Matt is stirred up. I will say I am hurt and heart sick to lose what I have worked for with my other home people for over fifty years to build a school from a one teacher school to one of the best little schools any where and as well equipped as you see any where and can say with pride has put out graduates who have made good citizens. But now we have to see all torn down and that by force.

We need to demand of our representatives respect for our homes and self government. They have no right to divide our people nor say what we shall do. If our people want to vote our destruction let them do it but not force things on them. All I want and all our people want is to have a right to have a voice in our community and when that is done whether right or wrong let it be.

I am willing to yield to the will of our home people and to work for the best interest of the masses not the special few who would destroy what others have given their lives make. I will say if we have to lose our school I had rather have in Kent County, not that I would do any harm to Spur, but we are in Kent County and it should be in our county.

I am for all schools in our State but not in favor of just one in a county. Our rural schools are the very best we have.

Notes From The County HD Agent

What's on the clean scene list at your house? - floors, walls, windows, furniture, clothes? If your house plants have a tired and dingy look, they need cleaning just as you do when you look tired and dingy. Dust, soot, and fireplace ash are bound to deposit a film on the plants' leaves and it will stay there and collect more dust unless you literally wash it off. Veteran gardeners know the merits of an occasional bath for house plants and have various methods of giving it. Probably the easiest way is simply to cover the dirt in the pot with waxed paper, and swab each leaf with a sudsy sponge. Gentle handling is very important so the plant doesn't get bruised. Rinse each leaf carefully.

Of every ten household food dollars, convenience foods today claim three - compared with \$2.75 in 1955. Buying trends are shifting from canned to fresh fruit juices and from fresh to processed potatoes. The average householder in 1965 used 30 percent more condensed soups and 100 percent more dehydrated soups than he did in 1955 and bought more bakery products in advanced stages of preparation than he did bakery mixes.

Convenience foods may ease chores but they complicate food shopping. With more convenience foods being used, family decision-making of food is becoming more complex. More foods are now in convenient form and the homemaker must choose whether to include convenience foods in her shopping, she must compare seemingly identical products, and she must know how to shop.

The next meeting will be April 29 in Jayton. 4-Hers going to the District Contest will be given the opportunity to practice their demonstrations at this meeting.

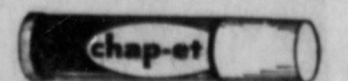

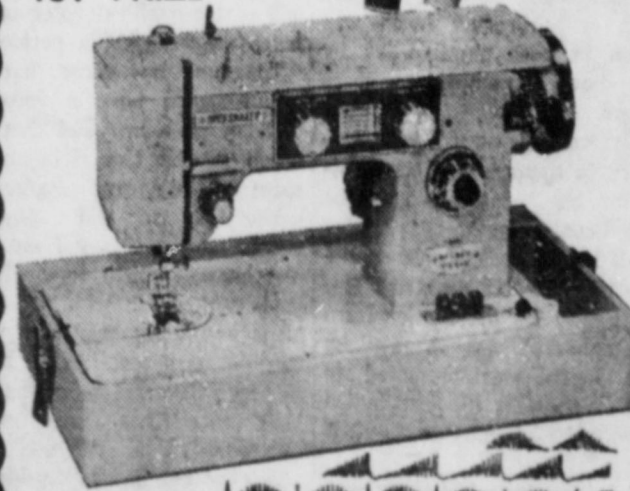

PUBLIC NOTICE

RECORDATION AND LIMITATION OF CERTAIN CLAIMS OF WATER RIGHTS.

Notice is here given as required by Section 4 of the Water Rights Adjudication Act of 1967 (Article 7542a, Vernon's Civil Statutes) that all claims of riparian water rights, all claims under Article 7500a, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, 1925, to impound, divert or use public waters for other than domestic and livestock purposes for which no permit has been issued, all claims of water rights under the Irrigation Acts of 1889 and 1895 which were not filed with the State Board of Water Engineers in accordance with the Irrigation Act of 1913, as amended, and all other claims of water rights other than claims under permits and certified filings, must be recorded with the Texas Water Rights Commission. Section 4 does not apply to use of water for domestic and livestock purposes as the same is defined by Commission Rules.

On or before September 1, 1969, every person claiming any water right to which Section 4 applies shall file with the Commission a sworn statement setting forth the nature of the claim of water right. Claims to which the Section applies shall be recognized only if valid under existing law and only to the extent of actual application of water to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1967, inclusive. However, in any case where any claimant of a riparian right has prior to August 28, 1967, commenced or completed the construction of works designed to apply a greater quantity of water to beneficial use, such right shall be recognized to the extent of the maximum amount of water actually applied to beneficial use without waste during any calendar year from 1963 to 1970, inclusive; provided an additional sworn statement is filed on or before July 1, 1971. Failure to file the sworn statement or statements in substantial compliance with Section 4 shall extinguish and bar any claim of water right to which the Section applies.

Instructions and forms for recording claims may be obtained without cost from the Texas Water Rights Commission, P.O. Box 12396, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711.
